

Rotary's Wheel Emblem

A wheel has been the symbol of Rotary since our earliest days. The first design was made by Chicago Rotarian Montague Bear, an engraver who drew a simple wagon wheel, with a few lines to show dust and motion. The wheel was said to illustrate "Civilization and Movement". Most of the early clubs had some form of wagon wheel on their publications and letterheads. Finally, in 1922, it was decided that all Rotary clubs should adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians. Thus in 1923, the present gear wheel, with 24 cogs and six spokes was adopted by the "Rotary International Association". A group of engineers advised that the geared wheel was mechanically unsound and would not work without a "keyway" in the centre of the gear to attach it to a power shaft. So, in 1923 the keyway was added and the design which we now know was formally adopted as the official Rotary International emblem.

Presidents Report 2005 - 2006

FROM THE PRESIDENT

It has been a privilege and an honour to serve as your President for the last twelve months. At the start of this Rotary year, the first year of a new century for Rotary, RI President Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar challenged us to adopt his vision, that it's the right time to go back to basics and re-visit the ideals of Rotary, the four avenues of Rotary service:-

Club Service

Vocational Service

Community Service

International Service

With this in mind he adopted the original motto, SERVICE Above Self and the Rotary Wheel as the emblem for the year.

I believe we have achieved his vision in all these four areas.

The real strength of our Club lies in the membership. Don Bowden as Chairman of Club Service has demonstrated his many talents not only as Chairman but also in his role as 'Radio Don' with his regular program on community radio supported by John Mollison.

Under his guidance, the members of his committee have kept us entertained, informed and interested. Sergeant Elisabeth Hall continually surprised us with her weekly session, some amusing observations, anecdotes and the odd joke or two while always adding dollars to the pot.

Grapevine Editor, John McBride, has taken our weekly bulletin to another level. Electronic communication has enabled us to quickly access other Rotary information, with links to the DG's weekly e-Zine, RI magazine and a number of other sites to keep us fully informed.

Findley Cornell has put a new spin on the role of Almoner. His weekly 'Sports Show' has kept us up to date on the health of our members.

Guest speakers covering a wide range of interesting topics have been organised by Tony Wells and John Moyle whilst Dick Johnson has maintained our Website and introduced some excellent innovations.

Fellowship is the backbone of our Club and Chairman Barry Cummings has excelled in this role particularly with events like the Bowls night, Progressive Dinner and the Birthday Night celebrations. The Club would not operate efficiently without the services of a Club Secretary, thanks to Anthony Stokes for fulfilling this demanding role for a second year. Likewise the position of Club Treasurer calls for a large commitment of time and expertise and Neil Ramsay has done this with distinction, also for a second year. Bronwen Dimond has accurately recorded minutes of our board meetings for the last time as she now moves to a position of Club Director. And finally, Hugo Goetze continues to maintain and record details on our database of membership and attendance.

A corner stone of Rotary is Vocational Service. This year we have been impressed with the 'what's my line' member talks and the site visit to the Melrose Health factory. Chairman Delina Schembri-Hardy can be proud of the achievements of her committee, the setting up of a member skills database and in particular the successful nomination of Dorothy Hamilton who received a Shine On Award.

It is important for us to focus on our community and remain relevant in our local area. The much-awaited Centennial Project, The Marwal Avenue Meeting Point is getting close to commencement. Don Haycraft has gently prompted us to provide goods for Camcare. The Community Service Committee has recognised the benefits of The ARHRF Indigenous Health Scholarship Program. With their recommendation, our Club has donated \$2500 towards this fund.

During the year, Phil Francis was awarded the ARHRF Medal in recognition for his tireless work over many years for the 'Toss the Coin' project and his many other commitments to Rotary, in particular, Variety the Children's Charity. Congratulations Phil, a most deserved award.

Chairman Peter Cleary organised, in conjunction with the Rotary Club of Port Lincoln, a team of volunteers to participate in the Grampians Bushfire Relief Project, a most worthwhile and rewarding achievement.

The Jack Nankervis House in Hilda Street continues to be part of our commitment to the local area, and through Greg Matthews regular working bees have been organised to keep the place looking shipshape.

International service remains a top priority for our Club. Under the Chairmanship of Duncan Ansell, our 'Adopt a Community' project in the Solomon Islands has progressed to another level and is our main international project. The successful application for a matching grant from The Rotary Foundation has given us the opportunity to proceed with confidence and continue this important humanitarian project. A great deal of time and effort by Jim Studebaker went in to preparing and lodging the application. The Rotary Club of Balwyn together with the Rotary Club of Istanbul - Goksu Turkey, in District 2420 have joined us as partners in the project. With the help of Joe Butler's Transport Company and Larry Fitzpatrick's Storage facility, a shipping container filled with donated goods, supplies and equipment was transported to Tulagi ready for the visit by the next volunteer team. The committee continues to support ROMAC and Bob Adams has joined the District Committee to help promote the cause in the wider community.

Foundation is the centerpiece of Rotary project funding. Our club has donated over \$12,000 this year, before any other donations from individual members, which puts us in a strong position to apply for funding for future projects. During the year our club has named six Paul Harris Fellows. On the evening of our 26th Birthday meeting we named Rotarians Brian Hurnard, Jim Studebaker and partner Anthea Mollison Paul Harris Fellows for their outstanding contribution to Rotary and our Club over many years. For exemplary service and outstanding commitment as a RYLA Facilitator and Director, we have named Lucy Mayes a Paul Harris Fellow. This was presented to her by District Governor, John Wigley at the District Assembly in May. Tonight we name two more members Paul Harris Fellows for their contributions.

In my changeover address last year I emphasised how important I believe the Youth Exchange program is. We have been very fortunate to have Livia Popp on exchange from Switzerland during this year and as every host family will attest, she has exemplified the role. This alone should give us encouragement and confidence to continue with the program. New Generations Committee Chairman, John Gartlan has engaged his committee in many facets of new generations programs including RYPEN, MUNA and National Youth Science Forum as well as encouraging and supporting our Rotaract and Interact Clubs.

None of the projects we undertake would be possible without money. Fundraising Chairman, Bill Oakley has had his work cut out this year as our programs require a constant stream of cash. Through the efforts of all members contributing and in most cases with the help of our partners, we are able to successfully run, on an annual basis, a number of regular fundraising activities. Grand Prix Breakfasts, Rotary River Ride, Christmas Raffle, Golf Day and other catering events finance our projects. These events don't just happen, they are a result of many hours of work and planning by the members of the committee, and I would like to mention the considerable effort put in by Geoff Haddy and Don Taylor in planning the Rotary River Ride this year. Our proposed major fundraiser 'Jazz at the Farm', although a great success in terms of achieving a spectacular event, failed to achieve the financial result we expected. However, full credit must be given to John Mollison and his hard working committee for organising the event from which we have gained valuable experience and knowledge.

Geoff Steinicke has chaired our horizons committee for the last two years and we thank him for his valuable contribution.

In closing I would like to thank my Vice President Greg Ross for his great support and counsel over the year. To Immediate Past President Jim Studebaker, firstly congratulations to you and Carol for being selected for the important role of District Governor for year 2008 – 2009. And secondly, I wish to express my sincere gratitude to you for your total support, encouraging words and pertinent advice. To President John Magor and Elaine, I have pleasure in handing over to you a great club and I can assure you of my total support and together with the support of all the members you are assured of having a fulfilling and successful year.

Projects undertaken during the year were varied and included

Further discussions with Boroondara Council to bring to conclusion the Centenary of Rotary Project as part of the \$160000 Marwall Avenue Pedestrian Plaza development to be undertaken in the latter part of 2006. The New Generations Committee did its best to put into practice the belief of World President, Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar, that an investment in our youth is an investment in our future.

New Programs:

Initiatives this year were:

- Assisting the District RYLA Committee to continue its program towards establishing RYLA in East Timor by bringing three young East Timorese to Melbourne to participate in the December 2005 RYLA camp at Wonga Park. Our Club's aid was partly financial (a gift of \$2,000) and partly in kind (assisting in billeting the visitors with Michael Barden and Rosemary Kelly being particularly helpful). By happy coincidence, all this was at a time when Ros Horne is providing exceptional leadership of RYLA at District level.
- Involvement in Why Try, which is an educational pilot program being run in certain schools with the aim of motivating the most poorly-performing pupils to become better students and better future citizens. Our initial contribution of \$2,300 assisted Balwyn High, which is so enthusiastic about the program that it has taken the program well beyond the extent of our assistance by applying it to all Year 9 students, good and bad, in the hope that the good get even better and the bad make significant improvement. Our Club was fully briefed on the program during New Generations month when the Balwyn High chaplain, Jim Vaughn, addressed our meeting on 29th September.

New Generations also continued its involvement in the following youth programs, with which members will be familiar:

Youth Exchange:

The highlight of the year was the presence of our Swiss exchange student, Livia Popp. Livia won us all over with her charm, her obvious interest in her host country and her clear desire to use her year abroad for its purpose of fostering international goodwill and advancing personal growth. She is a girl who ranks second to none among our incoming exchange students.

Special thanks are due to Livia's host families, Rosemary Kelly and Michael Barden, Carol and Jim Studebaker, Erin and Peter Courtney, Ann Kerr and Graham Bird, and Robyn and Peter Elliott. Our Club is also extremely grateful to Genazzano for having so readily accepted Livia for the year and to Sue McDonald for acting as Livia's counsellor.

At the time of going to press, the Committee, through Mike McKay, was working through the process of seeking a suitable candidate to be an outgoing youth exchange student for 2007.

Rotaract:

Unfortunately, a non-highlight this year was the fact that our Rotaract Club has struggled to survive. Our Rotaract Liaison Officer, Matthew Pauli, assisted by Brian Hurnard and Mike McKay, has put in countless hours of assistance and encouragement well beyond his duty. However, Rotaract's future will ultimately depend on whether it is successful in attracting new members fairly quickly and building from there. Without new members, the Rotaract Club does not have the numbers to run events or functions. Without events or functions, the Club cannot gain or retain members.

Siemens Science Experience:

Member Skills Database - Lindsay Pegg

This year, the Vocational Committee embarked on an initiative to set up a database to record the broad range of individual skills our members have acquired through work, hobbies, etc. This information would supplement the brief qualification and vocational data already held by the Club.

The thrust of the project was threefold, that is, to have available information that would help identify members who may be able to:

- Assist with mentoring programs undertaken by the Club from time to time.
- Provide assistance to other Club members in relation to a particular skill.
- Help the Club when embarking on specialised projects.

Data collection commenced during March 2006, however, as many members have yet to respond, the project will be passed to the incoming Vocational Committee to progress further during 2006/07.

Sounding Board (Executive Bank) - Kitch Wendt

Sometime ago the club established a business mentoring service to offer local people in the business community free business advice or opinion from the wealth of knowledge and a bank of skill and experience available through members of the club. There were a couple of cases in the pipeline this year that were followed up as a result of approaches made to us, but no new clients were obtained.

The committee considered additional advertising for this mentoring service through local newspapers, shopping centre owners and local councils to ascertain any further interest. However given the difficulties in "marrying" up potential businesses with our current skills listing and the perceived problems in following through with arrangements, it has been decided to defer any further action in this current year.

We consider that Sounding Board is a worthwhile project and should be continued but on the basis that the clubs' skills data base is updated and fully completed prior to any further advertising.

Mentoring Guidelines - Ian Adams

The committee undertook to develop guidelines and tips for mentors of new members. The objectives were:

- To help new members settle more readily into our club culture and gain a better understanding of how Rotary works
- To give guidance on how they may contribute to the life of the club.

The committee took into consideration:

- Who the mentors should be, e.g. How much Rotary experience needed
- Regular ongoing contact with the new member
- Partner participation
- Participation in club activities, e.g. Fundraising, fellowship, service
- Fireside chats
- Appropriate documentation for new members

A dossier of useful material s is being collated for use by Mentors.

VOCATIONAL VISIT - Nino Sofra & George Selkrig

Our vocational visit this year was to Melrose Health Supplies which is part of the complementary healthcare industry and brain child of one of our own members, Geoff Steinicke and his partner Judy. The company was founded 27 years ago and has traded profitably every year since. It has grown to achieve annual sales in the vicinity of \$12 million. This is due in no small part to the hard work of its two Founders and their principles of growth through excellence and using only the very best ingredients, formulations, and techniques available.

Our hosts for the evening Geoff and Judy and their very helpful team took a group of about 80 Rotarians and partners on an informative tour of their facility, outlining and demonstrating their manufacturing, packaging and distribution centre. Geoff also regaled us with some of the personal trials, tribulations and successes of pioneering a new industry. All of which was very much appreciated and enjoyed by our members.

Once we had concluded our tour of Melrose, we adjourned to "What's a Name" restaurant where our host Steven ensured that we were provided with a wonderful meal. The general consensus was that the food was excellent, the wine drinkable and the fellowship top notch.

A visit to The Alfred Hospital has been arranged for July, 2006. The Alfred Foundation has planned for a talk on the aspects of 'Asthma in the ageing population", a huge area of unmet need and an area of active research at The Alfred.

JOB INTERVIEWS FOR STUDENTS - Ian Adams/Marcel Muntwyler

A number of Club members undertook "mock" job interviews at Camberwell Grammar School in October 2005. Students were not successfully coordinated by the school and it was felt that October was too near to school exams. This was a disappointed exercise for club members. We believe the concept is excellent but there needs to be a champion within the school community before this can be undertaken again.

Shine On Award - Lew Lustig

We had a successful outcome at the Shine On Awards, which were held at Maryborough on the 7th May. Dorothy Hamilton, our nominee, was selected from a large field of very worthwhile nominees in being selected for a major award. Whilst Dorothy did not attend the awards, we had the opportunity to present it to her at the Club meeting on Thursday 18th of May.

Shine On Awards serve to inspire all who are associated with them and we encourage our Club's continued participation in this project.

Life Education Victoria - Marcel Muntwyler

This wonderful organisation is providing school children of all ages with basic information on maintaining a healthy body and mind and an insight of the adverse effects created by excessive use of alcohol and drugs works on the premise that - Prevention is better than cure. Following on from our Club's previous involvement with this organisation, we made a request to the

Club's Board for a contribution and this was accepted. A cheque of \$ 2,000 was presented to Life Education Victoria in January 2006.

We recommend that our Club continue to be involved and give support to Life Education on a regular basis, through our Community Services group.

Computer Training - Ann Kerr

A number of our members have a great deal of experience with regard to working with computers, on the other hand, we have members who have no experience whatsoever perhaps because they have worked with staff who took care of all correspondence etc. for them. Computer training matches the experienced with the inexperienced and on a one to one basis training was provided on a casual basis as required. The most common need was for email training and those who have been assisted have appreciated the help and are now able to communicate via email with confidence - if they run into problems they have someone at the end of the phone to help them out.

Computer training has been a valuable resource since being introduced some time ago but we expect that the need for this project will decrease.

Work Experience for Country Kids - Jo Butler

Each year Rotary is asked by Rochester Secondary College to help place students in jobs that will provide country kids with work experience. We have seven job placements with members of our Rotary club this year. The experience the students gain is not only in work, but on exploring their way around the city and suburbs of Melbourne, getting to and from their accommodation and work locations. Real life experiences for many coming from a regional area.

What's My Line - John Rennie

New member's biographies are always the best evenings we have in Rotary because we learn more about each other.

It has been disappointing that the What's My Line presentations have not been given with the same degree of enthusiasm by our long-term members this year. There is no better place for new members to learn more about how our senior members contribute; some to outside organisations, some with passion for their hobbies. This is your opportunity to stand in the spot light for 10 minutes and tell us what you are passionate about. We sincerely hope this continues to be a part of Rotary evenings in the future.

The main thrust of our International program was our Adopted Community of Tulagi, Solomon Islands. The five members who visited Tulagi remained on the International Committee this year.

Adopt a Community

We have been liaising with Rotarian Linda McMillan of the Rotary Club of Honiara, Solomon Islands to obtain quotes for key projects to improve services and facilities at the Tulagi school and hospital. Things do not happen quickly on Tulagi, but there are two major projects which have commenced and should be completed in the next couple of months.

Matching Grant

With Jim Studebaker and John Reddish preparing the application for a Matching Grant from The Rotary Foundation, together with the financial support from the Rotary Clubs of Balwyn and Istanbul-Goksu, Turkey as well as District Designated Funds from Districts 9800 and 2420 our Matching Grant application was approved by the Rotary Foundation in Evanston, Il, USA.

The Rotary Clubs of Balwyn and North Balwyn each contributed \$8,542 US and our committee appreciates their financial support for this project.

This is a magnificent effort and I would like to thank all the people who put a huge amount of time and skill in to getting this Grant being approved.

Details of the Grant:

Total value: \$ 46,257 US dollars Items to be purchased and installed:

Installation and connection of new septic tank.

3 x 1000 gallon rainwater tanks plus spouting, guttering and piping to interconnect.

Supply and installation of two toilets, all plumbing requisites and connection to septic tank.

Two hundred (2 seat) student desks - to be manufactured in Tulagi.

Supply and installation of school lighting - 54 two-tube fluorescent lighting banks.

Supply and installation of 28 ceiling fans.

Donations in Kind - 20 ft Container

For the past nine months many members have been donating and sourcing items to fill a container of new and second hand goods which arrived in Honiara late April. As you read this report, the team of Duncan Ansell, Tony Wells, and Don Taylor will be in Tulagi distributing the contents to ensure they get safely to the intended recipients at the school and hospital.

Contents of the Container

7 hospital beds and railings, 5 hospital hi/lo beds, 7 hospital mattresses, 4 new hospital mattress covers, 10 boxes of new children's clothing, 1 new junior size soccer goal and net set donated by Tony McLean and Duncan Ansell, This is being set up and installed by us using the 24 bags of quick set cement obtained by Terry Keyhoe.4 new portable netball stands donated by John Reddish, 7 new boxes of surgeons and examination gloves donated from Ansell Ltd, 3 boxes texta and marker pens, 1 portable as new defibrillator donated by Elisabeth Hall, 1 photocopier, 10 computers (H/D) Keyboards, etc) 1 Hospital examination couch, desk, 1 small table, 8 trapezium tables, 54 new florescent light fittings and tubes, 13 office chairs, 1 bag of assorted emergency lights ,2 whiteboards, 28 new ceiling fans, 85 boxes of new and second hand (general reading and educational). Kitchner Wendt also donated 40 cartons of new books. Garth Symington also obtained donations of computers and printers from various sources. Seven of our partners spent a morning repacking and marking 17 cartons of Christmas toys for the McMahon School children, which we appreciate and would like to thank them.

All the mechanical goods donated were in good working order.

As can be seen this is a <u>team</u> effort and I would like to thank all the people listed above for their generous donations or contacts to make this container such a success.

Last but not least, what would we have done without Larry Fitzpatrick and the use of his storage facilities and his truck. He gave us the use of his facilities for many months and once all the goods were at his CSSS a team led by Larry filled the container to the gunnels. Many thanks Larry.

JOBS COMPLETED IN TULAGI

The school toilets were fully refurbished but unfortunately cannot be used because the septic tank did not have enough capacity to handle the volume of the school. A new one is required and is being built under the Matching Grant.

50 new two-seater desks were supplied to the school, built locally. These were funded at a cost of \$2750Aus by donations from club members. When the 200 are supplied from the Matching Grant, the school will be fully supplied with new desks.

FUTURE PROJECTS IN TULAGI

Hospital Fence

The 2 quotes are being evaluated on the 3metre high cyclone and barbed wire fence to cover the one-acre site. The Don Bosco Technical Institute in Honiara will be quoting as well, as they have the skills but would be much cheaper than building companies due to low overheads and not looking for big profits.

Generator for the Hospital

We have quotes but we are currently evaluating their electricity usage so that we buy a generator that is the correct capacity.

Hospital Extensions to expand the hospital to 50-60 beds and a new kitchen for the hospital. This is currently being investigated during the visit by D.Ansell, Tony Wells and Don Taylor.

New Water Tanks, Stands and Guttering for the Hospital

Painting and General Maintenance of the School and Hospital

Currently being investigated but there are two options,

- a. RAWCS team
- b. Don Bosco Technical Institute, or perhaps combine the two as a single project.

TEAM VISITS

Bob Bott and Bill Oakley visited Honiara and Tulagi, from May 23rd to June 3rd. They reviewed and reported on numerous ongoing and proposed projects. Duncan Ansell, Tony Wells and Don Taylor are currently away and will be likewise reporting back on specific projects, which will be evaluated by the new International Committee and Board and actioned where they feel necessary.

TWIN ROTARY PROGRAM WITH URAWA SOUTH

They donated \$935 to our Club to be spent at our discretion, which of course was used for Tulagi. There have been no team visits this year but Robert Ebihara visits their Club during his business trips.

RAWCS \$2 STICKERS

59 were sold and a cheque for \$118 was sent off to District 9800

ROMAC-DISTRICT COMMITTEE

Bob Adams joined the District ROMAC Committee early in the year and is enjoying the role, which he is carrying out with much enthusiasm and has been visiting many clubs in the district to raise funds for this project.

Our Club has donated \$1,000 towards this worthwhile cause.

AMBASSADORIAL SCHOLARS

At the request of Ambassadorial scholar Michael Morris, the Club donated \$250 towards the cost of a generator at St Judes School in Africa.

NORTH BALWYN INTERACT CLUB

Our Intertact Club generously donated \$1,700 from their fundraising function to be used on projects in Tulagi. Thank you Interact.

DONATION TO DON BOSCO/SALESIANS

Bob Bott has given money out of the Bott Foundation to cover the purchase of 500 mosquito nets. These will be distributed through the Salesians of Don Bosco in the Solomons and this will further strengthen ties to Rotary and our project in Tulagi.

Well done Bob and we thank you very much for your donation, which will help reduce malaria dramatically.

DONATION TO THE ROTARY FOUNDATION

Our Club has approved the donation of \$12,462 to the Foundation, the highest amount ever given by our Club to Foundation.

As this is my last year in this role, I would like to thank everyone on my committee who have given me full support during this period, in particular Garth Symington, who very capably filled my shoes during my short absence when the DIK container was packed and shipped to the Solomon Islands.

The committee met three times during the year. The Horizons Committee's charter is to suggest future directions for the club; it is not meant to be a committee of review. However, a review of established activities will often present an opportunity for future direction. Several projects were discussed with the following results:

Catering in partnership with Sodexo at the Commonwealth Games
 Discussion: Project lapsed because Sodexo could not win a contract.

Club Survey of members - a SWOT analysis

Discussion: Decided that the club does not see value in having a member survey.

Opportunity Shop

Discussion: On hold, unless one or more members want to set it up.

• Fund Raising on a larger scale, for example, a golf day to raise \$100,000.

Discussion: On hold.

Club Membership - the stated aim: "membership should be a reflection of our community achieved by increasing female membership and seek members in the under 50 age bracket." Discussion: No female members were inducted this year and half the male inductees were under 50 years of age. We question the weighting of the under 50 aim. Our female members should be encouraged to seek other female members.

Tulagi "Adopt a Community" is a major project of RCNB

Discussion: The lack of spontaneous response to requests for volunteers to go on assignment to Tulagi will need to be addressed. One obstacle to participation is the air fare. Perhaps a subscribing fund needs to be established to pay half the travel costs of volunteers.

Fully Funded Training of nurses from Tulagi

Discussion: Current investigation into funding nurses from Tulagi to receive several months tuition in Melbourne, is proceeding.

Camp Getaway, Lancefield

Discussion: There are no immediate projects, but a project for RCNB is expected at some future time.

Janet Hawkins property at Woodend

Discussion: This has the possibility of a community project for Very Special Kids (VSK). Legal issues are currently being drafted in regard to the future changes required to meet the needs of VSK. A definite project for RCNB with District involvement - proceeding.

Scholarships for Aboriginal Children

Discussion: Scholarships for aboriginal children in the Shepparton area is being met by one of the Clubs in Shepparton. Suggested we look at the south western region of Vctoria, eg., Portland area. Investigation is continuing.

Local Swap Meet or a Show – horticultural / food festival / craft.

Discussion: Not much support for a one-day activity, but the success of the Boroondara market run by RC Glenferrie and farmer's markets generally, could be a possibility. Needs further research.

As our Club gets larger, so the number of members in each committee also grows, and there is the potential for committees to become unwieldy. Despite its size, the Fundraising Committee worked with remarkable cohesion to achieve a considerable amount of work and to enjoy good fellowship in the process.

Fundraising Activities

This year the Fundraising Committee raised approximately \$48,000 for the Club (including the recovery of some \$4,000 in GST payments). It is not possible to be precise as some fundraising activities were not complete for the year at the time of writing.

Principal contributors were:

1. Rotary River Ride - \$4,431

Michael Barden headed the standing committee which organised and ran this year's event. Geoff Haddy and Don Taylor also contributed hugely to the success of this event. Most of the problems experienced in the previous year's event were overcome with participant numbers up about 20 and proceeds almost doubling. The Austin Hospital – Olivia Newton-John Cancer Ward continues to be a major beneficiary of this event. Besides being a worthy charity, we believe that many riders are persuaded to participate because of our support of cancer research. It is expected that next year we will be able to build on the solid foundations laid this year to again substantially increase participation and profit.

2. Catering Functions - \$3,138

We made use of our catering expertise to support a number of different events including two craft displays at the Mt Waverly Community Centre and a "Life Be In It" day for IBM staff at Albert Park. As well as generating funds these events proved to be good fellowship activities. Particular thanks to Peter Courtney, Terry Gretton and Maurie Walters who stepped in to look after the coordination of some of these events when Bill Oakley, wearing his caterer's hat, was not available.

3. Christmas Raffle - \$10,719

Particular congratulations must go to Maurie Walters and Imre Lele who took on the organising for the first time for a very good result. It was only a few hundred down on the previous year's record result, and made all the more creditable when taking into account the fact that Jazz at the Farm took place in the middle of the selling period. Particular thanks to Jim and Kerrie Romanis for again providing accommodation at Noosa, the major part of our first prize.

4. Golf Day - \$11,824

Terry Gretton took on the daunting task of filling the very large shoes of Ted Wilkins as organiser of this day. The spectacular result is testament to the huge amount of work Terry put into this event. Although Terry is moving on to bigger things in next year's Club administration, he has indicated a keenness to keep involved with the Golf Day and build on this year's efforts. Sponsors, and especially our major sponsor, Ian Mollison and Jetset Travel North Balwyn, contribute greatly to the financial success of this day. (Refer to the section on Sponsors below).

5. Cabaret Night - \$402

A great night of entertainment was had at the Manningham Club by about 130 members and friends. Poor numbers kept profits from this event modest. Thanks to Ron Liner for the great effort he put into the organising over a considerable time. His efforts were somewhat frustrated by his going to hospital for a hip operation shortly after the night

6. Grand Prix - \$7,282

After almost ten year's involvement with The Formula One Grand Prix, organisation of this event is a well oiled machine - kept that way by Michael Barden who heads the permanent coordinating committee. Although the work hours are dreadful (start at 5.00am at Marwell Ave!) there seems to be no shortage of 'petrol heads' who want to be involved, even though the change of date because of the Commonwealth Games forced a clash with the District Conference at Geelong. The Grand Prix also provides a fundraising opportunity for Rotaract who provide a team to wash some of the official on-course cars.

Wine Sales - \$1,500+

Thanks to Don Taylor we have been able to secure a supply of excellent labelled red and white wine which we sell at a good profit, at prices still well below bottle shop prices. At the time of writing this project has only been launched, and promises to generate good funds for us next year as well.

Equestrian Event - \$2,000

Again this Queen's Birthday Weekend we plan to provide a team to help at the Three Day Equestrian event at Werribee Park. We earn good money for a most enjoyable day watching the horses! Thanks to Ian Richardson for acting as "guest coordinator" for this event.

Bill's Jams

It looks like jam sales will generate over \$1,000 for the Club funds for the first time this year.

Other Fundraising

Thanks to Maria Gouvoussi for a great effort with the Xmas cake and pudding sales which netted \$487 this year, about \$50 more than last year. Market research raised \$340 this year. We offered the sale of the entertainment books to the Rotaract Club as a fundraiser for them. Sale of Rotary Centenary coins from the Perth Mint raised \$165.

Sponsors

Major Fundraising Activity

In particular, as we attempt more ambitious projects, like the Adopt a Community project in the Solomon Islands, we need more funds. The strategy has been to try and identify and develop one or two major fundraising activities which can be added to our fundraising programme. A number of possibilities were investigated during the 2004/05 Rotary Year, and two were tries during this year – Jazz at the Farm, and the Cabaret Night.

These initial efforts weren't exactly crowned with success! However the need remains as strong as ever for the Club to strengthen its fundraising base. Some of our existing activities, like the Grand Prix, have a finite life. Others, like the Christmas Raffle, are mature and have little potential to significantly increase their earning potential. There is perhaps some potential to increase the result from the Golf day, but this is limited by the overall number of players we can accommodate.

Of our existing activities, the Rotary River Ride has the best potential to be developed further. The two events we tried this year with such limited success – Jazz at the Farm and the Cabaret Night – are both still under active consideration to see if a successful formula can be developed. The key to success of all of these activities will be to attract substantial numbers of the public to participate.

During the coming year the Fundraising Committee will continue to actively seek new ways of fundraising for the Club, and to extract the best possible result from our existing fundraising activities.

To the members of the Fundraising Committee who have supported me so wholeheartedly in all our fundraising efforts, and have taken responsibility for organising and running many different events, mine and the Club's thanks. I especially thank those who opened their homes to host what were memorable and productive committee meetings – and great fun and fellowship activities too!






