Explosive beginnings

When Jeremy Hill came to Coffs Harbour in 1993 to set up an office for Guide Dogs NSW, he learnt first hand the need for improved vision in our local community. A disgruntled resident threw a pipe bomb into the office in Moonee Street, missing the intended target next door.

Jeremy has worked with Guide Dogs for over thirty years and has seen changes in the client base. No longer are guide dogs assisting as many young people who

have lost their sight due to going through the windscreen of a car (praise be for seat belts) instead more clients are older people suffering from conditions such as macular degeneration, diabetes and strokes.

Guide Dogs such as Pascale, who's owner is currently in hospital, cost \$35,000 to train. Combined with GPS enabled phones, guide dogs give people with vision impairment wonderful independence and freedom of movement.

The organisation also trains people in the use of canes and other mobility devices. The local office can lay claim to a wonderful

device which can be used on walkers to sense obstacles. Inspired by parking sensors on the rear bumper of cars, they raised the idea with a former British Airways aerospace engineer who came up with prototypes in a matter of weeks. These devices are now sold around the world.

Some other ideas haven't quite worked out—Coffs suggested placing failed guide dog puppies into nursing homes, only to discover,

when visiting three months later, that the Labradors were twice the size they should have been. The residents were all perplexed about who was feeding the dogs. Other puppies who don't make it as guide dogs have gone onto a career with Customs as sniffer dogs or are trained as pets for autistic children.

When asked why Labradors are chosen, Jeremy referred to their intelligence, loyalty and the fact that labs learn through positive reinforcement. Sometimes it takes a while, waiting for the correct behavior to reward, but it is the preferred method for training.

Guide Dogs in Australia kicked off in the mid fifties with Arnold Cook and most of their

funding comes through community support with only 4% coming from government coffers.

Jeremy finished with a story from Kyogle. He received a call from a gentleman concerned with the rapid deterioration of his eyesight. He had no one locally to support him and needed a prompt visit—three weeks was too far off. Jeremy re-arranged his commitments, took a drive and met this chap on his place out of Kyogle. After a introductory chat, Jeremy took an alcohol wipe and cleaned the pair of glasses and handed then to the chap. "It's a bloody miracle, I can see!"

Well done, Jeremy, miracle worker!
