President's Report

The Club's 30th year has been a year of consolidation, development and steady progress underpinned by a revised administrative structure based on Rotary's Club Leadership Plan. At the same time the Club has had an eye to the future taking into account RI World President John Kenny's theme: "The Future of Rotary is in Your Hands".

The Board has met regularly to manage and oversight the affairs of the Club and the Directors provide detail on their areas of responsibility elsewhere in this report.

The Club remained an active partner in Rotary Community Service programs including recovery activity for areas ravaged by bushfires in February 2009. Our work has including fencing at Upper Plenty, Buxton and Kinglake and specific funds were earmarked for a major project at Marysville. Other partnership activity included support for Boroondara Cares, a program in which all the Rotary Clubs in the Boroondara have combined to support the drought affected Moira shire in Northern Victoria.

Community and fund raising activities during the year included the annual Rotary Ride for cyclists, catering for marshals and others at the Grand Prix, the Fun in Retirement Expo (FIRE), the ladies Christmas Fair and various other events including the Werribee Equestrian and Reclink (community support) programs. The financial return from FIRE was disappointing, at about break even, but the event was also designed to provide a community service for those approaching or in retirement and the concept remains open to further review.

The International Service program of recent years in the Solomon Islands moved towards maturity with funding for a rice drying and storage facility. The International Committee began work on a new community based project at Minh Hac in Vietnam.

Rotary presentations were regularly scheduled at Club meetings under the headings of Vocational Service and Rotary Knowledge. The internal Vocational program included presentations from Club members highlighting their own experience and a debate with the topic "Ethics in Business – The Responsibility Lies with Regulators, not Directors, Managers or Employees".

The Rotary Knowledge program covered a variety of areas, with focus on the Rotary Foundation and its global reach and proposed changes being piloted in the Rotary Future Vision program.

The Club participated in the Foundation's Group Study Exchange program and hosted the inbound team from Spain while Brazil was the focus of our commitment to Rotary Youth Exchange. This year's Exchange student Cecy Perez arrived to spend 12 months with us and Olivia Bassini returned home after her successful year in Brazil. Paulina Gorka returned to Poland in December. Maria Moffatt, Mary George and Bronwen Dimond have worked with commitment as Counsellors for Cecy, Olivia and Paulina respectively. The Club is indebted to them and to the host families in the 2009/2010 Rotary year, Ann Kerr and Graeme Bird, Rosemary Kelly and Michael Barden, Carol and Jim Studebaker and Judy and Geoff Steinicke.

The Club supported the RYLA camp at Wonga Park and hosted the D9800 RYPEN camp at Lancefield during the year. RCNB continued to support the North Balwyn Rotaract Club and the Balwyn High School Interact Club.

There has been a slight drop in membership for the year with the induction of five members against a loss of seven. The trend has been reviewed by the Membership Committee and innovative programs are under consideration to attract new members.

Fundraising remains a key issue with various options under review. The Club conducted extensive due diligence and the Board approved a proposal to develop and operate an Op Shop style of retail outlet to raise funds to support service programs. We were not successful in finding a suitable manager for the start-up phase and as a result the project has not been brought to fruition. However an enormous amount of information is available should an Op Shop be re-visited in future. I acknowledged Don Taylor's effort and energy in proposing and developing the case for the Op Shop. The proposal was extensively reviewed by the Major Projects Committee chaired by Garth Symington and by a Working Party appointed by the Board and lead by Jim Romanis.

Fellowship continued as a key element in Club life and this year's Committee, chaired by Don Bowden developed an excellent and varied program greatly enjoyed by our members. This extended to the annual golf and fellowship weekend, fellowship evenings, epicure dinners and an excursion to Marysville to support the town following last year's devastating fires.

At the District level, a team of 17 from the Club attended the D9800 Conference in Perth, Western Australia in March and enjoyed an excellent conference program and good fellowship.

Early in the Rotary year there was extensive discussion in the Club about honorary membership and following lengthy consideration the Board endorsed guidelines designed to assist the appointment of honorary members in future.

Looking to the future, the Horizons Committee chaired by Phil Francis, was asked to develop a strategic plan for the Board. As part of the process Rowan McClean facilitated a Club forum/ planning session and subsequently drafted a document "The Way Ahead – 2010-2012 and beyond". The document has been endorsed by the Board and will provide a planning framework for future administrations.

The Club celebrated its 30th birthday with a black tie dinner in May attended by 160 at the Manningham Club. During the evening an updated Club history - *The First Thirty Years* – was launched by the Club's Charter President Stan Hibbert. This excellent document of record was compiled by an enthusiastic editorial committee chaired by David Cheney and including Paul Fitz, Brian Hurnard and Ian Adams. The featured speaker was Brian Nankervis, son of the late Jack Nankervis who was District Governor when the Club was chartered in 1980. Brian's heartfelt reminiscences about Jack's connection to the Club and his candour and humour provided an entertaining highlight at the celebration.

I have appreciated the support of an excellent Board this past year who have served the Club particularly well and I thank each one of them for their contribution and support in the management of the Club finances, programs and other issues requiring attention. I am particularly grateful to Bill Oakley and Paul Fitz who at short notice respectively took on responsibilities for Fundraising and Foundation when a vacancy on the Board occurred.

It has been a challenging year financially and the Treasurer Geoff Haddy has worked diligently to monitor and maintain the Club Administration and Service accounts effectively and efficiently. The Treasurer's report indicates the detail and the Board believes we have achieved a satisfactory outcome in the circumstances. Importantly

the Club again met its obligations to the Rotary Foundation which underpins Rotary's Global reach, including Polio Plus.

The Club's Honorary Secretary, Mike McKay has worked with great attention to detail to ensure the Board and the administration of the Club operated smoothly during the year. I have also valued the support of Vice President Peter Elliott, President Elect Findley Cornell and others on the Board including Bob Adams, Terry Gretton, Geoff Haddy, Sue McDonald, lan Mollison and Gavan Schwartz. They have made up a great team and through their collective contribution they have served the club extremely well.

The Club has also been fortunate to have the support of the D9800 Eastside Cluster Assistant Governor, Philip Rowell whose Rotary experience, advice and counsel has been very helpful in working through a range of issues.

The Club could not have functioned without support from many working tirelessly behind the scenes. Our speaker's program has been excellent due largely to the work of Michael Barden and Joe Butler. Matthew Pauli has been an enthusiastic Sergeant at Arms overseeing Club meetings, conducting fines sessions and keeping us humoured with tales of Murphy and others.

Unheralded officers include the Board Minute Secretary Jane Pennington, Banking Marcel Muntwyler, Property Officer Barry Cummings, Database and Attendance Hugo Goetze, Protection Officer John Rennie and Radio 96.5 Inner FM Don Bowden.

Communications are significant in maintaining and developing the Club's internal and external profile and this year Phil Francis had oversight of our communications program with support from Dick Johnson our Webmaster, John Cook, editor of the Grapevine and Maurie Walters, publicity.

Beyond the Board and those already mentioned I would like to thank everyone in the Club who has supported me during 2009/2010. Your numbers are numerous and your encouragement has been helpful. I have appreciated the good will extended to me.

I am also extremely grateful for the support of our wives, husbands and partners who have willingly participated in a range of activities. Specifically I mention my wife Jo, who has been not only an enthusiastic contributor, but a constructive critic when appropriate! Her support has been unwavering and she has my heartfelt thanks for that.

The Club now moves into its fourth decade of Service and I wish Findley Cornell and his team good fortune for the Club in its 31st year.

CLUB FINANCES

The following accounts relate to the first eleven months of the year. Our full year accounts, including prior year comparisons, will be published on the Club website as soon as practicable after 30th June, replacing the 2008/09 accounts currently on the website.

The Club maintains two sets of accounting records:

ADMINISTRATION accounts for transactions relating to the day-to-day operations of the Club including our financial obligations to Rotary International and to District 9800.

SERVICE accounts for transactions relating to our fundraising, community projects, service activities and donations for the benefit of our local and international communities. This includes our contributions to the Rotary Foundation.

Although there is one month of expenses to come, our ADMINISTRATION accounts should end the year in satisfactory shape. Thanks to generous support from Jetset North Balwyn and Publication Perspectives, the cost to the Club for publication of our updated history was held at \$4,006 which was the amount put aside from prior years for this purpose. Our obligations to Rotary International were helped by favourable exchange rate movements.

Despite a hiccup with FIRE and no golf or trivia events this year, two key initiatives added to our SERVICE fundraising efforts: the very successful Christmas Fair raising funds for the Eva Tilley Memorial Home, and the sale of Relish Recipe books. The Christmas raffle exceeded the previous year's result by over \$1,600 and, although we no longer had revenue from the Macleay Park Community Café, our catering teams did a superb job to raise \$8,345 with more in the pipeline from events being held in June. Members and partners have continued to be generous not only with their time but with donations including the week-by-week 'spare cash in the silverpot' enabling a donation to Australian Rotary Health of around \$1,200. We also received \$1,750 from the Interactors to support our international activities, in particular the Vietnam Minh Hac project.

Other highlights from our SERVICE activities include:


- Our final instalment to help finance the special needs of Brigette Stark, a young girl who touched our hearts with her courage.
- Continued support for Boroondara cares and for Carols in the Park.
- Bushfire relief expenditure related to our fencing projects and the equipping of a BBQ trailer.
 Further expenditure is expected once a decision is reached on a suitable major project.
- \$2,000 put aside for an Odyssey House project, and \$2,000 put aside for the initial awards in the new (ES3P) Exemplary Science Scholar Support Program.
- In addition to our usual RYLA support, special help was given to Greg Dimopoulos to attend RYLA International.
- Continued support for the Exchange Student program
- Transfer of funds (including \$5,000 District Simplified Grant) to build up a trust fund in Honiara to the equivalent of A\$15,000 to help finance a rice drying/storage shed at Tetere in the Solomons.
- Transfer of A\$7,000 for our initial project in Vietnam at Minh Hac.
- \$16,500 for the Rotary Foundation, including \$3,000 for Polio Plus and \$1,000 for the Royce and Jean Abbey Endowment Fund.
- Donations of \$3,500 to the Asthma Foundation of Vic. rom proceeds of the Rotary Ride, and \$6,909 to the Eva Tilley Memorial Home with more to come from the Ladies Card Luncheon in June.

Expenditure for the Rotary Centenary Project (Marwal Ave development) did not proceed, so those 'committed funds' were written back for use elsewhere.




NET ASSETS AT END OF MAY

The coupling of these two committees for the 09/10 Rotary year presented some initial concerns that were quickly dispelled by the enthusiasm of the committee members in pursuing all the challenges that were presented during this year.

The committee was well served by - Jim Studebaker, Ron Phillips, Rob Head, Anthony Stokes, Imre Lele, Jane Pennington, Maria Moffatt, Barry Cummings, George Selkrig, John Gartlan and Anthony Overmaars. We welcomed Sally Blaubaum to the committee on her induction into our club in April 2010.

Anthony Stokes represented the club on the District RYPEN committee and Rob Head was active with District on the RYLA committee – we thank both members for this extended participation

Graeme Bird continues to represent the club on the District International Youth Exchange Committee.

With the "double interest" of the committee Jim and Jane were co-opted to assist in the coordination of the Vocational and Youth Projects respectively.

My sincere thanks to the both of them for their excellent support and to all the other members who contributed so effectively throughout the year.

Meetings of the committee were generally in two parts with a combined opening to deal with correspondence and to discuss major policy directions before splitting into the two aspects of the program for more administrative considerations and implementation plans. This arrangement, with an expectations statement established prior to each meeting, appeared to work well with the committee achieving its aims throughout the year.

The Vocational program was built around the idea of providing more information to the club on skills held by individual members and the wide variety of Rotary processes surrounding Foundation. Ethics in Business was also an aspect the committee wished to highlight. The Youth component was represented by traditional District related projects and an exploration of possible local involvement through the Boroondara City Council. Two significant recommendations were sent to the Board during the year.

• The first relates to the International Youth Exchange program as a result of a club survey on attitudes to that program. The issue of finding host families has presented significant difficulties to the Youth Committee so the survey was conducted, with greater than 80% response rate from the club. The outstanding and conflicting responses indicated that the majority of the club strongly supported the exchange program but only 2% were able to offer to host an incoming student. The following recommendation was therefore made to the Board:

"That the club takes no further active participation in incoming International Youth Exchange Program activities (following the conclusion of the current inbound activity due to conclude in January 2011) until the membership can ensure the availability of host families prior to any incoming student acceptance".

• The second recommendation was to bring the issue of club member acceptance of the need to acquire Working with Children Cards (WWC's) to a higher awareness. Currently 25% of club members do not hold WWCs- with some actively antagonistic to them. The role of the Protection Officer was chosen by the Youth Committee as a means of increasing the awareness and hopefully compliance with this legislation. The following recommendation was therefore presented to the Board: "That the Club review the role statement for the Club Protection Officer in the light of recent compliance of members participating in some service activities".

The Board has moved to include the District role statement for the Club Protection Officer in the Club Bylaws – this remains a continuing concern as the club is held accountable if a member should participate in an organised event with children when not in possession of a current WWC.

PROJECT REPORTS:

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA)

Our club nominated Amy Wappler from the Rotaract Club and accepted a District nominee in Sukrit Sabhlok to the December 2009 camp. Both of these young leaders responded well to the challenges presented and expressed their thanks and development opportunities to the club after their participation. Six members of the club represented at the RYLA Dinner in support of our nominees and of Rob Head who continues on the District committee. The club is excited to have Greg Dimopoulos accepted as a delegate to the International RYLA Assembly in Montreal later in the year. Greg has received club financial support for this exciting leadership development activity.

It is also exciting to report that Greg has been nominated as the incoming RYPEN Camp Coordinator for the next Rotary year. Our congratulations to Greg on these recognitions of his contribution and abilities.

Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN)

Poppi Owen from Canterbury Girls Secondary College was our club nominee to the April camp with the second nominee unable to attend. The club had responsibility for the catering for this camp so our sincere thanks to the "cooks": Bill Oakley, Jane Pennington, Mike McKay and John McBride. Thanks also to Barbara Stokes, Jo Wells, Findlay Cornell and Gavan Schwartz for their assistance in serving the Dinner hosted by our President Tony Wells on the Saturday evening.

In an article published in the school newsletter Poppi later wrote "What I loved most about RYPEN were the amazing people I met. It gave me the opportunity to meet people from all over Victoria and by the end of the camp, (as corny as it sounds) we were like a great big family. Before I went to RYPEN I thought Rotary was just for "old people" but now I know that there are so many other programs and opportunities for younger people to get involved in. I had such a great time during my time at the RYPEN camp and if anyone gets the chance to go on it next year I would definitely recommend it". Poppi is to be asked to present a report on her experience to the club. The availability of students to participate in such activities as RYPEN appears to be declining.

ES3P (Exemplary Science Student Support Program)

Having trialed this new program in 08/09 a name change and clear documentation of the administrative functions and application processes was undertaken.

This has now been established within a discrete website attached to the club website that will form the basis for the distribution of information into educational establishments in June 2010.

This program is designed to replace previous District science support programs the club felt were no longer providing the outcomes sought.

A budget of \$2000 has been retained to support this program into the future.

The trialing of the processes envisaged in the last Rotary year has assisted us in refining the program documentation and expectations. We look forward to receiving responses to the information to be circulated in the near future.

MUNA (Model United Nations Assembly)

This program was originally planned to run in Bendigo at Camp Getaway in June 2010 but was rescheduled for August 20 – 23 due to a lack of participants.

Our club sought participants from Canterbury Girls Secondary College, through the Interact Club at Balwyn High school and has secured two candidates from Trinity Grammar School. The club supports this activity and will continue to budget and seek participants for it. Transport to and from the Assembly will be provided by club members.

The issue of students being available to participate in these programs continues to concern the committee. There may be a need to explore a different methodology in circulating information to organisations from which we draw participants for such programs: a recommendation that the Cluster consider this situation will be discussed at the next Youth Committee meeting.

Youth Exchange (Inbound)

Thursday 28th January 2010 at 23.05 Cecy Perez de Nascimento arrived from Brazil to begin her 12 months with RCNB. Cecy was met at the airport by her Counselor- Maria Moffatt, her first host family- Carol and Jim Studebaker, our returned Exchange student from Brazil – Olivia Bassani, Youth Director- Gavan Schwartz and President Tony Wells and Jo. So began our continuing support for this program with Cecy being the fourth inbound student in the club without a break.

Contact with Cecy's father was established by the Studebakers and President Tony prior to her arrival – a worthwhile extension of our club's influence.

Cecy was enrolled at Canterbury Girls Secondary College – the school that Olivia attends – in year 11. CGSC has been given first option in having participants in all appropriate youth programs

Carol Studebaker worked with the committee to establish a body of knowledge to support host families. This is being used to support Geoff and Judy Steinicke, Rosemary Kelly and Michael Barden and hopefully the Bassani family (Olivia's family) who will host Cecy as her fourth host family.

Special mention must be made of the diligence of Cecy's Counselor – Maria: Her attention to detail in making sure Cecy has a great time in Melbourne has been exemplary.

At the time of reporting on this program Cecy was registering to participate in competitive Australian Rules Football competitions (mainly as a result of her introduction to the game from the Barden family!)

Cecy has participated enthusiastically in all activities available to her. Thanks are expressed to all club members who have involved her in outings and visits during her time with us.

Youth Exchange (Outbound)

Following the club survey results and the resultant recommendation to the Board no active participation has been undertaken to identify a future outgoing student

Interact:

The Interact Club at North Balwyn has continued to function well with support from George Selkrig

The club, led by Mei Jin Tee and Nick Lui meets regularly every fortnight with a Board meeting in the intervening weeks. Membership has been consistent with up to 20 members attending most meetings.

As a result of fund raising activities in 2009 a cheque for \$1750 was presented to RCNB to assist in the Vietnam project to purchase books for the students at Min Hac. President Tony attended a meeting at Balwyn High School to explain the processes involved in getting the contribution to its intended outcome.

The Interact club has planned and conducted several fundraising activities for this year including face painting at a sports day, "It Takes Two" talent quest and another edition of "Strictly Balwyn" is scheduled for 21 August 2010.

As George is stepping down from his role as coordinator there will be an immediate need to find a RCNB member who can attend the Tuesday meetings of our Interact Club to ensure its ongoing success.

Rotaract:

As Mathew Pauli has had such a leadership role with the Rotaractors this committee has stepped back from the support role for it. The committee recognises that this responsibility will rest with the committee when needed.

Local Youth Projects

A gathering of cluster New Generation coordinators with officers from Boroondara City Council has been exploring projects directed at youth within the municipality. The recommendation from the current committee for the incoming committee is to seek projects of a needs base sourced from Camcare or similar welfare agencies that would benefit from hands on support to projects in the local area. The recommendation would extend to the idea of the club focusing on coordinating services from funded organisations to support disadvantaged youth.

Vocational and Rotary Talks

The idea of the club being aware of its members skills, capabilities and passions was the underpinning of a series of talks by club members entitled "What's My Line," with emphasis on the influence of the "Four Way Test" and its impact and effects in the member's business outcomes. The ten minute talks were presented on a monthly basis with any new member being invited to present an autobiography shortly after their induction as an adjunct to the arranged program. In this way the club has had approximately 12 presentations of skills and competency capabilities of its members during the year. Rob head was most effective in having these presentations take place throughout the Rotary year.

Monthly talks by experienced Rotarians on specific aspects of Rotary programs operated concurrently with the skills presentations. Members from other clubs assisted here also. PDG Jim called in a few favours to ensure the best knowledge on the particular topics was shared with the club.

A presentation at District Assembly on the Vocational program of the club was made.

Vocational Theme Month Presentation:

A debate entitled "Ethics in Business – The responsibility Lies With regulators and not the Directors, Managers and Employees of Businesses" formed the program for one meeting in October 2009.

Imre Lele arranged the two teams of three all of whom put in some time in preparation for the event.

An independent adjudicator was invited to participate which added to the impact of this attempt to raise the profile of ethics in business.

This activity was considered a good vehicle to re-emphasise the ethics aspect of Rotary.

Shine On Awards:

This program was again supported by our club but no suitable candidates were identified to submit for the selection process.

Police Mentoring Program:

Ron Phillips represented our Club in working with Inspector Michael Glinski in this program. Michael has attended several club meetings and addressed the club on the program and his role. Rob Head has also assisted Ron in the mentoring processes. This effective program is scheduled to continue into 2011.

This committee has participated in some far reaching considerations this year as it evaluated the programs running and the impacts of changes in the club on them.

While raising funds, our involvement with Reclink provides a great community service by Rotary which is widely recognised and acknowledged. Major amongst these was the effort to develop and establish a Rotary Op Shop. Whilst all the work was done to persuade the board to support the project, we haven't at this stage found someone willing and able to take on the initial management role. Also a new format for our Golf Day was established, and although some 12 fours were found we didn't secure the necessary 18 fours to get underway. This is a possibility for a future fundraising committee to consider


International Committee Report 2009-10

The 2009-10 International Committee's work program has seen the completion of our major commitments in the Solomon Islands. The Club sought and received a District Simplified Grant of \$5,000 to help funding for the first stage of a rice drying and storage facility at the Don Bosco Rural Training Centre at Tetere on the island of Guadalcanal. In total \$15,000 has been committed to the project which fulfils a need for the community at Tetere and its effort to further develop a renewed rice growing industry.

We also express our sincere thanks to Aisin (Australia) for their generous donation of 10 new electric sewing machines which are being used within the technical school and community to enhance the financial self empowerment of the Solomon Island people. This year has also seen the implementation of a new challenge in Vietnam. We have recently received approval to assist in funding the construction of a community centre in Minh Hac, based some four hours from Hanoi. The presence of a community centre in the village will provide a vital focal point where education, health and social engagement can assist the wellbeing of the community in general. The building construction is under way with visits by club members planned in the new Rotary year. There are many further potential projects that can be linked into this one once we have an established presence in Vietnam including water and health education. The project has recently been registered as a RAWCS project which will enhance our ability to work in collaboration with other clubs particularly within our cluster that may be interested in joint projects that will increase our capacity to maximise our efforts in providing better outcomes for international communities. The RAWCS status also confers immediate benefits for members in terms of it tax deductibility when undertaking travel to Vietnam to assist with projects.

The committee has also undertaken to reconnect with as many of our past International exchange students as possible and this has so far been quite successful. My heartfelt thanks to all members (Nino Sofra, John Magor, Bob Bott, Peter Cleary, Gary O'Connor, Kinga Paulheim and Bernie Smith) of the committee who have been a fantastic support and contributed so willingly and with such a dedication to the purpose of the committee. I hope those moving on from the committee will continue to give us the benefit of their expertise and watch with interest the growth and development of a major project they have initiated. A special note of thanks to Nino for so seamlessly stepping into the Director role during my recent need for extended leave.

Group Study Exchange

- Megan Voelkel, visiting Ambassadorial Scholar from the USA, spoke on the Program and the influence it is having on her.
- PDG Jim Studebaker spoke on The Rotary Foundation Polio Eradication Initiative.
- PP Garth Symington, District's Humanitarian Grants Deputy Chairman, spoke on the new types of grants which will form part of the Foundation Future Vision global Pilot program.
- PDG lan Knight, District's Annual Program Giving Chairman, spoke on contributions.

Every Rotarian Every Year Centurion Program

During the year this type of personal giving to The Rotary Foundation was promoted to Club members. At the end of the 2009-2010, there were 28 active Centurions in the Club, three of whom were also Paul Harris Society members.

Contributions

The Club gave \$ 15,500 to The Rotary Foundation, \$3,000 of which was ear-marked for the Polio Eradication Initiative. This more than met the District's goal of contributing at least \$150 per member.

Paul Fitz

Max Hunter

Max Hunter was a member of our Club for almost 25 years and was committed to the Rotary ideal of Service above Self. Max seldom sought the limelight, but his commitment was self evident.

His fellow Rotarians were aware of his contribution to the Club and its programs and activities, especially when, as a member of a three man team, he went to the Solomon Islands to help build a school and pass on skill to the locals.

Max's younger daughter, Jenny was the Club's third outbound exchange student, and Max joined the Club on Jenny's return from a year in Japan.

Max was a loyal member of the Club and was universally respected by all who had contact with him. Max was a distinguished Rotarian who was an active contributor to the Club's service and fellowship, and his work was acknowledged with a Paul Harris Recognition. PP Clive Hughes was asked to nominate a member of the Club to join the board of Eva Tilley Memorial Home, a local residential aged care facility. Clive invited Max to represent us and Max became a tireless worker for Eva Tilley where he was Honorary Treasurer for nearly fifteen years.

Max passed away on 17 July 2009 and Club members contributed to the purchase of a lasting memorial to him in the form of a painting of the foreshore of Blairgowrie that was presented to Eva Tilley in September 2009.

lan Taylor

lan was a member of the Club for fifteen years. He demonstrated values and standards to match those of the best Rotarians around the world.

lan was a great family man, a lover of golf (a sport he played extremely well) and was the quintessential Rotarian which was reflected in his commitment to the Rotary ideal of "Service before Self". His membership of service organisations began when he joined Apex in Western Victoria, working energetically for the community, displaying a propensity for fundraising and was appointed District Governor.

lan joined our Club in 1995 where he made an enormous contribution. Much of his work was done without fanfare as he preferred mostly to work behind the scenes.

He is remembered as a fund raiser 'extrordinaire' for his efforts in the early days of the Grand Prix marshall's breakfasts, and the Hole in One Golf that preceded the annual Charity Golf day. Ian also provided focus during development of the annual Christmas raffle, identifying and negotiating selling sites, obtaining permits, arranging rosters and selling tickets. Many thousands of the dollars raised for community projects can be directly attributed to his systematic and business-like approach to fund-raising.

lan never showed a desire to be President: his preference was to roll up his sleeves and get on with the job at the work face. His efforts were rewarded with two well deserved Paul Harris recognitions.

lan also enjoyed fellowship in the club and both he and Pat were active participants in the social activities. During his last two years, lan was Director of Club Service and despite his declining health, he remained on the Board until the new Rotary year began — this was a measure of his determination to continue to serve the Club.

lan died on 24 August 2009 following a long battle with cancer.
