

Where to live in 2050

As climate change accelerates, economies falter, governments face increasing instability, and technology continues to disrupt every facet of life. Which cities will possess the luck, vision, and resilience to thrive amid the convergence of these 21st-century challenges? Where would you choose to settle with the year 2050 in mind? Dr. Parag Khanna will offer his expert foresight into which cities are likely to become the most desirable places to live in the decades ahead.

Dr Parag Khanna frames geopolitics as a "war for young talent." Countries that can attract and retain mobile, educated youth will out-innovate and out-adapt those that cannot. Robots and Al may raise productivity, but they neither pay taxes nor solve demographic imbalances; humans remain indispensable.

Young people today behave like "quantum pinballs," switching countries repeatedly in pursuit of opportunity, affordability, and community. By 2050 the winners will be jurisdictions that offer climate resilience, reasonable taxes, robust infrastructure, and social openness. Khanna's own software venture, AlphaGeo, ranks locations against such criteria to help individuals and investors decide where to live, work, or retire.

Climate change reshapes both population flows and food production. People will generally relocate along four predictable vectors: coastal \rightarrow inland, low-lying \rightarrow high ground, hot \rightarrow cooler, and always by the shortest affordable hop. As droughts, mega-storms, and water scarcity intensify, entire "vacant states" could emerge when regions like parts of Bolivia, Eritrea, or Yemen become uninhabitable. Conversely, higher-latitude zones in Canada or northern Europe are already expanding agricultural output and absorbing migrants.

Because no global migration framework exists—and none is likely—countries are striking bilateral "skills partnership" deals. Japan recruits Filipino nurses; Germany just opened 90 000 visas a year for Indian software engineers; Greece seeks Indian construction crews. Competition for critical workers resembles elite football transfers, with professionals constantly arbitraging wages across borders.

In the Q&A, Khanna notes sectors poised to benefit from these macro forces: defense in an era of conflict, AI hardware-software, and resource companies buoyed by climate-driven commodity inflation. Yet he concludes that even the most automated societies will still need human caregivers and innovators, making youthful migration the pivotal variable for national success.

The Magical Conference

Joint District Conference Rid 3420 & 3310, 16 - 17 May 2025 ("Bali Discon")

The Rotary District Joint Conference 2025, held on May 16-17, 2025, at The Meru Convention Hall in Sanur, Denpasar, Bali, was a landmark event that united over 500 Rotarians from across the globe to address pressing environmental and community challenges. Organized by Rotary District 3420 (East Indonesia) and District 3310 (Singapore, Malaysia, Brunei), the conference embraced the theme "Collaboration for a Better and Sustainable Life." It provided a platform for sharing innovative solutions, fostering international collaboration, and celebrating Rotary's commitment to service above self.

The conference addressed Bali's environmental challenges, particularly its annual waste generation of 1.6 million tons, 20% of which is plastic. This focus aligned with Rotary's growing emphasis on environmental sustainability, making the event a critical platform for actionable solutions.

Conference Highlights

The two-day conference featured a range of sessions designed to inspire and equip Rotarians with tools to address global challenges. Key highlights included:

i) Pameran Projek (Project Exhibition)

Grassroots projects focused on sustainable living, offering practical examples for replication in communities worldwide. Projects included waste reduction initiatives and community-driven environmental efforts.

ii) Sungai Watch

A key initiative focused on innovative river cleaning solutions to combat water pollution in Bali's waterways, a critical issue for environmental and public health.

iii) Talk Show on Sustainable Business

Featuring collaborations with organizations like Plastic Angel and Pesona Plastik, this session explored how businesses can adopt sustainable practices to reduce environmental impact, emphasizing partnerships that turn waste into opportunity.

iv) Waste Management Training Center

Located in Pemogan, Denpasar, this center promotes the principles of Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle, serving as a model for community education and action to address Bali's waste crisis.

The conference also highlighted Rotary's broader humanitarian efforts, such as its polio eradication campaign, which has immunized 1.2 billion children globally, and community literacy programs that enhance educational access in underserved areas.

The Rotary Club of Singapore, as a key member of District 3310, contributed to Rotary's success through its participation and alignment with the goals and mission of Service Above Self. The club's history of impactful projects, such as Football Plus and mangrove restoration, highlights its leadership in Rotary's mission.

Many Rotarians and their guests arrived in Bali on Thursday 15th May 2025, one day before the official opening of the conference.

Some Rotarians visited centres for community services to have a better understanding of the difficulties faced by the different segments of society. This served as a basis for future projects which the club can undertake to provide assistance to the beneficiaries.

A visit was made to a Mental Health Project Initiative in Bali with RC Bali Nusa Dua. Members interacted with RC Bali Nusa Dua and co-founder of Sole Family organisation.













A visit was also made to the Kolewa Foundation in Bali. This is a cooperating organisation for RC Singapore's Global Grant project for Cleft Lip/Palate.







A briefing was made by PP Wes Nieman of RC Bali Nusa Dua. This was the 5th Cleft Lip/Palate Global Grant project. Close to US\$1 million was raised impacting the lives of 250 beneficiaries. RC Singapore contributed US\$18,000 and was instrumental in the application of the global grant.

Members witnessed a speech therapy and caregiver training session in progress.







In the evening, guests were treated to a fellowship dinner, with a traditional Kecak Dance Performance, at Minoo Restaurant, Melasti Beach.



I was one of the early registrants of the DISCON2025 recently held in Bali. What attracted me to attend was the "Environment and Sustainability" theme of this conference, and to pay tribute to our two back-to-back DGs, and that our club was the de-facto host. There was also this inner urge to visit Bali which is my favourite holiday and 'unwind' destination. And above all the potential for inter-district cooperation in joint projects with D3240 was not lost on me.
