# ROTARY CLUB OF CALGARY DOWNTOWN (RCCD), CANADA by Rick Tamascke





The Rotary Club of Calgary Downtown (RCCD) meets in person on Tuesdays at 12noon (at the Fairmont Palliser Hotel in Downtown Calgary) on the SECOND and FOURTH TUESDAYS of the month. On the FIRST, THIRD (and FIFTH) TUESDAYS of the month we meet on zoom. RCCD is part of Rotary District 5360 which covers clubs in Southern Alberta and is headquartered in Calgary.



Calgary is the most populous city in the Canadian province of Alberta, with a population of more than 1.3 million persons. Alberta has a rich natural resource base, and produces the vast majority of Canada's crude oil and natural gas and roughly half of its coal (royalties). It also possesses much of the Canada's farmable land (part of the great wheat production area of Canada), and benefits from its tourism assets (eg the Rockies, rivers and lakes). Alberta has the highest GDP per capita of Canadian provinces, nearly CDN 80K (2023)

In 1914, RCCD was the first club established in Calgary and Alberta (in and around the City there are now more than a dozen Rotary clubs as well as Rotaract and Interact clubs.) RCCD has over 130 members, boasts a rich history of local and global impact. Dating back to 1914, RCCD takes pride in being the home club of James Wheeler Davidson, who played a pivotal role in chartering 27 Rotary clubs worldwide including the Rotary Clubs of Melbourne and Sydney in Australia, and Wellington and Auckland in New Zealand in 1921.

<u>The Calgary Rotary Clubs Foundation</u> was established in 1972 under the leadership of RCCD and now involves a number of Calgary Clubs.

Through contributions (including bequests) and investment returns, the Clubs Foundation now has assets of the order of CDN 60 million. The fund is governed by a board of the twelve participating clubs. A portion of the earnings are then distributed annually to the member clubs in proportion to their share of the overall fund. The clubs are then tasked to distribute these funds to worthy charitable organizations and/or projects.



Since inception, over \$25 million has been reinvested through the Calgary Rotary Clubs. In 2023 the distribution will total over \$2.6 million.

For more than 100 years Rotary has been active in Calgary and helping to make Calgary "A Better Community".

RCCD collaborates with communities in Calgary and across the globe to address challenges and foster positive change.

RCCD encourages its members to engage in club activities that hold personal significance to them, allowing participation in any of the following areas:

- ♦ Youth Service including Early Childhood Literacy
- ♦ Community Service
- ♦ International Service
- ♦ Club Service
- ♦ Vocational Service

# DROUGHT RELIEF PROGRAMMES in TWO DISTRICTS by Phil Saxby



#### **DISTRICT 9620 DROUGHT RELIEF PROGRAMMES**

Rotary District 9620 (extending from Charleville and beyond in the west to Pimpama, Redland Bay, Caloundra and Gympie in the east) commenced its Drought Relief Program in early 2014, with none of us expecting at the time that we would still be active more than nine years later!

We have a charter of improving sustainability prospects for the whole of the affected communities, not just those on the land. We are also very active in promoting emotional well-being for those enduring the effects of extended drought.

We don't do "stuff". We do not donate items which could be purchased locally by fund recipients (e.g. groceries, hardware, pharmaceuticals and the like). We distribute funds, predominantly through an independent third party, in the form of debit cards only able to be redeemed at businesses local to the recipient. This not only assists the farmers and graziers, but also helps the rest of their local community as those funds are circulated in turn throughout that community.

We have also previously pioneered events we call "Family Days" (sometimes under the title "Big Day Outback"). These have the aim of not only lightening the physical and financial load on the affected landholders, but also the mental load – providing some low key mental health relief. Children are a major focus at these events as well as adults.

#### **OLD ROTARY DISTRICT 9570 DROUGHT RELIEF PROGRAMMES**

In 2004 the members of **Pioneer Valley Rotary Club** responded to the drought in the Longreach area by establishing a Drought Committee that would assist the farmers, this was because in 2004 only this part of Rotary District 9570 was affected by the drought. *The committee raised 6 million dollars* that was distributed to farmers.



Each area has different programs and in the Bundaberg area the drought program has the following interconnected elements designed to assist farmers. The following programmes were all run through **Bundaberg Central Rotary Club**, managed by PDG Rod Medow. Over a period of years, this one Club provided just under \$900,000 in drought assistance. Amazing what one Rotarian can achieve through assistance from other Rotary members and various organisations.

**FOOD PACKS** In February 2010, the club partnered with Northside Produce to produce packs of food for animals. Each pack was valued at \$1,000 and consisted of a mixture of hay, protein pellets, lick blocks, dry licks, and various other hard feeds. Northside Produce also had a database of farmers in need as a result of the ongoing drought and consequently could easily be identified.

How much have we spent in Bundaberg on this program? \$120,000.

How is this program financed?

- ♦ The club was successful in applying for **two The Rotary Foundation <u>Disaster Response Grants</u>** valued at \$60,000.
- ♦ We wrote to all Districts worldwide requesting assistance resulting in \$50,000.
- ♦ Clubs and individuals donated to the Drought Committee on an ongoing basis.

FIRE As a result of the devastating fires in our areas the committee decided that these were related directly to the drought. Farmers who had property damaged from the fires were asked to apply for money. Areas of farming addressed were water tanks, damaged fencing, and firefighting equipment.

How much have we spent in Bundaberg on this program? \$81,000.00

How is this programme financed?

- ♦ \$76,000 came from Rotary Australia World Community Service.
- \$5,000.00 was a contribution from our club to help rebuild a shed.

CARDS In 2021 RAWCS launched a 'buy local' program which involved the distribution of \$250.00 EFTPOS cards to farmers in various areas affected by drought. Bundaberg was the only area in our District to be successful in applying for this program. Cards were distributed through Rural Financial Services (this is due to the money being held in a trust which has various conditions) with the cards expiring in January 2021.

How much have we spent in Bundaberg on this program? \$66,000 however there is a second round where we will receive an additional \$66,000.

How is this programme financed?

\$66,000 from RAWCS. The money was raised through specific District programmes.

#### **ROTARY INFORMATION SPOT**

#### DROUGHT COMMITTEE OUTREACH PROGRAM (DCOP).

This is a Federal Government programme implemented by the National Recovery and Resilience Agency.

The agency has partnered with Rotary to deliver the program.

Every farmer, farm employee that is in drought declared area is entitled to \$1,000.

This involves the person completing the form and having a Rotarian check and sign the form.

How much have we spent in Bundaberg on this program?



♦ The majority of forms have come from Northside Produce and Bundaberg Fruit and Vegetables. However other organisations have access to the forms.

How is this program financed?

♦ All money is from the **Federal Government.** 

**FARMERS FIELD DAYS AND BBQ** This is an initiative of Bundaberg Central club. Field days are combined with BBQs where lectures are held on farming techniques, farm economics and machinery. The field days are also used for Rotary to promote the above programs and mental health.

How much have we spent in Bundaberg on this programme?

- ♦ None in fact these field days are funded through **the Rotary Drought Committee**.
- ♦ In some cases, RAWCS will fund the BBQ.



# **GUEST SPEAKER**— Michael Anthonisz — Senior Economist Queensland Treasury Corporation
