NEXT LUNCHEON GUEST SPEAKER



Associate Professor Angela Ballantyne is a senior lecturer in Bioethics (parttime). Angela teaches medical ethics in the 4th and 5th year ALM program at Wellington. She was President of the International Association of

Bioethics (2016-2017) and was the ethics member of the Central Ethics Committee (HDEC) NZ (2010-2018). In 2016, she received a NZ Marsden Fast Start grant and in 2015 a UOW Award for Best Emerging Researcher. Her research interests include exploitation, research ethics, vulnerability, ethics of pregnancy and reproductive technologies, and secondary use research with clinical data.

Originally from New Zealand, where she gained her BSc in Genetics and Molecular Biology from Victoria University, Angela has worked in a wide range of international settings, including Australia, England, Europe and the United States. She received her PhD in Bioethics from Monash University (Australia), and spent a year of her doctorate program undertaking research at Imperial College London. She has worked in schools of medicine, primary health care and philosophy. Her interest in global health policy lead to a position as Technical Officer for Genetics and Ethics for the Human Genetics unit at WHO in Geneva in 2005, where she worked on projects concerning the ethical, legal and social issues associated with medical genetics. Prior to returning to New Zealand, Angela was a Visiting Scholar at the Yale University Interdisciplinary Center for Bioethics.

CONCLUDING 2021

WARREN YOUNG



While the evening meeting on 25th November at KPC was not as well attended as previously, there was, nevertheless, a most informative address from Dr Warren Young on his for Peform of the Criminal

promotion of the Case for Reform of the Criminal

Justice System. Dr Young's argument was that the present process, which appears to favour the courts and lawyers in that cases sometimes dragged on for years, disadvantages both the victims and the accused. The victims of the accused are left in limbo while the defendants are trapped on remand, sometimes for periods which are greater than the sentence eventually handed down. Further, as while being detained on demand, the accused are denied access to rehabilitation services.

Warren Young spoke of his efforts over the years, while holding senior justice roles, to advocate for streamlining the situation, so far with minimal success. Until there is some political will, nothing is likely to happen.

2nd DECEMBER LUNCHEON MEETING

Normality almost returned with the resumption of buffet service. We also welcomed back our long-term caterer, Monique, after a combination of maternity leave and Lockdowns. The meeting began with a reflection from Gerald McGhie.

There was a brief AGM at which Steve Brazier was elected President for 2023/24 and the Club accounts, including the Charitable Trust were approved. Lionel Nunns was congratulated on the successful completion of the [non] Queenstown half marathon as a substitute for the [non] Khandallah Village Fair. The original target of \$1,000 was trebled, that being a substantial portion of the lost Fair revenue for far less effort, apart from Lionel!



Guest speaker, the Reverend Ken Irwin, was introduced by Pat Helm. Ken began by saying that he was proud to be associated with

Wellington North, and especially so with its outstanding Reading Boost programmes.

After a formal greeting in Te Reo, Ken spoke of his formative years in the midst of the Ureweras at a small Village called Te Whaiti in Tuhoe territory. In the local primary school - awkwardly named a Native school, Ken and his brother were two of twelve pakeha kids in a school roll of almost 100. As whities, they were laughed with not laughed at by their Maori mates, a contrast to when the numbers were reversed in other places. Ken spoke of his special memories, as an 8-yearold old at Christmas time and challenged the audience to think of their own memories. He professed to hating Christmas plays at church because, as a good reader, he was always made the Narrator, but he wanted to be part of the action: Joseph, a Wise Man, even a Shepherd. This strange *word* kept cropping up: Baby Jesus was in a SWADDLING cloth... What was THAT?!

Noting that while there was no specifically "Christmas celebration" for Maori, there is an annual celebration that acknowledges new beginnings, past happenings & planning for the future. He referred to Matariki, the Maori New Year which begins in June at the start of winter but whose dimensions of meaning reach way beyond climate & stars. He added that these meanings can be slotted into the routines and rhythms of families and community groupings like Rotary.

Ken described Matariki as guided by 3 major principles

remembrance: honouring those who have died since the last rising of Matariki:

celebrating the present: gathering with family and friends:

looking to the future: looking forward to the promise of a new year.

Finally, with a nod to Changeover, Ken asked the question. *What might a partnered Matariki & Rotary celebration look like?*!

At the conclusion of Ken's message, President Stephen announced that Ken had been elected an honorary member of the club and was duly presented with a certificate of membership. Ken's background was covered in the 25th November Bulletin.

KIWI COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE UPDATE



Tracy reports that the pc netting that they purchased with Wellington North Rotary's recent donation was great as it has significantly reduced the amount of shrink wrap plastic they are using and no longer sending as much to the landfill.

We have a lot happening already in 2022 with the purchase yesterday of a 2019 chiller truck to add to the fleet in place of the aging smaller chiller truck which has been sold.

With the ongoing mutations of Covid-19 the Board made the decision to continue to operate contactless and in bubbles. This mitigates the risk to the volunteers and team members. KCA has just placed an order with Wellington Refrigeration to build an outdoor chiller room in the car park for the partner agencies to access as they are not allowed in the building. This should be built and installed by March 2022. KCA's board decided at the December Board meeting that it will continue to work contactless with only volunteers allowed in our building. All personnel entering the warehouse must be double vaccinated.

Continued from page 1. The reading programme, introduced almost a decade ago, has ranged over a number of schools from Titahi Bay to Wainnicenza. Rotary Club members and supporters volunteer to work one-on-one, in the classroom or liberary, with a pupil for 20 to 30 minutes, sharing a book or isournal.

Children often choose a book from the library, or the volumcers suggest something. Ocassionally a Rotary volunteer will borrow a book from a public ibrary that reflects a pupil's inerests, be it comic superheroes w norbe learne

A SLICE OF HISTORY – WOMEN IN ROTARY



Women are active participants in Rotary, serving their communities in increasing numbers and serving in leadership

positions in Rotary. The 1989 Council on Legislation, which voted to admit women into Rotary clubs worldwide remains a watershed moment in the history of Rotary.

The vote followed the decades-long efforts, including legal cases, by men and women from all over the Rotary world to allow the admission of women into Rotary clubs, after several close votes at previous Council meetings.

The response to the decision was overwhelming: by June 1990, the number of female Rotarians had skyrocketed to over 20,000. The number of women members worldwide reached 195,000 in July 2010 (about 16% of Rotarians) and surpassed 277,000 in July 2020 (about 23%). Our part of the Rotary world can claim success with the following forming the 2022 leadership chain.

FEEDBACK - HINE NGAREWA



Terry Pinfold has received a detailed report and academic transcript from Hine Ngarewa, a 2021 Club

Scholarship awardee, who has also been granted financial support for the 2022 year. The following is a brief summary of Hine's first year at the University of Canterbury.

Fresh out of high school, Hine looked for opportunities to help people, especially of her culture. While she initially started studying for a Bachelor of Criminal Justice she soon realised that that degree was not for her. She stuck with it as she thought changing would be a form of failure. However, at the end of the first year, she found a degree better suited to herself and her passion. This was a Bachelor of Health Science majoring in Maori and Indigenous Health. The change was positive and Hines grades improved markedly.

She attributes her participation in the Takere scholarship programme, designed for Maori and Pacifika students, to participate in and complete university degrees, as providing the support she needed to find her passion. With a new confidence, she was able to obtain a casual student library assistant job across three libraries on the Campus. She has become very active in supporting students unfamiliar with university life. Hine has expressed her thanks to Wellington North for its support, which has allowed her to commence what we are sure will be a career of much value.
