GUEST SPEAKER SARAH FITT



Sarah was appointed Chief Executive of Pharmac in January 2018, having been Pharmac's Director of Operations since 2013. Under Sarah's leadership, Pharmac has: expanded the

number and range of funded medicines available to New Zealanders, widened access to currently funded medicines, managed funding medicines in all New Zealand public hospitals and laid the groundwork for Pharmac to manage hospital medical devices.

Sarah spoke about the improvement programme to make Pharmac's decisions clearer and faster as well as a commitment to reducing inequities of access to funded medicines.

Sarah spoke about the issues which faced Pharmac, such as the heartfelt calls for specific, but expensive, medications for specific diseases. She noted that there were pills, which are targeted at specific conditions, but cost \$1,000 each. Covid had thrust a spanner in the works with the need to import vaccines and anti-viral drugs. Sometimes, there was a cost benefit in provided costly medication in lieu of the alternative cost of hospitalisation.

Morris Robertson gave the vote of thanks, noting that most of the audience would be good customers of Pharmac.

MINI FORUM - SCHOLARSHIPS

A mini forum, chaired by David Young, followed the meeting in order to further discuss the future of the Scholarship Trust. Since the Trust was established in 2005, in honour of the Club's 50th Anniversary, it was felt that circumstances had sufficiently changed to warrant a review.

A key issue was to allow for additional disbursements to be made from the increased capital value. There was also consideration of the potential for funding for life skills and providers. There was also the opportunity to outsource selection and management processes, while still having general control.
