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DG Dr Yap's Visit to Kenya and Nairobi



ROTARY MEDICAL OUTREACH & PUMWANI MATERNITY HOSPITAL UPGRADE 2025 COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND HUMANITARIAN PROJECT ENHANCING HEALTHCARE SERVICES IN KENYA

In January 2025, the Rotary Club of Singapore (part of District 3310) supported the District's Friendship Exchange Mission to Kenya, led by District Governor Dr. Yap Lip Kee and organized by District Friendship Exchange Chair PP June Jonet, with support from the Rotary Clubs of Queenstown, Garden City, Sentosa, and Singapore.

Mission Kickoff: Visit to Masai Mara & Fellowship in Nairobi

The delegation began their journey with a brief yet enriching visit to Masai Mara, immersing themselves in Kenya's breathtaking landscapes and cultural heritage. This visit provided a deeper understanding of the country's diversity and set the tone for a mission built on cross-cultural exchange and humanitarian service.

Upon returning to Nairobi, the team engaged in meaningful fellowship events hosted by local Kenyan Rotarians, reinforcing international camaraderie. Their visit also coincided with Rotary International President Stephanie Urchick's tour of Africa, amplifying the mission's impact.

Mission Highlights

1. Rotary Club of Kikuyu Medical Camp – January 2025

As part of Rotary Family Health Days, the Rotary Club of Kikuyu, supported by Rotary District 9212 and RFHA, conducted a comprehensive medical camp at Gichuru Dispensary, providing essential healthcare to over 2,000 patients in three days.

Key Services & Impact:

Cancer Screenings for Women – Led by DG Dr. Yap Lip Kee

Medical Assistance – Rotarians from District 3310 helped with patient registration, blood pressure checks, and support

Sustainability Efforts – A tree-planting initiative promoting environmental conservation

2. Gynaecological Surgery Camp at Pumwani Maternity Referral Hospital

Patients requiring specialized care were referred to Pumwani Maternity Referral Hospital, where keyhole surgeries were performed under Dr. Joseph Nyagi (RC Kirinyaga), with six major surgeries conducted daily over four days.

Additionally, Dr. Yap introduced telemedicine equipment to explore future telementoring collaborations, paving the way for a potential partnership with Safaricom Foundation.

3. Global Grant Project – Pumwani Maternity Referral Hospital Upgrade

A landmark initiative was the launch of a Global Grant Project aimed at upgrading Pumwani Maternity Referral Hospital, a 97-year-old institution serving Nairobi's mothers and newborns.

Project Goals & Benefits:

Infrastructure Enhancements – Installation of modern medical equipment in labor and neonatal wards

Capacity Building – Training hospital staff in partnership with the University of Nairobi's Department of Obstetrics & Gynecology

Improved Maternal & Neonatal Care – Expanding affordable healthcare access for low-income families

Measuring Impact:

50-99 children under 5 treated every six months

Reduction in neonatal and child mortality rates

20-49 maternal and child healthcare professionals trained every three months

Long-term hospital sustainability through local partnerships

This \$180,000 Global Grant Project is supported by Rotary International, Rotary Districts in Africa and Hong Kong, and various Rotary Clubs, including Singapore, Pandan Valley, Bandar Seri Begawan, and Kuching Central.

The CEO of Pumwani Maternity & Referral Hospital will oversee monitoring and evaluation to ensure transparency and long-term sustainability.

Disruption, opportunity or the new normal? Container shipping in 2025 and beyond

Container shipping, a backbone of global trade, has faced unprecedented challenges over the past few years, and the industry has been forced to adapt rapidly. As we look ahead to 2025 and beyond, the key question arises: Is container shipping experiencing a disruption, an era of new opportunities, or the establishment of a "new normal"? Mr. Jeremy Nixon will share his thoughts on this topic.

CEO of Ocean Network Express (ONE)

THE ROLE OF CONTAINER SHIPPING IN GLOBAL TRADE AND THE PATH TO DECARBONIZATION

Container shipping serves as the backbone of global trade, providing essential transportation infrastructure that enables commerce on a massive scale. The demand for shipping is closely linked to trade volumes, which fluctuate based on economic conditions and market dynamics. Companies like Ocean Network Express (ONE) operate extensive global networks, connecting 120 countries through more than 244 port calls across 165+ service routes. However, the shipping industry now faces a pressing challenge: the need to decarbonize its operations while maintaining efficiency and reliability.

THE PROBLEM STATEMENT: SHIPPING'S DEPENDENCE ON FOSSIL FUELS

The modern trade network has been built on fossil fuels. In 2018 alone, 60,000 ships transported approximately 12 billion tonnes of cargo worldwide, contributing significantly to global greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. As environmental concerns intensify, the industry is under increasing pressure to transition towards sustainable alternatives.

ONE'S COMMITMENT TO DECARBONIZATION

ONE has set ambitious decarbonization targets to reduce emissions intensity and achieve netzero emissions. By 2030, the company aims to cut its Scope 1 GHG emissions by 70% per TEU-km (twenty-foot equivalent unit per kilometer) compared to 2008 levels. ONE has already achieved a 62% reduction from 2008 to 2023, putting it on track to meet its 2030 target. Looking further ahead, the company plans to achieve net-zero absolute emissions (including Scope 2 and 3) by 2050.

INNOVATIONS ENABLING A GREENER FUTURE

To support its decarbonization goals, ONE is investing in a range of technological advancements:

- 1. Advanced Hull Design Optimized hull shapes reduce drag, improving fuel efficiency.
- 2. Smart Technology Integration Digital solutions enhance operational efficiency, reducing unnecessary fuel consumption.
- 3. Energy-Saving Devices Wind-assisted propulsion and other innovations help cut emissions.
- 4. Alternative Fuels Research into biofuels, hydrogen, and ammonia as potential replacements for traditional fossil fuels.

TRANSITIONING TO ZERO-EMISSION VESSELS

ONE has outlined a phased approach to introducing zero-emission vessels:


- -By 2030, the first alternative fuel-capable vessels will be deployed.
- -By 2035, more than 20% of the fleet will consist of zero-emission vessels.
- -By 2050, net-zero emissions will be achieved through a combination of biofuels, carbon offset mechanisms, and fleet-wide sustainability improvements.

CONCLUSION

The container shipping industry is at a critical juncture, balancing the need for global trade efficiency with the urgency of decarbonization. Companies like ONE are taking proactive steps to reduce their carbon footprint, leveraging technology and innovation to meet ambitious sustainability goals. While the path to net-zero emissions presents challenges, continued investment in green solutions and regulatory support will be key in shaping the future of sustainable shipping.





Joint CSC & VSC Meeting

The 8th VSC meeting took place on Thursday, 13 March 2025, at The Foundry, The Anvil Level 2. VSC Director Denis updated that the fund raising project with NeuGen has successfully reached its target amount of \$25,000 (\$18,000 raised by the club and 40% or \$7,000 matching by Tote Board)



- Fund-raising campaign target of \$18k was met on 25 February 2025
- Recap: \$25k to sponsor tuition of 10 primary school students (children of ex-offenders)
- NeuGen has received 40% matching approval from Tote Board
- IshK Tolaram Foundation has approved USD5k grant to VSC for this project
- Thank all Rotarians for their generous support to this very impactful project!



What are some issues faced by migrant domestic workers (MDWs)?

SALARY ISSUES

- Low pay
 Unpaid or underpaid
- Excessive recruitment fees, salary deductions for 2 -8 months

WELL-BEING ISSUES

- Inadequate food
 Confiscated phones
- Cramped sleeping arrangements
- Lack of privacy & constant surveillance

LACK OF REST DAYS

Not all MDWs have weekly rest days. They're also frequently overworked due to a lack of labour protections (excluded from Employment Act).

ABUSE

Physical (slapping, beating), verbal (screaming, name -calling names)and sexual abuse from employers & agents
