



### **President's Report**

One of the features, and I think great strengths of the "Rotary way" is the regular annual renewal and replacement of most senior leader positions, including that of President. However it does mean that I write this with a growing feeling of "......if only I knew then what I know now". I recall then, enthused by my President-Elect training, looking forward to putting my stamp on the blank sheet which was the Rotary Club of North Balwyn. What I know now is that the Rotary Club of North Balwyn was then, and is now, anything but a blank sheet. Indeed at almost thirty years old and 100 members strong the Rotary Club of North Balwyn is a very substantial enterprise, built carefully layer upon layer by previous generations, and gives every impression of being able to get along quite well without the help and guidance of a new and enthusiastic President.

But as it has done 28 times before, the club welcomed me as their new President; listened to my thoughts on steering the great ship North Balwyn; gave me sage advice when they thought I had got it wrong; and trusted, backed and supported me in everything I sought to do.

RI President DK Lee made as his theme "Make Dreams Real for the World's Children" and asked us all to focus on projects which would help to reduce the awful rate of child mortality in the World. Throughout this report you will read about the work we have been doing, and will continue to do in this area. DK Lee asked us also to focus upon the critical issue of membership in Rotary, because, without the sustaining energy of new members, our capacity to do good in the World will dwindle and eventually die. In a year when the number of new members joining us just balances the number of members who have left, the challenge of building a stronger and more vibrant membership remains.

For some years Rotary International has been urging Clubs to review their administrative structure and consider adopting changes as recommended in the Club Leadership Plan. The four stated objectives of the club leadership plan are to:

- -Sustain and increase membership
- -Help implement successful projects which address the needs of local and overseas communities
- -More strongly support the Rotary Foundation
- -Develop leaders within our clubs capable of serving Rotary beyond the club level. Following a review of our structure last year, we introduced changes to our board structure this year to create a Membership Director and Committee, and to create a Foundation Director and Committee.

The Membership Committee was chaired by Greg Ross. The creation of the Membership Committee has allowed us to focus on the need to sustain and build our membership. Although not showing instant results in increased membership, the committee has laid a good foundation for us to continue to work actively to recruit and retain members. I am confident that this initiative will result in increased membership in the future.

Recognising that our club has many friends who wish to maintain some association with us, but are not able to become or remain members, the club established the Friends of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn during this year. Now numbering 20, Friends are sometimes former members who can no longer retain full active membership, and are sometimes potential full members whose present circumstances do not allow them to take the step into full membership. Friends

regularly attend our dinner meetings, and are involved in most of our social and service activities. Friends is proving to be a great addition to our Rotary family which will add strength and fellowship to our club. Congratulations and thanks to Greg Ross and the membership committee for taking on these new initiatives.

The importance of the Rotary Foundation in funding so much of both the local and the international service initiatives of Rotary is driven home to us at every opportunity. The creation of a new committee and its chairing by Past President Ian Adams has given Foundation a greater prominence within our club, and has allowed us to make donations to the Foundation totalling almost \$25,000. It has done the groundwork for us to become more involved in the Foundation programmes of Ambassadorial Scholars and Group Study Exchange next year, when we are not so involved with the District Conference. My thanks to Ian Adams and the Foundation Committee for driving this important initiative.

The pages of this report give details of the many and varied projects which a club of our size and experience gets involved in. Here I will highlight a few of the initiatives and new directions taken this year.

I had the opportunity to thank all the various club office bearers whose jobs contribute to the overall quality of our dinner meetings and to the club's internal communications. I have been particularly gratified to receive compliments on the quality of our dinner meetings from members and guests alike on behalf of all those office bearers who actually do the work. We set out to improve the quality of the dinner meetings, and also the efficiency of our internal communications, both crucial to the successful running of such a large and diverse club. To lan Taylor and to the team in Club Service, thank you for the diligence you showed in maintaining such a high standard in all club support areas. To Don Taylor and the Fellowship team thank you for fun packed and diverse fellowship programme for the year.

A particular aim of mine for this year was to see our club visible and active in the local community. There were a number of significant initiatives and projects in Community Service which served to show very well our club in action locally. The Fun In Retirement Expo, run just four days into the start of this Rotary year brought over 70 exhibitors and around 3000 members of the public together for a great event. Next year the size of the display area has been doubled and we are seeking around 150 exhibitors. Over 100 members, Friends and partners were actively involved in running FIRE. Particular thanks to Terry Keyhoe whose hard work and enthusiasm drives FIRE from strength to strength.

Boroondara Cares - a joint initiative of the 8 Boroondara based clubs with the 3 Rotary clubs in Moira Shire to highlight to Melbournians the continuing devastating impact of drought in country Victoria. A large range of practical support activities have helped to ease the burden on the farmers and residents around Cobram, and have gone a long way in demonstrating that city Victorians really do care about the plight of those in the country. This project has also been a great example of how clubs can get together to work for a common goal. My particular congratulations to Bruce Timbs who has led our club's participation in this venture.

Our involvemnt, along with many other Melbourne clubs in the Homeless World Cup late last year was a great example of how Rotary can partner with other organisations to achieve great results in community support.

The sudden and dramatic impact of the Black Saturday Bushfires demanded the attention and support of every community organisation in our State. As a club we were involved in many immediate relief activities, and later in a major effort with the team from the Rotary Club of Port Lincoln in a major fence rebuilding project. The work of recovery and rebuilding is far from complete, and as a club we have set aside substantial funds, and plan to be involved in further major projects in this area in the future. Congratulations to Bob Adams and the team from Community Service, and the many drafted to that team, for all their great work this year, but in particular for the quick, comprehensive and compassionate response in the wake of the bushfires.

In a year in which we thought that the committment to the District Conference might reduce our fundraising capacity, we have finished with an excellent year in which we have been able to take on bushfire committments at short notice, and provide additional support to the Roatry Foundation when it needed it. Special thanks to John McBride for heading up our catering efforts, and to Michael Barden for producing such a wonderful result from the Grand Prix. Thanks to Elisabeth Hall and the whole fundraising team for the great job of raising the money to do all that we do!

The North Balwyn Rotaract Club is the only operating Rotaract in the District. However it goes from strength to strength, due in no small measure to enthusiasm and hard work of Matthew Pauli and the Vocational Service team. Small wonder District 9800 has appointed Matthew as the District Rotaract Chairman. Well done Matthew for a great year.

Following completion of the second Matching Grant for our work in Tulagi we took the opportunity to develop a rice growing project in Tetere on Guadalcanal, leveraging on the experience and learning gained by our Royce Abbey Agricultural Scholar Joseph Aarons. The project has helped Joseph and the team at Don Bosco Tetere to substantially increase the amount of rice grown there, at a time which rocketing rice prices around the World have led to great shortages in the Solomons. It has also taught the students at the rural training college at Tetere skills to take rice growing back with them to their home villages. Congratulations to Bob Bott for stepping into the role of International Committee Chairman this year, and for driving the rice project to such a successful result.

I thank Paul Fitz for his continuing Chairmanship of the Horizons Committee. This committee comprises the past, present and future Presidents of the club along with new and experienced club members. It serves the vital function of facilitating some continuity in the planning of the club as we transition from President to President. The committee helped the board deal with recommendations coming out of Horizons Committee work extending back two or three years. Tony Wells was able to be involved in this and is able to take the issues and recommendations of the Horizons Committee into account in his planning.

So many have come to me commenting that it must have been difficult being president in the year when we were charged with the responsibility of organising a District Conference. I can honestly say that it never felt like the District Conference was a millstone around our necks. For this I express particular thanks to District Conference Chairman Greg Matthews, first for taking responsibility for attending to the multitude of detail involved in such a complex organisation, while still keeping the run up to the conference in the background of club affairs during the first part of my term; then for staging such a fantastic conference in Launceson, leaving the club

repleat with plaudits and congratulations, and all our members rightly proud of the great effort we as a club put in.

A special time at the District Conference was when Paulina Gorka, our exchange student from Poland provided the entertainment, playing piano. Paulina has been a wonderful exchange student, participating in everything, and showing through the year how she has grown and matured. We say good bye to her at our club changeover, as she flies home the following day. Thanks to all the host families and to Bronwen Dimond for taking on the role of counsellor.

To Jim Studebaker, congratulations on a stellar year as District Governor. District 9800 is regarded as one of the best in the Rotary World, which your leadership this year thoroughly enriched. It was crowned by visits by the RI President at the start of the year and by Immediate Past RI President Wilf Wilkinson as the RI President's representative at our District Conference. In a District of 70 clubs it's a remarkable effort for one club to have had three District Governors in its less than 30 year history.

To Peter Courtney, my Vice President, thank you for your wise advice on many occasions, tempering my natural tendency to excess; and thank you for your constant support and for taking the reins at those meetings at which I was not able to be present.

It is unusual for a President not to have a partner to support him or her during the term. I want to say thank you to all the ladies, female members and partners, who have gently guided this mere male in the way so many of you with partners are used to being guided! Special thanks to Alison Adams for taking on the organisation of a number of functions for the partners during the year, and to Elisabeth Hall for making her home available to host a number of functions to save you all the long trip to Blackburn.

To Tony Wells and the team for 2009/10 I wish you every success in the coming year. Tony, I hope you get as much joy and satisfaction out of the experience of being President of this club as I have!

### Vale - Ron Carnell

The club was saddened by the news of the Death of Ron Carnell in August last year after a long illness. A Charter member of this club, Ron became club secretary in our third year, and held this post for an amazing ten years. He remained an active member of the club until 2003 when poor health forced him to retire. He pioneered the Rotary radio programme which still continues to this day. Then it was known as Radio Ron.

As a mark of the esteem in which Ron was held by his fellow North Balwyn Rotarians, the club's Presidents Award has been named the Ron Carnell trophy. The year has been busy and, thanks to the support of all the committee members, much has been achieved.

The "Adopt a Community" programme has been completed with a special note of appreciation for the support received from the Rotary Club of Werribee, and the Rotary Club of Port Lincoln (S.A.). A final report for the second Matching Grant (No.65280 – Solomon Islands) was forwarded to Rotary Foundation Evanston USA on the 6<sup>th</sup> May 2009. The closing paragraph of this report read: "We have completed this project with a surplus of US\$5,468.00 due in the main to negotiating a better price for the generator and freight saving charges". A difficult project, but the impossible was achieved through the efforts of DG Wayne Morris (Honiara) and Garth Symington. Continuing with our "Community work" at Tulagi, with a mix of club and Rotary International funds, we purchased two bread making machines, together with utensils, trays etc. and baking ingredients. This will support two local villagers to commence their own business. The Community Support Centre at Tulagi, run by the Melanesian Church is responsible for the loans that have been made available. The following repayment plan was a condition of the funds being made available.

- 1. No Interest to be charged
- 2. Repayments are to be in equal monthly instalments over a 3 year period.
- 3. All funds received are to be deposited in a trust account at the Community Centre and used to assist other members of the Tulagi Community in approved business developments.

It is equally pleasing to record that three (3) new Janome Sewing machines have been received at the Community Support Centre – Tulagi for the use of the local community to be trained in the skill of dressmaking/sewing. A teacher from the Don Bosco Technical School at Henderson (located on the main island of Guadalcanal) will travel to Tulagi at agreed times to conduct dressmaking and sewing classes.

### Don Bosco Rural Farm - Tetere (North Guadalcanal)

We are happy to report that Joseph Aaron and his students continue to develop the old abandoned rice fields at Tetere with great results from the introduction of improved planting methods.

Season 2008 : 10 Hectares of land was prepared, weeded and cultivated to produce a 'bountiful' rice harvest – refer to photograph.

Season 2009: A further 10 hectares has been cleared and prepared for the first planting of 'paddy rice'. Unfortunately due to abnormal heavy rain the rice planting is 4 – 5 weeks behind schedule.

The planting of paddy rice has been made possible this year due to the drilling of three (3) new water wells, plus the installation of irrigation pipes. The cost for this additional infrastructure was paid from Club funds held at Honiara. Resulting from the above new irrigation system, the students have been able to grow additional vegetable crops i.e. mag beans, sweet potato, tapioca, corn, peanuts etc. These vegetables are for the consumption of the students and their families, plus the patients of the Mission Hospital.

An email received last Christmas from Father Dominic Katchira (the principal of the Mission) reads as follows: "Thank you Rotary for all you have done. This year's rice harvest is nothing short of a miracle for our local community, who will have food on their table for Christmas. This wonderful

harvest has occurred at a time of grave concern due to a growing food shortage for the local Solomon's people. Rice is 60% of their daily dietary intake and local people cannot afford the cost of imported rice"

The next important project to complete at Tetere is to build rice storage & drying shed. The club has offered to meet the cost of materials, with the actual building of the shed to be completed by the students from the Don Bosco Technical School at Henderson, and the Don Bosco Rural Farm. Construction will be under the supervision of the building teacher from the Technical School. Thanks to the work Mev Connell from the Rotary Club of Melbourne, a plan has been drawn up, plus notes of what is required for the 'risk management' procedure involving storage and the drying of rice.

### Donations in Kind.

Thanks to the generous support of 'Janome Australia' and Toyota, thirteen (13) new electric sewing machines have been received, assisting the Club in our ongoing education programmes in the Solomon Islands. (to the value of \$6000)

7 Sewing machines - Don Bosco Technical School – Henderson. (60+ students now attend dressmaking/sewing classes)

3 sewing machines - Don Bosco Rural Farm (10 students are now attending dressmaking/sewing classes).

3 sewing machines - Melanesian Church (Community Support Centre) Tulagi; enable dressmaking/sewing classes to be conducted for the local community.

Particular thanks are recorded for the work of Robert Ebihara in obtaining the above donations and to Brother Michael Lynch of Bon Bosco Melbourne who arranged and met all costs for the sewing machines to be exported to the Solomon Islands

### Future Projects in Planning.

- 1. As the rice fields at Tetere are expanded from 20 hectares to (say) 30 50 hectares, the question of the need to purchase a rice harvesting and threshing machine has been discussed. Information has been gathered regarding the equipment available and associated costs.
- 2. Kai-Kokorako project (the development of a chicken hatchery at Don Bosco Rural Farm-Tetere). This project has been put on hold pending the next club visit to the Solomon Islands and discussions to be held with Father Dominic Katchira.

On behalf of the International Service Committee a special thanks to everyone for the encouragement and support provided for our many projects. In closing it would be remiss of me not to express a note of appreciation to the North Balwyn Rotoract and Interact clubs for their interest and valuable support provided over the past year

The vision of The Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty. The Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and friends of Rotary.

Our club contributes approximately \$100 per member each year while members are encouraged to contribute directly on an individual basis.

The Centurion Program which was established to encourage Rotarians to contribute a minimum of \$100 annually continues to be well supported by members, resulting in 26 members as Centurions this year. Several members and Friends of Rotary support Foundation through the Benefactor Recognition Program whereby they have formally advised Foundation that they have made provision in their will, naming the Foundation Permanent Fund as a beneficiary. The club has also supported Foundation through its recognition of a number of Paul Harris Fellows during the year. Each committee member has given a brief talk to the club on a Foundation topic to increase members' knowledge of Foundation. The topics included: Ambassadorial Scholars, Foundation Grants and Contributions.

Early this year the club was represented by 10 members and partners who enjoyed an excellent evening of entertainment provided by students from International House at the University Of Melbourne at the annual Cafe International.

For the first time in some years the committee nominated a candidate for an overseas Group Study Team and, despite being unsuccessful, it was a useful process to go through. During Foundation week in November the committee arranged for a Foundation-funded Rotary Peace Scholar as guest speaker at a dinner meeting.

In summary the club has been able to donate a total of \$23,910 to the Foundation: Polio Plus (\$6,000), Rotary Foundation, including per capita club contribution (\$16,750), \$1,160 to Essendon Rotary Club towards the Royce and Jean Abbey Agricultural Scholarship and sundry smaller allocations (\$240). In addition individual members have also contributed generously.

I would like to thank all members of the committee for their ready support and hospitality at committee meetings throughout the year.

The outcome of the review is a recommendation that NYSF be replaced with a new program that will enable the club to maintain control of the selection and funding arrangements, to support local students and to build the reputation of our club locally.

To this end the committee recommended that a new program Exemplary Youth Science Promotion be established.

The first recipient of funding under this program will be Fiona Kan of North Balwyn who is currently studying engineering at Monash University. Fiona has been supported in her attendance at the International Scholar Laureate Program in China.

Prior to Fiona being supported, program credibility was established, nominating procedures were evaluated (Faculty nomination of top 5%achievement levels) and a report back mechanism was agreed to.

The Committee recommends that the previous funding for Siemens Science Experience and NYSF be combined to form the budget for this activity.

### Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA)

Mary George has successfully arranged for Rachel Bailes and Stephen Mallis from Balwyn High school to represent our club at this year's program to be conducted on the weekend of 13/14 June. Our students will be representing the United Kingdom in the Assembly deliberations.

Thanks to Mary and Jane Pennington for arranging transport to and from Myrniong for our participants.

### Storm The Stage.

Mark Edwards made many contacts with schools early in the Rotary year in regard to this program but with no commitment given and Mark transferring to SA, no nomination was forthcoming for this year.

The committee was also informed that the dates proposed for this program conflicted with exam times for senior students in our schools.

The committee has recommended that this program be reviewed early in the new Rotary year.

### Youth Exchange (Inbound)

Paulina Gorka, a young lady from a small town in Poland, arrived in Australia on 8 August with a smattering of English and a huge smile. She has been very fortunate in having Bronwen Dimond as her counsellor, Ala and Don Taylor, Peter and Erin Courtney, Michael Barden and Rosemary Kelly and Ann Kerr and Graeme Bird as her host parents. Our sincere thanks to them all and to the other members who have contributed to Paulina's experience with us.

Paulina has grown as a person and learned much in her time with us. Her participation in the District Conference will be a lifetime memory for her. We must recognise the arrangements that

Bronwen was able to put in place for Paulina to attend school at Genazzano and for the piano lessons to support her preparation for the Conference performance.

A recommendation to the club for us to accept a southern hemisphere student (possibly from Brazil) has been forwarded to District with an anticipated arrival date in January '10.

Bronwen, having such first hand experiences of the Exchange Program as counsellor and host parent, has accepted an invitation to participate on the District Committee. We appreciate Bronwen's efforts in her wonderful support for this program.

### Youth Exchange (Outbound)

Olivia Bassani is in Brazil as a result of our club's participation in this aspect of the program.

Mary George as her counsellor here has been maintaining a strong interest in Olivia's activities and has brought several issues to the District Committee as we have found the Brazilian way of conducting the exchange program differs significantly from our expectations. Olivia was originally hoping to go to Europe but was selected for Brazil, much to her family's dismay. Mary took on the responsibility of providing the family with the information and support that saw Olivia leave on the 8<sup>th</sup> July to return on 10 June 2010. Mary will remain as Olivia's counsellor until her return even though she will no longer be on the New Generations committee.

Should the club wish to sponsor another outgoing exchange there will need to be some prompt work in finding a suitable nominee for participation in the next round.

### Boroondara Cares.

This activity, operated under the auspices of the Rotary Clubs in the City of Boroondara as a combined group, set out to assist the community in the Shire of Moira in northern Victoria who were struggling under the challenges of severe drought and significant social change in the shire. Each Rotary Club involved took on one aspect of the support program with our club requested to establish a School to School initiative. Much time and effort was expended in attempting to establish a program that would support the staffs of the schools in the Shire to assist those people at the forefront of dealing with the effects of drought and change being demonstrated in the behaviours of the students. This program was not picked up by the Moira schools and to date only one activity has been established at a pupil to pupil level. A disappointing outcome.

Bruce Timbs, our club contact on the Boroondara Cares committee, has worked endlessly to have our club involved in the other activities within the program. Our club has supported the provision of food rice through the Moira Food Share activity, supplied Christmas cakes and puddings, funded student participation in a Portsea camp, billeted work experience students and had club representatives attend "An Evening With The Stars" at Katunga in January and the special Harness Racing event to support the program at Cobram.

This program will continue next year attached to the Community Service Committee.

We recognise the ongoing efforts of Bruce in keeping this activity in our club's conscience.

### INTERACT:

The Interact Club at Balwyn High School continues to function effectively with a current membership of approximately 40. The club, lead by Co-Presidents Breanna Hassall and Wesley Loo is working towards the next production of "Strictly Balwyn" on July 25<sup>th</sup> as a major fund raiser. With a completely new membership at the beginning of 2009 it is encouraging to see this club continue to build under the guidance of Bronwen Dimond. Our recognition of Bronwen's work in this regard is essential – our sincere thanks to her.

The Interact Club has also sought to assist in the local Carols by Candlelight activity and planning was underway for a future "It Takes Two" challenge. A cheque for \$4000 was presented to our Club by the Interactors to support the Tulagi project. This money was raised from the previous "Strictly Balwyn", "It Takes Two" and a face painting day at the School swimming sports.

The Interactors also combined with the Rotaract club in a trivia night resulting in a cheque for \$1500 to support our club activities.

A very successful year!

Our Committee will be working differently next year as the combination of Vocational and Youth Services work together in an exciting new challenge.

My thanks to all the members who have contributed so generously in enabling our New Gen. committee of 08/09 to achieve what it has. There has been significant review of programs and new challenges have been identified to maintain the support of the youth in our community into the future

### **CLUB FINANCES**

The finances of the Club reflect careful stewardship by the Board and by members in the conduct of all Club activities in the past year. The statements which follow are for the first eleven months of 2008-09. Final (12 month) statements will be prepared after 30<sup>th</sup> June for presentation at our annual meeting.

The Club operates two main sets of accounts:

ADMINISTRATION accounts for transactions relating to the day-to-day operations of the Club including our financial obligations to Rotary International and to District 9800. We have two ADMIN bank accounts: a cheque account and an investment account.

SERVICE accounts contain all transactions relating to our fundraising and other monies received to carry out our services, projects and donations for the benefit of our local and international communities, including our contribution to the Rotary Foundation. Again, there are two bank accounts: a cheque account and an investment account.

There have been two particularly significant matters affecting this year's accounts. The Victorian Bushfires saw tremendous generosity by members both in money and time. In accordance with member wishes, some monies were passed to external bushfire recovery funds, whilst other funds have been used in supporting affected areas and in hands-on help such as fence building.

The second item was the decision to create a *Bushfire (future projects) Fund* from proceeds of our fundraising through the Kellys Promise raffle, the APT European Tour raffle (after allocations to the Alannah & Madeline Foundation, and to RoCan), and from the return by the District Conference of the Club's week-to-week contribution of seeding finance over the past 2½ years.

Other significant financial events:


- The loan of \$5,000 made from the ADMIN account to the District Conference to assist cashflow, has been repaid.
- Our first FIRE community project made a surplus of \$8,727
- Nearly \$24,000 has been donated to the Rotary Foundation of which \$6,000 has been for Polio Plus.
- A new container has been purchased to store the many 'tools of trade' needed for our SERVICE activities. The capital cost has been charged to the SERVICE account, to be amortised over a relatively short period.
- The bank account opened to handle transactions relating to the APT European Tour raffle is in the process of being finalized and closed.




## **SERVICE ACCOUNT FOR 11 MONTHS TO 31 May 2009**
