MEMBERSHIP REPORT

This is our centenary year 29th May 2023

2. Membership 29 members (23 M 6F) plus 1 H (M) = 30 at year start 1/7/2022 + 16 new members

(3H) - 8 resignations (M) and 1 death (M) (-9) during the year= 35 members (29 M, 6 F) at 30/6/23.



3. The Lord Mayor of Brisbane Councillor Adrian Schrinner, the Governor of Queensland HE Dr Jeannette Young AC, PSM and the Governors husband Professor Lt Col Graeme Nimmo RFD were inducted as Honorary Members during our centenary year.

4. One signup from the 31st May

2022 champagne reception failed to pay his dues for the first halfyear prior to induction and his application for membership has lapsed.

5. The Club within a Club Centenary Members Program 2023 was approved by the Board in August 2022 culminating in a champagne reception on Tuesday 22nd November 2022 with a target of 5-10 new member signups and an aspirational goal of double our membership by 30th June 2023. Following Board



approvals, invitations were sent to 147 membership proposals with 2 follow ups. The prospective members included all Director-Generals and Deputy Directors General from the Queensland government plus industry leaders from the Queensland utility sector. The club catered for 25 members and prospects and 22 attended including 10 prospective members. Four 4 applications were received plus one application for corporate partnership from the Queensland Brain Institute and five others are considering and have been sent application forms. Three subsequently completed applications for membership.

6. Our centenary week celebrations included our 100th year regular luncheon on Monday 22nd May 2023 held at our new venue Friday's Riverside attended by past presidents, past district governors, members and guests including our sister club delegation, the Lord Mayor's reception for over 60 Rotarians, visiting Rotarians and guests on Monday 22nd May and the Next Century Gala held on

Wednesday 24th May 2023 all of which were brilliant affairs, and a celebration regular luncheon held on Monday 29th May 2023 to coincide with our charter day 100 years prior.

7. Information about Rotary and our club were sent to all prospective member inquiries received via the Club's web page.



- 8. The board approved honorary memberships for Rotarians James Delahunty and PDG Tim Keeler AM with effect from 1 July 2023.
- 9. The Board approved internal service projects in association with the Rotary Club of Colombo Reconnections as joint lead club with the Rotary Clubs of Madras, Calcutta and Bangalore, India as Host Clubs with the theme of Supporting adolescents with Autism. In each case one-day hybrid workshops were held in the local cities. The club donated A\$5,500 from the Rotary club of Brisbane Public Ancillary Trust to the Rotary Action Group for Family Safety in support of these international service projects.

SISTER CLUBS

A delegation of 6 from our sister club RC Taipei Tatung attended our centenary week celebrations as our guests. PP Harold Sandragara from our sister club RC Colombo Reconnections had hoped to attend our centenary celebrations but was unable to get a visa from the Australian High Commission in time. He will now visit our club later in the year. No responses were received to our invitations sent to our other sister clubs RC Kobe East, RC Charleston South Carolina USA, RC Amsterdam International, The Netherlands. These will be followed up.

BULLETIN

The Bulletin plays a vital role in keeping our members up-to-date with all our activities. Thanks to Phill Saxby for taking on this important job. There is no doubt that this has led to a much greater involvement by members in club activities.

FOUNDATION

Once again, our club has generously supported the Foundation. Both as a club and by individual contributions. Our club may be small, but we certainly bat above our weight in supporting the foundation. This ensures that Rotary can continue to do good in the world.
