

Trump and Trade

With Donald Trump returning to the presidency on January 20, 2025, his MAGA movement is set to be revived. On the economic front, his focus will likely remain on reducing trade deficits and imposing tariffs on foreign goods, aiming to protect American industries and create jobs. But what will the impact of these policies be on Southeast Asia? Prof Dr. Andrew Kenan Rose will share his insights on this critical issue.

Professor Rose opened with a personal anecdote, sharing how he and his spouse decided to relocate to Singapore on the night of Trump's first election—a decision reflecting their concerns about the direction of U.S. policies.

TRUMP & TRADE - A DEEP DIVE WITH PROF ANDREW K ROSE, DEAN FOR NUS SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

The Rotary Club of Singapore hosted Professor Andrew K. Rose, Dean of the NUS School of Business, who delivered an insightful lecture on the implications of protectionist trade policies under the Trump administration.

Professor Rose emphasized the long-standing economic consensus on the benefits of free trade, highlighting its role in enhancing efficiency and consumer welfare. Drawing from Adam Smith's principles, he explained that free trade is a mutually advantageous system, benefitting both producers and consumers. However, he also acknowledged the realities of trade disruptions, particularly for segments of the labor force, and advocated for retraining programs and social safety nets as effective solutions. A significant portion of the talk critiqued protectionism, with tariffs being described as harmful to both consumers and the broader economy. Professor Rose detailed how tariffs disproportionately burden consumers, especially lower-income groups, while providing limited gains to wealthier producers. He also linked protectionist policies to fostering corruption, as exemptions often become avenues for bribery and inefficiency. Additionally, he warned of the risks of retaliation, with trade wars further straining global relations and economies.


His speech highlighted Singapore as a model of free trade, with its lack of agricultural protectionism keeping food costs low and fostering efficiency. In contrast, Professor Rose explained how the U.S. dollar's appreciation, driven by rising deficits and inflation under Trump's policies, could worsen trade imbalances, counteracting the administration's stated goals.

Closing with a historical perspective, Professor Rose tied strong trade relations to global peace, reminding the audience of the post-World War II efforts to promote free trade and stability. However, he cautioned that diminishing trade ties today could erode these gains, potentially leading to greater insecurity.

The session ended with a lively Q&A, where Rotarians engaged deeply on the future of trade, leaving the audience with much to reflect upon about the intersection of economics and geopolitics.


In order to meet the educational needs at the secondary level for pupils with special needs at SK Tenglu Mahmud Iskandar (1), the Secondary Special Education Program started with SMK Sri Perhentian was chose as a pioneer in the Pontian district to implement it in 1997.

A total of 5 pupils namely 4 female and 1 male were selected to follow the program. A teacher who has just graduated from UKM in the field of Special Education has been placed to implement the program. Since there are no vacant rooms, the program is conducted in a 2-bay room on the second floor (former supervisor)'s room). Starting from there, the Integration Special Education Program at this school continues to grow until today.

Introduction to the SMK Sri Perhentian



Rtn Deepa:

Special Education Program: SMK Sri Perhentian started the Secondary Special Education Program in 1997 to cater to pupils with special needs, initially with 5 students and one teacher.

Philosophy and Mission: The program aims to produce skilled, motivated, and independent individuals who can manage their lives and contribute to society, aligning with Malaysia's National Education Philosophy.

Current Needs and Repairs: The school requires funding for various repairs and improvements, including replacing sun shade nets, repairing the piping system, painting the garden walls, and making the toilets more conducive for students with disabilities.


Special Education Student Demographics: The special education class consists of 26 students with various disabilities, including cerebral palsy, autism spectrum disorder, Down syndrome, dyslexia, intellectual disability, and multiple disabilities.

Funding Requirements: The total estimated cost for the necessary repairs and improvements is RM 1542.45 (SGD 480~), covering items like anti-slip nylon handrails, handicap grab bars, toilet bowls, sunshades, and weatherproof paint for the garden.


