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PRESIDENT'S REPORT – 2022/23

Another busy year at Rotary Cambridge and it was good to return to a mostly normal life after the restrictive impact of Covid over the past couple of years.

Member participation in the breakfast meetings, social and vocational events has been high, with fellowship being evident at all times. The very good level of attendance at breakfast meetings stems from the excellent guest speaking programme, again organised by Jeanette Wood. I am extremely grateful to Jeanette for her hard work, not only in arranging and liaising with the guest speakers, but also with the advertising she arranges through the Post newspaper and her promotion of the Club through this and other sources. Thanks Jeanette for your continuing great efforts. We continue to make a donation to Polio Plus on behalf of each guest speaker, with a certificate presented to each speaker. Sgt Roger Veary always provides an entertaining session enabling us to leave the meeting with a smile on our face.

I think our most significant project this year has been the continuation of the Peace Pole programme, initiated by Jeremy Wood last year and which has now seen 12 Peace Poles installed in local primary schools and one at the Uniting Church Floreat. The poles have been extremely well received and have gained the Club tremendous rapport with the schools and in the community generally. Thanks to Jeremy other Rotary clubs in WA have now taken up the programme.

The Club continues to be involved in its regular community events – the RSL collection at Floreat Forum, the poppy day collection at 11 schools (raising \$4,249-), Bunnings sausage sizzles and the regular Friday night sausage sizzle during the summer at the Wembley Districts Junior Cricket Club – all well organised, good fun and providing support for the community. The Club also donated \$300- to Foodbank for 10 Christmas hampers for the needy. In my role as President I have represented the Club at a Town of Cambridge citizenship ceremony and, at the Town's invitation, laid a wreath at both the Remembrance Day and Anzac Day ceremonies held at the West Leederville cenotaph. I also attended a community workshop at the Town of Cambridge. Outside of Rotary Jeremy and Jeanette and Max Puddey deservedly won awards at a State Government sponsored "Celebrating Local Volunteers" ceremony. All extremely worthy recipients.

The Club has renewed contact with both the Wembley Downs and the City Beach Probus Clubs. I have paid official visits to both clubs and their Presidents have reciprocated with visits to our club. Rotary Cambridge originally sponsored both Probus clubs through the former Floreat and City Beach Rotary clubs (now joined as Cambridge). Eileen and I also attended the 30th birthday celebration of the Floreat Ladies Probus Club. We hope to build on these relationships.

As well as Probus we have established good relationships with our local members of Parliament, all newly elected – Kate Chaney, the Federal member for Curtin, Christine Tonkin MLA for Churchlands and Dr Katrina Stratton, MLA for Nedlands. All three ladies have been guest speakers during the year. Christine has also participated in our peace pole programme as have the Deputy Mayors of Cambridge and Stirling, Rotarian Cate Barlow and Stephanie Proud respectively. The Club continues to enjoy a very good relationship with the Town of Cambridge and recently joined in with the Council in a 2-day volunteers stall at Floreat Forum.

During the year Paul Harris Fellowships were presented to our long term auditor Peter Crowe and to Dr Scott Teasdale and Megan Watters, who have been willing hosts of incoming exchange students over a number of years.

Our membership declined by one to 22 during the year. We did not induct any new members and unfortunately lost our newest member Sue Brown. Sue found Rotary was not what she was looking for, but departed the Club on good terms. Increasing the membership remains our biggest challenge.

Full Directors' reports form part of this Annual Report and I comment briefly:-

<u>Administration</u>: Has run very smoothly under the control of Libby Larsen, who has also handled the front desk in an exemplary and cheerful manner. Peter Burns has continued to fulfil the role of Secretary with all returns, statutory matters, organization of Board meetings/minutes and the ever mounting level of red tape and compliance issues handled in his usual highly efficient manner.

Roger Veary has been our Bulletin Editor again this year and issues an informative and interesting newsletter without fail on a weekly basis.

Jeremy handles Public Image/Public Relations and promotes the Club at every opportunity through local media, the Town of Cambridge and the Club's web and Facebook pages (which is quite a task keeping it all up to date).

<u>Finance</u>: The Club's finances have been in the excellent hands of Max Puddey, who has regularly provided Board members with interim financial reports during the year and has maintained firm control. And all this while still heavily involved with his leadership and activities at the Community Shed, which continues to go from strength to strength with increasing member numbers. A highly successful project emanating from this Club. Thanks Max.

The Club operating budget for next year is forecast on just a break even basis, however our balance sheet is in a healthy position as a result of our fund raising sausage sizzles and the funds raised from the community fetes in 2020 and 2021. The sausage sizzles will continue and another fete will be held in November 2023. This year we again donated US\$100- per Rotary member to the Rotary Foundation.

<u>International Service</u>: Our long running East Java Hearing Project being handled by Graham McHarrie and Don Hollywell, in conjunction with the Rotary Clubs of Mt Lawley and Surabaya, looks like being re-invigorated after the operation was suspended due the effects of Covid in Surabaya over the past couple of years. We still have some unused grant monies on hand and are very hopeful the project will get up and running again. It has brought tremendous benefit to hearing impaired children in its 25-year existence and we would very much like to see its continuation. I believe it is the club's longest running and most meaningful project. Thanks to Graham and Don for all their efforts which are very much appreciated.

<u>Youth:</u> Under the auspices of Jeremy always plenty happening in Youth. This year we again participated in both the junior and senior 4-Way Test speaking competitions, the driver training programme and enjoyed a short term overseas exchange programme, with Suzanne coming out from Calais, France and Eva, a local City Beach student, reciprocating with a visit to Calais. We will welcome Betty from the Czech Republic this July, for a 12 month stay here. We also greatly enjoyed a visit during the year from Jaz Hernando, a former exchange student from Argentina. As well as Jeremy and Jeanette thanks also to Don Hollywell for his mentoring role with our overseas students, ably assisted by Robyn. Jeremy has continued his numerous Early Act activities in many of the local primary schools and has been assisted by Libby and David James. Close liaison with all primary schools in the Cambridge area is maintained – a really outstanding achievement and earning great kudos for our Club. Jeremy has also served as an Assistant Governor this year and is taking on the role of District Youth chairman next year. Thanks Jeremy for your untiring efforts not only in Youth, but in many aspects of Rotary.

<u>Social:</u> Members and partners enjoyed a number of social events this year commencing with the Changeover Dinner at Ambrose Estate, then during the year a visit to the Aviation Heritage Museum at Bullcreek, a weekend away at the Bridgetown flower festival, a Christmas function at the City Beach Tennis Club, a social evening at Don and Robyn Holywell's home, an evening get together at Matilda Bay foreshore and a visit to the DFES Bushfire Centre of Excellence near Pinjarra followed by lunch at the Ravenswood Hotel. All social events and outings were very well organised, well patronised and enjoyed by all attending. My particular thanks to Jan Puddey and the Ladies Social Committee, which met regularly during the year and initiated and organised a number of the events, including also a ladies morning tea at the Pearse residence.

My particular thanks to all Board members and Committee Chairman for their efforts and support they have given to both the Club and me personally throughout the year. Indeed I feel I have had the support of all the Club which has made for an enjoyable year for me as President and, I think, an overall successful year for the Club.

CLUB TREASURER'S REPORT – 2022/23

INTRODUCTION

This report outlines the unaudited financial performance of the Rotary Club of Cambridge (RCC) for the FY 22/23 at 30 June 23. Attached are the following financial reports.

- Balance Sheet Report
- Operating Account Profit / Loss
- Fund Raising Account Profit / Loss

NET WORTH

The net worth of RCC at 30 June 2023 is shown in the attached Balance Sheet and shows an increase in equity of \$ 61,540. Issues that have affected net worth during this financial year are as follows:

RCC equipment has been depreciated by 20%

Fund Raising Account – Cash at bank is \$42414.58 which includes an operating profit of \$1691 mainly due to the following:

- Receipts and expenses for the WDJCC program
- Receipts and expenses for Bunnings Sizzles
- Receipts and expenses for the student driver training project

Operating Account - Cash at bank is \$ 18206 which includes an operating profit of \$ 718 mainly due to the following:

- Receipt of:
 - o Annual Membership Fees
 - Changeover dinner receipts
 - Weekly breakfast meeting receipts
- Payment of
 - Weekly breakfast meeting expenses
 - Changeover expenses
 - o Rotary District and International fees
 - Bowling Club Fees
 - o RDU Fees
 - o Donation to Rotary Foundation
 - o Donation to Rotary Polio Plus

The Term Deposit of \$15000 as reported in the FY 21/22 was earning minimal interest and as agreed, was folded into the Fund-Raising account.

LIABILITIES

- Current Fund-Raising account liabilities are \$9992 representing unspent donations from Telethon and Amcor, and remains unchanged from FY 21/22.
- Operations account liabilities are \$2080 which relate to funds for the RCC Changeover event received but are yet to be expended. Acquittal is due 5 July 2023.

Pre-Payments

• A pre-payment of \$250 is outstanding and relates to a booking fee for the annual RCC Changeover event. This pre-payment will be acquitted on 5 July.

BUDGET – FY 23/24

A budget for the forthcoming FY 23/24 financial year was approved by the Board in June 2023 based on trends from FY 22/23 and input from Club Directors, and is forecast as follows:

- RCC Operations is forecast to break even, however club membership fees will rise by \$25 to \$375 to cover the increase in various external payable fees.
- RCC Fund Raising is forecast:
 - To earn a profit of approximately \$5000
 - Is dependent on the St Edmunds Fete earning a profit of \$7000:
 - Includes:
 - Various local community projects
 - An incoming exchange student expense
 - Several WDJCC BBQ events October to March
 - Two Bunnings BBQ events.

INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE REPORT – 2022/23

The effects of Covid which had restricted international activity declined towards the end of this term and our two projects, both connected with the Karya Mulia School for hearing impaired children in Surabaya East Java, were reactivated.

Currently we have \$10,000.00 in our bank account for application to Karya Mulia projects. We expect a further \$10,000.00 from Amcor Indonesia may be forthcoming but this is in no way assured.

Progress with our projects has been slowed without the input of the late Marie Kommendy who was a very effective intermediary between our two organisations. Our two projects with the Karya Mulia school are:

1. Training of the school's teachers on site by Western Australian teachers of hearing impaired children.

This involves sending Western Australian teachers to Karya Mulia school, and not bringing Karya Mulia teachers down to Perth for training as was done previously. This is at the request of the school. We are currently liaising with a school staff member for that person to drive the project from the school's point of view. Once that is in place we can commence activity in selecting two Western Australian teachers to visit the school.

2. Assisting with repairs to school buildings.

Damage to the school occurred during construction on a neighbouring property and our Rotary Club is liaising with the Rotary Club of Surabaya to assist with repairs. This is in progress and we are awaiting advice on proposed repairs and their costs to be submitted to us. This will then be considered by our committee and a recommendation presented to the Cambridge Rotary board.

In recent months we have met with and commenced a working relationship with Hearing Aid East Java. They undertake activities complimentary to ours and we believe a lot of good will develop out of this relationship

In conclusion we need to recognise our partnership with the Rotary club of Mount Lawley in this project, and the contributions of Glenn Davies of Mount Lawley, Simon Tomlinson of Telethon Speech and Hearing and the key role of Graham McHarrie.

YOUTH COMMITTEE REPORT – 2022/23

The club continues to participate in as many of the District's Youth Programmes as possible as well as some additional programmes particular to the club. However, the extent of participation varies from year to year depending on the degree to which applications are received. The club participated in the following Youth Projects over the past year:

Peace Poles

This has become one of the most visible projects conducted by the Club. In the past year new Peace Poles were installed at Jolimont Primary School and, although not a school, at the All Saints Uniting Church in Floreat. In addition to the new poles that were installed, annual ceremonies were held at many schools. Since I was not able to attend all the ceremonies because of clashes, speaking duties were shared with Christine Tonkin MLA, Cate Barlow and me. The ceremonies at the four schools in the City of Stirling (Wembley Downs, Doubleview, Woodlands and Churchlands) were also attended by Stephanie Proud, Stirling Deputy Mayor. I officiated at all the ceremonies except for Wembley and Churchlands (Christine Tonkin MLA) and West Leederville (Cambridge Deputy Mayor Cate Barlow). The other ceremonies I attended were at City Beach, Kapinara and Floreat Park Primary Schools. At Lake Monger Primary School where a combined ceremony was held for the dedication of the new playground, Premier Mark McGowan MLA and Christine Tonkin MLA were present.

Liaison with Schools

Close contacts continued to be maintained between the Rotary Club of Cambridge and all the Primary Schools in the Town of Cambridge. These were City Beach, Kapinara, Floreat Park, Wembley, West Leederville and Lake Monger. In addition, Churchlands and Woodlands Primary Schools were added to the list of close contacts. Relations were developed with John XXIII and Hale School but unfortunately lost with Newman College because of a change of staff.

Rotary Youth Exchange

For the first time the Rotary Club of Cambridge participated in STEP (Short Term Exchange Programme). A student arrived from France in August after a Covid delay and a student went to stay in France on exchange. Although the official length of the exchange is three months the reciprocal stays were in fact about two months each. The students were Suzanne Dessein from France and Eva Veerman from Australia. The club will participate in the long term Rotary Youth Exchange programme in the coming year and will be hosting a student from the Czech Republic (Alzbeta Dvorakova). Unfortunately, the outgoing student who was from Broome was not selected for the programme.

RWADE (Rotary Western Australia Driver Education)

Once again this was held in December. The Rotary Club of Cambridge hosted 180 students from John XXIII College at the venue at the Claremont Showgrounds. Six teachers and seven Rotary Club members were also present. As in previous years, the students were divided into six groups attending six sessions over the course of the day. Once again, lunch was provided free of charge by the Rapid Response Team for which the club made a donation.. It is a most worthwhile programme and the club will be participating once again in the coming year.

Junior 4-Way Test Speech Contest (Years 5/6)

As in previous years, the standard of speeches was outstanding and the large audience was thoroughly impressed. The winner and runner-up went on to compete in the District Final which was hosted by the Morley Rotary Club. It is a programme that the club will continue to promote in the years to come. Thanks go to all the ladies who participated in the evening's raffle which raised welcome and needed funds for the Club.

EarlyAct Activities in local Primary Schools

I continue to run small programmes at five local schools – Floreat Park, City Beach, West Leederville, Churchlands and now also Woodlands. At Floreat Park, West Leederville and Woodlands, I coach the Year 6 Student councils in running their meetings. I also assist them in choosing and running an event for a charity of their choice. When a suitable speaker is talking at a Rotary Cambridge meeting, all these groups are invited to attend. Without exception, the students find this to be a very exciting occasion. The whole programme is very fulfilling. At Churchlands, Libby Larsen and I assist the Year 5 Sustainability Group in running their meetings and with help and advice with their gardening projects. At City Beach Primary School, David James and I help the Manual Arts teacher in her classes. I attended the Year 6 Graduation ceremonies at five schools and was invited to present awards at City Beach, Churchlands and Wembley Primary Schools. These activities all help in promoting the public image of Rotary generally and the Rotary Club of Cambridge in particular.

Wembley Districts Junior Cricket Club Friday evening Sausage Sizzles

Twelve Sausage Sizzles were held over the course of the junior cricket season. We continue to build a strong feeling of camaraderie with the young cricketers and their parents in running these events. All participants and their families now know us and this helps to foster a wonderful atmosphere on a Friday evening. It acts as useful small scale fundraiser for our club while at the same time giving us a face in the community. Payment by credit card has now become the norm with over 90% of payments received by this method. Any catering leftovers are taken to the Fresh Start facility in Subiaco. Most Friday evenings after the event, the club's sizzlers repair to Amarin Thai Restaurant in Subiaco where a great social evening is capped off.
