Russell joined Rotary in 1997 at a time when members were assigned a classification associated with their profession which for Russell was accounting
When joining Rotary you are asked to give of your time and talents to the organization for the betterment of the community and humanity
Russell fulfilled his obligation with ease and professionalism during his membership of Rotary
In 2006 he served as a director of the club for two years
He was a member of the Eric Hall Trust for over 10 years and served much of that time on the trust as treasurer
Our club was instrumental in establishing a values based programme in Sth Canterbury schools called Kiwi Can. Russell assisted in setting up the financial aspect of the trust and was treasurer for some time. His firm also did the administration required for the payment of wages at no cost. 2011 again we chose to stay at one location this time Te-Anau and do day walks

2013 saw us ditch those heavy packs to do the Otago Rail Trail which I think was Margaret and Russell's last trip with the group
