


Conservationist Jim
Lynch, QSM, who from
1990 to 1995, managed
to sell his dream of a

pride. Jim, who was
President of the

Wellington Branch of Forest and Bird from 1991, is now retired and living in Waikanae and remains humble about his achievement. He's adamant that he was just a small cog within a much larger group effort.

Jim was born in 1947 in Whangarei and grew up on a farm in Hukerenui. He was also well known as a cartoonist. His first cartoons were published in the *Taranaki Daily News* in 1979, appearing weekly until 1986, and he produced fortnightly cartoons for the *New Zealand Times* from 1981 to 1985. He was the runner-up in the New Zealand Cartoonist of the Year category at the Qantas Press Awards in 1983. His cartoons appeared under the name 'James' as he didn't want to go to his boss and ask if he could have secondary employment as a political cartoonist".

RIP DR FRANCIS SMALL CNZM



Francis' long struggle with Parkinsons ended, age 75 on Friday 5th March. He died peacefully at Te Hopai surrounded by his family.

Francis was a long-time member of Wellington North, although for many years he was known as the invisible member due to his other extensive activities precluding regular attendance. Nevertheless, he contributed to the Club in several other ways. In his latter days, he was a regular attender, supported by his wife, Dianne, until such time as he was unable to attend, despite his best efforts. Francis was a Paul Harris Fellow and recipient of a Rotary Centennial Service Award for Professional Excellence

Francis was a true railwayman, having progressed through the ranks to become Managing Director of New Zealand Rail and Tranz Rail Ltd. He was a key figure in the sweeping changes which took place in the 1980's as a result of the Booze Allen Review. This continued into the 1990's with the sale of Tranz Rail to Wisconsin Central, Berkshire Partners and Fay Richwhite, thus leading to his positive working relationship and friendship with Wisconsin's Ed Burkhardt, who was a guest speaker at the Club.

Over the years, Francis held 17 company directorships, several of which he was Chairman, including Meridian Energy, the Met Service and the Centre for Advanced Engineering. His many roles ranged from Wisconsin Central Transportation to the Antarctic.

Amongst Francis' many interests were his forty years of services to Scouts, mainly in the training and development roles. He was awarded the Bronze Woolf, the highest award from the World Scouting Organisation.


His funeral will take place on Friday 12th March at 3pm at Old St. Pauls.

Rotary Youth Programme of Enrichment

Due to circumstances beyond his control George Prince was unable to participate in the student exchange with Australia. The Club has subsequently nominated George to attend this year's RYPEN course to be held from 26-28 March, at the Vertical Horizon Outdoor Adventure Centre, 572 Everett Road, Inglewood, Taranaki.

With the course at risk due to a projected shortfall in attendees, the club has nominated a second student, through Te Ara, for Joseph Pickavance, who will be able to attend with

financial assistance from our club and the Ian Crabtree Trust.

RYPEN is aimed at young people in the 15 –17 age group who are not likely to be selected for Youth Exchange or later for RYLA, but who possess qualities of decency, persistence and application and who deserve further encouragement. The young people will be presented with a series of ideas, challenges and social experiences, which will hopefully assist them in broadening their horizons socially, culturally and physically.

GUEST SPEAKER

James Renwick is a weather and climate researcher. He is Professor of Physical Geography at Victoria University, specialising in large-scale climate variations.

Professor Renwick used a series of scientific charts, including sea level rise predictions, to clearly explain the causes and consequences of climate change and what steps need to be taken to meet the 2050 zero carbon target. In order to achieve this, a reduction of 50% in greenhouse gasses was necessary by 2030. The areas being targeted are transport, fossil fuels, animal emissions and deforestation. With regard to the latter, long-life natives planting produces a much better result that short cycle pine plantations. He said that we must work together to achieve our target. New Zealand, if acting positively, could inspire and support other nations to achieve their targets.

A question was asked if it was time to revisit non-polluting nuclear energy. Professor Renwick's response was that this could be an answer for countries which already rely on this solution, but there was no satisfactory answer to the disposal of nuclear waste. Meanwhile, New Zealand still had many opportunities ahead for energy derived from the sun.

View of the upper floors showing the Rotary sponsored recreation area


