

It is with pleasure that I present the 20th Annual report of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn.

Before I summarise the events that the Club has participated in this year I would like to thank all members of the Board for their support and dedication to the job during the last twelve months.

ADMINISTRATION

The administration of the Club was in the hands of our tried and true professionals; John Rennie and Bob Woolgar. These two worked together with Anthony Stokes, our Board Minute Secretary and Attendance Officer and P.P Bruce McIver who was the driving force behind our new computer system. One item, which was very pleasing to read, is that our attendance figures have been in the top three of the District. I would like to thank John, Bob, Anthony and Bruce for their support during the year.

FUNDRAISING

Bill Oakley and his team have had a very successful year, which included the Christmas Raffle, and I would like to thank Lindsay Pegg for his great work, and for achieving a profit of \$8,616.

The Grand Prix was again in the capable hands of Terry Keyhoe. This year's result was down due to a new catering arrangement, which depleted our income to \$11,451. Thanks to Terry and his team for their hard work.

Our Charity Golf Day was disappointing due to a number of major sponsors falling by the wayside close to the event. However, it was a very successful social day for the Club. Thanks to Bill and his committee for all their efforts and the preliminary work completed for the Olympic catering venture that will no doubt be a very big money earner for the club next year.

INTERNATIONAL

Barry Cummings and committee have put together our Matching Grant re: Literacy in Thailand. This was funded to the value of \$3,900, the major portion being donated by two of our members.

"Save water, save lives" programme is currently on hold due to political instability in the area.

Hopefully, this project will recommence during the next twelve months.

Thanks to our members Paul Fitz, Tony McLean and Ken Maxfield for taking the role of counsellor for three Ambassadorial Scholars. In the area of ROMAC our club members have played a very significant role having P.P Paul Fitz as National Chairman and P.P David Cheney as Secretary of the Victorian Committee.

Rotary Foundation has not achieved the success I would have liked due to a number of technicalities - I will try to pursue this over the next twelve months. This year I am delighted to report that we have increased our donation to Rotary Foundation to \$85 per head.

Our Exchange Student this year was NILS ANDRIESSEN from Germany and I would like to thank the host parents especially those who answered the call for help after his arrival. They being the Swansons, McBrides, Magors and the Verones.

ACTIVITIES

CLUBMATE ANNUAL REPORT 1999-2000

CLUBMATE

Our club had acquired an IBM notebook computer (IBM Think Pad I Series 1400) and Clubmate software. Clubmate develops member and accounting software for the management of service clubs. Clubmate also delivers district and national packages that integrate multiple club databases. Clubmate has been endorsed and recommended by the Rotary International Technology Task Force as the software to automate Rotary clubs and districts. Twenty (20) clubs in our District 9800 have acquired Clubmate. We have established our member database and have started to record meeting attendance in parallel with our existing paper system. We plan to introduce Clubmate in the new Rotary year (ie. as of 1 July 2000). The member database will need to be extended and checked for accuracy and it is anticipated that one-on-one interviews will commence shortly. Once the Secretary's activities have been properly established, we will then look at proceeding to incorporate the Treasurer's activities. This exercise continues to pose interesting challenges as we continue with the programme to integrate the full range of our club procedures into Clubmate.

CHALLENGE

Challenge is a programme initiated this year that offers help to young people who face a crisis in their lives - be it drug dependence, homelessness, or just alienation from family and friends. During the year, the club joined with The Outdoor Experience (T.O.E) to offer wilderness courses to young people in Boroondara.

The Outdoor Experience is a Jesuit run programme that features a 12 day wilderness course in the Victorian Alps. In the first programme, the young people were taken on a cross country ski trip. They had to carry all their provisions with them - learn how to pitch a tent, how to cook in the open, do basic first aid and cope with knee-high snow. Counsellors from T.O.E accompanied them on this trip and were on hand to talk, give encouragement and to listen. Following the wilderness course a few days recovery, de-briefing and finally a graduation ceremony was held at the T.O.E headquarters in Collingwood.

A successful start to a worthwhile community project for the club.



The budget set for the Fundraising for the year was to raise \$27,000 for the Club Service Account, and \$1,000 for the Club Administration Account. At the time of writing, accounts for the year were not finalised. However, it appears that both these figures will be exceeded for the year. The major fundraising activities for the year were as follows:

CHRISTMAS RAFFLE

Again the major prize for the raffle was a weeks holiday at the French Quarter at Noosa. Some effort was put into preparing promotional signs so that selling of tickets could be undertaken simultaneously from several locations. Selling was started earlier, and more sellers recruited. The resultant \$8,600 net profit was significantly higher than it has been in recent years. Special thanks need to go to Lindsay Pegg for a great effort in coordinating this year's raffle.

QANTAS AUSTRALIAN GRAND PRIX

Our role in the Grand Prix continues to grow. We produce and sell food in three separate roles and places: -

- We provide breakfast each morning for the CAMS officials under an arrangement with the Grand Prix Corporation where we donate half the profit to the Grand Prix's nominated charity - this year Kildonan Child and Family Services.
- 2. We sell to the public under an arrangement with Peter Rowland Catering who have the overall contract to provide the catering at the Grand Prix.
- 3. We provide specific catering required by the Grand Prix Corporation. This year this involved a sausage and orange juice breakfast for 2-3,000 participants in a Walk the Track activity on Sunday morning, and dinner for the CAMS officials on the Saturday night.

In addition to this our Rotaract Club are given a donation of \$750 for washing various official cars. Around 100 members, Rotaractors, partners, family and friends put in over 1000 hours of work to raise approximately \$13,000 for our Club, \$750 for Rotaract and \$2,500 for Kildonan. A special vote of thanks must go to Terry Keyhoe for an incredible effort in bringing together all the diverse strands necessary to make this activity a success.

CHARITY GOLF DAY

Around 30 players enjoyed a great day of golf, which resulted in approximately \$4,500 for club funds. Proceeds were down a little because we were only able to find one major sponsor this year, and the number of players was down from previous years. Thanks to lan Taylor and Jim Studebaker for taking the lions share of the organising.

OLYMPIC FUN RUN

We were given the opportunity at short notice to provide catering for the Olympic Fun Run in November. With no previous experience of the event; and with the date clashing with a major Club fellowship weekend, we nevertheless made a creditable \$1,500 for Club funds. The way is open for us to do this again next year, with the potential to make much more.

Other activities that have contributed to our fundraising this year include the sale of Christmas cakes and puddings; salmon sales; several theatre nights and club raffles, which have netted over \$2,000 for club funds.

CATERING

Catering is increasingly a feature of our fundraising, and we are getting more professional at it. This year we ran a special Hygiene for Food Handlers course at which 20 members and partners gained the food handling qualification. Our expertise is becoming more widely known. The Olympic Fun Run opportunity was a result of this, as is our increasing involvement in the Grand Prix.

Next year we will have the opportunity to participate in catering activities at the Olympic Games in Sydney, and at the Air Show at Geelong in February. These activities should prove great fellowship as well as fundraising activities.

This has proved to be a busy year for fundraising. I thank the members of the Fundraising Committee and the members and friends of the club for their hard work and support during this year.

MATCHING GRANTS

Personal contributions previously made by two members of our Club have now been applied to a Literacy Grant in District 3360 Thailand. Balance of our contribution to the grant was provided from a commitment of \$3000.00 from last year together with an amount budgeted this year. During the year PDG Jack Nankervis spoke to the Club on Literacy and Numeracy activities.

INTERNATIONAL HOUSE

The Club has had no involvement with International House this year but plans are in place for a Club visit in early 2000/2001.

INTERNATIONAL PROJECTS / ROTARY VOLUNTEERS

The tank funded by North Balwyn under "Save Water Save Lives" has now been installed. It was anticipated that Club members would become involved as volunteers in a RAM (Rotary Against Malaria) project in the Solomon Islands. Due to an unstable political situation the project was relocated to a different Province and as a consequence will not now be commenced before June 2000, but we did make a contribution of \$1000.00 toward the completion of a Microscopist Health Centre House. PDG John Reddish has had major involvement with RAM including attendance at a World Health Organisation Conference in Geneva. \$1269.00 raised from a Wine Auction was provided as aid for the Turkish Earthquake Disaster.

MEDICAL SUPPLIES TO THE SOLOMONS

Through the continued direct efforts of Nino Sofra supplies of medical goods have been sent this year.

ROTARY AUSTRALIA WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE (RAWCS)

Apart from proposals for volunteers as mentioned above, annual contributions to RAWCS have been received from most of our members.

AMBASSADORIAL SCHOLARS

Three of our members, Tony McLean, Paul Fitz and Ken Maxfield acted as Counsellors for incoming scholars. Anita Kishore and Anthony Cutter from USA, Alexandra Seele from Germany, sponsored by North Balwyn and Hanuki Makio from Japan sponsored by Balwyn have addressed the Club. While an expression of interest from a potential outgoing scholar was received it did not result in an application.

ROMAC

Barry Cooper of the Rotary Club of Kangaroo Flat and Murray Stapleton (Surgeon) provided a most interesting address to the Club.

The ROMAC Concert was well supported by members of the Club.

Club members Paul Fitz and David Cheney are involved on National and District Committees respectively.

ROTARY FOUNDATION CONTRIBUTIONS

The Committee budget included an amount of \$5000 which is approximately \$62 per member. It has been recommended to the Board that this amount be increased but pending assessment of funds available a decision as to the contribution to be made is yet to be finalised.

The "Top Spin" Tennis fundraiser for Foundation was quite successful in spite of the number of raffles at the time, including our own Christmas Raffle. As a result of our efforts \$976.00 of tickets were sold.

STUDENT EXCHANGE

This year responsibility for Student Exchange was moved from Youth to International. This years inward student Nils Andriessen from Germany, with Counsellor Greg Adams, and Lyndel Hopkins as our outward student to Norway with Ian Mollison as Counsellor. Due to difficulties in obtaining host families it was decided to defer our next inward student until January 2001 and not to send an outward student next year.

A Committee has been formed to seek out potential host families. There seems to be a lack of interest in Student Exchange and it will be necessary for some concerted action next year to redress this problem.

Host parents during this year were, George & Anita Swanson, John & Jill McBride, John & Elaine Magor and Frank & Marilyn Verone. Thanks to these members and their wives for helping us out of a very difficult situation.

The following will give some idea of the projects undertaken by this very active and committed group.

BUSINESS BOROONDARA

We and other branches of Rotary International combined with City of Boroondara, Swinburne University and Jobs East to set up a group to assist small business in our area to form support networks. Business Boroondara was successfully launched on 1 Sept. 1999 and was attended by 250 local businesses. We have offered our assistance and look forward to further involvement next year.

OPERATION LIVEWIRE.

Once again mentors from our club were involved in supporting two groups of young people to create business plans for new businesses. One proposed an internet café/training centre while the other was involved with designer labels. Despite (or thanks to) advice from our mentors, neither proceeded to the next level.

RIO TINTO NATIONAL YOUTH SCIENCE FORUM (Fortnight in Canberra with accommodation travel and tours fully funded for Yr11 students)

Once again we processed a large number of excellent applicants and advanced two to District. Unfortunately neither was successful at District level. One was a particularly gifted, visually-impaired student. Further contact with his school resulted in our donating a video-flex camera to assist him in seeing all that other students could see.

Interviews for the next Forum were conducted on June7 2000. Perhaps we will have better luck next year.

SIEMENS SUMMER SCIENCE SCHOOL (Fortnight program in various Universities in Melb.) Once again we supported this Program by paying for two students to attend.

VOCATIONAL VISIT

Members were provided with information on the Stock Exchange in a very professional presentation by experts from JB Were.

JOB TALKS

These were presented under a different format, with groups of speakers on different nights. As usual, these talks were numbered amongst our best for the year.

JOB INTERVIEW TECHNIQUES

As part of Careers Week at a local school we provided a program to assist year 10 students in improving their skills in applying for jobs and in subsequent interviews with potential employers. Students were advised on how to optimise their chances of being "short listed" and were then supplied with mock advertisements for jobs in their particular areas of interest. A week later, they were called in for a simulated interview and their applications discussed.

Y2K PROJECT

Our committee did all in its power to kill "The Bug". Articles were regularly placed in the Grapevine. The transition to 2000 was quite painless, perhaps due to the preparatory work put in by our members.

SHINE-ON AWARDS






