NEXT LUNCHEON SPEAKER INNOVATIVE YOUNG MINDS



Eden Bacani, a year 12 student at St Mary's College, was sponsored to attend this year's IYM, a programme sponsored by the Rotary Club of Hutt City.

As Eden says "In my presentation, I will be talking about Innovative Young Minds, a residential programme where I and 38 other amazing ladies got to learn about the world of STEM while also gaining valuable connections for the future. I learnt multiple ideas and concepts throughout the programme and am excited to share my findings with you. I will also be going over The Innovation Challenge that went throughout the programme in which I and my team had the honour to win."

Innovative Young Minds (IYM) offers young women in years 11 and 12 the opportunity to learn about the wide range of research and career opportunities available in STEMM (science, technology, engineering, mathematics and high- tech manufacturing).

Nearly 40 young women from the Greater Wellington Region took part in the six-day residential programme and were inspired by local researchers, innovators and entrepreneurs who are themselves making cutting-edge advances in STEMM.

After a week of experiencing incredible opportunities in science and technology, these young women are now ready to become New Zealand's next generation of innovators and industry leaders.

21 OCTOBER SPEAKER

RICK LOWE – A LIFE IN THE FAST LANE



Rick passed away on 12th October, following complications arising from a severe heart attack. His funeral was a 3-way affair, family and family friends at St Luke's Anglican Church, Waikanae, overflow,

including Wellington North Club members, who viewed a live stream at Waikanae Funeral home and also elsewhere by Vimeo.

The main eulogy was given by Rick's son, Tom, who traversed Rick's life in about thirty minutes. Rick was born on Yorkshire. When he was 2 he lost his father and the family came to New Zealand where Rick attended Christ's College. He survived two weeks at university before joining the life insurance industry and later established the very successful Prime Finance.

Tom made much of Rick's energy and dedication to speed on land and water. In 2005, Rick suffered a severe stroke which, his then partner Libby said "made him a better man". With great determination, Rick persevered in his ambition to drive again eventually being granted a licence for modified cars. He was a generous man, particularly in his support for the poor. He established the Prime Charitable Trust which the family is continuing.

Rick's three daughters, Pip, Bridget and Penny read a poem they had composed and his eleven grandchildren each gave a brief message before placing flags on his racing green casket.



Rick's friend, the Rt Rev Justin Duckworth, Bishop of Wellington, paid tribute to him, describing their association with the

Rekiorangi Church and Rick's generosity.
