NICK HURLEY is Chair of the District 9940 International Service Committee and a Director representing the

District on Rotary New Zealand World Community Service – RNZWCS Ltd. He has been a career diplomat who has worked with the MFAT since 1974, formally retiring in 2014 but continuing to carry out assignments for MFAT until three years ago. He has had extensive experience in the Pacific and Europe with overseas postings in Samoa, Cook Islands, Fiji, Solomon Islands, Paris, Rome and Brisbane.

In Paris, he was Deputy Ambassador and Permanent Representative to UNESCO, and in Fiji he was Deputy High Commissioner. His first posting was to the Cook Islands in the mid-to-late 1970s. While on overseas posting, Nick has also been a member of the Rotary Clubs of Honiara (Solomon Islands), Mid-City Brisbane, Apia and Rarotonga. He has held a number of senior positions in MFAT in Wellington including APEC Senior Official, Director of the Economic Division, and Deputy Director of the Development Cooperation Division.

CHRISTINE HURLEY is a member of the Rotary Club of Wellington. She represents RCW on the Australasian steering group of the centenary immunisation project Rotary Give Every Child a Future and chairs its NZ engagement and fundraising committee.

Christine has a background in public service policy and NGO management. She holds a Master of Arts in English literature from the University of Canterbury and a Graduate

Diploma from Victoria University of Wellington. She accompanied husband Nick on his postings as High Commissioner to Samoa, where she headed up the Samoa Cancer Society, and then to the Cook Islands and Tonga. During these postings, Christine served on the boards of the Rotary Clubs of Apia and Rarotonga.

GUEST SPEAKER



Tony Hildyard, who was introduced by David Young, is a Senior Portfolio Specialist for Harbour **Asset Management** limited, responsible for the management

of Harbours Global Bond Offering. He has had broad Fund Management experience, including spending 20 years with Tower Asset Management Limited. Tony developed specialist investment skills having had portfolio management roles in both domestic and global

fixed interest, currency management and New Zealand commercial property. Tony had seven years working for the US based Global Bond Firm, PIMCO where he was their sole representative in New Zealand.

Tony began his presentation by referring to the Russia/Ukraine war, noting how Europe was overexposed to Russia, particularly for oil and gas. Together with grain shortage, this has had a world-wide effect on financial markets. He said that the challenge now was to balance interest rate increases with getting inflation under control. Financial markets were very fluid at present and supply chain issues, particularly the reliance on China, only added to the concerns. Peter Shanahan gave the vote of thanks and so forth.

CREATING A TOMORROW FOR ROTARY – ADVANCE NOTICE



Rotary began in 1905 in Chicago as a diversified lunch group of four men in 1905. Over subsequent years it grew internationally and evolved from just meeting to serving the community. While the rules of Rotary were established around membership procedures and rule, the ground has shifted with membership decline and escalating community needs. Hence, it's time for a change to recognise the current situation and to build a new future for Rotary. The new RI President, Jennifer Jones, has the theme of Imagine Rotary.

Nevertheless, there needs to be a process to change the fundamentals while retaining the advantages of our international organisation. The Council on Legislation, at its April meeting, voted to begin a three-year Pilot Study in two selected Regions to redefine the structure and objectives of Rotary. We are honoured that the selected regions are Oceania, accompanied by

RIBI [UK & Ireland]. All clubs in the Regions will be asked to vote on the proposal. In order to present it to our District DGE Wayne Gordon has implemented a Roadshow to present the facts to clubs. Groups of clubs have been tasked to meet at combined meetings. However, as out club has three PDG's who have attended a District Advisory Committee briefing, we are going to have our own session, led by Morris Robertson, at the Club meeting of 4th August.

Wellington North is part of the way down the proposed track with its growing links with its community. Papers prepared by Morris Robertson and Maurice Manttan on the Club's future opportunities beyond Revitalisation, will form part of the presentation.

ROTARY ACTION IN UKRAINE RNZWCS Ltd. CONNECTION



Thank you to all those who continue to support this appeal. Rotary NZ World Community Service is working directly with Rotary DG 2232 Ukraine and being supported by members of the Ukraine Association of New Zealand who have requested their members support the RNZWCS Ltd. appeal.

RNZWCS is in personal contact with immediate Past District Governor Volodymyr Bondarenko through an interpreter. The District has 62 clubs, 1111 Rotarians, and 380 Rotaractors. The PDG has set up a Rotary Committee to deal with the continuing humanitarian catastrophe. Daily operational meetings allow it to respond instantly to the changing needs of communities in cities and villages where there is a full-scale war or in the aftermath. Humanitarian hubs have been set up on the western border of Ukraine, where humanitarian goods from Europe and the World arrive daily including basic medicines, medical equipment, diapers, food, water, clothing, linen, and hygiene items. Distribution is made through the 62 clubs who apply to the district committee and satisfy them that the number of packages they request will be

distributed. Rotarians in Poland are assisting with purchases. Polish trucks cannot cross the border, so goods are transhipped to Ukraine vehicles. Unlike some other NGO's Rotary will not make cash grants. Recent advice is that five powerful diesel generators (10kW) and nine gasoline generators, with a capacity of 2.2 kW, were distributed on 23rd June to Ukrainian communities and hospitals where the grid was destroyed and where the need for electricity is vital. PDG Volodymyr is providing full transparency and reporting.

Projected outcomes are to continue to meet lifesaving needs for the crisis-affected civilian population and to save and preserve lives, ease suffering and promote self-sufficiency in the long term. It is recommended that you use RNZWCS Limited to donate to this crisis. RNZWCS Limited is aware of scams being perpetrated which may have already 'caught' some. RNZWCS also requires accountability reports. Their website www.rnzwcs.org / Facebook pages and other social media have further details.
