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PRESIDENT'S REPORT - 2021/22

General Matters

We have come to the end of another successful year, my second in this 2021/22 cycle and my fifth overall in the past seven years. But don't get me wrong, the journey has not been a hardship. It has been an honour to serve this club over that period and I have greatly enjoyed my two stints as Club President. In this regard I acknowledge the tremendous assistance and support I have received from my wife Jeanette.


The past two years have seen many challenges due to the uncertainties surrounding the Covid pandemic but our club has shown considerable resilience especially when speakers have withdrawn at short notice. Our members have stepped in with stories, anecdotes and even full presentations.

The year in review has seen some considerable successes again but also, as always, some matters which have yet to be achieved. We achieved a Rotary Presidential Citation once again. This means that, largely, we met our targets.

I would like to deal with our many achievements in the past year. These are considerable:

• Joint Rotary/St Edmund's Church Fete:

This was our second year in a row participating in this fete. It was held at St Edmund's Church in Wembley in November 2021. This was a huge success not only financially but also because of the complete team effort involved. It seems to be the only occasion as far as I am aware when the entire club contributes in some way and this was again the case - all club members, their partners, some children and even some grandchildren. From a financial perspective, it was more successful than the previous year and has allowed our club to achieve a more sustainable footing when considering project participation, donations Foundation and other organisations.

- Lake Monger Community Shed: Although this project is no longer an active one as far as this Rotary Cambridge is concerned, we continue to take an interest in how it is being brought into a fully operational position.
- Youth Programmes: The club participates in all the many youth programmes offered by Rotary. However, the degree to which the club participates in them from year to year depends on the applications received. For a full description of these, reference should be made to the Youth Report.
- Peace Poles: It often happens that the best projects come along by accident. This was indeed the case with the provision of Peace Poles at eight Primary Schools in our area. The schools conducted Peace Pole unveiling ceremonies as close to World Peace Day (21 September) as possible. These ceremonies involved some input by me on behalf of Rotary in the reading of the UN message and explaining how the project fits with one of the Rotary Avenues of Service Promotion of World Peace. On some occasions the Peace Song (Light a Candle for Peace) was incorporated into the ceremony and what a moving experience this was especially at Mount Hawthorn where the whole school (960 students) performed the song.

All schools will have follow-up ceremonies on or close to 21 September again and Rotary can once again be present and speak at these. How those eight schools plus now a further two can be fitted into my schedule remains to be seen.

EarlyAct Activities in local Primary Schools:



Churchlands Primary School Sustainability Group

I continue to run small programmes at four local Primary Schools – Floreat Park, City Beach, Churchlands and West Leederville.

At Floreat Park and West Leederville, I coach the schools' Year 6 Leadership Groups in the running of meetings.

At Churchlands I assist the Year 5 Sustainability Group in running their meetings and with assistance and advice with their gardening projects. Libby Larsen has now started assisting with the gardening. At City Beach, David James, Max Puddey and I help the Manual Arts teacher in her classes. At Churchlands and City Beach Primary Schools I was invited to present awards at the Year 6 Graduation Ceremonies.

- Wembley Districts Junior Cricket Club Friday Evening Sausage Sizzles: A great feeling of camaraderie has developed over the four seasons that we have been running these. The cricket players and their families all know us now and there is a wonderful atmosphere on a Friday evening. It acts as a useful small-scale fundraiser for our club while at the same time giving us a face in the community. We continued with the innovation this year of taking credit card payments and this has proved to be ever more popular. All leftovers are taken to a shelter for recovering drug addicts.
- Liaison with National, State and Local Authorities. Contact and liaison were maintained with the Federal Member for Curtin, Hon Celia Hammond MP, and her staff. We will engage with the newly elected Member for Curtin, Kate Chaney, in due course. Similar contact was kept with Christine Tonkin MLA, State Member for Churchlands. Relationships continued to be built with Mayor, Keri Shannon, other Councillors and staff at the Town of Cambridge as well as with the City of Stirling through Mayor Mark Irwin and Councillor Stephanie Proud. Many activities at the Town of Cambridge that I would normally attend have been suspended due to Covid but there are signs that they may soon resume.

- Liaison with Schools. Close contact is maintained between the Rotary Club of Cambridge and schools in the Town of Cambridge and surrounding areas. These schools include City Beach, Kapinara, Floreat Park, Churchlands, West Leederville, Wembley and Lake Monger Primary Schools as well as with Newman College, Hale School and John XXIII College.
- Pride of Workmanship Awards. The club gave three "Pride of Workmanship" Awards
 during the past year: the first to Ross Bolton, the Manager of the Cambridge Bowling Club,
 the second to Mark Boden, proprietor of Pronto's Catering which supplies our weekly club
 breakfast while the third was to George Young, owner of Cappuccino Express, the coffee
 truck which supplies our breakfast coffee fix at meetings.

- Assistance to Charities. This activity continues to be an important part of our programme with assistance being given to the RSL this year.
- Rotary Foundation. The club's members donated \$100 US dollars per member to the Rotary Foundation. This gave a total donation of US\$2200 (AU\$3000). These funds went to the general fund for worldwide projects.
- East Java Karya Mulia School for deaf children. This project has been severely impacted by Covid. For a complete report, reference should be made to the International report.

Public Relations

Our Public Relations work is being carried out in accordance with the Strategic Plan. In the past year the following has been done:

 Social Media. I am always learning but the Club's Facebook page now has a considerable following throughout the world. That is not to say we can't do better. We need to get more of our members into the habit of "Liking" and "Sharing". This is how news of the club's events is spread. I always put at least one "Post" on the page every week. The Facebook page now has nearly 2200 "likes" and 1900 "follows".

- Roger Veary and I work on the club's web page continuously if only on an ad-hoc basis.
 More and more current information being made available there including this Annual Report. The web page is now "live" and no longer static. Liaison with media and the local community has continued throughout the year. Cambridge Rotary is the envy of other clubs with the exposure it gets through the local press and Town of Cambridge outlets.
- Further social media platforms are being considered. What we have is probably enough for me to handle at the moment. I do notice that the use of LinkedIn is increasing.

In due course, when we have a suitable and sufficiently enthusiastic candidate, Facebook and the website could easily be handed on to another "manager".

Membership Report

In the absence of a specific champion for Membership, I retained overall responsibility for this portfolio although we are all responsible in effect.

Although I think we ought to be able to do better, the club has managed to achieve the following:

- We have retained all our existing members
- We have gained two new members this year in Sue Brown and John Gartlan.

- Our goal has been to build the club to more sustainable levels and to achieve greater diversity and we are definitely not there yet.
- We need to develop new pathways to membership. Although not addressed at our club level, I continue to monitor developments elsewhere and to follow the work of the study groups. The ethnicity aspect has not yet been addressed but our gender balance seems to be moving forward in the right direction, albeit slowly.
- We need to maintain RYE contacts. This is being done to the extent that it is possible.
- Encourage EarlyAct activities. This is being done on a continuous basis.

I am hopeful, as always, that our visibility efforts in the community are starting to bear fruit and that people are starting to realise that ours is an organisation worth belonging to.

Public Image

I am pleased to note that Public Image will be the District's theme in the coming year. Public Image is something I have long been preaching to the District Board. The District and all clubs need to stop "hiding" in comfort in the background and they should not be satisfied to be given the Sausage Sizzle or Parking to organise at large State and City events. Rotary needs to be given a seat at the "top table" on these occasions.

Once again the Rotary Club of Cambridge had a most enjoyable and fulfilling year. We increased our membership numbers, welcoming John Gartlan who transferred to us from the Balwyn North club in Victoria and Sue Brown who is new to Rotary, taking our total to 24 members

All statutory matters required of me as the Club Secretary have been attended to with submissions being made to Government and the Rotary District.

The minutes of all Board meetings held during the year have been prepared, circulated and signed by the President including the Notice of and Minutes of the Annual General Meeting. The Working with Children Register has been maintained and is up to date as at the time of this report.

CLUB TREASURER'S REPORT - 2020/21

Introduction

This report outlines the unaudited financial performance of the Rotary Club of Cambridge (RCC) for the 2021/2022 Financial Year.

All accounts, reports and supporting documentation will be submitted to the RCC's nominated auditor during 3rd or 4th week in July 2022 after receipt of the respective bank account statements and account reconciliations.

Net Worth

The net worth of RCC at 30 June 2022 is shown in the attached Balance Sheet. It shows an increase in equity of \$4,981.78 for the period. Issues that have materially affected net worth during this financial year are as follows:

Fund Raising Account

Cash at bank is \$40,723.43 which includes an operating profit of \$3,328.65 for the period mainly due to the following:

- The St Edmund's Church / Rotary Fete was an outstanding success and generated a profit of \$9,771.30 for RCC;
- A solid contribution from the Wembley Districts Junior Cricket BBQs;
- The Surabaya Project was deferred due to Covid-19 and hence there were no expenditure and/or revenue changes from FY 20/21;
- RCC donated \$3,000 to the Rotary Foundation, \$350 to the Rotary Polio Plus project and \$5,258 to the Lake Monger Community Shed;
- Project specific floats have been repaid.

Operating Account

Cash at bank is \$17,884.34 which includes an operating profit of \$1,653.13 mainly due to the following:

- An increased profit in breakfast revenue and from the sergeant's fines;
- An increase in club subscription fees due to a modest increase in membership.

The Term Deposit Account of \$15,000 was terminated during the period with the funds being transferred to the Fund Raising Account.

Physical Assets

Club assets including computer equipment have been depreciated 20%.

Pre-Payments

- Pre-payments from FY 20/21 have been reconciled;
- A new pre-payment of \$400 (deposit) was made to Ambrose Restaurant for the forthcoming changeover dinner on 6 July 2022.

Liabilities

- Current Fund Raising account liabilities are \$9,992 representing unspent donations from Telethon and Amcor in FY 20/21;
- Current Operating account liabilities are \$3,025 representing Change Over Dinner receipts for the forthcoming changeover dinner on 6 July 2022;
- Operating account liabilities from FY20/21 have been reconciled

BUDGET - FY 21/22

A budget for the forthcoming FY 22/23 has been prepared based on trends from FY 21/22 and input from Club Directors.

The Budget is forecast to break even. Essentially RCC needs to find additional revenue earning projects, in particular as RCC will not be conducting a fund raising fete during FY 22/23.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE COMMITTEE REPORT – 2021/22

The Rotary East Java Hearing Project is undertaken in conjunction with Rotary Clubs of Mount Lawley and Surabaya, Indonesia. The joint committee comprises Graham McHarrie, Don Holywell, Glenn Davies and Simon Tomlinson (a teacher with Telethon Speech and Hearing Inc who participated in the visit to Karya Mulia in 2019). Our Surabaya contact is Rotarian PP Guy Setiadi.

The current program with Karya Mulia School for the Deaf, in Surabaya, was established as an annual exchange of teachers for the purpose of assisting their training and development. We collaborate with the Department of Education School of Special Educational Needs: Sensory and Telethon Speech and Hearing Inc.

Unfortunately, the project continues to be suspended, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, however we have maintained our contact with Rotary Club of Surabaya and Karya Mulia School and have agreed the following:

- The program for training Karya Mulia teachers will continue, when it is safe to travel, however we will only send WA Teachers to Surabaya. We will not continue the reciprocal visits by Surabaya Teachers to Perth. This will simplify the program and is expected to be more effective.
- We will endeavour to source video educational material for the school, through the resources of Telethon Speech and Hearing and relevant Australian universities.
- We support a request to fund some minor renovation work at the school, relating to the Toys rooms and the Audiology and Speech Therapy rooms. The cost is yet to be confirmed.

Our Club is currently holding unspent funds donated by Telethon Speech & Hearing (\$5,000) and Amcor Indonesia (\$5,000).

YOUTH COMMITTEE REPORT - 2021/22

Despite some events continuing to be affected by COVID we enjoyed another busy year with Youth programmes.

School Principals & Speech Teachers

As in previous years the standard of speaking was excellent and the large audience was thoroughly impressed. Unfortunately, there was no District final this year owing to an absence of sufficient Clubs participating, due to COVID. Nevertheless, we enjoyed a great competition and both Cassie and Oliver would have been worthy finalists.

Driver Education (RWADE)

Held again this year in December 2021 at Claremont Showgrounds, with 180 Year 11 students from John XXIII College attending. Nine teachers and seven Cambridge Rotarians supervised the six groups of students who attended six separate half hour driver training sessions over the course of the day. Lunch was provided free of charge by the Rapid Response Team. A most worthwhile programme with John XXIII booked again for November this year.

Santos Science Experience

The Club sponsored Year 9 students Jordan Smith and Charlotte Laurent, both from Newman College. Jordan attended a 3-day course at Murdoch University in December 2021 and Charlotte a 4-day course at Edith Cowan University in January 2022. Due to the school's COVID protocols neither student was able to present to the Club personally, but both provided video presentations and, from these, it was obvious how much they enjoyed and benefitted from the experience.

National Youth Science Forum

The Club agreed to sponsor Olivia Dixon, a year 11 student from Newman College, after she won selection to attend the Forum. Unfortunately, Olivia withdrew for personal reasons.

Rotary Youth Exchange

Due to COVID, overseas youth exchange has been suspended for the past 2 years. However, Rotary International has recently formulated a short term 12-week reciprocal exchange programme directly between families. Suzanne Dessein from Licques, a town about 20kms south of Calais in Northern France, will arrive on 13th July. Suzanne is a 16 year old and will stay with the Veerman family in City Beach, attending Churchlands Senior High School. Eva Veerman, also 16, will visit Licques later this year and stay with the Dessein family there. The District administers all arrangements and Cambridge will act as the host club. Interestingly, Suzanne will be the first overseas youth exchange student in the world since the lifting of the suspension from 1st July 2022.


