Roger Usmar General Manager Oceania Dairy

Roger joined Oceania Dairy in June 2015 coming from Fonterra in Hamilton. The value add plant appealed to Roger along with doing something around people and within a world class culture.

Roger lives in Timaru and his family in Hamilton. When Roger arrived at Oceania they had 95 staff and last year that number rose to 210, and forecast to rise to 280 within the next few months. Approximately 40% of staff live in Timaru, 20% in Waimate and 40% in Oamaru. The company also have 25% of their staff on Visa's from China.

Roger spoke of the expansions with the canning plant and UHT milk and future plans for a larger lab and other investment dotted around the site. Currently the plant receive and process 231 million litres of milk . Yili vision - Be and be recognised as the most trustworthy healthy food provider around the world.
