

Rotarians understand that the whole world is their backyard. They can see the effects of climate change in communities they care about, and they haven't waited to take action. They're tackling the problem the way they always do: coming up with projects, using their connections to change policy — and planning for the future.



Climate conversation

Here at The Ratarian, we've rarely received as many letters about a story as we have in response to our April issue, which focused on alimate change. In that issue, 2018-19 Rotary President Barry Rossin encouraged Rotarians to "start the conversation." To include as many volces in that conversation as possible, we've expanded inbar to three pages this month.

Rotary has worked where politicians have failed because it's a nongovernmental, nonsectarian, nonpolitical organization. Everyone can share in the goodwill of our work. That's what makes the April issue, with the cover "Climate Solutions Within Our Reach," disappointing. Not only does the series of articles wade into deeply political territory – climate change (sometimes colled global warming) – but it claims that this is our place and that it is in fact "the Rotary way" to tackle "a contentious issue in rancorous times."

Really? That's the Rotary way? If that premise is true, then why not address other contentious issues as a Rotary family, such as abortion, income redistribution, etc.? Of course, to do so would divide us. And that's my point — the contentious issues are for politicians, not for Rotary. Whether you are a climate change believer, skeptic, or undecided. it's a highly contentious issue. The issues that unify us are for Rotarians.

If we wish to have Rotarians of diverse

viewpoints, then we cannot be an organization that silences, ignores, or insults the diverse opinions in our ranks. Rotary has more influence, not less, because it limits itself to the truth, to fairness, to building goodwill and better friendships, and to work that is beneficial to all concerned. Let's be Rotarians and not political operatives. Rotary's past was great because we recognized our best place in society. Rotary's future relies on our fidelity to these first principles of our fundamental purpose. If we betray those principles, Rotary will, in effect, cases to axist. Long live Rotary!







Earth's "Uninhabitable" Zones




The world could see up to 1 billion climate migrants.

Global Annual Plastics Production







- Rotary Climate Action Teams (RCAT) recognize that climate change is an unprecedented challenge to humankind
- The more CO₂ in the atmosphere, the hotter our planet will become
- Impacts of climate change will affect the world's most vulnerable first and hardest, putting Rotary's good work in the world at risk
- We know ACTIONS must be taken now to prevent further damage
- Clubs are where the actions must begin



The RCAT Challenge

Challenge yourself to take action on at least half of the following items (or identify which you already do) in three categories of actions- individual lifestyle actions, individual travel actions, and club actions:

Individual lifestyle actions

- □ Turn off and unplug appliances, lamps, TVs, computers, etc. when not in use
- Shift your electricity purchases to only that which comes from 100% renewable sources
- Replace incandescent and CFL light bulbs with LED bulbs
- Regularly buy organic produce and meat from local farmers
- Compost your food scraps and add it to your soil
- Remove some lawn and install gardens with native plants and native trees
- □ Plant 5 trees in your garden or community
- Join an organization restoring natural areas
- □ Volunteer at a local natural area restoration project
- Join or start a green team at your workplace
- □ Simplify your life. Simply buy less stuff

Individual travel actions

- Drive less. Car pool. Walk or bike more. Use public mass transit where available
- Drive a hybrid, electric, or hydrogen car to reduce or eliminate CO2 emissions
- Use shared economy services such as ZipCar, Freecycle, Airbnb, Lyft, etc.
- □ Take a "staycation" instead of a vacation in another location
- D Buy carbon offsets when traveling by plane or ship from Terrapass and similar groups

Club actions

- Support Rotary Climate Action Team's efforts
- □ Encourage your Club, church and other volunteer groups to go green
- D Bring speakers to your Club on a regular basis
- □ Spread the word on climate action to other clubs and friends/family
- □ Read/share books and articles on climate change, mitigation, adaptation, and resilience
- Encourage your District leadership to spread the word on urgent need for climate action
- Encourage Rotary International to get involved with climate change education and challenges
- Volunteer at a local natural area restoration project as a Club
- Sponsor a local natural area restoration initiative
- Support local efforts to become carbon neutral, focused on Rotarians and businesses
- Establish partnerships with local NGOs seeking to impact climate change
- Work with local government on projects that address climate change
- Use your community connections to provide climate education where appropriate
