

Proposal for Japanese Peace Garden

Located at Coochin Park – Dicky Beach



- Is under utilised but in a prime position to attract visitors
- Has no obvious entrance from Beerburrum Street
- Grass often needs cutting
- Parking only available on road
- Has no recognisable paths difficult to walk the area
- No disabled access
- Locals will probably only walk their dogs on this land
- Has room to be developed into an attraction that will benefit the local community



What will a Japanese Peace Garden bring to the community

- A place of reflection but also a place of inspiration
- A place where locals and visitors can go to escape the hustle and bustle of life
- A calming influence
- A blend of Australian and Japanese plants to signify friendship
- A garden that serves as an example that peace must always prevail






Similar gate proposed for Coochin Park


















Similar bridge proposed for Coochin Park






















Summary
