The Art and Science of Peace for Humanity

In today's world, armed conflicts are widespread, and the pursuit of peace has never been more urgent. As global instability intensifies, the focus on how to prevent and resolve these conflicts through mediation and discreet diplomacy has become paramount. Ms. Wu Ye Min will share her invaluable experiences and efforts in reducing violence and fostering peace across the globe.

Ms. Wu Ye-Min, the Regional Director at the Centre for Humanitarian Dialogue, shared a touching story about her father's involvement with Rotary International. Her father, now ill, was excited to hear about her speech at the Rotary Club of Singapore, especially as it tied into the book he once gave her, From Conflict to Peace, symbolising her journey in conflict resolution. She highlighted a book he gave her, "From Conflict to Peace," which traveled with her through various global postings and foreshadowed her current work in conflict resolution. She now works for the Center for Humanitarian Dialogue (HD), which started in Asia and has achieved significant peace agreements, such as the one between the Philippine government and the Moro Islamic Liberation Front, and emphasised her pride in her team's work across Asia Pacific.

She discussed the realities of global conflicts, sharing personal experiences to highlight the importance of peace-building. Transitioning to the art and science of peace, Wu conducted an interactive exercise where participants role-played a noisy neighbors' mediation scenario, illustrating the subjective nature of peace-building. She explained the Position, Interest, and Needs (PIN) model used in mediation to uncover underlying needs and promote understanding. She also introduced the "ladder of inference" to encourage recognizing diverse perspectives, vital in today's polarized world.

Wu highlighted Rotary's mission to foster peace and introduced the four T's—Thought, Talent, Treasure, and Time—as pathways Rotarians can use to contribute. Examples included hosting forums, training peacemakers, offering meeting spaces, and organizing fundraisers. Wu celebrated Rotary's potential to create "magic" through collective action and expressed optimism for the Rotary Club of Singapore's 2025 initiatives.

During the Q&A session, Wu addressed various topics, including criteria for HD's mediation efforts, the universality of mediation principles, and the importance of local culture. She explained that HD focuses on armed conflicts, often in hard-to-reach areas like Afghanistan and Nigeria, but emphasised that mediation skills are equally applicable to local disputes. Wu stressed the significance of trust-building in conflict zones, noting that fostering relationships often takes precedence over security measures.

Wu also discussed how local cultures influence conflict resolution, while external mediators can provide valuable perspectives. She encouraged empathy and active listening, citing examples from her work in the Philippines to demonstrate the power of understanding others' stories. She concluded by reaffirming the role of relationships and trust in peacemaking, underscoring Rotary's potential to influence peace conversations globally. The session ended with applause and an invitation for further fellowship.



VSC Guest Speaker Ms. Catharine Kho, a Senior Economist at the ASEAN+3 Macroeconomic Research Office (AMRO), is set to discuss recent economic developments and the macroeconomic outlook for the ASEAN+3 region. AMRO, established in 2011, is dedicated to enhancing the macroeconomic and financial resilience and stability of the ASEAN+3 region. The ASEAN+3 Macroeconomic Research Office (AMRO) plays a crucial role in regional economic stability, offering surveillance, regional financing, technical assistance, and more. AMRO is headquartered in Singapore with a USD 240 billion CMIM agreement for short-term liquidity support. ASEAN+3 accounts for about 30% of global GDP. Growth has been supported by strong domestic demand and improving external demand, particularly in investment and exports. Headline inflation has moderated due to lower global commodity and transportation prices. Core inflation remains stable. Financial Markets has mixed performance since the US election, with regional currencies depreciating against the USD. The outlook is subject to large uncertainties, especially regarding US-China trade tensions and global geopolitical developments. Potential escalation of US protectionist measures could significantly impact regional growth. Long-term growth could be affected by aging populations, global value chain reconfiguration, rapid technological advancements, and climate change.

Ms. Kho's presentation provide insights into the current economic landscape and future prospects for this significant economic area, as well as the challenges, and opportunities for the ASEAN+3 region.




