Also notate the payment to nominate the Charity or purpose the funds are for, if it is for a specific Charity.

Failure to make these payments to the Clubs Charitable Trust Account, will invalidate any receipt for IRD and Charities Commission purposes. If members personally make out a donation/contribution directly to the Charity, or the Charities Bank account, it will not be able to be claimed as a Charitable Donation, unless the recipient is a registered Charity and issues you with an appropriately identified Receipt.

The Club will consolidate the moneys for the specific Charity and forward a single payment from our **Charitable Trust Account** directly to the respective Charity.

The recipient will then be able to Claim the money as received from a Registered Charity for IRD purposes.

The Club "Charitable Trust Account" will also make out an IRD acceptable Receipt to you for your Contribution.



The proposed off leash Dog Park is situated on left beside Ti Irirangi Drive in the present waste ground as shown in the above plan.

The Club has the opportunity to be involved in developing the park with assistance of the Council. We need to provide Council with a Project scope and can implement or manage any part of the project.

The Park will have clear walking areas over its surface, firm pathways clear of grass, Rubbish Bins, Bench seating, Sign for "Rules of the Park," Water provision for Dogs to obtain a drink. Shelter for Hot or Wet days, Control Exit Gates at the boundary and entrance to retain pets inside park when off leash. The park will have a boundary fence around it entire perimeter.

Adjacent car parking will be available.

Currently the project has no start / finish date as it is only in the conceptual stage of planning, but it would hope to be completed over the next 12 months.

A future pathway (in Red) connecting the Park with the walkway alongside Ti Irirangi Drive on the right of the above plan will be built.

Updating you on the ongoing Rotary champagne to rid the world of Polio

Polio vaccine campaign targets 100 million African children

Health workers are preparing to vaccinate more than 116 million children against polio in West and Central Africa in a new drive to contain last year's outbreak of the disease in conflict-hit north-east Nigeria.

Thompson Reuters Foundation journalist Kieran Guilbert shared the news with world media recently, explaining that vaccination teams are aiming to reach every child under five in 13 countries as part of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) led by the World Health Organisation and Rotary International.

The article told how fighting between jihadist group Boko Haram and the Nigerian Army has caused mass displacement, raising fears the polio outbreak could spread across borders and throughout the region.

The news, of course, underlines the importance of Rotary International's push this Rotary year to step up fundraising to safeguard funding of ongoing surveillance and vaccination campaigns in a myriad of countries.

Polio appeared beaten in Africa after two years of no cases, but the discovery of four cases in the war-torn area last August had dramatic impact.

"The goal is to ensure polio has nowhere to hide," GPEI director Michael Zaffran told the Thompson Reuters reporter.

"We won't reach every child, but we are hoping for at least a 90 per cent coverage," he said.

Carol Pandak, director of Rotary International's *End Polio Now* campaign, said no effort will be spared with this latest immunisation project.



"Some 190,000 polio vaccinators will travel house to house throughout villages, towns and cities across the 13 countries, carrying the polio vaccines in ice-filled bags to ensure they do not spoil.

"The vaccination teams will reach children on the move by targeting bus and train stations, toll plazas and country borders," Carol explained. The GPEI was officially launched in 1988 and originally aimed to end all polio transmission by 2000. While there has been a 99.9 per cent reduction in cases worldwide since that time, fighting the final 0.1 per cent has been much tougher than expected.

Some 37 global cases were reported in 2016, and just five cases to date in 2017.

New Zealand Prime Minister awards outstanding students

New Zealand Prime Minister Rt Hon Bill English presented awards to three outstanding students at the Rotary Club of Port Nicholson in Wellington on March 22.

The awards were developed by the club for students who had set goals to overcome a significant setback in their lives and had achieved those goals. The awards currently carry a cash scholarship of \$3000 per student and have been running for many years, thanks to the support of club members and sponsors in the community.

In 2017 the winners were:

- Emily Dwight, who was diagnosed with thyroid cancer after she was used as a model to demonstrate neck ultrasounds. She had surgery to remove her thyroid gland followed by radiation therapy, but went on to win Dean's Commendation for fifth year medicine.
- Jeremy Haggland is still in chronic pain after a medical misadventure while undergoing surgery in 2009, which led to multiple operations over seven years. Now aged 44, Jeremy is in his final year of a Bachelor of Nursing (Maori) and is active in the student community.
- Julie Vidal and her sister were raised by their father, who died

in 2016. Julie is doing Law/Arts degrees at Victoria University and has volunteered at the local Soup Kitchen since she was 15. She now also helps out at the Community Law Centre.

With 2017 being an election year in New Zealand, there was a high level of interest in Mr English's address. He became Prime Minister in December last year after John Key stepped down. This was Mr English's first visit to the club. He commended the recipients for their determination and perseverance.

Bill Boyd's Usborne **Dictionary Project bringing** words to life

The Usborne Dictionary Project provides children, often from homes where books are few and far between, with their own illustrated dictionary.


The project began in 2008, through a joint venture between the Bill and Lorna Boyd Charitable Trust and the Rotary Club of Pakuranga, with the intent of improving literacy rates in low decile areas. Bill witnessed the benefits of a similar project in the USA during his year as Rotary International president, and wished to see New Zealand children enjoy the same results.

"It is often the case the dictionary is the first book the children have at home - and especially the first one that belongs to them."

The dictionary is far from traditional, with more than 1000 colour illustrations accompanying 10,000 entries and 25,000 definitions, making it an attractive read to old and young alike. More than 120,000 have been distributed throughout New Zealand so far, equating to a retail value in excess of \$3 million.

"It is often the case that the dictionary is the first book the children have at home - and especially the first one that belongs to them," Bill said.

While originally aimed at New Zealand Year 4 students, aged 8 to 9, the dictionary is now supplied to every child who passes through Refugee Resettlement Centre, schools in the Pacific Islands and prisons. Parents, many of who suffer reading difficulties themselves, have also reported reading

clubs then purchase copies at \$NZ9.50 each, subsequently rebuilding the Trust's funds.

"It's a magic Rotary moment to be at a school watching a child put their name in what becomes their own book," Bill said. "It's something we'd like to see happening everywhere there's a need."
