FORUM REPORT

President Lionel opened the meeting and welcomed all those present. He noted that this Forum was focussed on two particular topics:

- 1. Use of the Charitable Trust fund for 2019-2020 year.
- 2. Social programme for the club 2020-2021 year.

President Lionel introduced his Paper which had been pre-circulated, and emphasised it was focussed on the Club's Charitable Trust and not the other Trusts for which the Club had responsibility. He described the funds already dispersed in the 2019-2020 year. These amounted to \$16,264.

The current account level as at 1 April 2020 was \$27,349 comprising \$13,403 from general funds plus \$13,496 from the Gorman legacy. President Lionel explained that his paper contained 3 recommendations put together following discussion by the Board.

Recommendation 1: represented the main item of expenditure for the Trust being \$10,000 to be donated to the new Wellington Children's Hospital. This was discussed and carried by a show of hands.

Recommendation 2.

This proposed that \$2000 be allocated to the Rotary Foundation. Having been advised that this was close to the recommended amount per member, it was carried by a show of hands.

Recommendation 3.

President Lionel explained that this recommendation 3 was comprised of two separate funding streams of \$5,000 each in total from the Gorman legacy. The first (3a) was allocated to specific Rotary projects, namely the Give every Child a Future project, two Emergency Response Kits and St. Mary's College Peer Support. Recommendation (3b) was targeted to address local Covid related consequences. This was discussed but not fully resolved. It will be reconsidered by the Board, taking note of the comments from the meeting.

SOCIAL PROGRAMME

PE David Young outlined the proposed social programme for the year ahead. This included continuation of Friday Fellowship at varied locations, the newly introduced monthly evening meeting at Automat. This would be of a more social nature with partners included. As well as one off social events there was a proposal for one off café get-togethers.
