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NEXT LUNCHEON SPEAKER

JANE EDWARDS - UNIVERSITIES OF NZ



Wellington North has moved the burden of scholarships administration to the specialist service provided by Universities of New Zealand.

The Club Scholarships Committee works with the Universities New Zealand – Te Pōkai Tara (UNZ) Scholarships Office to manage application and selection processes on behalf of funders for a number of nationally contestable undergraduate and postgraduate scholarship programmes. The Committee consists of a Chair appointed by UNZ and eight committee members, one nominated by each university in New Zealand.

The scholarship programmes managed by UNZ provide a variety of opportunities for both current students and graduates of New Zealand universities. UNZ works with scholarship funders supporting candidates studying in New Zealand as well as offering opportunities to study offshore.

Jane Edwards will give us a further insight into the financial needs of students and how they manage the selection and administration processes.

20th OCTOBER MEETING

Lionel Nunns was in the chair in the absence of President Zai, who has just returned to NZ after a sojourn in UK and Europe.

Brian Poole reflected on Pharmac's decision to finally fund medication for IBD sufferer's after years of lobbying. Crohns and Colitis NZ got together with gastroenterologists to protest with the war cry "#we can't wait" and collected 30,000 signatures, marched on Parliament and attended Select Committee hearings.

Morris Robertson introduced the Club's Community PHF, Lynette Brown, who had expertly managed the Clubs Timor Leste Safe Surgery project, which had attracted a substantial Rotary Foundation Global Grant.



Acting President Lionel reminded members that the 1 December meeting would be held at Mary Potter Hospice. As there was some concern about

parking, Morris recommended the No1 bus, which runs every 10 minutes from Johnsonville/Churton Park to Island Bay via the hospital and close to Mary Potter. The cost of travel would be covered by gold cards and parking not needed.

GUEST SPEAKER





Cheryl Young, who was introduced by her father David, managed to exhaust her audience by

describing what is involved in GodZone, an endurance test which she has achieved five times with more planned for the future.



GODZONE is an annual, multi-day, non-stop, expedition race. The event is the largest such race in the world and widely regarded as the best. Teams navigate, trek, mountain bike, kayak, canoe and raft over a vast array of different landscapes. Teams may or may not be notified of these disciplines before the event starts. GODZONE tests the mental and physical skills of participants as well as other factors such as team work and emotional stress. The routes are highly demanding both technically and physically, testing teams in many different ways.

Those taking part in the event should not underestimate the importance of being well prepared for travel in very remote locations and a high degree of outdoor competency is a pre-requisite of entry.



Teams are expected to travel day and night. Decisions to rest and sleep are left solely to the discretion of the teams themselves.

Cheryl said that the race had received little publicity, apart from the time Ritchie McCaw was a participant when it was covered by TV1, but the coverage was all about Ritchie.

Laurie Bond gave the vote of thanks.

IAN CRABTREE TRUST RECEIVES AN AWARD



In the legacy of the Little Company of Mary Sisters, Mary Potter Hospice continues to be a leader in specialist care for people with life-limiting illnesses. Services now include the Inpatient Unit in Newtown plus Community Hospices in Kāpiti and the new facility in Porirua. Maintaining a community focus, the services are provided wherever people are, at home, in aged residential care or in the Inpatient Unit. The Ian Crabtree Trust gave \$100k to the new centre In Porirua.

The late, and former member of Wellington North, Ian Crabtree was a strong supporter of the Hospice, where he spent his last days. The Trust, established by his will, has Trustees appointed by our club.

At the recent Mary Potter AGM, the Patron Dame Kerry Prendergast presented a Mary Potter Hospice Award to the Ian Crabtree Charitable Trust, which Graeme Waters and David King accepted on behalf of the Trust. The Award recognised that the trust had given over \$1.2 million to the Hospice over several years, most recently with a grant of over \$600,000 for its Newtown re-roofing project.
