The Rotary Club of Alexandra Headland recently hosted 300 scouts and their leaders for breakfast when they stopped off at the Sunshine Coast on their way to Maryborough for the 26th Australian Jamboree (AJ2025). The three yearly event was held at the Maryborough Showgrounds and Equestrian Park January 6–15, 2025.

Six buses left Canberra at midday on Sunday January 5 and travelled through the night, planning to arrive at the Sunshine Coast at 6:00am. You can imagine the surprise for the Rotary Club of Alexandra Headland members who arrived just before 5:00am to start setting up and found two buses already in the carpark! A better run than expected partly explained the early arrival but the main reason? – they hadn't taken daylight savings into account, or the lack of it, in Queensland!



As more buses arrived, the scout group patiently waited as the Rotary Club of Alexandra Headland volunteers feverishly set up for breakfast. No doubt the scouts were just grateful to be out of a cramped bus and able to walk around in the pleasant Queensland morning air – and go to the toilet!

Biogas for Nakuru Project Update

Biogas units 19 and 20 have now been commissioned and handed over to the beneficiaries. Unit 19 went to a family of the Umoja Self Help Group (SHG) and unit 20 to a family of the Hope SHG.

Unit 20 was constructed using the funds raised at our changeover last June, Unit 19 was funded by the Bedourie Amateur Race Club Inc. This was from the funds raised by the Rotary Nomads and Friends helping with the Camel and Pig races.

Rotary Foundation Global Grant Application

The application has been submitted and assessed by the Rotary Foundation Regional Grants Officer (for Africa). The regional grants officer has requested quite a lot of additional information which the project team is now working on.

We still need funds and pledges to support the global grant and the Rotary Foundation project to install 120 biogas units for families in the rural area around Nakuru. The budget to install 120 biogas units is currently US\$131,425 (A\$211,178).

Unfortunately, it is not possible to donate directly to the Rotary Foundation for the project until the global grant is approved which also makes fundraising very challenging. We do have pledges from four other Rotary Clubs and verbal pledges from Rotary Nomads and other individual Rotarians for funds to be donated to the project once the global grant is approved. We are also receiving cash donations into the Rotary Nomads 'grant' account which will be transferred to the Rotary Foundation project in the donor's name as soon as the global grant is approved. The Foundation donations go towards Paul Harris recognition where RAWCS donations do not.

Donations to the Foundation and via RAWCS are both tax-deductable.

RAWCS Biogas for Nakuru

The Biogas for Nakuru is now an approved RAWCS (Rotary Australia World Community Service) project. This means that anyone can now make a tax deductable donation of any amount at any time direct to the project. Why RAWCS as well as the Foundation Global Grant? Transferring donated funds that we already hold to a Kenyan shillings bank account in Kenya ANZ from our was too bank



difficult. These are funds received directly for the biogas project are outside of the Foundation global grant application process.

We had to try to work around this to get the funds to Kenya for units 19 and 20. Long story, anyway we still needed a way for people to be able to make tax deductable donations to the project anytime and in addition to the Global Grant process.

It is important to have a simple way to transfer any funds raised outside of the global grant process to the Rotary Club of Nakuru's biogas project account whenever required i.e. for the payment of invoices for materials etc to construct a biogas unit. RAWCS solves both these issues.

Tax deductable donations can now be collected and managed by RAWCS and no longer have to pass through a Rotary Nomads account reducing the Treasurer's workload by no longer having to manage these funds.

Funds have now been transferred to the RAWCS Biogas for Nakuru project account for the construction of Biogas units 21 and 22 funded by the Rotary Club of Townsville Central and a private donor from Canada.

DISTRICT 9620 FOUNDATION COLUMN

We are continually seeing media reports of horrendous episodes of domestic violence in the community. Rotary has begun aggressively tackling this issue in recent years, with such things as T-shirts promoting awareness, being worn by Rotarians who have taken to the streets with this message. Businesses have also taken up this campaign, with employees all wearing the T-shirts. Many clubs are now taking the advantage of District Grant Funds to assist in this area.

My club, Ipswich City, has repainted and organised recarpeting of the admission area of one of the Domestic Violence Offices, as well as providing an outdoor area with landscaping, a cubby house, seating, and land scaping.

The Rotary Club of Toowong (RCT) support of the Windana Domestic Violence Support Centre.

This month the first District Grant (2021-2022) we will be looking at, was initiated by the Rotary Club of Toowong (RCT). The Rotary Club of Toowong has a close relationship with the Windana Support Centre, a refuge run by women for women and children subject to domestic violence. RCT has assisted Windana over the last seven years with several donations to meet their continuing needs. Windana provides safe and supported short-term crisis accommodation. When families arrive at the refuge, the support workers will assist them with their immediate

needs by providing food, safe accommodation, and access to urgent medical attention. Families may stay in the refuge for around three months and have the possibility of extending their stay in a transitional house for around another three months.

The Project

This District Grant was an opportunity to give Windana items which they have indicated that they need. Something to always consider when structuring a District Grant, is to make sure that a needs assessment, which must involve the recipients, is always carried out. This is of paramount importance with the structuring of a District Grant.

The items requested by Windana are as follows.

1. The InfaSecure car child seat is for children from 0 to 4 and they have an easier mechanism to adjust the height of the seat.

2. The iPhone SE 2020 128GB for staff as this will provide all the features for working safely with clients and to access emails and other communication sites Windana needs to.

3. The Samsung Galaxy A12 unlocked smartphones are for clients. This will give them a reliable mobile phone so they can access their social media sites to retain communication with their loved ones, capacity to access internet site such as realestate.com so they can look for secure and sustainable accommodation.

The above items purchased by the Rotary Club of Toowong came to \$2,481.41 with the club requesting grant funding in the amount of \$1,240.71, with the remaining half provided by the club.

Something to be aware of when dealing with Domestic Violence Offices and Accommodation, is the secrecy involved in not disclosing their locations. This information is rarely shared with people outside their organisation.

Rotary Club of Mooloolaba's Equine Therapy Program

The next District Grant (2021-2022) we will look at, is the Rotary Club of Mooloolaba's Equine Therapy Program for Years 4 and 5 students who attend Mooloolaba State School. In addition to providing funding for the program which is provided by "Equine Alliance", volunteers from the Rotary Club of Mooloolaba provided transportation for six students to and from the Equine Alliance facility at Palmwoods. The programs run for six sessions of each school term throughout the year.

The Benefits of the Project

Equine Assisted Counselling & Personal Development Program as provided by Equine Alliance has proven to provide positive results with students who participate in the program. Students with either personal behavioural issues or with troubled home life are identified by the school counsellor and a recommendation is put to the school for participation in the Equine Therapy Program.

Statistics have shown that behavioural issues are corrected for those students who participate in the program, which assists greatly in improving their home life for both the individual students and their families. The program assists in keeping young children out of institutions and keeping the family unit together.

The Club's proposed financial contribution, resources and / or labour

The program offers six sessions for each of the 4 school terms and six different students attend each term making a total of 24 students for the year. Each year supports 24 different students from the year before.

Mooloolaba has been supporting this program for over eight years now and the volunteers have witnessed the improvement in the students' outlook and demeanour after the six sessions are completed and over the years had very positive to the program's feedback as success. Cooperation and collaboration with the school, particularly their Counsellor & Deputy Head, is essential for without it the program would fall flat. The Club Coordinator works very closely with the Counsellor and is currently in discussions with her as to how we may be able to help with a breakfast club she is hoping to start up, which offers food to students in the mornings. It was through our relationship with the DP we were able to arrange for a Peace Pole to be established in the school grounds. As such, we have learnt that the development of strong relationships in a community can allow other pathways/opportunities for new projects to develop.

When Clubs are writing their District Grant applications, they sometimes neglect detailing their commitment of club funds or member labour input towards the grant. When completing the financial section of the final report, all funds expended should be shown as well as member hours.

I hope clubs are preparing to get their District Grant applications for the 24/25year in. Also, this year two members from each club will have to complete the Grants Training on the RI learning centre site.

VALE WILLIAM (BILL) BOYD

Rotary Oceania stated on 22 January that, 'It with great sadness that we recognise the passing of Rotary International Past President Bill Boyd today. Our thoughts are with Lorna and their family. Bill Boyd was President of Rotary International in 2006/2007, only the second New Zealander to hold that position. 'In recognition of his service Bill was awarded the Rotary Foundation's Distinguished Service Award and Citation for Meritorious Service and a Distinguished Service Award by Rotary Down Under. Bill was also presented with the Queens Service Order for Community Service in the 2007 New Zealand New Year's Honours List and made a Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit in 2013. He was a Paul Harris fellow, many times over. A complete Rotarian.'

'Thank you, Bill, for your unparalleled dedication and leadership. Let us honour his memory by continuing to Lead the Way.'


IPDG to conquer Mount Kilimanjaro
