Nikau Foundation



Our joint guest speakers, Alice Montague and Emma Lewis came in by Zoom to give a presentation on the Nikau Foundation.

Alice Montague

Operating in Wellington since 1991, the Nikau Foundation was inspired by the work of community foundations overseas, particularly USA. With the objective of growing generosity, the community foundation's model builds reliable funding streams to create long-term community transformation. All gifts it receives are ethically invested and grown, with the ongoing income earned distributed in grants to community organisations, initiatives, and projects throughout the Wellington region.

Essentially, the Foundation accumulates and invests funds on behalf of organisations and individuals for charitable distribution either generally or

by specific preferences. Grants, organised by the Foundation total \$1 million PA. Much of the talk was conveyed in management jargon and did not explain how much of the contributions were devoted to funding the organisation itself.
