## Helping in the aftermath of Cyclone Alfred

The Rotary club of Wynnum and Manly moved its meeting venue to the Wynnum Golf Club last year. Member attendance at meetings has increased consistently since the move and membership growth has accelerated, partly because of the excellent venue. The RC of Wynnum and Manly could not meet there in the second week of March because of the impact of Cyclone Alfred and its aftermath.

While cyclone Alfred did not reach the intensity expected, it still packed enough punch to bring down trees, snap branches and scatter debris over some distance. The accompanying rainfall softened the soil and exacerbated the effects of the wind.

This is what happened at the Wynnum Golf Club and the damage caused was enough to put the club out of action until much of the debris was cleared up. The Golf Club management arranged for two working bees on successive days in the second week of March and sought assistance from Golf Club members and their friends to join the working bee and help in the clean-up.

In return for the excellent treatment RC of Wynnum and Manly has received from the Golf Club, President Mick Matthews offered the services of RC of Wynnum and Manly to help. That was gladly accepted by the Golf Club and the call went out to the RC of Wynnum and Manly members. The short notice meant that most were not able to be present but President Mick and Vice President Les Louis attended on the day, armed with gloves and rakes to attack the offending debris.

They joined with about 30 Golf Club Members and staff for three hours on Thursday morning and the whole team was able to make major inroads into the clearing of the fallen trees and branches. The success of the effort can be judged by the fact that the Golf Club was able to get operational some days earlier than they had expected.

#### **District Grant 2023-34 Booval**

The Rotary Club of Booval has for several years provided nutritional meals to disadvantaged persons in Ipswich, at Queens Park. This is a small club of four members, who meet every second Tuesday, with the alternate Tuesday being when they feed the local people. They work in conjunction with Rosies, another organisation which has supported the local disadvantaged for several years. This program comes under the name of "Footprints in the Park".

The delivery of meals is provided through the Club's Catering Trailer. With the club's small numbers, they rely on "Friends on Rotary. In the previous year the club provided 735 meals with 201 volunteer hours provided by five Rotarians and three Friends of Rotary.



The grant requested was for \$5,000, to be used in food purchases, associated packaging, plus repairs to the club trailer subframe. Without the trailer this program could not occur.

The club expenditure was made up of \$463.21 of club funds and \$5,000 from the grant.

Booval should be congratulated for their ongoing commitment to the disadvantaged of Ipswich. This is a long-term commitment, with all club member participation being required.

#### **District Grant 2023-30 Roma**

Members of the Rotary Club of Roma form the Board of Pinaroo Roma Inc., which owns and operates a not for profit 71 bed aged care facility in Roma, along with a new Independent Living Units (ILU) complex for 10 residents. Pinaroo is the only privately owned & managed community based residential aged care provider in the Maranoa region. The new ILU's will require a feature meeting place for residents, family and friends in the centre of the complex to enhance liveability and improve the physical and mental health and the welfare of residents.

The project will involve the foundation and erection of a gazebo structure and surrounding landscaping to form this meeting place. The gazebo will be named the Rotary Gazebo and will feature appropriate signage to that effect. This District Grant is supporting the purchase of the Gazebo with 8 sides, 7-metre sides, and 2400mm high. The cost of the Gazebo was \$11,813, with this only being part of this major project which has an estimated cost of around \$100,000.

When completed, the project will be a family friendly place for the elderly residents to gather in a village square like atmosphere. This will further enhance their healthy living conditions, provide better emotional support and improve overall aged health care for those who live in rural Queensland.



The Rotary Club of Roma is to be commended for this project with the club providing the \$4,813 to complete the Gazebo purchase.

#### The Process of Acquitting a District Grant

When a Rotary Club completes their District Grant, they are required to submit their Final Report for evaluation by the District Grant Committee. In most cases payment of the grant cannot be made until the committee checks the grant for compliance with the applicable rules. (In some cases, clubs may request progress payments be made during the period of the grant.) When the committee gives the approval, the Treasurer (Bruce Mills) will make a transfer into the club's bank account.

There is another check of the grant compliance, where John Leddy (OAM PDG) the District Stewardship Officer evaluates a percentage of the District Grant Final Reports. He may request extra information from the Grant Committee when doing his assessment.

Once the acquittal process is completed, all the grant information is transmitted to head office in Sydney. As you can see Rotary treats the process of District Grants and the correct spending of the associated funds with great diligence. The table above details the process that John Leddy goes through in evaluating a grant's compliance.

I would make a few comments on issues I have noted when evaluating District Grants. We have had to knock back some receipts which were dated before the club received the approval letter from the District Grant Chairman. There have been instances where flight bookings were made before the acceptance date. This was approved by district after the situation and time frames were discussed with the club.

When evaluating receipts, difficulties arise with foreign exchange rates, and ineligible receipts. I would suggest that a record is kept by the Rotarian involved, regarding all these transactions, to help the grant committee's assessment. At times club members may pay with their own money from their account, and then seek reimbursement by their club. We require to see a paper trail from the bank statements provided with the Grant Final Report.
