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Membership Report

- Membership grew by 6.6%. During the year we had 8 new members join, and 1 member who joined but then resigned early because an employment change. Briefly we reached 37 active members, but we also had 6 long-term members resigning so that our membership at year end stands at 32 active members, 26 male (81%) and 6 female (19%) plus 1 honorary member. Five of the new members were inducted at our regular meeting on 14th December 2020, including 2 active members under our new Corporate PaRtner program.
- Rotarian Denise Schellbach, the Club's Public Relations Director received an OAM in the Queens's Birthday Honours in June 2021 "for service to the community through a range of organisations".
- The Club's Corporate Partner program was approved and published to the club in October 2020.
- The Board approved in July 2020 a change in policy to provide that any member may send an alternate to any meeting with the alternate paying the same luncheon fee that the member would pay if he had attended.
- 11 members attended the District9600 annual general meeting and The Rotary Foundation seminar in October 2020.
- 1 member who is also a Rotaractor (Rotaract Club of Brisbane RiverCity) was sponsored by the club to attend the RYLA 2021 (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) program.
- 8 membership prospects requested and have been sent the application for membership form.
- 51 enquiries about membership from active prospects were received during the year. All active prospects after review were sent invitations to the next club meeting and were sent information about Rotary and about our club. There are now 162 active prospects in the prospect register in ClubRunner.
- A very successful Rotary Learning and Information workshop was held at the Normanby Hotel on 29 May 2021, with 8 participants plus the presenters and workshop Chair, comprising 3 past presidents from our club, the District Governor Neil black and 3 past district governors, 2 from D 9600 and 1 from D 9630.
- The board agreed to sister club arrangements with the Rotary Club of Colombo Reconnections, Sri Lanka, and the agreement and certificate of recognition were signed by President Dan Adler for the Rotary Club of Brisbane and President Harold Sandrasagara for the Rotary Club of Colombo Reconnections.

Financial Report

The revenue raised for Charitable purposes is shown on the draft P&L as \$51,387 (2020 \$7,056). Note the COVID lockdown closed down most of our planned fundraising events for 2020. The revenue raised for Operating is shown as \$40,518 (2020 \$46,391). This is revenue raised for Member's dues, Lunch fees, Sergeant's sessions, raffles etc. The counterintuitive result of comparing the two years is largely due to the Club this year holding a lot of its meetings outside of the Brisbane Club while in 2020 it was the COVID Lockdown that forced members to stay at home.

The donations to date from the Club, excluding the PAF, was \$17,944 (2020 \$11,750). John Smerdon's PAF report shows over \$50,000 was donated from that entity. Please refer to John's report.

The net surplus of in 2021 from both Charitable and Operating revenue and expenditure was to date \$18,094 (2020 \$(7,421)).

Public Ancillary Fund (PAF) Financial Report 2020 – 2021 Financial Year

Rotary Club of Brisbane Public Ancillary Fund (PAF) is very important to the longterm financial viability of our Club. From humble beginnings in the 1990s it now provides a significant role in our annual donation program to Australian based charities. An Independent Investment Committee comprising of Rotarians John Smerdon (Chair), Don O'Donohue and Alistair Smith manages the investments, while the overall running of the PAF is managed by the RCoB Board as Trustee.

John and his Investment Committee are pleased to report that the PAF's Investment Portfolio has performed very well in the year following the COVID-19 outbreak. The Fund balance has enjoyed growth to the tune of \$160,000.

This is a great outcome considering the PAF has also provided donations totaling over \$50,000 to many worthy charities during the year. These donations were all approved by the RCoB Board and organisations supported were as follows -

- Motor Neuron Disease Assoc. of Qld \$5,000 providing support and research into MND
- Kyeema \$5,000 Supporting communities in PNG and Africa to establish sustainable food production to improve nutrition.
- Donations in Kind \$5,000 providing containers filled with much needed medical supplies, school desk desks and other essential supplies and equipment to neighboring countries
- Rotary Foundation Polio Plus \$17,550 ongoing program using proceeds from the Gala Ball
- Australian Rotary Health Mental Illness Fund \$4,000 a huge ongoing problem
- Rotarians Against Malaria \$5,000 the fight continues against this tropical disease
- Mission Australia \$1,000 a charity assisting the long-term wellbeing of Australians in need
- Epilepsy Queensland \$1,000 providing education and support for people with Epilepsy
- Downs and West Community Support \$1,000 supporting communities in Western Qld
- Beddown Limited \$1,000 taking spaces that are commonly used and busy during the day but at night are left vacant or empty. Beddown then activates and repurposes the space at night into pop-up accommodation for homeless people.

During the year, the PAF also received generous donations totalling over \$20,000 from members and friends of the Club. Our members' efforts in running fundraising activities have ensured that the PAF and the Club's finances are in a very healthy state.

SUMMARY: This year The Rotary Club of Brisbane launched Sponsordea – 'Ideas for Humanity', aiming to be the next 'Kickstarter. The reason why this sub-brand was created separately to our Rotary Club of Brisbane / Rotary International brand was to skip a generation, attracting a younger audience. We invited them to bring an injection of positivity and new projects to our club. This was designed to attract our older, core prospective members to get involved and help budding charities, startup NGO's, and worthwhile entrepreneurs realise their dreams.

THE WHY: 2020 / 21 has been a period like no other. We're all doing it tough. But between the hardship, people have picked each other up and soldiered on. There are some great projects that have started across Australia that are uplifting our communities. Driven by young millennials with big hearts - new ideas from startup charities seem to be popping up everywhere. And while they come with the best intentions, some might struggle to realise their potential. The Rotary Club of Brisbane introduced Sponsordea: a platform to open applications for Ideas for Humanity.

Rotary Club of Brisbane President, Dan Adler, said "It's all about great ideas for products and services that help people, the environment, anything and everything is eligible for assistance. If you've got one that could help your community and the people in it, by all means, get on the website and apply for a grant today. Whether you're making soup for the homeless in your family kitchen or creating a plant nursery in your garage and brightening up your neighbourhood. Whatever your idea, if it's a keeper, check out our website and get amongst it. Together we can make the world a better place."

The Rotary Club of Brisbane through its fundraising and foundation supported charities and humanitarian causes to the tune of almost \$80,000 in 2019-20. The Club has almost 100 years of history supporting charities and humanitarian causes. Our community contribution over the last 10 years' totals over \$750,000 and thousands of hours of volunteer time. This year we are looking to deliver some of that assistance to young entrepreneurial charities and causes that need help to elevate their product or service and make a worthy difference. But Sponsordea is about so much more than just the money. Sponsordea calls upon a stable of highly successful business people from the Rotary Club of Brisbane, each with their own unique skill sets and experiences waiting to mentor and guide successful applicants along their journey.

Mr Adler added, "We also help sponsored organisations with presentation skills, marketing & advertising, social media drive, business plan development; you name it - our team of mentors has been there and done that. We can definitely help them realise their dreams." **THE RESULT:** The very first call for applications went live on Wednesday, 11th November, 2020. Entries closed on 28th January 2021, with six quality applications received that were culled down to a shortlist of three which were announced on the 1st of February. Short

listed applicants were then asked to pitch their idea in person to the Rotary Club of Brisbane board; like they do on the successful TV show 'Shark Tank'. From there, the winner PP Bruce McNaught and Sue Cole's 'SOUND WORDS' was awarded a grant in the means of marketing mentoring and promotional support. The process 'Round 2' then happen all over again in April / May 2021 and we received a credible applicant https://www.flicks4good.com.au, who is scheduled to pitch in person on Monday 28th June, 2021.

SPONSORDEA WINNER ROUND 1 PP Bruce McNaught and Sue Cole pitched their SOUND WORDS app to Club members.

SUMMARY OF APP BY BRUCE: "My colleague and I have developed a software tool which is intended to mitigate against the difficulties experienced by illiteracy. The product enables the user to photograph a document, sign or menu using a mobile phone and then it will read the text back either on the speaker or headphones. My colleague Sue was a teacher teaching adult literacy, and she became aware that there are a great many folks in the community who do not have the necessary neural connections to enable them to read despite making considerable effort to do so. This app enables people to become employed

who would otherwise be unable to get a job. There was a case on an Australian mine site where a haul truck operator was fired because she was unable to read an important sign which nearly caused an accident. The users need only to take a photo of the sign and then choose the text that they wish to have read and select it and the audio commences. The interface is extremely simple and fast to use, unlike other products which are not purpose designed for this situation. It will work in most languages."

OUTCOME: PP Bruce and Sue asked to be supported by promotional means (not asking for money), and the RCoB Sponsordea Committee agreed to offer such support by promoting the app via the website, eDM newsletters and social media channels.

James pitched his initiative to RCoB Sponsordea Committee. His charity organisation aims to equip teenagers with the tools to manage their anxiety and stresses in the age of social media and trolling in High School. - **Dog Olympics:** lead by PP Bruce McNaught for the purpose of fundraising is well under way with over six months of preparation.

- Two legacy initiatives were commenced in the 2021 period, these being:

o **Sponsordea initiative**: lead by President Dan Adler and the <u>nextThursday</u> team, inviting the best and brightest to pitch for funding and support from our club to address a variety of community issues.

o **Lifetime Achievement Award:** lead by President Dan Adler and Service Chair Matthew Christopher, to recognise the dedication and service of past and present members of the Rotary Club of Brisbane.

KYEEMA Foundation Report

Rotary funded support for village chicken keeping in Papua New Guinea March 2021

Background to Project

The Rotary Club of Brisbane (RCOB) has been supporting Kyeema Foundation, a Brisbane-based not-for-profit organisation, in the breeding and conservation of indigenous village chickens in Papua New Guinea (PNG) since November 2018. RCOB initially supported set-up of a village chicken farm for Haus Pikinini in Wau, Morobe Province, which is a community home that looks after 30 children from the local community who have no-one to provide for them. We supported the set-up of the chicken shed and yard, purchase of local chickens for breeding and training in village chicken keeping. We are still providing support to Haus Pikinini with the management of their chickens. In April 2020, RCOB provided a donation of A\$3,980 to support setting up of another village chicken farmer in Gabagaba village.

The RCOB support is part of a larger project being supported with funds from the Australian Government's NGO Cooperation Program, which means that every dollar provided by RCOB has been matched by an additional five dollars from the Australian government. This project also includes support of community-led no fish zones and coral reef gardening activities, with the village chicken work as an alternative food and livelihood activity for the coastal communities on the project.

Gabagaba Master Farmer progress

Kopure Airi (Kopsi) was trained as a Master Farmer in Fiji in October 2019. Since then, he has returned to his village in Gabagaba, Central Province and with funds provided by RCOB, has been set up as a Master Farmer of village chickens for his community. While he still has a way to go to build his chicken numbers up (currently he has 32 chickens), he is slowly getting there and will commence training for his community once he has sufficient stock to give to community members after they complete the training. He is also hoping to set up a coral garden later this year with the funds provided by Rotary.

Now using local feed Farmer has access to electricity, so electricity cards are being used rather than solar. Farmer is not yet ready to trial an incubator

General Project Progress

The project encompasses establishment of breeding and training centres in Central and Morobe Provinces and training activities to ensure the specialised skills needed for this work are provided, so that improved village poultry keeping and conservation of indigenous chickens can be sustained. Families receive chickens to raise after their training session, which will provide both a source of food nutrition and income. To date, under the larger project:

- Six PNG Master Farmers (four male, two female) were trained in Fiji over a four-week period in coral reef restoration, permaculture, participatory community decision making and improved village chicken keeping.
- Baseline surveys have been undertaken in four Villages in Central Province and in Markham Valley, Morobe Province.
- Six village chicken breeding centres have been set up: Vanapa, Tubusereia and Gabagaba in Central Province; Markham Valley and Wau (Haus Pikinini) in Morobe Province. Two have been funded by RCOB.
- 52 farmers have been trained in village chicken keeping (42 in Central Province, 10 in Morobe Province: 35 women, 17 men).
- Two coral gardens have been established in Central Province.
- System set up to provide farmers who do not have the means to purchase chickens with three chickens and a rooster and a roll of chicken wire to set up a basic chicken shed after they complete basic training in village chicken keeping.

Our coral reefs are disappearing rapidly due to human actions and natural predators such as sea snails and we are taking actions. Tubusereia joined efforts with Gwarumemase lady councillor, Mary K. Loa to build their coral nursery next to Loloata Private Island Resort. I showed them different techniques of coral gardening and we planted 200 coral fragments on a-frames, ropes and tables. What's important is conducting more awareness on the importance of coral reefs and establishing no fishing areas to allow the reefs to recover. This is possible through meaningful engagement with the locals and support from key stakeholders including Government, private sector and our development partners. Iboudai baita gaukara hebou (lets all work together).

PERINATAL MENTAL HEALTH GETS A LIFT FROM ROTARY CLUB OF BRISBANE DONATION PIC: Senior Psychologist, Dr Constanze Schulz

Mater's newly established Perinatal Mental Health Team celebrated a win this year with the support of a financial donation from The Rotary Club Brisbane. The Mater Family Wellbeing Service Best Start Grant has been established to foster research and educational activities that will have an immediate, direct and positive impact on achieving the service's aims. As one of four winners of Mater's inaugural Best Start Grant, Senior Psychologist Dr Constanze Schulz and her team,

will continue to work to help pregnant women and new mothers who experience some mental health issues. Their work will help contribute to shape services offered through Mater's upcoming Family Wellbeing Service.

"The grant would allow clinicians from this service to attend the Perinatal and Infant Mental Health Intensive Training. Specifically aimed at providing an overview of contemporary approaches of assessment, formulation and treatment in both the antenatal and postnatal phases. Our team would then be able to ensure that we are all offering a uniform approach, guided by best practices as outlined by the Centre of Perinatal Excellence."

The Best Start Grant provides funding to support project staff salaries, direct project costs and education or training expenses for clinical research. The Perinatal Mental Health team will offer individual therapeutic interventions and groups addressing adjustment to parenthood, self-care and bonding with the baby.

The Mater Family Wellbeing Service will be established in 'Catherine's House', the soon to be refurbished convent on Mater's South Brisbane campus, with plans to expand beyond South East Queensland in future. The service will provide specialist perinatal and infant mental health services for women and their families across a spectrum of care and treatment options from preconception through to pregnancy, birth and into the postnatal period.

The new service will be available to all mothers, babies and families in need. It will focus on giving families the 'best possible start' during the first critical, early years of life and will offer services and care that promote wellness, parental mental health, healthy relationships and child development.

The Rotary Club of Brisbane's President Dan Adler said, "Our club has been a big supporter of the hard work that The Mater does to help people in need, and this area around mental health is so important as it can affect so many in the family and the community, the ripple affects are huge. We couldn't be prouder to do our bit to deliver a great outcome for their cause."

Suzanne has spent many years speaking for <u>Polio Australia</u> but this recent development also needs advocacy as many young people are unaware of the polio story and many in the medical profession (as well as the general public) are unaware of LEoP.

So, despite a lifetime of discouragement and living with a considerable disability, Suzanne's life achievements have been many and remarkable, and now she has started on a new chapter of informing people about this ongoing challenge of polio.

Suzanne's story of overcoming pronounced difficulties throughout her life to excel in a number of fields is a reminder of how important the PolioPlus program is. It was an honour to have her at the club today.

Phil has brought smiles and laughter to our club as Sergeant of Arms, he was always on hand to lend some muscle and sweat packing shipping containers (even during a heat wave), and has been our 'go-to-guy' whenever any print or electronic media needed publishing. Never shy, very quick witted, always having a finger on the pulse of latest technology, and always humble. It was an honour to award Phil his Lifetime Achievement Award which was well earned.

Don O'Donoghue joined Brisbane Rotary Club on 15th March 1985. He is a Paul Harris Fellow, and served as a Director of University of Queensland, International House for many years.

Don was heavily involved with Donations in Kind along with Rotarian James Delahunty, who was among those present when he received his Lifetime Achievement Award. The presentation was made at Don's home at Brookfield in the presence of a number of his fellow Rotarians.

Ian A. Wilson introduced Don O'Donohue to The Rotary Club of Brisbane on 15th March, 1985. There were 180 club members when he joined. Don said, "you could sit next to a different member each meeting, and you wouldn't get to know every member in the

club for 3.5 years!" Don said it was the best decision he ever made, having made life-long friends through Rotary International.

One of the highlights of his history with Rotary was meeting Sir Clem Renouf. Sir Clement William Bailey Renouf AM was an Australian accountant and President of Rotary International from 1978–79. Don explained that in his opinion, Sir Clem probably did more for Rotary International than anyone, except the founders, with the eradication of Polio globally. Don describes him as an Ingham boy, nice guy, genuine Australian, reserved, tenacious, courageous, kind and highly intelligent man.



The next unsung hero of The Rotary Club of Brisbane, who has done some amazing things, was James Delahunty (who was in attendance today). James helped start Donations In Kind (DIK). As a Pharmacist, he was astonished how many good quality medicines, which were quite usable but almost out of date, were being thrown out, and he organised to send them to PNG and third world countries to help save lives. Don said, "DIK, after Polio Plus, has done more good for more people than any other project, and that's a Rotary Club of Brisbane initiative."

Don said he is very grateful for the Lifetime Achievement Award, and that it is a great honour. Don even generously donated \$1,000 today to the Rotary Club of Brisbane Public Ancillary Fund, and his request was to donate it to CEO James Patterson, founder of BreakingFree.org.au who are doing amazing work to help with youth suicide.

President Dan Adler said, "On behalf of all our club members, past, present and emerging, you've earned this award Don. It's a humbling experience being the 98th President, hearing your story and being the one presenting you with this trophy today as a small, but significant, symbol of our thanks for your time, energy, loyalty, passion and generosity."

ROTARY CLUB OF BRISBANE SUPPORTS MATER FAMILY WELLBEING SERVICE TO TUNE OF \$50,000

The Club was pleased to announce a grant of \$50,000 to the Mater Hospital, South Brisbane, to assist in the establishment of a service to provide perinatal mental health support to mothers, babies and the broader family network in our community.

This new service will offer a wide spectrum of

programs including inpatient admissions and an outpatient clinic focussing on supporting babies and families to have the best start in life.

In recognition of the Club's gift, the Mater will establish the Rotary Club of Brisbane – Best Start Grant to provide professional development for staff who will work in the service to further their knowledge base and expertise in infant and perinatal mental health.

The project involves renovations to an existing heritage building and a new build for inpatient admissions commenced in January 2021 and was officially opened in May 2021. Big thank you to Rotarian Cameron Gibson who has been the driving force behind supporting this charitable cause and thank you to PP Michael Stephens for representing our Club on the day of the opening, in the absence of President Dan, who was in Sydney for work at the time.
