NEXT LUNCHEON SPEAKER



President Stephen Spence arrived in Wellington in November 1982 to join the Traffic

Management branch of the Town Planning Department and, two years later, became City Traffic Engineer. Throughout his 39 years with the Council, Stephen's main task was to keep Wellington moving, while perpetually waiting for the outcome of "Let's get Wellington Moving" to emerge in reality.

Over time, Stephen became responsible for a broad transportation and traffic team, planning, designing and managing the city's transportation network as well as car parking buildings, street lighting and a range of transport assets. One of his major successes was the installation of the SCATS traffic signal system across the city, which made a big difference to traffic flow and safety. Stephen, who has served eight Mayors and six CEO's, was originally nominated for Rotary by his friend and colleague, the late Ken Boyden.

NEXT EVENING MEETING – 28 OCTOBER CLIMATE CHANGE: IS GLASGOW THE LAST CHANCE TO SAVE THE PLANET?

Join members of KPC, Ngaio Union in a gathering at KPC hosted by Wellington North Rotary to highlight the importance of the impending COP26 climate negotiations.



Our speaker will be Dr Adrian Macey, a former diplomat who has served as New Zealand Ambassador in Bangkok and Paris. He has also been New Zealand's Chief Trade Negotiator and was our first Climate Change Ambassador. He served as Vice-chair and then Chair of the UN climate change negotiations under the Kyoto Protocol in 2010-2011.

Adrian is currently an adjunct Professor at the New Zealand Climate Change Research Institute, based at Victoria University. If you want to know more about the political dynamics of climate change, and what's at stake at the Glasgow meeting, don't miss this special opportunity.

Widely travelled, she has English and Business degrees from VUW as well as a Master of Development Studies. Amelia Volkerling is a registered educational psychologist. She is in charge of selecting Āwhina Education programmes and ensuring that its teaching and plans are up to scratch.

The objective of \bar{A} whina Education, as expressed by Amelia is to make the world a better place by creating a culture shift in the education system so that every child is recognised as having their own learning style and supported to be their best self.

Melissa and Amelia gave a very informative joint talk on the techniques they use to kick start reading ability by children who have specific difficulties. The talk was well illustrated with a few challenging tests for the audience. An interesting statistic was that the 26 letters of the alphabet convey 44 distinct sounds. Brian believes it is time to bring in new blood and I have invited expressions of interest from members to fill Brian's vacancy. Thank you, Brian, for the skills and dedication you have brought to the position over the last 6 years.

KIWI COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE



Tracy, who has had a range of medical issues during the course of the year, resulting in her being admitted to hospital several times, is now back in action,

although continuing pain remains a problem.

She has expressed her sincerest thanks to Wellington North Rotary for its continued support of KCA. "We are at the end of our trial period for the gaprie ropes instead of using shrink wrap and they have proven successful for us. This will reduce the amount of soft plastics and is more environmentally friendly for KCA."

Michele has stepped down from being KCA's General Manager and has returned to being a volunteer once a month on a Sunday, making up boxes of food once the farmers markets reopen at level 1. As KCA is deemed an essential service, it has had to stand down all of its non-food volunteers in order for the food operations to continue. All of the drop off points for non-food will remain closed until level 1.

Tracy's first full month back at KCA, was the busiest, so far, this financial year! The team of 16 (skeleton crew) have been working contactless and have managed to distribute over 44 tons of food donated via KCA's food rescue programme and from generous sponsors. KCA food team are making up emergency orders for clothing only and are distributing large quantities of donated PPE gear such as Spray-n-Wipe, hand sanitiser and face masks. They made up 388 banana boxes of non-food items.

As the team is working contactless only volunteers are allowed into the warehouse. This is to protect the volunteers and the warehouse, which has been sanitised and deep cleaned by Chemwash twice in recent weeks as added protection as there has been stock arriving from Auckland.
