Paul Peter was born in Washington D.C. and grew up in Fairfax, Virginia. He was a submariner, serving in the US Navy from 1962-1967 on the USS Halfbeak, the USS Croaker and the USS Sam Rayburn. Paul graduated from Old Dominion University with a degree in Math Education.



From 1971 to 1977, Paul taught Math Analysis and Algebra 2/Trig at Kempsville High School and served as the Coordinator of Student Activities. From 1977 to 1985, Paul worked as an operations research analyst under contract to Atlantic Fleet and NATO commands, designing, testing and evaluating tactics in support of maritime strategy in the north Atlantic. Paul Peter returned to work as a high school teacher in 1985 at Salem High School before his retirement. He has been an adjunct professor at Tidewater Community College, Virginia Beach, Campus since 1973 where he continues to teach Mathematics.

(DDF) dollar for dollar. DRFC Stephen Beer said a \$100 gift with matches from DDF, TRF and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation will yield \$900 toward polio eradication. (Here's how the math works in case you're interested: Your \$100 + \$100 (match from District) + \$100 (TRF -The Rotary Foundation match) = \$300 which then results in a 2 for 1 match by the Gates Foundation of \$600 with a grand total of \$900) or if a club gives \$1000, with all of the matches, the club's \$1000 becomes \$9000. You can't beat that rate of return!
