beneficiaries. Based in Cornwall, UK, with 18 international affiliates (including Rotary), ShelterBox is an international disaster relief charity that delivers emergency shelter, warmth and dignity to people made homeless by disasters worldwide.

Most recently ShelterBox (partnering with Rotary) sent a response team to Italy following the 6.2-magnitude earthquake which struck central Italy killing more than 240 people and trapping an unknown number beneath rubble. Tremors were felt as far away as Rome, 100 km (65 miles) southwest of the quake's epicentre.

ShelterBox NZ is a registered charity with New Zealand Charity Services (CC49035) and is a 'registered charitable entity' under the Charities Act 2005. ShelterBox New Zealand has also been granted 'Approved donee status' by the New Zealand Government and, as such, individuals can claim a tax credit for their donations to ShelterBox.

Each ShelterBox costs around NZ\$1,500. If you would like to learn more, talk to our International Committee members. President Gary

Mabel Msopero arrived in New Zealand from Zimbabwe in 2002. She is the mother of four grown children - 2 boys and 2 girls and grandmother to a 3-year-old lovely boy. Two of her children work as nurses, one works as an IT engineer, and the other as a geneticist & microbiologist. She has worked in education for 32 years, 14 of those years in New Zealand. Before joining English Language Partners she was a High School teacher of English in Palmerston North. She is on the Asylum Seekers Support Trust Board and on the Auckland Council Ethnic People's Advisory Panel. She is passionate about education and the community and loves being the centre

manager at ELPNZ North Shore.

Mabel has such a passion for the job that her co-workers wondered if she ever went home. English Language Partners provides English language skills to refugees/migrants. It started in the 1970s with home tutors. In 1992 a National Association was formed and ELPNZ was formed in 2014 based in Wellington. They have 6500 learners, 2000 volunteers and 310 teachers and support staff.

Locally last year they helped 357 Asians, 33 Europeans, 44 from Middle East, two Pacific islanders and 13 from South America. 65% of their funding is from government contracts (TEC). They run four tutor training courses per year. Language is the primary focus but they also help people to fill in forms rather than doing it for them. In Browns Bay in conjunction with the Chinese Association they have an over-60 group and are trying to set up a similar one in Albany for under 60s. They also help people looking for work by making their CV Kiwi friendly and helping them with coffee conversation like the All Blacks. They provide an intensive ESOL of 250 hours five days a week for three hours. They also provide a government prepaid one-to-one service for new migrants. They have social functions a couple of times a year and are always looking for help by donation or people becoming volunteers. She asked us to recommend the service to neighbours.

The world is indeed full of peril and in it are many dark places. However, there is much that is fair and just and this is where the future begins. Everything starts again here, from today.
