## **NEXT LUNCHEON GUEST SPEAKER**



Ken Irwin QSO has had a comprehensive career using his special skills in independent inquiry, conflict resolution and managing projects that required discerning but discreet people management. He has

been professional advisor on health and social service strategies, Government interface with community organisations, Maori initiatives and CEO of Presbyterian Support. He is a fluent speaker of Te Reo.

He is experienced in governance roles, including membership of the Board of NZ Mental Health Foundation and the Board of Turakina Maori Girls College. Ken is currently Advisor to two Maori Trusts delivering prison programmes and social services. Locally, he had an extended interim role as Minister of Khandallah Presbyterian Church. Ken is a former Rotarian and he was President of the RC of Dunedin in 1990 [188 members]

Ken joined in the WN Rotary reading programme at Wainuiomata Intermediate School in June 2014. That makes him effectively a foundation member of the programme in Wainuiomata. In 2015, Ken thoughtfully offered to take over the task of managing the roster of volunteers and liaising with the school. It is only now that he has asked to retire from the role.

With Ken acting as our rock and mainstay at Wainuiomata Intermediate, it means the Club has been able to expand the reading programme to a second school in Wainuiomata, Arakura Primary school. He has helped make the programme a fitting symbol of this club's community engagement.

## **DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S VISIT**

DG Mark Wheeler ONZM met initially with the Board for a review of the Club's activities and to outline the future for Rotary. Area Governor, David Shackelton, was also present.



In his address to the club, after an introduction by PDG John Mohi, Mark paid tribute to Wellington North's four PDG's and their continuing contribution to the District. He then went on to speak about the changing structure of Districts, whereby New Zealand could become two, or even one District by 2024. In this situation, the overall Governor would be supported by Area Governors who would be the first port of call for clubs.

DG Mark commented on the various youth programmes the Club was involved with and called upon members to further unlock the potential of youth, urging support for Rotaract and Interact. His final message was think differently, throw out the rule book and plan a club for the future.

The vote of thanks was given by PDG Tony Fryer.

## **FROM THE PRESIDENT**

At our last lunch meeting on 18 November we had the pleasure of a visit by District Governor Mark Wheeler which was well attended by members and partners. Mark met with the Board before lunch when he touched on upcoming changes to the Rotary structure and heard from the Board about our Club's activities. After lunch Mark was our guest speaker when he gave a very informative explanation about future potential management formats at District level for NZ and how clubs will have the opportunity to influence these in the New Year. Mark was very complimentary about our club and acknowledged the significant contribution we make to our community which Rotary could ill afford to lose.

#### KEY ITEMS FROM 15 NOVEMBER BOARD MEETING

PROSPECTIVE MEMBER - The Board welcomed the nomination of Michael Hinds as a prospective member. We look forward to Michael joining us in the near future.

SCHOLARSHIP TRUST - The Board received a full and informative report from Pat Helm, Chair of the Scholarship Trust. This referred, among other things, to a number of important issues for the Trust and the Club relating to future policies and practices. These include - the life of the Trust; the quantum of annual allocation of funds - the awards selection process and a review of the purpose of the Trust Deed. The Board is keen for the club to make progress on these key issues as a matter of priority so that that the substantial Trust funds can make a greater contribution to addressing present and future needs.

APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES – The Board received a report on a possible future process for appointing Trustees for the three Club Trusts, which would bring a greater degree of consistency across the Trusts. This was approved by the Board for discussion with the Trustees.

SCHOLARSHIP PANEL – A report from the Scholarship Panel, presented the results of this year's scholarship applications. The report noted there were 29 applicants with 15 students recommended for grants totalling \$60k, with a further six students recommended, subject to availability of additional funding. The Board was happy to agree to the recommendations, with the successful students to be invited to attend a BBQ at the Khandallah Bowling Club on 20 January to receive their awards.

FUNDRAISING PROJECTS – As we all know the fair being cancelled means a loss of income for

our charitable trust for this Rotary year. The Board agreed to ask the Fair Committee to reform to act as a brains trust for finding other ways to raise funds for the charitable trust. This will mean coming up with ideas for smaller-sized fundraising events that the club can quickly commit to. The first of these is Lionel Nunns\_Fair Replacement Fun Run in Queenstown which he successfully completed. It's not too late to sponsor Lionel, (with the details below). to make it all very easy. Please give generously if you haven't already done so.

#### END POLIO NOW EVENT

A District fundraiser event at Wellington train station was again held, actively supported by seven clubs including Wellington North. Bacon sandwiches were cooked and sold



to raise the money and lots of Rotary apparel and flags about provided some public image for Rotary. The sea of red shirts and the gazebo made a very positive impact on all who passed the stand.

Comment from AG David Shackelton in the Port Nicholson Bulletin -

"It was another wonderful day filled with hard work at the Bacon Buttie Stand on Thursday, with many of the volunteers leaving smelling like a bacon sandwich. The final numbers have not yet been announced, but it appears the team made around \$1400 for the End Polio Now Campaign, an incredible effort."

## FAIR CANCELLATION OPPORTUNITIES

The decision was taken by the fair committee, on 2 November, to recommend that the fair be cancelled for 2021. The prolonged uncertainty meant that it was unworkable and unfair to keep everybody 'dangling' for further weeks when the signs pointed toward cancellation. At Alert Level 2, it would have been impossible to hold the fair and comply with Government requirements around Covid protection. Fortunately, fixed costs have been kept to a minimum.

The cancellation strikes a direct and harsh blow to the club's earning capacity for the year for our charitable trust. Club members are charged to come up with ideas for fundraising over the coming months.



Past President Lionel was first out of the blocks with his generous offer to run the "cancelled" Queenstown Half Marathon with suggested sponsorship from Club members of

\$20 per head. There is still time to contribute. By way of boosting the contributions the project was taken to Ngaio Agile, a weekly exercise group for seniors, which is led by Lionel. So far, contributions from that source add up to \$270.

## ROZOPS – ROTARY OCEANIA ZONE OPERATIONS

At our last meeting DG Mark asked those who know what ROZOPS is to indicate. Given the minimal recognition, the following is a brief introduction.

Rotary Oceania is the "brand name" for joint operations by Rotary districts 9910, 9920, 9930, 9940, 9970 and 9980. These 6 Rotary districts are collectively part of Rotary International zone 8. Rotary has 34 zones worldwide.

ROZOPS Limited is a wholly owned company, held in trust by the 6 District Governors, to provide marketing, sales and technical services to the Rotary Clubs and District Organisations in our 6 Districts.

For many years the 6 districts have acted jointly in regard to;

- 1. tax-effective donations for overseas aid
- 2. national advertising campaigns
- software systems and services for district and club operations and communications.

During 2016-2018 the latter two joint activities were restructured under "ROZOPS". This Rotary Oceania website is managed by ROZOPS.

The current chair is PDG Jennie Herring, Rotary Club of Otahuhu, the District 9940 Director is PDG Simon Manning, Rotary Club of Kapiti and the chair of the ROZtech Standing Committee is Richard Stephen, Rotary Club of Hutt Valley.

The Clubs of Rotary Oceania are the guardians of 20 million square kilometres of the Earth's surface, stretching from extending 4,600km from east to west (Papeete to Noumea) and 5,330km from south to north (Invercargill to Tarawa.

Although mostly sea, it is the health of the sea that is likely to set the future for our planet and Rotary can play its part.
