PRESIDENT'S REPORT

When I was elected to be president 19 months before taking over the reins, the installation as president seemed a long way away. It is amazing how quickly those 19 months disappeared. The closer the time came the more I thought about the responsibility I was assuming. The North Balwyn Rotary Club is a great club and had developed quickly over the five previous years under the leadership of five very able and dedicated men. Now it was my turn to carry the baton and ensure that I passed the Club on to Geoff Steinicke in equal and, if possible, better condition.

As we entered our sixth year of service we faced the challenge that we were now a mature Club with significant achievements in our five avenues of service. It was important to build on these achievements, to improve in those areas which needed improvement and to maintain the friendship and fellowship in our Club which is the envy of all other clubs in the District.

To achieve these ideals it was essential that we set real objectives and goals for the year and to plan, as we have in the past, well in advance to ensure we achieved them and, in achieving them, we maintained and expanded the high standards of our Club and built greater goodwill and understanding between our members, our families and our community.

Rotary International President Edward Cadman's theme for 1985/86, "You are the Key", seemed most appropriate in all of this. The members of our Club are the keys to our successful achievements, activities and fellowship, our Club is one of the keys to an achieving District and our District is another of the keys to making Rotary International, in reality, a body which builds international goodwill, understanding and peace.

Our ten major objectives for the year, which in the main were achieved, were to:

- 1. Continue to foster the fellowship and friendship bonds in our Club.
- Continue to develop hands-on projects in our Community Service activities.
- 3. Concentrate on service efforts within the boundaries of our Club.
- 4. Continue to emphasise Youth Service activities, an area where we have performed well in previous years.
- 5. Concentrate on developing programmes in the difficult Vocational Service area.
- 6. Improve our knowledge and dissemination of Rotary Information.
- 7. Charter a Rotaract Club.
- 8. Organise and provide logistical support for District 980's President-elect seminars.
- 9. Support the Rotary Down Under House appeal.
- 10. Increase our membership to 60.

Our fellowship bonds are forged by our Club Service and Committee meeting involvement. John Robson headed up our Club Service Committee with great efficiency which ensured our Club functioned effectively and smoothly. He and his committee spent hours in organising and coordinating all of our club meetings, administration and communications.

<u>Clive Hughes</u> organised an excellent programme for the year which included such eminent speakers as Sir William Dunlop, Ian Haigh, Harry Beitzel, Senator Shirley Walters, Ian Cleland, Frs. Chris Gleeson and John Brosnan, Dame Phyllis Frost and Bruce Ruxton to mention only a few.

Three interesting meetings were held away from "home" - one at the Melbourne Stock Exchange, another at Odyssey House and the third at the Box Hills hospital. Our ladies, as ever, supported the Club magnificantly, at ladies' nights which we held about every 4-6 weeks, by providing the entertainment at our Christmas and Birthday meetings and when they "took over" a meeting in June and provided us with such entertainment and fun. Of special note is Betty Carnell who made our birthday cake.

Ralph Lee and Peter Kagan respectively looked after the portfolios of Sergeant-at-Arms and Grapevine editor. I know from personal experience that these activities are persistent, with weekly deadlines to be met, but they are activities which being personal fulfillment. Ralph, controlled meetings very well and entertained us all with excellent fines sessions. Peter improved the "Grapevine" as the year went by and, on the whole, kept the Club informed. A special thanks to Ralph Lee and his staff for printing and distributing our bulletin.

Stan Hibbert, as Rotary Information Chairman, presented a number of segments at selected meetings which were aimed not only informing members, but making them think.

Fred Pike, as Almoner, kept the Club informed on members' illnesses and forwarded cards, messages and flowers to the members and families concerned. There were more than usual hospitalisations during the year with major emphasis on 3H programmes!

Duncan Ansell, as Public Relations Chairman, commenced the year well but unfortunately business and family pressures meant that Duncan did not have the time to maintain the level of publicity we would have liked. However, some committees obtained independent publicity covering selected activities.

John Etkins began the difficult job of documenting our club's history before we grow too old and records are lost.

Ron Carnell, our secretary and Attendance Chairman, continued the low-key but time-consuming role he does so well and is so important for the smooth running of the Club. Many members do not realise the efforts Ron devotes to our Club and, as President, I know how Ron's efficiency makes my role that much easier. Similarly, Treasurer <u>Geoff</u> <u>Perdriau</u> has given the Club tremendous service in the way he has administered its financial transactions and records. It is the efficiency of Ron and Geoff which makes Club Administration run so smoothly and effectively.

Our Fellowship Committee was directed by **David Cheney** with the Cheney flair and dedication to detail and it provided us with a well structured and variable programme. In all, 13 functions were organised ranging from Trivial Pursuit and Casino-nights to a Golfing/Tennis week-end to a New Year Eve's party, Pool Party-Spit Roast, a cricket match against Gisborne and the highly successful Safari Dinner.

The leadership of our Community Service Committee changed hands mid-way through the year. <u>Ron Roy</u> ran into work pressures which meant he had to resign from the Board and as a Community Service Director. However, <u>George King</u> very willingly stepped into the breach for the second part of the year. Our goal of continuing hands-on activities within our boundaries resulted in some worthwhile projects. The health testing week-end was again successful and <u>Roger Benallack</u> is to be congratulated for his excellent organisation. We also undertook some worthwhile activities at the Marwell Avenue Elderly Citizens Club where we also missed a meal and donated the savings to the Rotary Foundation for the Polio Plus programme. However, we continue to "suffer" from living in an affluent area where community service projects appear to be hard to find and the Club may have to re-consider its guideline of staying within its own boundaries.

Our Youth Service Committee, under the able leadership of <u>John Thwaites</u>, moved from strength to strength. It achieved one of the highlights of the year when <u>P.P. David Goldsmith's</u> committee, consisting of selected Youth Service Committee members and one member from each of the other committees, successfully extended the new Rotaract Club of North Balwyn. Our special thanks go to David and to District Rotaract. Special Representative, <u>Dianne Griffin</u>, for their untiring efforts which resulted in the now flourishing Rotaract Club.

Roger Wiggill continued to develop our Club's creation, the Rotary International Youth Art Exchange (RIYAE) programme and was appointed as the District's inaugural RIYAE Chairman when D.G. Edwin Peatt officially recognised the programme. Tony McLean organised the second year of our Youth Debate which saw more schools participating and Carey winning the North Balwyn Rotary Club's Debating Shield by narrowly defeating Marcellin in the final.

We selected a student, Lan Nguyan, to attend Mittagundi and our own Rotaracter, Carol Griffin, was selected as our RYLA awardee. Thanks to <u>Gerry Spencer</u> and <u>Peter Cook</u> respectively. <u>Graham Ford</u> coordinated our ongoing Vern McConchie Awards with Greythorn High and a student from Greythorn High, Peter Roberts, won our Club's prize in R.I's "Letters for Peace" competition.

Last, but not least in the Youth Service area, was our surprise exchange student from South Africa, Vanessa Lowe, who came to us in January and whom we are sharing with West Footscray. A special note of thanks goes to the Headmaster of Carey Baptist Grammar School who so readily accepted Vanessa at the last moment. We, also, farewelled Martin McInerney to Brasil.

A special committee interviewed fifteen students for outward exchange in 1987 and two girls were recommended to District for final selection. We were the only Club to have both students selected by District. Carolyn Greene, our student, will be going to Canada/USA as well our second student, Athalie Williams who will be sponsored by the Rotary Club of Glenferrie. We were notified that Matti Paljakka from Finland would be joining us in August.

Finally, our thanks to <u>Roger Wiggill</u> and <u>Ford</u> for the rafts which allowed us to come last in the Rotary/Rotaract Raft Race.

Improving our performance in Vocational Service was another of our goals this year. Director, <u>Don Haycraft</u> and his Committee did a great job in organising visits to Show Ads, the Melbourne Stock Exchange and Box Hill Hospital, speakers to celebrate Vocational Service Month (Ian Cleland and our own P.P. Kevin Maunder) "mock" job interviews with Marcellin College students, and a Careers' Seminar for Greythorn High. During the year, one of the Committee members, <u>David Wornell</u>, wrote a book entitled "Towards a Fulfilling Career" and its potential will be explored further in 1986/87.

Ron Arthur directed the activities of the International Service and Rotary Foundation Committee. It organised guest speakers for Rotary Foundation Month (Duncan Grace, Foundation Awardee from Canada), World Understanding Month (Rupert Balfe on Pakistan and Peter Dransfield on China) and speakers on FAIM (Terry Mulqueen) and Interplast (Rosie Ravich). IPAC projects were evaluated but it was decided to investigate further in 1986/87 a project presented by our Youth Exchange student, Vanessa Lowe, to provide a classroom in Zululand, South Africa. We interviewed an applicant for a Rotary Foundation Scholarship and nominated a Paul Harris Fellow.

Our Fund-Raising Committee was chaired by P.P. John Reddish. This year the Committee evaluated fund raising ideas coming from Club members and allocated projects to Committees to execute. This approach was only partially successful. However, we raised \$8,970 for our Service account from six projects and \$1,216 for our administration account from three projects. Major fund raising successes were the do-it-ourselves fashion parade, organised very successfully by the Fellowship Committee, the Christmas Raffle, so well organised by the Youth Services Committee that we doubled our profit over the previous year and the Aeromodellers Display which was very successfully organised by the International Services Committee. We conducted three excellent in-house fund raising projects, the annual wine auction, the sale of pears so well conducted by Gordon McQueeney and the Racing Night. In turn, we donated to RI's Polio Plus programme (\$468), Rotary Foundation (\$943), Onemda Centre (\$1,000), Australian Rotary Health Research Fund (\$1,000), Red Shield Appeal Door Knock (\$1,880), Rotary Swinburne Bursary (\$1,000), Odyssey House (\$612 for two EDP Hard Discs), EDAR (\$1,060) and Rotary Down Under House (\$840). Minor donations were given to Mexican Relief Fund, Diabetes Foundation, Camberwell Community Youth Centre and Surry Hills Primary School Camp. One of the major challenges for our Club is to establish

one or two major fund raising projects which will allow it to financially support some large programmes.

The Membership Development Committee, under the Chairmanship of <u>President-elect</u> <u>Geoff Steinicke</u> carried out an excellent programme of gradual but continual recruitment. In all, 9 members were inducted into the Club bringing our membership to 61, one more than our target at the beginning of the year. We welcomed our first Honorary member, Keith Glover and Gwenyth, who M C'ed the District Convention in Canberra, his third. Keith was paid a second honour at the Convention by being awarded a Paul Harris Fellow by PDG Jack Nankervis on behalf of the Rotary Club of Melbourne North.

Our attendance record was excellent in the first half of the year but declined to some degree in the second half. This was partially due to a record number of overseas trips by members (in excess of 25 members travelled overseas more than 35 times during the year!) and an above average numbers of leave of absences due to travel, illness or business reasons. However, attendance is an area we must watch closely.

The Club's official task for the District was to organise the logistical support for the President's-elect seminar. The Committee was chaired by P.P. Kevin Maunder and comprised one representative from all the Club's committees with assistance by most members on the day. Kevin and his committee did a first class job and brought great credit to the Club from District.

The Club was well represented in other District activities including the DG's Change Over Dinner, Conference, Assembly, International Dinner and Forum, Membership and Peer Group Forums and the Rotary/Rotaract Raft Race. The Club was represented with distinction on District Committees by <u>P.P. John Reddish</u> (Australian Rotary Health Relations), <u>P.P. Stan Hibbert</u> (Public Relations) and <u>P.P. Kevin Maunder</u> (Group Study Exchange). As well, <u>P.P's John Etkins</u> and <u>Kevin Maunder</u> were leaders in the District's Presidents-Elect Seminar and John and Kevin were joined by <u>P.P. Stan Hibbert</u> as leaders in the District Assembly.

D.G. Edwin Peatt set up a committee of Camberwell City Rotary Club Presidents (Ashburton, Balwyn, Camberwell, Camberwell North and North Balwyn) which met regularly to coordinate Rotary activities. Of major note was the decision for the five clubs to share common boundaries, those being the boundaries of the City of Camberwell.

A great deal has been achieved this year and the credit goes to our excellent Board and to the members and ladies of our great Club. You were truly the keys and I thank you for all your wonderful support. It has been a great honour to have served as president of the North Balwyn Rotary Club and if I am handing the Club over in good condition it is entirely due to you all. Thank you.

Finally, I would like to thank my wife, <u>Sue</u>, for her total support, patience and understanding during a very busy and time-consuming year. I know she enjoys Rotary as much as I do and gets the same satisfaction coming from the fellowship and friendship of all our members and ladies within the Club and our worthwhile activities outside. I, also, extend a special note of thanks to my secretary, <u>Trudi Bisnieks</u>, for her wonderful logistical support. Nothing was ever too much trouble even if it was on top of an already very busy day. Her friendly assistance made the year for me that much easier. Also, to <u>Immediate P.P.</u> <u>John Reddish</u>, for his continous support, friendship and advice throughout the year. I thank him sincerely.

To our incoming president **Geoff Steinicke** and his wife **Judy**, Sue and I extend our very best wishes and total support for what, undoubtedly, will be another great year for the Rotary Club of North Balwyn. "Rotary does bring Hope".

The average age of our members is 51 years and 9 months, and it is intended that we look for younger people as prospective members in the coming year. The introduction of some young members will ensure that the club has a good blend of youth and experience to ensure that we remain an active club, capable of undertaking whatever task that may emerge within our local community.

Although our club is now six years old, the average period of service by the members is 3 years and 8 months.

B. Attendance

Our average weekly attendance for the year was 85.57%, which placed us in 9th position in District 980, out of fifty three member clubs.

Our best month for attendance was December, 1985 where we attained 3rd position in the district, but our performance has deteriorated to the extent that we dropped to 23rd position in April, 1986.

Our members undertook over 30 overseas trips during the year, and eleven members were granted leave of absence due to business and travel reasons.

Unfortunately our attendance figures have been affected by a lack of make-ups being recorded. Members should note that their first obligation to Rotary is to make-up at another club if at all possible, and if that proves to be difficult, seeking leave of absence from the club should only be sought where a person's membership is in danger because of absenteeism.

Peter Kagan is to be congratulated on his achievement of being on an overseas trip for three weeks and in that time having made-up at nine Rotary Clubs in various countries. The banners are a welcome addition to our collection of regalia.

It is pleasing to record that the following members achieved a 100% attendance figure during the year: Ron Carnell, David Cheney, John Etkins, Stan Hibbert, Peter Kagan, Geoff Perdriau, and Tom Wing Young.

Peter Cook has also achieved a 100% attendance record since he was inducted on 20th February, 1986.

G. Rotary Information

Stan Hibbert contributed a number of three minute segments at selected meetings, and we found him to be informative for the benefit of new members, humorous, for the die-hards, and thought provoking for the new board members in relation to the Ashburton club.

The secret of this task is to keep the members informed by giving a short address, embodying the three factors mentioned and in so doing Stan was able to get his message across to the members.

H. Almoner

Fred Pike kept the club informed of members' illnesses and the get-well cards or messages of sympathy were well received by the people concerned.

ROTARACT CLUB FORMATION

One of the most significant achievements of the 1985-86 Rotary year was the successful sponsoring of the Rotaract Club of North Balwyn, which was presented with its Charter by D.G. Edwin Peatt at an impressive evening on Tuesday 26 November 1985.

The formation of the Rotaract Club was the culmination of a significant effort by all members of the Rotary Club, but in particular, of the special committee under the chairmanship of Vice President David Goldsmith. This committee was strongly supported by the District Rotaract Representative, Diane Griffin, who was untiring in her efforts to see the successful establishment of a new club.

From some 120 names put forward by members of the Rotary Club, and following interest meetings held during October, 1985, a charter membership was achieved of 26 members. Although the club had a very healthy start, the early loss on transfer of the Charter President, Andrew Barr, and of three other members, was a cause for concern. Tess Glenister, a charter member, and a Past President of Werribee, stepped into the breach to successfully maintain and strengthen the structural organisation. There have been seven inductions, to bring the current membership to 29, with a further three inductions likely before change-over.

The Club is strong socially, and has involved itself with some success in community, vocational, and international projects, such as the Raft race, helping at the Allambie Reception Centre, assistance with Blue Light Discos, the Dial-a-Santa programme, and raising funds for a water purification plan in Bangladesh, as well as becoming a recognised force in the Rotaract District. They have participated in all District activities since their provisional pre-charter status, and won the District Participation Award at the Rotaract District conference.

Virtually all members of the Rotary Club have attended meetings of the Rotaract Club, on roster, and Rotaracters have been regular in their attendance at Rotary meetings. The future should bring extension of the already commenced programme of joint activities.

The newly elected Board for 1986-87 under the leadership of President-elect Tim Proposch, will have many challenges of organisation, participation and involvement to meet but if what has been achieved in 1985-86 can be built upon as a firm foundation, then the Rotary Club of North Balwyn will be able to be justifiably proud of its further achievement for the youth of our district.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL YOUTH ART EXCHANGE (RIYAE)

Α. Outline:

1. History & Current Programmes:

The father of a Japanese Exchange Student brought some paintings with him on a visit to Australia in 1983 and from this North Balwyn Club initiated the Painting Exchange Scheme. The Boroondara Primary School participated in 1983 and Methodist Ladies College and North Balwyn State School in 1984, exchanging paintings with three Japanese Schools. Since these early days, the Scheme has expanded and has now been in operation for approximately 36 months, and 11 batches of paintings (total paintings ± 300) have been sent across (to Japan, Italy, South Africa and Finland) and 9 batches (total paintings ± 280) have been received (from Japan, Italy and Finland).

#### UNICEF International Student Art Exhibition - 1986

The Board of North Balwyn Rotary Club has approved this as an International project for 1986/7. DG Edwin Peatt has concurred and obtained the green light from the 4 DG's whose districts are involved. The project involves 3 major art exhibitions July - October 1986, with North Balwyn Club assistance, Rotary publicity, the opportunity to raise funds, and the availability of well over 100 paintings for exchange. Details were finalised in June in a combined meeting with the UNICEF Art Committee and other sponsors.

#### 2. Objective:

Utilising the concept of painting exchanges between children of different countries, the scheme is spreading and becoming a means of building bridges of friendship and understanding between children of different Nations.

#### 3. Participation:

All schoolgoing children show interest, and benefit from the scheme. The scheme operates on a School to School, and Class to Class basis, with any School eligible.

## 4. Method of Operation:

The following is the method of operation:

- (a) In order to inject a personal touch, a photograph of the artist should accompany each painting, together with the artists name, age and address. This might encourage pen-pal-type relationships.
- (b) Participating Club's Youth Affairs or International Committees administer the Scheme.
- (c) Topics for paintings are chosen by the Youth Affairs Committee of the Club organising outgoing paintings, or by the Schools preparing the paintings, e.g. "MY HOME", "MY SCHOOL", "MY FAMILY" etc.
- (d) Paintings on the appropriate topic, probably around 25 paintings in total (but, any number is acceptable) with a photograph of the artist stapled in the top lefthand corner, and bearing the artist's name on the rear of the painting are collected by the Rotary Club from the participating school (and class) and mailed to the participating Rotary Club in the other country. Simultaneously, a batch is collected and mailed in the opposite direction. A time-table for the exchange is established in advance by the organising club, together with the age group selected. The exchanges are, ideally, on a 1-year programme basis with, say 3 exchanges in the year, on three different topics. The incoming batch is delivered to the local school. Paintings are usually displayed in the class for perhaps 3-4 weeks, and as desired, at meetings of the participating clubs.
- (e) The cost of inter-club packaging and mailing is borne by the participating clubs. The children provide the photograph of themselves.
- (f) The paintings should be done by a class in the participating school under the guidance of the school, and as part of the normal curriculum.
- (g) Consideration could be given to involving wives of Rotarians in the scheme, in view of their (usually) closer contact with the schol.
- (h) An unexpected side-benefit of the scheme arose, when it was established that the Victorial National Gallery may be interested in receiving incoming batches of paintings after the schools have finished with them. These would be stored in their archives and used for study purposes in future years, mainly in the training of art teachers, and the first batches handed over.

## B. District Committee

Roger Wiggill, Chairman of RIYAE for the Rotary Club of North Balwyn has been appointed Chairman of a District 980 Committee to promote the exchange amongst other clubs. Members are being co-opted onto the committee at present.

#### C. PLANS

It is recommended that the plan to develop RIYAE over the 1986/7 year and for future should be:

- We (North Balwyn Rotary Club) continue with the exchange limiting our commitment to 5 local and 5 overseas schools (through overseas Rotary Clubs).
- 2. The District Committee will guide participating clubs to ensure a uniform approach by all Clubs, and will publicise the scheme and encourage participation by District 980 Clubs, and Clubs in other Districts in Australia and overseas.
- 3. For 1986/7, at least four District 980 Clubs should, under the above Committee's guidance, become active in the exchange programme e.g. North Camberwell, Balwyn, Footscray, and one other, and a start should be made by clubs in other districts.

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 Clear guidelines will be established for Clubs in other districts who may wish to participate e.g. Rose Bay, N.S.W.

- 7. <u>JUNE:</u> A careers' seminar was organised for Greythorn High School. Under the leadership of Ron Phillips, five members spoke to students about their careers.

In preparing the objectives for the Rotary year, the International Services Committee saw their role to promote Rotary International matters and to arrange speakers on various aspects of this area of service.

Duncan came from Ontario on a Rotary Foundation Graduate Scholarship to study International Law at Melbourne University.
