Project i2Eye Report

In the heart of Sambalpur, Orrisa, a ground-breaking shift swept through healthcare corridors. It emerged from a joint endeavour between the National University of Singapore, Rotary Club of Singapore, Rotary Club of Sambulpur, and Trilochan Netralaya. Project i2Eye, a beacon merging innovation with empathy, unfolded a narrative of technological advancement and compassionate care in its recent expedition. Supported by the generous funding of S\$11,800 from the Rotary Club of Singapore, the project held a singular vision: to revolutionize healthcare by leveraging technology for enhanced screening protocols, data collection, and intervention strategies, specifically targeting eye and general health conditions.

The journey commenced on a bright Sunday morning, as the team touched down at Jharsuguda Airport, filled with enthusiasm and an unwavering commitment to make a difference. Their base at Hotel Grand Siba became not just a residence, but a hub of anticipation, buzzing with the promise of transformational days ahead.

The week unfolded with meticulous planning and execution:

- **Educational Engagements:** The team plunged into a Continuing Medical Education (CME) session at Trilochan Netralaya on the very first day, setting the stage for knowledge exchange and collaboration.
- Screening Days: Each day dawned with purpose. Manned by dedicated volunteers, stations were set up to register participants, measure vital statistics, and conduct detailed screenings, leaving no stone unturned in understanding and addressing individual health concerns.

- **Technological Marvels:** Cutting-edge technology came to the forefront at the eye stations. Utilizing innovative apps and equipment, they conducted comprehensive eye screenings, identifying potential concerns and paving the way for timely interventions.
- **Personalized Consultations:** The true essence of care emerged in personalized consultations. Participants received expert guidance based on their screening results, ensuring that each individual was connected to the necessary follow-ups and specialized care.
- **Empowering Education:** Beyond screenings, the project aimed at empowering individuals. A dedicated health education station disseminated invaluable insights on lifestyle modifications, disease prevention, and holistic well-being.

The impact of Project i2Eye extended far beyond the screenings and consultations:

- **2000 Beneficiaries Touched:** Through their meticulous efforts, the team reached out to 2000 beneficiaries, each interaction a step towards a healthier future.
- **Eye Surgeries and Interventions:** Notably, 200 cataract surgeries were made possible, offering renewed vision and hope to those in need.

As the week ended, the team gathered for a screening feedback session, reflecting on the journey that had unfolded. Lives had been touched, futures had been altered, and a vision for a more connected and compassionate healthcare system had been nurtured.

The echoes of Project i2Eye's impact continue to resonate, not just in the lives touched in Sambulpur, but in the broader spectrum of healthcare innovation. The project stands as a testament to the power of collaboration, technology, and, above all, unwavering compassion. We strongly believe this project has a potential to be a flagship project of Rotary club of Singapore similar to Help the Children project.

Guest Speaker Series

Speaker: Mr Manu Bhaskaran, Founding Director and CEO, Centennial Asia Advisors

Topic: Economic Outlook for 2024

Rtn Dr Denis Hew introduced the speaker who is a good friend. Mr Bhaskaran has 40 years of expertise in economic and political risk assessment and forecasting in Asia. Before joining the Centennial Group, he was Chief Economist for Asia of a leading international investment bank and managed its Singapore-based economic advisory group.

Mr Bhaskaran noted that the news has been depressing but he wanted to make a point that while there were dark clouds, there are also silver linings.

He gave his views of various geopolitical situations, adding that there would be more decoupling of the big powers, but unlikely to have extreme scenarios. He spoke of episodes of financial stress in the markets in the coming months, however, these would be managed by the various central banks and governments. Even with the slowdown of economies, Mr Bhaskaran suspects that there are happening in the global markets which are upholding the economies, such as

technological change and innovation that leads to more investments and productive growth. There are risks and there would be some degrees of slow down, but there are engines of growth which would mitigate these risks. Final area of concern was climate change which would affect food prices which we have to be prepared for, and will be in unchartered territory.



Mr Bhaskaran gave an overview of the upsides in this region, with reconfiguration of supply chains, moving out of China and the beneficiaries spreading around, and favouring ASEAN. He was seeing more efforts to gain synergies from trade with an overall good outlook. Final risk would be getting policies wrong, which would cause ASEAN to lose their position for foreign investments. Following his insightful talk, Mr Bhaskaran kindly answered the many questions posed to him by members.

On behalf of the club, Rtn Sanjeev Shah thanked Mr Bhaskaran for his talk on a complex topic which gave a good flavour of what to expect in 2024.
