Welcome to the September Newsletter,

I cannot believe that we are a quarter of the way through our Rotary Year.

September has been a month of both celebration and reflection. The Rotary Club of Nambour marked a significant milestone, celebrating 75 years of service. Shortly after, we bid farewell to Past Rotary International President Glen Kinross AO, a cherished member of the Rotary Club of Hamilton, remembered fondly as a friend and mentor to many Rotarians in our district. Our heartfelt condolences go out to his family and friends.

Nambour was also the home of Past International President Sir Clem Renouf, who initiated the End Polio Now Campaign. We need your help to continue his legacy and eradicate polio from the world. Although we started the year with single-digit cases, we now have 19 recorded cases in Afghanistan and 21 in Pakistan. We must give a final push to consign polio to the history books forever. Rotary has also committed US\$500,000 to support a two-round polio vaccination campaign that began in Gaza on September 1st.

### We need your support.

October 24th is World Polio Day – a time for Rotary members, public health advocates, and everyone who envisions a polio-free world to come together, recognise our progress, and discuss the actions needed to end polio for good.

Have a club event, promote this Rotary initiative, we are close, so close, but cannot afford to be complacent.

The final push needs to be the biggest push!

## Important changes to presidential messaging

- Presidential materials: year colours, scarves, ties, and more

"Say NO to Domestic Violence and YES to Respectful Relationships"

The aim of the "Say No to Domestic Violence and Yes to Respectful Relationships" campaign is to raise awareness of this scourge on our society, to raise funds, and to change behaviour to promote Respectful Relationships. This campaign was initiated by the Rotary Club of Ballina-on-Richmond and has since spread across Australia, New Zealand, and the Pacific Islands.

The Message is simple but powerful: "Say NO to Domestic and Family Violence and YES to Respectful Relationships" which essentially, urges us "to be Kind" to one another.

Rotary International has been operating in Australia for over 100 years serving local and world communities, helping to make a better life for those in need. In addition to its many projects, Rotary in Australia, New Zealand, and the Pacific Islands now seeks to make a massive difference by reducing the incidence of Domestic Violence that destroys lives, and families.

#### **Emotional Abuse**

Emotional abuse is defined as behaviour or actions that are aimed at preventing or controlling a person's behaviour, causing them emotional harm. This behaviour is characterised in nature by their intent to manipulate, control, isolate, or intimidate the person they are aimed at. They are generally repeated behaviours and include psychological, social, and verbal abuse.

### The Effect on the Children

Abuse and violence devastate a child's sense of self and safety and limits their choices and freedom. Their family and homes are no longer a 'safe haven'.

The risk factors of mental health problems, and financial stress is being repeated in families. There are programs in place to tackle each of these issues, but first and foremost **the safety of children must be considered.** We firmly

advocate for the importance of maintaining strong family units.

### **Psychological Trauma**

Emotional and Psychological trauma is the result of extraordinarily stressful events that shatter your sense of security, making you feel helpless in a dangerous world. Psychological trauma can leave you struggling with upsetting emotions, memories, and anxiety that won't go away. It can also leave you unable to trust other people.

Traumatic experiences often involve a threat to life or safety, but any situation that leaves you feeling overwhelmed and isolated can result in trauma, even if it does not involve physical harm. It's not the objective circumstances that determine whether an event is traumatic, but your subjective emotional experience of the event.

# Interplast brings smiles and illuminating futures in Kiribati

Interplast has been sending programs to Kiribati since 1986. In June, our volunteer team returned for the first time since 2019 to provide lifechanging surgery to patients and learning opportunities to local staff.

### Overcoming challenges before arrival

Before the program begins, our local partners in Kiribati prepare a list of patients who would benefit from consultations with the Interplast team. Director of Health Services, Dr Tekeua Uriam Kabiri, and surgeon, Dr Uriam Salomia, pour through potential patients and arrange for them to be at Tungaru Central Hospital to meet the team.

However, the first thing to arrive in Kiribati is the essential medical equipment and supplies needed for treatment.

Did you know that the cost of transporting the essential equipment our team need is one of the highest costs of providing life-changing care? Many of our partner countries have limited supplied and rely on Interplast to provide specialist materials. Unfortunately, the COVID-19 pandemic drastically increased shipping costs, which has significantly increased the burden on our programs.

Getting all personnel and equipment to arrive incountry is often a feat in itself!

### **Delivering outstanding care**

No hour is wasted. The week was made-up of long operating days, lectures, demonstrations and evenings with the Australian High Commission and Rotary Club of Tarawa.

All the hard work pays off in a big way. Together, our team delivered:

- 20 surgical procedures
- 15 allied health treatments
- 111 training opportunities.

Patients were of all ages: 18 adults and 15 children.

Eight pantechnicon loads of school furniture were all heading for landfill, until the asset manager made contact with RARE with volumes of furniture being shifted during the recent school holidays. The old furniture was still is in excellent condition with many decades of service life remaining.

### The 2022 Ipswich Flood Disaster

This month I will be describing how three of the local Ipswich Clubs banded together because of a natural disaster. The clubs involved were my club Ipswich City, Ipswich, and Greater Springfield, with a much appreciated \$5,000 donation from the Rotary Club of Mitchell. This collaboration demonstrates that we can greatly expand Rotary's effectiveness by clubs working together and looking at multiple sources of funding.



A major flood event occurred in February 2022 in the Ipswich region, which inundated almost 600 homes and 300 businesses across Ipswich, before another wave of flooding inundated our community again in May 2022.

The White Goods Program: After a combined club meeting it was decided that to provide a greater single impact to the flood affected households, the grant money and club funds would provide a large piece of white goods to each household. This was their choice of a fridge,

freezer, washing machine or dryer. The DG (Paul Roger) and I did a survey of local goods white suppliers, and Harvey Norman, Booval was the eventual choice.



**Rotary Grants**: District applied for a \$25,000 US Disaster Grant in support of the flood recovery, and I wrote a combined application for the three clubs in the cluster. We were limited to \$3,000 for each club, with \$9,000 being the combined funding received. District then made available funds through a Disaster Grant from

District Funds. The club cluster received \$6,000 from this. The last funding we received was a District Grant that I applied for on behalf of Ipswich City and Greater Springfield. This District Grant gave us an extra \$7,000. So, the total funds made available through various Rotary Grants was \$22,000.

**Fund Raising**: The three members of the cluster made available \$16,500 from their club funds. This amount was increased to \$21,500 with a very generous, and much appreciated donation of \$5,000 by the Rotary Club of Mitchell. The Rotary Club of Ipswich had been looking at the "Gathering" as an opportunity to raise funds, and they decided to make this part of the cluster fund

raising. The "Gathering" is an event where all things of a Scottish background are promoted. This of course involved Scottish food, dancing, music, and lots of blokes in skirts. Ipswich took the lead on this with



Greater Springfield, Ipswich City plus Rotarians from other clubs from the district helping. The main problem was the rain with around a quarter of the expected attendance. To give an idea of the situation, I was collecting the gold coin donation at the main entrance from the car park and had to keep emptying the water out of the collection bucket. The Gathering ended up raising \$4,786, with a big thank you to the Rotary Club of Ipswich and the main organiser Richard Horne. In total the club money raised was \$26,286.

Summary of the White Goods Program: With the Rotary Grants plus the fund raising and club donations, a total of \$48,286 was raised. It is required that the use of grant funds does not differ from the details laid out in the grant application. The recipients of the White Goods were stipulated to be family households. Through the Goodna club I had an inquiry if the Goodna SES could receive a washing machine. During the floods the Goodna SES members spent long hours wading through muddy water, with the mud and filth adhering to their uniforms. The SES headquarters had no facilities to allow them to wash and dry their uniforms. I requested that District broaden the scope of the recipients of the program to include the Goodna SES, and

this was agreed to. I supplied them with a large washing machine and a similarly sized drier. A little later a similar situation for the Marberg SES was approved by District.

**Small Appliance Packages.** Many of the households I visited did not qualify for the whitegoods, however they were still struggling. I found that things such as toasters, kettles, vacuum cleaners, and other small household appliances were still missing from these households. There was an agreed amount of club funds to match the Rotary Grants, however there was money above this amount available. With the 3 clubs' agreement I would put together these small appliance packages up to the value of \$350.

**Summary of White Goods and Small Appliance Package Programs**: The first piece of white goods was delivered on 27/7/22 and concluded on 23/3/23 with 43 households receiving a piece of whitegoods at a total cost of \$39,016. In all 29 small appliance packages were delivered, at a cost of \$8,745.

In the end, I was having difficulty finding households that the white goods program could support, as the floods were well in the past, and most people had replaced their white goods. The other issue was that we had expended almost all the funds available. The DG Paul Roger organised a small barbeque in Goodna, at a cost of \$200, in support the 24 small town houses that had been flooded. Some of the remaining funds were used for this and the remainder was donated to the Rotary Foundation.

Between these two programs I visited around 65 households, with only four cases of people trying to receive support fraudulently.

RAWCS Assistance: After the floods RAWCS allocated \$500 Gift Cards available to the local clubs to distribute to the flood victims. This process involved visiting the affected households, confirming their eligibility, and my emailing a summary of the household's situation. RAWCS would then mail the gift card to the persons nominated. In all 25 \$500 RAWCS gift cards were distributed amongst the local community. **Rotary** Australia World Community (RAWCS) Service is an Australian non-profit public company controlled the Australian division of Rotary International.

**GIVIT Assistance**: Another source of funding was the GIVIT not-for profit organisation. To


access this funding, you must be registered with GIVIT. I took the approach of working through the Ipswich Council as they were registered, but more importantly they could tell me if people had already accessed this funding. After visiting the household and assessing their needs, I would fill out the paperwork with a brief description of the situation and pass this information to an Ipswich Council employee. I must emphasise the high level of professionalism in the assistance I received from Council staff. The assistance was in the form of Gift Vouchers from local firms. (Woolworths, Coles, The Good Guys, A Mart, K Mart, and Big W) The Gift Vouchers were then sent to me, and I then delivered them to the recipients. The acquittal process involved me getting a signed acknowledgement of the receipt of the gift voucher, and a copy of this was emailed to the Ipswich Council. In summary 24 households received \$34,215, with the amounts distributed ranging from \$100 up to \$2,580. I know \$100 is a small amount, but the elderly lady only wanted a new electric fry pan.

GIVIT is a national not-for profit that partners with local charities and organisations to connect those in need with generous donors, ensuring that Australians experiencing hardship receive the essential items and services they need, when they need them most.

**Saint Vinnies**: I was approached by St Vinnies to help them identify households where they could assist flood victims to rebuild their homes. I was told by the chairman of the body corporate for the 24 Goodna town houses that they all ended up receiving around \$17,000 each. A number of the other people whose names I gave to St Vinnies also received significant assistance.

In summary, we as clubs can extend our good work by banding together in "Cluster Groups". We have seen this happening in the District Grants for 24/25 with a number of clubs coming together to support a larger project.

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# FRIENDS CIRCLE EXPANDS SUPPORT IN COMMUNITY

The Rotary Club of Booval has been entrenched in the Ipswich community since 1967 and at the forefront in community events and service to the city.

In September the group came together at the PA Hotel in Booval for a visit from District Governor Sue Mulraney and Area Governor Lester Drew to celebrate and recognise all members of a special Friends of Rotary group.

Friends of Rotary collaborates to serve the community and has delivered repeatedly throughout Ipswich, as Booval Rotary president, Graham Keidge told *Local Ipswich News*.



"We have supplied defib units to two community groups, supported many Shave for a Cure events plus many other activities over time," Mr Keidge said.

"We continue to supply free meals every fortnight to the needy people of Ipswich.

"This costs many dollars plus people give of their time. This year we have worked 981 hours and provided 282 meals.

"We really appreciated the visit from DG Sue for taking the time out of her busy schedule to discuss issues and outline Rotary's vision for the coming year,"

Mr Keidge said the lunch was productive, with discussion around the impact of service projects, expanding Rotary's reach in the community and getting more members of the community engaged in their projects.

The theme for the year 2024-25 is The Magic of Rotary, and Mr Keidge said the positive change

Rotary had throughout the community was clear to see and would only grow into the future.

"We still have a way to go with the eradication of polio in some countries and this will be an ongoing project of Rotary International to achieve this goal," he said.

"Closer to home, we are taking an active role in raising awareness and advocating against domestic and family violence.

"We support all communities and organisations that take a stand against DV."



Mayor Teresa Harding was also in attendance for the special lunch, with Mr Keidge saying the council was a great supporter of Rotary's Footprints in the Park project.

### WHAT IS ROTARY?

How do you respond to the question "What is Rotary?" Strengthen your quick explanation - your elevator pitch - with six tips from our friends at Toastmasters International. Read their blog post to make an impression that lasts:

The world moves quickly and you may have less than 60 seconds to make an impression that lasts. Enter the elevator pitch, so named to reflect the short period of time it takes to travel between floors. It's a short and impactful summary that you can use to communicate the most important details about your Rotary club or project and capture the attention of a potential member, supporter, or partner. To ensure you're making the most of every opportunity, check out these six tips from Toastmasters to create and deliver a perfect powerful pitch.

### 1. Present your club as an opportunity.

An elevator pitch is not intended as an advertisement, nor is it a call for help. Instead, hook your target by framing your pitch as an opportunity. If you'd like someone to engage with you and your club, treat them as a potential partner and offer a compelling case that working together can be mutually beneficial.

### 2. Keep it simple.

Perhaps more than anything else, the key to a great elevator pitch is ruthless efficiency. Don't get bogged down with extraneous details and technical jargon. Carefully consider every word that you add to your pitch and ensure that it serves a direct purpose. Remember that the end goal is to quickly communicate your vision in less than one minute and inspire a desire to find out more. If they seem interested in your pitch, ask if they would like a "What's Rotary" wallet card to learn more about Rotary and connect with you later.

### 3. Remember your enthusiasm.

Your words are essential, but they only represent a small portion of your pitch. A beautifully worded pitch delivered without joy is bound to land with a thud, but kindling enthusiasm and anticipation is a surefire way to keep your message lodged in the front of a potential supporter's mind. Use your pitch as a chance to share your passion. Practice delivering it in a way that conveys your excitement and conviction.
