Rotary's Wheel Emblem

A wheel has been the symbol of Rotary since our earliest days. The first design was made by Chicago Rotarian Montague Bear, an engraver who drew a simple wagon wheel, with a few lines to show dust and motion. The wheel was said to illustrate "Civilization and Movement". Most of the early clubs had some form of wagon wheel on their publications and letterheads. Finally, in 1922, it was decided that all Rotary clubs should adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians. Thus in 1923, the present gear wheel, with 24 cogs and six spokes was adopted by the "Rotary International Association". A group of engineers advised that the geared wheel was mechanically unsound and would not work without a "keyway" in the centre of the gear to attach it to a power shaft. So, in 1923 the keyway was added and the design which we now know was formally adopted as the official Rotary International emblem.

North Balwyn Rotary has more than lived up to the inspirational words of Bichai in that both Fellowship and Service this year have been outstanding, making 2002-3 a stellar year. When Rotary was first formed it was for the purpose of fellowship, as at that stage Service was not on the agenda. For this reason we have given much prominence to fellowship this year, with the introduction of informal "get togethers" at members' houses. Attendance at meetings has been excellent and the enjoyment of members has been well illustrated by their reluctance to leave at the close of meeting, particularly on partners' nights! Sergeant David Cheney has set the tone of meetings from his introductory remarks. Members have kept the fun level high and Guest Speakers have been outstanding.

On the Service side, we have tried to introduce new projects to not only raise money but importantly to provide fellowship. Thus the Fundraising Committee introduced a wine-bottling, old-fashioned film night and Camberwell Market stall. The Best of British night, in conjunction with the Australian Pops Orchestra was an excellent fundraising effort towards Polio eradication, as well as great entertainment. The Fellowship Committee reintroduced the Concert Party concept into our Birthday Night, thus providing a great night of hilarity.

When I conducted our Planning Day last May, I asked all committees to introduce at least one new project for the year. All willingly took this request on board and have put a great deal of planning into such projects, many of which are ready to go in the next year. These include 'Sounding Board', which provides advice and support for small business people, a RAWCS (Rotary Australia World Community Service) project involving 8 of our members in helping to refurbish a hospital in Vanuatu which was destroyed by a hurricane, a plan to develop a community area in the North Balwyn Village in conjunction with Boroondara Council as part of RI's 100th Birthday celebration in 2005, a major family bike ride and the hosting of country children from the drought stricken areas and a community computer centre.

Activities from all our committees can be found in the reports from Directors but special mention should be made of the completion of our largest fundraising project to date - the building of our house for homeless youth, to which we committed \$50,000 and possibly more than that in furniture, furnishings and fittings from members and friends. This was a spectacular achievement for which our Club owes a debt of gratitude to PP Greg Matthews for his dedication and hard work and to PP John Mollison and PP Terry Keyhoe who made sure that money was reserved to complete this project.

Special mention should also be made of the outstanding contribution from all members towards Foundation and, in particular, to the eradication of polio world-wide. Our Club was set a target of \$125 per member for Polio Eradication plus \$115 per member for other Foundation commitments. In total we were asked for \$240 per member, a total of \$20,400 dollars. When first approached by District, I accepted the target with apprehension as, in the past, we have found it difficult to allocate \$100 per member. The incentive of matching contributions from RI, Government, World Bank and the Gates Foundation, as well as the appreciation of the great work being done, resulted in us being able to more than fulfil our target for Polio Plus and pay our target amount in full. We are also very thankful to the wonderful efforts of some members in making personal donations and in obtaining excellent donations from church friends and Trusts.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank certain people who have given special service to the Club this year. In particular I must mention the outstanding contribution of our Sergeant PP David Cheney, who has not only provided his unique doggerel to introduce his embarrassed President and conducted hugely profitable "fines" sessions but has been in personal touch with all members on duty with duties outlined, has produced detailed "running sheets" well in advance of each meeting and has answered every request from me (no matter how demanding) with alacrity and good humour. He also took on the main responsibility of revising our By-Laws, a huge task involving about 10 drafts. When the final document was offered to help another President, a solicitor from that club remarked that to change it "would be like drawing a moustache on the Mona Lisa"! It gives me great pleasure therefore to present David with the President's Award for 2002-3.

Also worthy of mention is our amazingly efficient Secretary Jane Pennington, who has gone out of her way to assist me. Again, any request has been carried out very efficiently and advice has been happily given when requested.

Frequent laudatory comment has been made on the speakers provided for our meetings. These have been excellent and have covered a very wide range of endeavour. For this we must thank John Gartlan who has a very large list of contacts.

Treasurer Lindsay Pegg has done an amazingly efficient job as Treasurer. He has gained an excellent overview of our finances, has introduced documentation which guarantees responsible use of our money and has always been available to offer advice.

The Grapevine has taken on a very professional look under Delina Schembri-Hardy and is the envy of many other clubs. Delina has been very understanding in extending deadlines to allow for the presidential recalcitrance. Despite constant computer problems in dissemination, Delina and Gavan Schwartz have fought the good fight and with Dick Johnson's assistance look like winning.

PP Terry Keyhoe is a man of ideas who, with his very efficient and pragmatic partner PP Ron Phillips, convinced the Australia Pops Orchestra to provide incentives for us to buy tickets for a concert to aid polio plus (see above) and also involved the Cluster Clubs in contributing, thus encouraging inter-club cooperation.

Our club is very indebted to Gavan Schartz and his staff for the use of his school and staff room every month for our Board Meetings.

There are, of course many others who are worthy of recognition and I hope this will be given in other areas of this report. If not, please accept my apology and my thanks for what you have done. I am well aware of all the wonderful things done by members this year and I have tried to recognise these in my President's Message each week, which I have made a "recognition" session.

Mention must be made of our Rotaract Club which, under Sarnia, has had a very successful year. Due to the efforts of many members and, in particular John McBride, our Club was awarded the District shield for Rotary - Rotaract cooperation. Despite being again defeated in the annual ten-pin bowling challenge by our talented team, Rotaract have remained defiant and will again challenge next year for the Greg (Grizzly) Adams trophy.

Our Almoner, John Magor took his duties to a new level this year, not only in keeping in touch with members in trouble but particularly in giving comfort and very real and ongoing assistance to the family of our deceased member Greg Adams.

On a happier note it gave me great pleasure to present Paul Harris Fellows to Bill Oakley, Dick Johnson, John Gartlan and Areta Hurnard and a multiple (Sapphire) to PP David Cheney. They were very well deserved awards for excellent service to Rotary.

In conclusion may I thank our Board for their outstanding commitment to our Club and for their unswerving loyalty to their fellow Board members and myself. My thanks, also, to every member for your support throughout the year - comments have always been positive and confirming.

Of course my undying gratitude must be reserved for my long-suffering wife Erin for her good humoured assistance at stressful times during the year and for always "being there".

I thank the Club for showing enough faith in me to provide the opportunity to serve you as President this year. It has been a unique opportunity which I have thoroughly enjoyed. I wish Brian a successful year and guarantee him my full support.

As a Past President, I am now "the font of all knowledge" and am happy to share this with anyone who cares to listen.

Thanks for helping to "Sow the Seeds of Love" in 2002-3.




GREG ADAMS



It is a pleasure to report that this year's Vocational Service Committee enjoyed wonderful Rotary fellowship whilst fulfilling the majority of its goals and putting in place the firm foundations for initiatives, which will be either completed in the near term and/or continuing in the future.

Job Talks

Nino Sofra headed up the Job Talks team and arranged for a number of our members to speak on their wide-ranging vocations. This activity enlightened all members on different vocations but also enabled our Club members to have a better appreciation and understanding of the varied occupations held by our members.

District Shine On Awards

Our Club had three nominations for the District Shine On Awards this year. Thelma Wright did a great job in sourcing the candidates from the Royal Institute for the Blind (Victoria). Two of the three nominees spoke to the Club before the awards ceremony in Kilmore. Thelma Wright and Jim Studebaker attended the award ceremony and each of our candidates was highly recognised. The ceremony was a moving event with our own David Goldsmith still taking an active part and supporting his son as prime sponsor of the Shine On Awards.

Vocational Visit

Initiatives

1. Internet Centre

The Vocational Committee undertook to get two initiatives established during the year. The first was to establish a fully equipped computer and internet centre to instruct senior citizens in the use of computers and, more particularly, in the use of the internet and the application of email. The computer centre is located at the North Balwyn Community House on Doncaster Road. At the time of the writing of this report, John Magor, Nino Sofra and Neil Ramsay had arranged for the accommodation of the computers, drawn floor plans for the computer room, arranged for instructors from Probus, located computers through the District computer contact and are close to arranging the operating software. Desks, chairs and modem connections are all that remain to fully complete the project. My thanks to

John, Nino and Neil for sticking to the project over the past few months and I hope that the computer project will be commissioned before the end of June.

2. Executive Bank (Sounding Board)

The second new initiative undertaken was to form an 'Executive Bank'. Executive Bank will comprise a group of members with business skills who would make themselves available to mentor small businesses in our local community. It was felt, that with the breadth and depth of executive talent residing in the members of our Club, a vehicle should be created to harness and focus that talent. Geoff Bell picked up this project with gusto and has since formed a sub-committee with Duncan Ansell and David Morris to formulate an action plan ready for execution later this year. The sub-committee has been meeting regularly this year and I would like to give special thanks to Geoff Bell for his organisational skills and his passion for this project. Executive Bank has been recently renamed 'Sounding Board' to more properly reflect its purpose. Geoff will be continuing this project next year and I know he will make a great success of Sounding Board, which will be a model programme that can be replicated to other clubs and other districts.

My thanks to all committee members for their work and support during the year. Special thanks to members and their partners for hosting our monthly meetings.

The committee has had an enjoyable and successful Rotary year, meeting twelve times during the year. I thank the Rotarians for their active participation and for making their homes available for our meetings and the hospitality that followed our meetings.

Our committee set a goal of undertaking two new projects for this Rotary year.

RAWCS - Rotary Australia World Community Service - Project Volunteers

We decided to examine the possibility of our Club being involved in a RAWCS – Project Volunteers. Bernie Smith accepted the task of finding a suitable project. After reviewing a number of projects, the committee accepted the Vanuatu Hospital Refurbishment Project to be undertaken by a team comprising Club Rotarians who indicated their desire to represent the Club in this project.

The team is currently scheduled to depart for Vanuatu on 16 August 2003, and will return on 31 August. The cost of this project for a team of 8 members will be \$12,800. The Board has agreed to financially contribute \$750 to each team member, with a maximum contribution of \$6,000 towards the project.

ROVE - Rotary Overseas Vocational Exchange

This is one of Rotary's International Fellowship programs, which gives people an opportunity to work in an overseas country to gain experience in their chosen field of expertise and/or study. The program utilises Rotary's network of business contacts to find appropriate employment and relies on Rotary families for hosting the participants.

Bill Thackray agreed to find a suitable person for this project. Unfortunately, after the sub-committee interviewed a possible applicant who had expressed interest in participating in the program, the applicant changed her employment and, after a number of months, withdrew her interest in the program.

We would still like to be involved in this program if we can find a suitable applicant.

Other Activities

RAWCS - Rotary Australia World Community Service

The Annual Subscription contributed by Rotarians resulted in a donation of \$152.45 from our Club for the work of RAWCS.

International House

We endeavoured to make a Club visit to International House, for an evening dinner meeting with students. However, it was not possible for our Club to join with the students because of our membership numbers.

ROMAC/Interplast

Following our recommendation to the Board, \$500 was donated to both ROMAC and Interplast.





Note 1 House for Homeless Youth

During previous financial years the sum of \$50,000 was committed by our Club to this project. These funds were held in *Funds on Deposit* along with funds totaling \$2,447 donated from the Ladies Card Day (2000/01). Total funding for the project was \$52,447

During 2002/2003, the following actions occurred

- \$45,000 Expended on construction of the house (total cost \$50,000, \$5,000 previously paid)
- \$ 1,909 Expended on white goods, etc for the house.

The balance of the funds i.e. \$538 are held in Funds on Deposit to cover any future expenditure on this project.

Note 2 Cash on Deposit - Service Account

The following funds were committed during 2002/2003 for expenditure in 2003/04 or later

- \$ 1,400 Donation to 6th Camberwell North Scout Group to upgrade shower facilities for disabled scouts.
- \$ 538 House for Homeless Youth (balance of funds from previous commitment see Note 1
- \$ 3,000 Presidents Fund. These funds have been set aside towards a future large project
- \$ 6,000 Rotary Australia World Community Service (RAWCS) Project. A number of our Club Members will be heading overseas in August 2003 as RAWCS project volunteers. These funds have been committed to assist members with the cost of the activity.
- \$10,000 Rotary Centenary Project. These funds have been set aside towards the cost of a significant community project to mark Rotary's Centenary in 2005.
