Report from Claire in Denmark

Hi all,

This month has been full of school, and in the brief moments of freedom, full of friends. This month started with birth-day celebrations for my best friend, who was turning 18. From her host family she received a weekend cruise to Oslo, Norway, and I've been invited, so I'm very excited for that. Our friend group also celebrated at Copenhagen's Pride Parade, which is a colourful and very festive party in the central city. Denmark is a such liberal country, and Copenhagen such a vibrant capital, that the parade is one of the top in the world.

I was also very fortunate this month to spend a weekend away at my counsellor's summerhouse. While its almost too cold to swim in Danish waters, it was very fun and hygglige to be relaxing with them and their friends. This recent weekend they also took me to a Danish island off the coast of Sweden. The island has a circumference of around 100km, and was the perfect size for us to see everything in 3 days.

From Monday to Friday I'm back at school. I have one class that I take all my subjects with, and we sit in one square white room while the teachers come to us. Classes are paperless, and I don't think I would leave my seat if it weren't for bathroom breaks, so its like lectures. People between the ages of 18 and 25 also get paid to be a student. It varies on your income level, disabilities etc, but most high school students receive around \$200 monthly from the government (not me), and so they treat school more like a job. I think that might be a reason they see their teachers as more peers and treat them with more respect.

Time is slipping through my fingers at an alarmingly fast rate. It feels as if I had just written my last report a few days ago, and I increasingly aware of my limited time left. Soon I will shift to my third and final family, who have just sent their own daughter on exchange to Argentina. I'm excited to move to them, but also sad to say leave my current host family who feel so like home.
