PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT 2000-2001

At the beginning of this Rotary year, we set ourselves some objectives.

In brief, these related to - membership growth, contribution to community needs, helping youth, raising funds, building excitement in our Rotary meetings, giving the club a higher profile, completing the club history and introducing some new projects.

The plan for the year was optimistic - the introduction of 9 special project committees meant that we were going to be very busy. And busy we were.

I'm pleased to report that we achieved most of the objectives we set for ourselves.

In reviewing all the projects the club has run, it's obvious we made a difference in the community. We made a difference to the lives of so many people here in Boroondara, in Melbourne, in Victoria, in Australia and overseas.

So if we can sum up the year in a few words - We made a Difference.

We made a difference to the 14 young underprivileged children we took on our Climb the Mountain weekend at Mt. Buller. Luke who was one of the most disruptive kids you could imagine, surprised everybody with a letter of thanks to Nino Sofra.

We made a difference to the children at Boroondara Primary School when we built a propagating frame so they could learn how plants grow.

We made a difference to Grant Morrow from the Disabled Scouts and Henry Nissen from Emerald Hill Mission who received our Community Awards.

The Eva Tilley Fete where North Balwyn helped with goods for the white elephant stall and helped with the barbecue. We made a difference to the lives of the elderly at Eva Tilley

We made a difference to the lives of needy families in Boroondara with our donation of \$2,000 to their Xmas parcels.

We made a difference to the lives of the young people who attended the RYLA, RYPEN and MUNA programmes.

During the year, we made donations totalling \$13,200 to the Royal Childrens Hospital, Asthma Victoria, Cystic Fibrosis, and the Starlight Foundation. We can imagine the difference this will make to the people who call on these organizations for help.

Earlier this month our Challenge project got underway - a 10 week programme with three Boroondara schools to try and improve the attitudes of 8 young people with behavioural problems. We hope to make a difference in their lives.

As a club, we continue to support the Variety Club Xmas Party with 15-20 North Balwyn Rotarians under the leadership of Phil Francis helping to entertain the children, all of them suffering from physical or mental disorders.

We have been a regular contributor to the Portsea Camp and through the excellent help from Ron Liner, we have been able to upgrade buildings and facilities that will benefit the hundreds of children who use the camp every year.

Late last month North Balwyn Rotary again helped with the Salvation Army's Red Shield Appeal and collected over \$2,000.

We are sharing the funding of a new house with the Child and Family Care Network to the tune of \$50,000. This will be used to house on a temporary basis up to 8 young people who are in desperate need of accommodation.

We continue to support Camp Getaway and we hope it will be chosen as the main beneficiary of next year's Grand Prix. This will result in a massive increase in financial aid to Camp Getaway.

North Balwyn's influence has made a difference overseas.

We donated \$2,000 towards a container for East Timor.

With a New Opportunities grant of US\$4,000, we are funding a 3 month educational trip to Australia for a Chinese anaesthetist.

North Balwyn attended the recent ROMAC concert in big numbers - helping to raise funds to bring overseas children suffering from facial and limb malformation to Australia for surgery.

We sponsored Alexis to the recent GSE team visiting Brittany in France.

And we are helping to improve Brazil/Australian relations through our Exchange student Dioga Moraes.

We donated \$2,000 towards the expenses of a study tour of Russia to our National Science student Samira Afrisiabi.

North Balwyn Rotary certainly made a difference beyond Australia.

I thank the Board for their co-operation and their excellent contribution to the running of the club this year.

Ron Phillips, my Vice president and Chairman of the Special Project Committees. Ron has been my counsel on so many matters during the year and his experience and advice has been of great value - thank you Ron

John Rennie, club secretary has again done a very important job for the club and has handled correspondence, Board Agenda and Minutes and the weekly follow-ups that every secretary is required to do very competently. - Thank you John.

Lindsay Pegg our Club Treasurer had to fill in for Bob Woolgar earlier than expected. But he has fitted into his new role so easily and his co-operative nature will be a great help to Terry next year. Thank you Lindsay for your help.

The task of minute secretary for our Board Meetings has been very well handled by Anthony Stokes - thank you Anthony.

John Magor, Chairman of Club Service. John said he had the easiest job on the Board, and at times I agreed with him it was because he had so many good Rotarians under him looking after specific responsibilities. John's contribution to the organisation of our 21st Birthday night and the Changeover Night have been invaluable - Thank you John.

Rob Head handled the Vocational portfolio very professionally and provided the club with a very interesting programme for the year. One of the highlights being a club visit to Colonial Stadium - Thank you Rob

Jane Pennington carried on with her Community Service programme introducing a lot of interesting projects with a strong Boroondara focus - thank you Jane

Hugo Goetze approached his International Service responsibility this year with his usual fervour and dedication. He gave North Balwyn a very strong involvement in overseas projects that will provide a good basis for the next international chairman - thank you Hugo.

Bill Oakley and New Generations were a good combination this year. His programmes included RYPEN, RYLA, MUNA and YOUTH EXCHANGE and he and his committee did an excellent job - thank you Bill.

Ian Adams had the responsibility to raise funds for all our projects this year and despite some disappointments has done a magnificent job. The Olympic Games, the Grand Prix, The Fun Run, The Xmas Raffle, the Werribee Park Horse Trials all were organised with the help of a

hardworking committee. Can I make a special mention of the team that organised the Olympic Games so well - Bob Adams, Bill Oakley, George Selkrig Terry Keyhoe - thank you lan

Some individual Rotarians deserve special recognition for their efforts this year.

Rowan McLean for his excellent publicity and building good relations with the Progress Press - thank you Rowan.

Jim Romanis and a hardworking fellowship committee for some great fellowship events during the year - thank you Jim.

Our Golf Day has become a real fixture in our fundraising calendar and is always so well organised by Ian Taylor - thank you Ian.

While not part of his brief, our almoner keeps us smiling with some of his jokes but at the same time keeps us up to date with who is not so well - thank you Don.

And although he thinks he comes in second as far as jokes are concerned sergeant Dick Johnson is out on his own when it comes to extracting money in fines - thank you Dick.

Our programmes of guest speakers have been the responsibility of Findley Cornell and Bruce McIver and they have provided a tremendous variety across the twelve months - thank you Findley and Bruce.

Our attendance records and the sheets ready for the Rotarians on the attendance desk have been supplied by Mr Reliable himself - Ron Carnell - thank you Ron. And Ron continued on with his radio programme which has become a tradition in the club. It has helped in establishing his nickname of "Radio Ron".

Ken Maxfield maintained a close relationship with our Rotaract club and gave a lot of time helping them build their membership - Thank you Ken.

John Thwaites has handled Rotary Foundation with his usual attention to detail - his last letter to the club members only going out in the last three weeks - Thank you John.

John Reddish for his leadership on the Horizons Committee - our club think tank. A number of initiatives have been discussed first at the Horizons committee and his experience has been invaluable in their development - Thank you John.

GSE is very much in the minds of North Balwyn Rotarians and Tony McLean has contributed to our GSE knowledge during the year. Thank you Tony

And finally to our President Elect Terry Keyhoe for his organization and control of the club's attendance at the District Conference. Thank you Terry. The club had 38 attendees at the Conference. This is always a great fellowship event. A small group had some post conference R&R at Merimbula.

District asked the club to organise a welcome for the bike riders for their arrival at the Convention Centre. Peter Elliot was able to organize a great banner and the welcome was well attended by North Balwyn Rotarians as well as PRI President, Royce Abbey, DG Des Jones and ADG John Edmonds.

North Balwyn won three awards at the District Conference. One of these was for membership development and we have to thank our membership chairman for this result - thank you Richard Dalla Riva for all your work on membership this year.

In District terms, North Balwyn was part of the Burke Cluster Group under the leadership of Assistant District Governor, John Edmonds. This group functioned very well with the presidents of the group getting together at the PETS Seminar, at the District Conference and socially during the year. The Burke Cluster included Balwyn, North Balwyn, Camberwell, Kew, Kew on Yarra, Canterbury, North Camberwell.

North Balwyn also appreciated the support of District Governor Des Jones who visited the club with his wife Beryl on four occasions during the year.

Our Special Project Chairmen introduced some new projects to the club this year.

Frank Varone conducted a successful environmental project with the Boroondara Primary School - thank you Frank

Last year Greg Matthews arranged for the club to join with the Child and Family Care Network to help fund the building a new home in Balwyn for young people needing accommodation. This is now entering the building stage and could be completed by next year - thank you Greg

Geoff Steinicke has been working very hard with schools in Boroondara to get our Challenge programme up and running. Earlier this month, the programme got underway and we look forward to hearing the results in three months time - thank you Geoff.

At our last meeting Paul Fitz on behalf of the club was able to make awards to two worthy community identities - Henry Nissen who runs the Emerald Hill Mission and Grant Morrow who looks after the disabled scouts in North Balwyn - thank you Paul.

One of the most significant meetings we've held this year has been our 21st birthday - so many members contributed to its success - Judy Reddish & June Phillips for the magnificent photographic panels which traced the history of the club, our Village People, our Lillie Marlene group, our Centenary of Federation group our past members and our District representatives. But perhaps one member should be credited with the success of the night and that's Greg Ross It's a night that will be talked about well into the future.

During the year we recognised two members as Paul Harris Fellows - Bruce McIver and Ian Taylor - bringing our total for the club to 52.

We inducted 8 new members during the year - Ann Kerr, Graeme Bird, Gavan Swartz, Jenny Ryan, Len Dean, Richard Johns, John Waldie & Michael Barden. We lost four Rotarians through resignation - Bob Ballantyne, Eldin Dixon, Frank Libman and Bob Woolgar.

It was with extreme sadness that we said goodbye to Helen Robertson who passed away in May.

The Club recognised the special efforts of three North Balwyn Rotarians during the year. A certificate of appreciation was awarded to John Gartlan for an excellent Grapevine.

Another certificate was awarded to Nino Sofra for his efforts in running the very successful Climb The Mountain project.

The Ron Carnell Presidents Trophy for 2001/2002 was presented to David Goldsmith for his great effort in writing and publishing the club's first history.

Finally can I say how much easier the task of president has been made through the support of my wife Anthea. She has been an excellent sounding board and dare I admit it the source of many new ideas.

And my final thanks go to you the members of North Balwyn. Firstly for your faith that I could do the job and secondly in your good humour your co-operation and your enthusiasm and commitment that you showed in everything we've done this year.

I wish Terry Keyhoe a great year for 2001-2002. I know he will continue the great tradition at North Balwyn and lead the club for another successful 12 months.

Compared to the previous year, the numbers on committee were reduced along with the move of Foundation, Ambassadorial Scholars and Youth or Student Exchange to other committees. Due to the utter devastation and hence urgent need, the focus this year was on helping the East Timorese. Volunteer work on the Solomon Islands in support of RAM did not eventuate due to the unrest there.

Dinner Meeting Speakers

There were five meetings at which the speaker's topic or report was of significance to avenues of International Service.

<u>3rd August</u>: Charlie Barnett of RC of Mossman reported on their Vietnamese Helping Hand project which is run in conjunction with St Luke's Hospital, Potts Point, and our club's planned involvement in the microsurgery training of a Vietnamese hand surgeon at St Vincent's. <u>24th August</u>: John Stevens - District Chairman for Rebuilding East Timor, and Jackie Robertson of RC of Maribyrnong Highpoint spoke of Jackie's reconnoitrer of East Timor and their needs. <u>26th October</u>: Our Bob Woolgar spoke on the culture and life style in Mongolia observed during his visits there to advise on corporate accounting and auditing.

<u>19th April</u>: Our John Reddish spoke as Zone 8 Coordinator for Rapid Response by Rotary to Disaster Relief, together with of Rhys Maggs from the S.E.S. and Gordon Birch from RC of Eltham who demonstrated his club's very practical contribution, the Aquabox. "Rotary should provide rapid follow-up humanitarian support, whilst leaving the front-line response to professionals whose work might be hindered rather than helped by the immediate presence of amateurs".

<u>17th May</u>: Dr Leonie Griffiths spoke on Medicine in Southern India after her visit there as a member of an Equal Health Medical team. The most significant differences in available resources and treatment were highlighted.

RAWCS

Donations In Kind

In August we donated \$2,000 as payment of half the cost of moving a shipping container to Dili. In response to the Rotary Club of Glenferrie's appeal for sewing machines and sewing requisites we collected and forwarded some six machines, including one from Helen Robertson. In May through Gaven Schwartz we moved an industrial sewing machine directly to the DIK warehouse.

Also in May, Greg Matthews was approached for donations of fasteners for several of the East Timor building projects.

Rotary Volunteers

Initially we had planned to join our cluster clubs in sending a FAIM type team to either East Timor or the Solomon Islands, however personal safety considerations have precluded such ventures. The annual \$2 donation in exchange for the dinner badge sticker, resulted in a cheque for \$154 being forwarded to RAWCS District Chairman Garry Gunnell.

ROMAC

The Romac Committee held a concert during the year featuring Roger Woodward, Caroline O'Connor and Pot Pouri. North Balwyn supported this concert and helped the Romac Committee raise funds for overseas children with facial and limb deformities to be brought to Australia for surgery.

Rebuilding East Timor

We made a donation of \$ 2,000 for a share in one of the District coordinated projects - the Mabaura Orphanage. District are asking for \$ 40,000 to start this project which involves moving the overcrowded orphanage to a new site with secure title and an adequate all year water supply. The new buildings will house 100 children, an isolation ward for TB infected children, a clinic and a school. To be self sufficient in some food, a fish farm and chicken pens are also to be built.

International Awareness

International Toasts have been proposed to clubs where members have visited while traveling or working overseas. These two to three minute presentations are going well and with the large number of members who have made such visits, these toasts should continue.

Foundation New Opportunities Grant

In July we applied for and after many months were granted A New Opportunities Grant, which was funded from District Designated Funds. We set up a budget for \$US 4,000 to bring out a Vietnamese Hand Surgeon for a three month Study Fellowship in microsurgery under Assoc. Prof. Wayne Morrison of St Vincent's Hospital. Unfortunately the project was cancelled late last year, from the Vietnamese end. Rather than cancel this Rotary project, we transferred the grant with Foundation permission to a Chinese Anaesthetist from Guangzhou to extend his knowledge of anaesthesia for cardiac surgery and teaching methods. This was arranged through the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons, Project China, and Dr Peng will study at Royal Melbourne Hospital. Although due to start on 4th June, the visit is being delayed due to the complexies of Australia's visa and health check processes.

Maria Moffatt chaired the District RYPEN committee during the year. Two RYPEN courses were conducted, and the club sent two candidates to each course. The reports back to our club indicate that RYPEN makes a valuable contribution to the personal development of these young people who are around year 10.

ROTARACT

The past year has been a difficult one for our Rotaract club. A number of the stronger members had to leave because they reached Rotaract retirement age or because they moved away from Melbourne.

Numbers declined to about 8 active members. However it is pleasing to note that as the year finishes, a number of new members have joined. The Rotaract committee is full of enthusiasm and is planning an active programme for the coming year.

Particular mention must be made of the tremendous effort put into supporting the Rotaract Club by Ken Maxfield in his role as Rotaract liaison person. Continued contact and support from Rotary is a major factor in the developing and maintaining the strength of Rotaract.

INTERNATIONAL YOUTH EXCHANGE

During the year the club welcomed our new exchange student Diogo Guerra Esteves de Moraes from Brazil - known affectionately as "Joe". Diogo is a fine young man who has made himself liked by all in the club, particularly by those who have been his host parents. He is keen to try anything new and has been very supportive of club activities. As a fundraising effort, he participated in a group which cycled from Melbourne to Sydney to attend the District Conference.

The club also welcomed home our most recent Australian exchange student - Lyndal Hopkins who has spent a year in Norway. Lyndal gave a very interesting presentation on her experience to the club, demonstrating the poise and self confidence she has gained through her exchange visit. It is clear that she has proved to be a superb ambassador for Australia during her time overseas.

The club owes particular thanks to all host parents and to Ian Mollison and Nino Sofra, counsellors for Lyndal and Diogo.


MODEL UNITED NATIONS (MUNA)



PUBLIC RELATIONS ANNUAL REPORT 2000-2001

Public Relations for a Rotary Club is not an easy task. There are many competing clubs, all doing worthwhile things, and the mainstream press show little interest in "good news" unless it has a very unusual angle. Community/ local press is more sympathetic, but still receives a large number of items considered worthy by the contributors but less so by the editor.

Rotary World, Rotary Down Under, Rotagram and other Rotary publications are perhaps the easiest with which to have success in this media hierarchy, but could be accused of "preaching to the converted" when the main PR mission should be to inform the public, create awareness about Rotary and what it does and generate interest in membership. We do need to promote our club within the Rotary community, and these media are appropriate for that purpose.

Unique high profile activities such as our work at the Grand Prix are more likely to attract media interest than something like a golf day, regardless of the fact that proceeds are going to a worthy cause.

I was blessed this year with the unusual asset of the Sydney Olympic Games, and an active role by RCNB. We achieved excellent coverage for this event. At the beginning of President John Mollison's year, I arranged for the two of us to meet with the editor of the Progress Press and discuss forthcoming events of interest.

The press made it clear that they prefer active small group or individual photographs of something being done - they do not like large group shots, cheque handovers or people shaking hands. They like multiple Rotary Club involvement in projects. It is also much better from a news point of view to have a financial objective/ beneficiary for each project than to lump revenue into general club funds.

The local press are unlikely to be available outside business hours and are time and cost conscious - they will not always provide a photographer so we should offer an alternative through our own resources.

Stories/items submitted this year have included:

Reports on the Olympic Games (before, during and after the event), The Grand Prix, our two hosted exchange students, Climb the Mountain, The East Timor project, our NYS student to Russia, Ron Carnell's Rotary Hour, Olympics Volunteers (Max walker's new Book in the International Year of Volunteers) and a bereavement notice for Helen Robertson.

Recommendations

Meet the Press - develop a relationship for the President with the Editor of at least the local newspaper, court one or two journalists, and invite journalists to our Club meeting early in the year (perhaps as guest speaker).

Meet the Progress press photographer and get some tips for us to provide supplementary shots during the year. Co-ordinate photography and PR item writing activities better.

Insist that people responsible always write 2 or 3 paragraphs on projects or events. These will be useful for short-term PR and for the Club history longer term.

President John had a vision to take a group of young "At Risk" people in need of direction on a spiritual journey symbolised by the climbing of a mountain, setting certain challenges for them and providing mentor support to create trust and confidence.

After a couple of false starts we eventually took three mini buses loaded with Rotarians & partners, Rotoractors, Facilitators and 14 teenagers up to Mt Buller, camping, for 2 nights and 3 days.

Our team approached this new adventure with great enthusiasm, idealism and some preconceived ideas of what teenagers are like. Most of the enthusiasm was exhausted after the first day along with the idealism and preconceived ideas.

The 'kids' were something else. They did not respond well to any of the structured activities, but were great when we organized a volley ball game in which the majority of the camp participated. Some of the other activities that the kids enjoyed greatly were, swimming in the mountain stream, climbing the top of Mt Buller in the clouds and bush walking.

It was during these activities that the kids started to open up, knowing something of their home lives and backgrounds explained much of their behaviour.

On returning to Melbourne several of the kids approached me to thank us for the weekend and 3 of them also apologised for their behaviour over the weekend. Since then I have received a thank-you letter from one of the kids, as well as thanks from several of the welfare workers who sent the kids to us. The Rotoractors in our team have plans to send 3 of these kids to Rypen.

Whilst 3 days in the bush is not going to turn around the lives of these young people, I do believe that it is a start that we could build on. Of the 14 that came along 12 asked that we invite them along to the next camp we run.

I would like to take the opportunity to thank Maria Moffat, Bill Oakley and Bev (Sofra) for their organisational help and expertise. George Selkrig for his help and all the brave Rotarians and helpers who gave of their time to be with these kids and help look after them.



Throughout the past twelve months the environment committee has been working with Boroondara Park Primary School on several environmental projects. The aim of the projects was to make primary school children more aware and more responsible for the environment.

Planned projects included the development and construction and of an Environmental enclosure.

This construction will provide students with a dedicated facility where they can study and gain a better understanding of nature. The facility will be used for planting and propagation of a wide variety of plants.

Following the Club's board funding approval, this project launched the first phase of the School's environment program.

On Saturday the fifth of May this year, North Balwyn Rotary Club members took part in a major "parents" working bee where Rotarians focused on the construction of the Environment enclosure.

Members worked closely with Mr. Neil Wilson the person appointed by the School committee to supervise works, he provided project plans and Co-ordinated the construction of racks, shelves and storage facilities for students to use as part of this learning activity.

Neil also organised tasks and directed people to different work teams to ensure project flowed smoothly.

Another project called "Flying colours" is planned.

This is an innovative project which will encourages students to study of Butterflies, gather data like size, colour, wing shapes, and habits of many different species. The study involves growing a variety of Butterflies and establishing appropriate ecological environments.

The school is also planning to re-activate a program called Greening Australia.

This is re-vegetation project along the Eastern Freeway near an area where Carron Street and Wilburton Parade merge. This will re-activate a project, which started in 1997 involving the North Balwyn rotary Club and we look forward to once again taking part in this project.

The environment committee has looked at all the school's proposals and all members agree that the projects which have been started and those planned for the future are worthwhile and will provide the basis for a good environmental education for young children in our area.
