As your President I felt extremely privileged to be able to present the Club's first Paul Harris Fellow Award to the man who played such a vital role in the formation and moulding of our club, Past President of the Rotary Club of Balwyn and District Governor's Special Representative, Duncan McKenzie. It was appropriate that this presentation should be made in the presence of District Governor Norm Moore at our Fourth Anniversary Dinner in May of this year.

Our Fashion Parade was a highly successful event providing the major part of our service funds for this year and our Fashion Parade Committee together with all club members who so admirably supported them deserve our sincere thanks. Particular emphasis must however be placed on the outstanding contribution made to the organisation and running of this function by Ron Liner and our Club Services Director, Paul Fitz. Such was this success of this function that an even bigger Fashion Spectacular has been planned for next year. I appeal to every member therefore to give the function your utmost support.

ROTARY INFORMATION : Chairman, David Willshire, and committee member, Ron Coates, were responsible for Rotary Information. This is a very difficult portfolio. The Bulletin was used as the major vehicle for disseminating Rotary information. The Rotary Basic Library was constantly on loan and a second copy purchased. Although organised by the Fellowship Committee, a number of "Fireside" meetings were held for new members and their wives. The occasional Rotary quiz was published in the Bulletin to "test" members' knowledge. All members, particularly new members, were encouraged to attend the District Conference and the District Assembly.

Rotary Information will always be one of the challenging tasks within any Rotary Club.

PUBLIC RELATIONS: Chairman, David Cheney, provided the Club with its most successful year in the public relations area. In order to get the Club better known to the three local newspapers, "Doncaster Mirror", "Progress Press" and the "Free Press", representatives of the publishing houses were invited on several occassions to Club meetings and activities. Press releases, together with photographs, were prepared in a format which increased the chances of publication. Emphasis was placed on writing "human interest" stories rather than straight factual accounts - an approach which should be pursued in future years. In all twenty stories were published as following:

- * 10 in the Doncaster Mirror
- * 6 in the Progress Press
- * 4 in the Free Press

One full colour front page was printed in the Doncaster Mirror and a three-quarter black and white front page was printed in Progress Press. The following pages record the publicity obtained.

Another initiative introduced in 1983/84 was the production of a news sheet following each Board Meeting. This sheet summerised Board decisions and major discussions and was distributed to all members at the following Dinner Meeting - another approach which should be pursued in future years.

VENUE: The venue for meetings throughout the year was the Sentimental Bloke Hotel, Bulleen. An excellent understanding has been developed between the Hotel's management and the Club's administration. Following early discussions, meals were improved and the cost held at \$8.50. Dinner fees were \$9.00, 50 cents going to the Club's administration account to cover the costs of invited guests. A number of large meetings were held during the year and the catering for these, as with our regular meetings, was of good standard. A special child's portion and price (\$5.00) was negotiated successfully with the Hotel.

All in all, it was a good year and the Club's gratitude is extended to the Sentimental Bloke's management, particularly Pam Mullarvey, catering staff and waitresses.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: John Robson carried out this important task for the year. Well prepared, John executed his responsibilities at each meeting with humour, human interest and public knowledge. A new initiative for the year was to ask members, without notice, to comment on a topic of public interest. For the first year, John wore the Club's Sergeants sash of honour. Red in colour, it carries the names of all the former Sergeants and the three stripes of the Sergeant's rank. This was initially presented to last year's Sergeant, Bernie Smith, at the last Changeover Dinner.

Kolchi, who is due to return home at the end this term, introduced kendo (traditional amboo sword fighting) to his fellow students Trinity last year.


He now has presented the school with sever-a bares of kendo clothing and equipment as a resture of thanks for the hospitality he has been given by his Australian friends.



This proposal was approved and a Fashion Parade Committee was formed to plan, coordinate and produce the function. This Committee consisted of:

Closer to the date of the parade, the Committee was increased to include:

On Thursday, 10th November, 1983 the Parade was held at the Camberwell Civic Centre. Total attendance was 597 people who sat down to dinner at 7.30 pm following drinks and hors d'oeuvres in the foyer.

Compares for the evening were Paula Duncan and John Orcsik. Six Big M girls modelled the parments in a 50 minute presentation which was produced by David Book and Bryan Decar of the Bra Shop.

Pollowing the parade, pianist and singer, Peter Sullivan provided the audience with classical, popular and sing-a-long music.

A locky door prize (a diamond and sapphire ring by courtesy of Morry Rubenstein and A. Perelberg) was won by Bernie Smith's daughter, Fiona, which was most appropriate as Fiona assisted the Committee in "selling-in" advertising space for the booklet.

a raifle was drawn and the nine winners presented with their prizes, the first prize being a return trip to Sydney (by courtesy of TAA and Hilton Hotels). The other prize sponsors were Peter Foeden, Clive Peeters and Toshiba, Tollana Wines, Linette, Lorraine Knitting Mills, Image and Fable Labels, Le-Specs and The Bra Shop.

The final net profit from the function was \$6,932.49 and this amount was tratsferred in full to the Club's Service Account. No bad debts were incurred.

1984/85

The Fashion Parade concept actually began in the Club with the do-it-yourself parade organised by Dorothy Clark and Judy Reddish at the Auburn Heights Bowling Thub in 1982.

With the successful conclusion of the 1983 Parade, a debriefing of the Committee was held on 21st November, 1983, to identify mistakes and make notes for the future.

In general, the 1983 Parade was considered successful and although falling short of the original estimated revenue, the approximate \$7,000 raised was considered satisfactory for the Club's first major effort. It also proved that, subject to a number of modifications, the Club has the ability to run a much bigger parade and, in general, develop the parade format as the Club's major fund raising vehicle.

To pursue this further a 1984/85 Fashion Parade Committee was formed consisting of:

Paul Fitz (Chairman) David Cheney Ron Liner

The Committee's task was to investigate the running of another fashion parade and on the 27th March, 1984/ it submitted a "Fashion Spectacular" proposal to the Board.

The concept for the presentation was a sit-down dinner featuring a fashion spectacular highlighting women's and men's summer fashions from 16 Westfield Shoppingtown Doncaster Boutiques, ranging from swimwear to outerwear and eveningwear. This was to be supported by entertainment (Nautilus Aerobic Dance Team), a live band, locky door prize and raffle. The spectaculars were to be run on two nights (10th and 11th August 1984) at the Camberwell Civic Centre and were to be produced by acrice Rinaldi.

The major profit centres outlined were:

- * Sale of tickets
- * Underwriting the parade
- * Raffle
- * Advertising booklet

The proposal recommended that the proceeds from the Spectaculars, to a total amount of \$13,000, should go to the Club's Service Account and the proceeds from the electrising booklet and anything in excess of \$13,000 from the Spectaculars should go to the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund. The Beeper Service was found to be an excellent project, unfortunately the cost was prohibitive, unless we mount a special fund raising project.

Investment for Retirement we found was catered for by many professional bodies.

A Probus Club was investigated, we were informed that there was not the opportunity to do so in our area. However, in the last month of this Rotary year, apparently the scene has changed and a recommandation will be passed onto the incoming Committee to reactivate the formation of a Probus Club; male or female.

The Edar Fete Stall was a great success raising approx. \$700.

The Blood Pressure and Diabetes Testing was a worthwhile project. However, for maximum results more publicity and evaluation of the location of the vans will need to be studied.

Unfortunately the Diabetes caravan was destroyed by fire one week before we were to have its use. We hired a conventional caravan so that we could fulfill our commitment.

Approximately 8 members and 1 wife became blood donors at the Royal Women's Hospital, at the next visit we hope to increase this number.

The painting of the Senior Citizens Hall was a great effort. The outside of the building was painted by 25 members in 3 hours. This was not only a community service project project, the Fellowship was excellent.

Special Project

The Rotary Park Project was commenced (physically) when the Club, their ladies, friends and locals planted, staked and mulched approx. 730 trees. These trees were donated by APM Forests. The Mayor planted the first tree. There have been two maintenance days since the original planting.
