

What is a Service Club?

A volunteer non-profit organization, usually composed of business and professional men or women, that is devoted to the principle of volunteer community service and promotes fellowship/networking among its members.



Service Above Self



The world's first service club, the Rotary Club of Chicago, was formed on 23 February 1905 by Paul P. Harris, an attorney who wished to capture in a professional club the same friendly spirit he had felt in the small towns of his youth. The Rotary name derived from the early practice of rotating meetings among members' offices.





Service Above Self

Rotary's popularity spread, and within a decade, clubs were chartered from San Francisco to New York to Winnipeg, Canada. The Rotary Club of Key West was chartered in 1916. By 1921, Rotary clubs had been formed on six continents.

Today there are more than 35,000 Rotary Clubs with more than 1.2 million members worldwide.



The Rotary Wheel



The original wheel was meant to illustrate “civilization and movement”. The Rotary Gear was adopted as the Rotary International symbol in 1923.

The keyway was added shortly after because a keyway locks a gear to the shaft making it a worker, not an idler!

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:


FIRST. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

SECOND. High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

Rotary Club of Key Largo




- January 24, 1990 was the first meeting as provisional club, sponsored by the Upper Keys Rotary Club.


Rotary Foundation

PolioPlus



- In 1985, Rotary launched its Polio Plus program, the first initiative to tackle global polio eradication through the mass vaccination of children.
- Rotarians have helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children in 122 countries. So far, Rotary has contributed more than \$1.8 billion toward eradicating the disease worldwide.

PolioPlus

- Every year, hundreds of Rotary members work side-by-side with health workers to vaccinate children in polio-affected countries.
- Rotary members also recruit fellow volunteers, assist with transporting the vaccine, and provide other logistical support.
- Rotary's advocacy efforts have also played a critical role in decisions by donor governments to contribute more than \$7.2 billion to the effort.









Cases due to wild poliovirus have decreased by over 99% since 1988, from an estimated **350,000 cases** then, to 33 reported cases in 2018. As long as a single child remains infected, children in all countries remain at risk of contracting polio!
