PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I am honoured to present to the Members, the Annual Report of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn for the year ended 30 June, 1991.

The Rotary International President, Paulo V.C. Costa, had as his theme "Honour Rotary with Faith and Enthusiasm".

I believe that our Club has responded to our President's challenge.

In the pages which follow, are reports covering the activities of each of the Club's Committees. The reports indicate another active year of Rotary Service by many members, supported by their wives and families. I would like to endorse the words of appreciation expressed in these reports to those members who have made a special contribution to the activities of the Club. A special thank you to all for your support.

To the members of the Board I express my sincere appreciation and thanks for your willingness to give your time and your talents to the affairs of the Club which collectively have ensured another successful year.

In my Presidential Address at the Changeover Dinner last year, I commented that after celebrating our tenth anniversary, there was a danger that members may feel quite comfortable with the various programmes that the club had established. I suggested that without new projects we lose the excitement and vitality which new experiences bring and challenged members to become involved in new projects in Vocational and International Service which would round-off the Club's Four Avenues of Service.

Bob Ballantyne, our Vocational Director (until March, 1991) and his Committee accepted my challenge to make Vocational Service an active part of our Club's programme in 1991. The Vocational Service Committee's report indicates that the Committee is now well on the way to establishing the "High Street" model based on businesses in Lexton Road, Box Hill, which may become a pilot scheme for Adult Literacy programmes throughout Australia. The pilot project will be underway in July, 1991. A great initiative which was the result of immense commitment and effort. My thanks to David Goldsmith who undertook the additional role of Vocational Director following Bob's move to Sydney.

Another challenge I placed before the Club was the identification of an international project which could give us direct personal involvement with an overseas club. The club responded by establishing sister club relationships with the Rotary Club of Manila Midtown, Philippines and with the Rotary Club of Madras East, India. Each club has been invited to identify a community project within their area, which could develop into joint projects with us and be eligible for special matched grants from Rotary Foundation. I believe that these sister club relationships in the near future will provide the introduction for our Club's direct involvement in International Service.

We have seen the relationships strengthened between the Rotary Clubs in the City of Camberwell. When the President's met in August, 1990, we thought that with a combined strength of 330 active Rotarians, Rotary should be able to develop a significant community project which would benefit the residents of the City of Camberwell. A working Committee was established to investigate homeless youth. Murray Carr agreed to be our representative on the Committee together with representatives from Ashburton, Balwyn, Camberwell, Canterbury and North Camberwell Clubs. The Working Committee has completed its investigations and recently submitted their report and recommendations to the Boards of the participating Clubs for the commencement of a programme to be known as "ROTARY ADOLESCENT FAMILY TEAM SUPPORT" (RAFTS) which I expect the Clubs to support. This will be a major project which will make Rotary more visible in our community.

The Presidents also instigated the first combined City of Camberwell Rotary Clubs Dinner Meeting on Wednesday, 27 February, 1991, at which 246 Rotarians heard Dr Neville Norman speak on "The Recession - Where To From Here?" This meeting generated great fellowship amongst the Rotarians present which will ensure that similar meetings are continued in future years. Fellowship has continued to be an integral part of all our activities, and is the corner stone on which we build our service to others.

There were many enjoyable dinner meetings during the year, but the following stand out:-

13 September 1990 - A ladies night in which Lorna Lee (Acting President), Tiina Huoviala (Speaker), Wendy Doyle (Chairperson), Cresley Robson (Sergeant), ably assisted by Dreta Cairns, Trica Lele, Joan Richardson (Attendance), Pauline Benallack, Erin Courtney, Lisa Zuccala (Greeters), Diane McLean (Setting Up) and Anthea Mollison (Fellowship) took over our Club for the evening and ran a superb meeting.

13 December 1990 - Our Family Christmas Party during which we sang Christmas Carols and exchanged Christmas greetings. A new innovation this year was instead of presenting gifts to one another, we gave our gifts to St John's Homes for Boys and Girls which were greatly appreciated by the boys and girls.

9 May 1991 - Eleventh Birthday Party and the District Farewell Dinner to the GSE Team from District 763 Marylands, Delaware, USA. The Fellowship's Committee decision to have a World War 11 Concert Party Theme for the evening made it a night to remember.

During the Club's 11th Birthday celebration we named Past President David Cheney, Max Hunter and Past President John Robson, Paul Harris Fellows in recognition of their outstanding service and contributions to Rotary. The warm response received by the recipients indicated the popularity of these awards.

The economic recession has had an impact on the Club's fund-raising activities. This was particularly noticeable with our Hole-In-One Competition with a dramatic drop in sponsorships. Our major fund raising activities namely the Hole-In-One Competition, the Christmas Raffle, the Aeromodellers Day together with our recycling of cans provided us with a net profit of a little over \$31,500. Having regard to the economic difficulties this was still an outstanding effort.

The Club has made financial donations of \$22,912 during the year. Further details of these donations are set out in the Service Account Financial Statement.

I am disappointed to report that for the second time in our history we have ended a Rotary Year with a reduction in our membership numbers. It is important for the ongoing vitality of our Club that members continually keep in mind the need to nominate younger people with leadership qualities who will be able to make a contribution to Rotary service. I know that President Elect, Ron Phillips has given membership top priority in the forthcoming year and I ask all members to support Ron in lifting our membership numbers in 1991-92 by nominating younger people who will become our leaders in the years to come.

It would be remiss of me if I did not acknowledge the contribution to our Club of two Charter Members and former Presidents who have indicated their resignations effective from 30 June, 1991.

Geoff Clark, Past President 1981-82 and Paul Harris Fellow, and John Etkins, Past President 1982-83 and Paul Harris Fellow both played a significant role in helping members understand what Rotary was all about in our formative second and third years. John also had two stints as Grapevine Editor, including his year as President. We have enjoyed the company of Geoff and Dorothy Clark and John and Johnnie Etkins over eleven years and we have been privileged to have known them as friends. They leave with our love and affection and have on open invitation to visit us at anytime. Shortly the Club will reach another milestone when one of its members, Gregory Ross, will be installed as District Governor of Rotary District 9800 on Saturday, 29 June, 1991. On behalf of the Club I extend to Greg and Carol Ross our good wishes for a happy, successful and rewarding year as they carry out the duties and responsibilities of District Governor.

David Cheney accepted Greg Ross's invitation to be Chairman of the 1992 Conference Committee. The Committee has for the last fifteen months been planning for the "Vintage Conference for Connoisseurs" in March, 1992. I look forward to all members supporting this Conference by their involvement which will make it the most successful District Conference held.

Our Club has continued to be active in the affairs of District through the contributions of eight of our members who have served on District Committees. In this regard, we acknowledge the contributions of Past President, Paul Fitz, Chairman of Group Study Exchange Committee, Past President, David Goldsmith, member of Awards Committee, Rob Head, member of Rotary Youth Programme of Enrichment (RYPEN) Committee, Past President, Stan Hibbert, member of Rotary Foundation Committee - Foundation Contributions, Max Hunter, Chairman of Rotaract Committee and Impact Clubs, Past President, John Reddish, Chairman of Rotary Youth Exchange Committee, Past President, Geoff Steinicke, Chairman of Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA) Committee, and Immediate Past President, Tom Wing Young, a District Governor's Group Representative.

It was great to see the District recognise Paul Fitz's work on the Group Study Exchange Committee over a number of years. He richly deserves the Rotary Foundation District Service Award conferred upon him by District Governor Colin Martin last November.

I would like to thank and congratulate District Governor Colin Martin for his leadership of our District during the past year. He and Dorothy have given themselves unreservedly in Rotary service.

This has been personally a very rewarding and satisfying year; one which I shall always remember. I thank you all for the honour and privilege of serving you as President of this great club.

I particularly want to express my thanks to our wonderful ladies for their continuing support of our Clubs activities which is a special feature of our Club. A big thank you to my wife, Lorna, for her love, encouragement and support throughout the whole year which has made my task that much easier.

To President Ron and June Phillips, I know that the members of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn will support you during your year of office and I trust that you will have as much enjoyment and satisfaction as Lorna and I have had this year. Our best wishes to you both for a great year of Rotary service.



ADMINISTRATION

Has been very routine during the year. The regular monthly meetings of the Board of directors were held as required by the Club By-Laws, plus three Special Meetings called to consider urgent business.

All meetings were well attended, and were held in rotation in the homes of Board Members.

In each of the last two months, combined meetings were held of the current and the incoming Boards to ensure a smooth-changeover of administration from 1st July.

ATTENDANCE

Average weekly attendance of 84% puts the club in 11th position among the 63 clubs in District 980.

In the previous year these figures were 85% and 10th position.

Attendance has been adversely affected by a heavy incidence of leave of absence granted to members who were overseas, had moved interstate, or were out of the area. In these cases, leave is granted on request to protect membership, but does penalise club attendance.

Make-ups are still unsatisfactory, and an improvement should be encouraged.

A pleasing performance is noted from twelve members who achieved 100% attendance for the year.

MEMBERSHIP

After starting the year with 72 members, a negative growth was achieved, taking membership back to where it was some four years ago.

It is estimated that by 30th June there will have been three inductions, and a loss of six, a net loss of three, and final membership of 69.

In the coming year, Membership Development will be looking to each Club Committee to help reverse this downward trend, with emphasis not only on numbers but also on the quality of the new members proposed.

There should still be 15 Charter Members of the original 31 who were Chartered in May, 1980.

PAUL HARRIS FELLOWS

Three new Paul Harris Fellows were named at the Club's Eleventh Birthday Night on Thursday 9th May, 1991 - David Cheney, Max Hunter and John Robson. All three were acknowledgements of their service of the years.

This brings to 18 the total number of P.H.F.'s named by the club since 1984, fourteen being club members.

As well as being a recognition of the service of these members to our club and to District 980, each award has been accompanied by a donation by the club of US\$1,000 to the Rotary Foundation to assist its charitable and educational programs.

THE COMING YEAR - 1991/92

President Elect Ron Phillips will lead the club into its twelfth year when he takes over on 1st July, 1991 - into what promises to be its biggest and most challenging year to date.

First challenge is organising the 1992 District Conference in Adelaide from March 19th to 22nd. That task was accepted when Gregory Ross was elected District Governor Nominee for the 1991/92 year.

Organising and running that Conference is a club commitment which will involve all members in advance, plus most members and their ladies in Adelaide in 1992.

Service on District Committees is another big commitment, last year there were eight members involved and in the coming year this increases to fourteen. For all those involved this is an additional load to carry while they are still serving on club committees.

It is necessary to maintain Fundraising at present levels to fund our service commitments. In the present economic climate, this will not be easy, and obviously we shall all have to accept a greater participation in seeking sponsors for the Hole in One in November 1991.

It will not be a dull year.

SUMMARY

Congratulations to President Ralph on a busy and most successful year.

In thanking the members of the Administration Committee for their help over the year I would particularly acknowledge Anthony Stokes and David Stockman. Anthony has lightened my load by acting as Minute Secretary at all Board and Special Meetings.

David is retiring from his elected position of Treasurer after three years in that role, preceded by a three year stint as Assistant Treasurer. Congratulations on a job well done, and my thanks for your co-operation and friendship over the years.


SERGEANT

FUND RAISING - HOLE-IN-ONE COMMITTEE REPORT

As can be seen by the attached Financial Statement, the "Hole-In-One" competition organised over two weekends in November, 1990 was successful in raising \$13,622. The major charity recipient was "CAN-TEEN" (for teenage cancer sufferers) to whom a cheque for \$10,000 was handed at a function concluding the event.

The "Niki" car, first prize for the event, was won by Jack Simpson who also won first prize in the 1989 competition. The car had been displayed in Shoppingtown for a fortnight prior to the event.

Unfortunately, the Financial Statement also shows that the profit from the event was down significantly compared to 1989. Reasons for this include:-

- greatly reduced level of sponsorship, no doubt due to the harsh economic climate. Not only was the number of major sponsorships reduced but minors, particularly at the small donor "end" fell dramatically.
- competition fees were less, probably due to the cold southerly winds which blew on three of the four competition days - as well as the hard times.
 - some "one-off" expenditure included in the "Freeway Signs" item to make for easier installation by providing permanent footings.

In spite the "bad news" arising from lower receipts and the inclement weather, there is also good news:

- the event still raised a substantial sum and the gratitude and excitement of the CAN-TEEN recipients present at the closing ceremony will be long remembered.
- involvement of Australian Posters has led to an uprated presentation of signs and provision of a far more satisfactory freeway display installation.
 - the involvement of "celebrities" (led by Steve Vizard, "Uncle Arthur", Collingwood Football Club President and two representatives from Hawthorn Football Club) and their interaction with the CAN-TEEN kids made for a successful and, at times, moving final afternoon presentation ceremony.
- support from the club members in general over the four days of the event and committee members in particular not only over the four days but also in the previous months was readily forthcoming and enthusiastic making the event a highlight of the club's year.

This year's Committee took a new view of Vocational Service putting their major effort into trying to find the best approach to establishing a "Basic Literacy Programme in Small Businesses". Their concept put together by Bob Ballantyne demanded extensive research and resulted in many frustrations while trying to determine the best approach. It was unfortunate that Bob left for Sydney just before contact was made with Heather Haughton and Sue Naylor of VALBEC (Victorian Adult Literacy and Basic Education Council). With Sue's assistance, and that of the Swinburne Basic Workplace Skills Division which she manages, we are now well on the way to establishing the "High Street" model based on businesses in Lexton Road, Box Hill, which may become a Pilot Scheme for Adult Literacy programmes throughout Australia.

There has been immense commitment and effort towards this and Ron Ritter, deserves special mention in carrying through Bob Ballantyne's work and in making David Goldsmith's task of bringing it together easier.

Other efforts have been directed towards offering Vocational Guidance assistance to schools, and attempting to organise Work Experience in the city for country children but regrettably the economic climate has made this difficult.

Speakers on vocational topics have been provided and efforts made to ensure a continuation of vocation related talks from club members.

In the current business climate, the efforts to support one another in our vocations, or when they seem to fall apart, helps us to return to the principles upon which Rotary was established.

One of these students, Chris Rush returned last December and from all accounts had a most rewarding experience and extensive travel in Europe.

The other, Jeremy Smith who left Australia in January is also reporting favourably to the Club of his experiences through his counsellor Anthony Stokes.

Nine applications were received from students for selection as our outgoing student to depart in January 1992 and after an extensive series of interviews Anna Shelley won selection. Anna is currently attending MLC where she is a prefect, vice house captain and house athletics captain. A second of our applicants was successfully placed with another Club in our District.

RYLA AWARD

Rebecca Edwards represented our Club at the RYLA conference held in April and impressed the organisers with her performance. She was pleased to have had the opportunity to participate and felt that she gained much from the course which would be of value in her future studies. RYLA was handled by Maurice Ellis.

SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

Following the exchange with Ruyton school we have learned that students have begun to correspond internationally thereby strengthening the link started by the exchange. David Robertson was involved in this one.

ROTARACT

This year has seen the Rotaract Club working towards major goals which were:-

The outcome has been:-

- . Five inductions this year thereby maintaining membership level;

- . Regular attendance at and reporting at Rotary meetings;



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

The Executive Committee consists of President Ralph Lee, P.E. Ron Phillips, I.P.P. Tom Wing Young, P.E.E. Tony McLean and D.G.N. Gregory Ross with Secretary John Thwaites, and P.P. David Cheney as Chairman.

The General Committee consists of the above, plus Max Hunter, Geoff Steinecke, Gerry Spencer, John Rennie, Russ Fynmore, Stan Hibbert, Greg Matthews and Anthea Mollison.

Regular meetings have been held over the past fifteen months, resulting in decisions being taken as follows:-

Dates - Thursday 19th to Sunday 22nd March 1992 Venue - Adelaide Convention Centre

Already, many aspects of the arrangements have been finalised, including conference registration computer programme, club outfits, preliminary promotional material to clubs; invitations to key note speakers; conference timetables; accommodation; sporting venues; theme; and letterheads.

Early indications lead us to anticipate attendance by 1200-1400 registrants, with emphasis being placed on minimising the costs for attendees.

The previous host club (Balwyn) has been good enough to allow our Chairman to attend their committee meetings, and thus be better prepared to avoid overlooking many of the myriad of details that go to ensuring the conference's success.

Club involvement will be encouraged by each member being assigned to a Conference subcommittee, thus ensuring member input into the Conference's organisation.

In summary, it should be recognised that our club has a well earned reputation for excellence in hosting District functions. It is our committee's intention to further enhance this reputation by hosting the "Vintage Conference for Connoisseurs" in March 1992, and thus fully support D.G. Gregory Ross in his challenging year.


