



# ROMAC ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The ROMAC AGM took place on 1 November, as part of the Zone 8 Conference in Queenstown, New Zealand. The meeting was held following the AGMs of RAWCS, ARH, ROSOPS and RDU, and it was enlightening to gain some insight into both the commonalities and the initiatives of these organisations. Thank you to those of you who were able to attend in person and online — your presence meant a lot.

Stephen O'Connell, our District Governor (DG) Representative, chaired the meeting with enthusiasm and guided us smoothly through the agenda. After noting attendees, apologies and approving previous minutes, the DG members proceeded with key votes. They adopted the 2023-24 Annual Report, the Financial Accounts and Budget, and the new ROMAC Constitution.

The DG members elected the following directors:

- Glenys Parton as Chair
- Michael Hetherington as Operations Director
- <u>Nigel Stewart</u> continuing as Medical Director
- <u>Stephen Noble</u> as Treasurer and Public Officer for his fourth consecutive year

ROMAC extended its heartfelt gratitude to <u>D'Arcy</u> <u>Walsh</u>, our outgoing Chair, for his dedicated service to ROMAC, and to <u>Richard Woodburn</u> for acting as Operations Director. Their contribution to the team has been immense and both were acknowledged in a presentation.

The AGM wrapped up efficiently in just 15 minutes. It was inspiring to witness the camaraderie, trust and respect displayed by the 2024-25 team of DGs for Stephen O'Connell and for each other. A big thank you to Stephen for his leadership during the AGM, and to his DG group members and DGE representative Ken Smith for their support and confidence in the ROMAC team.

Afterwards the Board convened to approve:

- New Zealand Regional Chair, <u>Peter Garnett</u> MBE as Deputy Chair (casual vacancy).
- Various draft policies that underpin ROMAC's operational and governance activities.

#### RECRUITMENT

I am pleased to announce the following:

- Australian Operations Manager: Pam Wood, from the Rotary Club of North Ryde, will take on this role starting 1 January. Pam brings with her a wealth of experience as a former school principal with expertise in managing large projects.

#### DAMIEN'S STORY

Damien, a two-year-old from Vanuatu, accompanied by his mother Ina, arrived in Auckland New Zealand on 18 October 2024. He began his medical work-up for corrective surgery for a coronary artery fistula (an abnormal connection between one of the arteries of the heart and another blood vessel).

His initial appointment for a diagnostic CT scan had to be postponed while he was treated with antibiotics for a skin infection identified upon his arrival. Damien's medical team, headed by <u>Dr John Stirling</u>, Paediatric Cardiologist at the Starship Children's Hospital in Auckland, discussed his case on 14 November. The team decided the best option would be surgery rather than the cardiac catherterisation procedure initially proposed. Damien is expected to have his surgery date confirmed within the next month.

Damien's father Ken was able to spend two weeks in Auckland exploring the city with his family and hosts Sharon and Wayne Brewer of the Rotary Club of Newmarket.

Remuera Rotarian Deeanah Winders also took the family to visit the Auckland Zoo, which they thoroughly enjoyed.

Mike Hetherington, ROMAC Operations Director, and his wife, Maggie Alexander, made an all-day visit to Brisbane Airport on 12 November. Two ROMAC patients, Nayline from Sydney and Krisselda from Canberra were transiting through Brisbane Airport on their way home.


They needed assistance moving from the domestic terminal to the international terminal, which are quite a distance apart and serviced by shuttlebuses.

Nayline and her father Henry were returning to Santo Island in Vanuatu for a brief respite with family over Christmas until they return to Sydney for more extensive work on Nayline's scoliosis early next year.

Nayline's uncle, Donald, is the Vanuatu Consul-General in Sydney and has been very appreciative of the care organised by Regional Chair <u>Anita Robinson</u> and, of course, Orthopaedic Surgeon Dr Angus Gray at The Sydney Children's Hospital, Randwick.

#### PETER GARNETT'S GARDEN

Past District Governor Peter Garnett's dream of a healing garden at Auckland's North Shore Hospital became a reality, though he never expected to experience it as a patient so soon. In July, the first large-scale indoor Healing Garden in Aotearoa opened at the new Totara Haumaru medical building.

Spanning 110 square meters with over 500 plants, the garden offers a tranquil escape from the hospital's noise.

Funded by \$1.8 million in donations to the Well Foundation, the garden is designed to improve patient outcomes, potentially reducing hospital stays and pain.

Nayline's surgery will address her scoliosis, a condition requiring the expertise of the hospital's skilled medical team, led by Orthopaedic Surgeon Dr Angus Gray.

Thanks to the unwavering support of ROMAC, the dedicated medical team, and the generosity of supporters from the Eastern region, Nayline's journey toward better health is becoming a reality.


Slavenia was recently diagnosed with glaucoma, a rare condition in children, requiring urgent surgery not available in her home country.



Twelve-year-old Charlie and his mother Rachel from Vanuatu arrived in Adelaide in late September.

As a result of a very mild case of Cerebal Palsy at birth, Charlie was born with a unilateral talipes (a clubfoot) and needed surgery to correct it.

This month Charlie is making great progress towards wearing shoes. His foot improved significantly after his first surgery. He has been having weekly physiotherapy sessions and spending time with his friends at school. Next week, Charlie will undergo another operation, which will require six weeks of rest without putting weight on his foot.
