


This year will be remembered by many as the year that North Balwyn Club "came of age" through its achievements some of which I will detail.

- Clubs membership grew to over 70 making us one of the group of larger clubs District 980.
- Fund raising activities yielded over \$80,000 through the:

Fete, the Health Check survey, North Balwyn Senior Citizens, chartering of the North Balwyn Ladies Probus Club, and Yooralla.

#### GENERAL SERVICE


#### Salvation Army Door Knock

# INTERNATIONAL SERVICE COMMITTEE

It is with great pleasure that I report the activities of the International Committee for the year ended 30th June, 1990.

The Committee consisted of Ian Lucas, Peter Cleary, Paul Fitz, Marcel Muntwyler, Bernie Smith, and Peter Cairns.

Committee meetings were held when required, and responsibilities allocated to members of the committee, to ensure each had a direct involvement in some aspect of the portfolio.

Activities entered into during the year covered the following:-

#### 1. International House at Melbourne University.

A formal dinner meeting was held there with the students, and a good representation of club members attended the very popular "Cafe International" night in May.

#### 2. Group Study Exchange

Our club was closely involved as committee member Paul is Chairman of the District G.S.E. Committee. We nominated a member for group leader, advertised for team member; and volunteered to host the incoming Japanese team. Because of our very intense involvement in the previous year, our applications were unsuccessful.

#### 3. Meeting Speakers

We arranged to have the following speakers address our club meetings:-Amanda Dawkins (1989 G.S.E. team member to Austria); Joe Coghill (Foundation Scholar from U.S.A); James Carter (Rotarian from Rochester on Illiteracy - a Person Experience), and Marianne Rowlands (to whom we donated \$500.00 to subsidise her fare to Bangladesh to spend her university vacation assisting in child health programmes).

#### 4. F.A.I.M. Promotion

Peter Cleary managed to sign up all members as F.A.I.M. contributors in February, making us again a 100% club.

#### 5. Member Education

Regular articles have been supplied to, and have appeared in the Grapevine, written by various members of the Committee. Items covered included G.S.E., I.P.A.C., Friendship Exchange, F.A.I.M., Rotary Foundation, etc.

#### 6. International Events

Marcel Muntwyler continued to regularly announce dates of international significance at meetings, a practice warmly received by members.

#### 7. Paul Harris Fellowships

Two awards were made, with the worthy recipients being P.P. Geoff Steinicke and Geoff Perdriau. Congratulations. Additional funds for a further three awards were also allocated to the Foundation.

#### 8. Raffle

The "Glen Walmsley" Giant Christmas Stocking was built partially by, and the selling organised by our committee - an activity requiring considerable input in the months leading up to Christmas.

#### 9. I.P.A.C. Project

It was our aim to apply for a \$2000.00 matched grant from R.I. Foundation, to enable us to provide a \$4000.00 inventory of learning and teaching aids to the Solomon Island School which our own Max Hunter assisted in building two years ago.

Unfortunately, it is proving difficult to obtain the necessary details as to whom to apply and how to go about it.




David McKewan in his job of Rotaract District Representative has acquitted himself well and Rotaract Clubs of District 980 will benefit as a result of his efforts.

It is probably time to look at a change of format for this function. Although successful, there was a certain sameness in the general reaction.


#### 19th November HOLE-IN-ONE BARBECUE

# VOCATIONAL SERVICE

Business, Social and Community activities have no significant factor in common - Change.

This changing environment is created by differing needs and expectations of the people involved. So it is with Rotary.

Over the past 10 years change has occurred with increasing volatility in our business and community life. We have an ageing population and in our local community we are witnessing the forced closure of schools, because of a lack of children to teach. In most schools professional career guidance counsellors provide school leavers with highly developed information on job opportunities.

Business is now required to spend 1% of gross wages and salaries on training its staff and in 1992 this requirement will increase to 1.5%.

I submit that members would find more satisfaction if their talents were used for example in Drug Prevention and Rehabilitation, kids assistance with the aged and handicapped, or work with the homeless or street kids!



#### ADMINISTRATION

This committee has operated successfully for the second year, improving the efficiency of club administration by the use of additional members to assist the Secretary and the Treasurer in their duties.

Club membership has increased from 31 to 74 in the past ten years, and the workload has increased in proportion.

Since being chartered on the 8th May 1980 the club has inducted 86 new members and lost 43 for a net gain of 43 and a membership of 74 at 30th June 1990.

#### COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

To carry out all the normal activities of the Secretary and the Treasurer.

#### **CLUB CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS**

Following the Council on Legislation in Singapore in January 1989 a new Club Constitution was issued by Rotary International to take effect 1st July 1989.

This Constitution was formally accepted by the club on 28th September 1989 to comply with its Articles of Association and the Associations Incorporation Act.

The Registrar of Incorporated Associations was duly advised and the new Constitution is now incorporated in the Statement of Rules.

A motion to amend the Club By-laws to permit absentee voting was not successful.

# ATTENDANCE

Average attendance for the year was 85% for tenth position among the 64 clubs in District 980. This is much the same as in 1988/89, but we have less make-ups for meetings missed. It is suggested that those members who do not make up are missing an enjoyable opportunity to look at the activities of other clubs and to boost our attendance.

It is pleasing to see that 15 of our members (20% of the membership) have achieved 100% attendance for the year.

#### MEMBERSHIP

Membership will be 74 at the end of June after inducting 6 new members and losing 3 for a net gain of 3.

Nineteen of the original 31 Charter Members 19 are still with the club.

Seven members moved from Active or Past Service Membership to Senior Active status in the year, the club now having eleven members who have achieved a status which is a compliment to their years in Rotary.

It should be noted that their former classifications are now vacant, and are available to other prospective members.

#### INCORPORATION

The requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act have been complied with during the year.

Treasurer David Stockman is Public Officer of the Incorporated Club.

A member of the Administration Committee, Bill Thackray, was appointed Convenor of the new Ladies Probus Club of North Balwyn.

This project was carried out promptly and successfully, and the new club was Chartered on 16th November 1989.

Two new Paul Harris Fellows were named at the Club's Tenth Birthday Night on Saturday 5th May 1990, namely Geoff Perdriau and Geoff Steinicke. Both well merited by their contributions over the years.

They bring to fourteen the total number of PHF's named by our club since 1984, eleven being club members.

As well as being a recognition of the service of these members to our club and to District 980, each award has been accompanied by a donation by the club of US\$1,000 to the Rotary Foundation to assist its charitable and educational programs.
