Members of the Club were shocked and saddened by the sudden death of President Terry Gretton on 17 December 2012. Just days before, he had been exuberantly celebrating the outstanding result of the Christmas Raffle and had worked hard selling programs at the Annual Carols in the Park.

Terry's foreshortened term as President was marked by the tremendous personal effort he was making to further strengthen and invigorate the Club. Above all he had an enduring sense of humour. He introduced new ideas – no committees, a weekly toast to another Rotary Club proposed by a Club member, meetings chaired by the President and a different host each week to introduce the guest speaker. He also placed a strong emphasis on the local community and increasing membership. He engaged with many community groups and encouraged members to join with him thereby forging strong links with a wide range of organisations. His two favourite causes were Servants Community Housing which provides housing and support for local homeless people and he was a weekly volunteer at Fareshare which provides free, tasty and nutritious meals to the hungry using food donated by supermarkets, farms and markets.

Terry was immensely proud that as a result of the record-making profit from the Club's Annual Charity Golf Day the Club was able to make a substantial contribution to Fareshare. The returns from the Christmas raffle set another record leading to the Club readily providing additional funding towards the recent purchase of 'Gretto's bus' which was donated to Servants.

Terry's optimistic approach to everything he did certainly caught on in the Club and the Board was unanimous in deciding to commit itself to building on all that he started. He is sadly missed by all.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

2012/13 was an extraordinary year for the RC North Balwyn by any measure with the untimely and devastating death of our elected President Terry Gretton on December 17th 2012. During his all too brief time in office Terry invigorated our Club through his commitment and enthusiasm for the Rotary ideal of Service Above Self and the results he achieved were outstanding. Terry outlined the achievements of the first six months of the Rotary year at our Club meeting four days before he died and in summarising the period he was President he reported: Tonight is our final regular meeting for the year and what a first six months it has been! It has been exciting, busy, rewarding a lot of fun and some hard work as well. Some of achievements have been, the formation of a partnership with Bendigo Community Bank Kew East, and further developing partnerships with our community including the Boroondara City Council and other Rotary Clubs in our area through Boroondara Cares, Servants Community Housing, FareShare, North Balwyn Traders Association, Schools, Disabled groups, Victoria Police, CamCare, Reclink.

In July we visited FareShare to see the wonderful work they are doing. Anna Seidenkranz, our exchange student, went back home to Germany after a great year. The Catering Corp came to the fore at the Miniatures event. The Web Site has been revamped. We had our first dinner at Servants.

During the year a team went to Tungamah for restoration work on flood damaged fences. Balwyn High Interact Club is active and we've committed to an Earlyact Club at the Balwyn Primary School.

The Gardening Project is going from strength to strength and we held the NAB Business Breakfast at Colombo's. The Golf Day at Freeway Golf Course raised substantial funds to go to Fare-Share. A great Fellowship Weekend was enjoyed by members at Swan Hill.

We supplied volunteer marshals at the City to Sea fun run, and the Xmas Fare provided a healthy result to be passed onto Guide Dogs Victoria. We also had several volunteers at the Variety Children's Christmas Party. The Club Xmas raffle wound up on Saturday and all tickets have been sold, raising more than \$20,000.

We have had some great speakers (as always) this year making our meetings interesting and informative. The AFL Grand Final night, and Melbourne Cup night saw enthusiastic attendance with great supporting speakers . We inducted a new member and we look forward to inducting many more next year. We sent two young people to RYLA. And offshore we have great work continuing in Bali and Vietnam.

All in all its been a great six months for our club and Jessica and I thank each and every one of you and your partners for your support, encouragement and the great work that you have done. One of my friends said 'We must not rest on our laurels in the New Year'. I can promise you that we will not do that.

During the second half of the Rotary year the Club maintained the momentum. I was appointed to the vacant President's position by the Board and, taking into account my other Rotary Commitments as Assistant Governor for the Batman Cluster of Clubs, the Board agreed to appoint

two Vice -Presidents to share the work load. Peter Cleary and Peter Elliott willingly accepted the roles and I am indebted to them for their commitment, support and advice. The continuity we achieved in the circumstances following the loss of Terry is in no small way due to their contribution.

Club Directors will report on Club activities in more detail elsewhere in this Annual Report, but I would like to highlight several programs.

The Club provided a people mover vehicle for Servants Community Housing, largely using funds raised during the Christmas raffle. This was a dream Terry had and the vehicle, now known as Gretto's Bus, is providing a much needed resource for Servants. Our relationship with Servants continues to grow and there will be many service opportunities to assist them in the future. Another major contribution as a result of fund raising was to make FareShare the beneficiary of our Golf tournament at Freeway Golf course in November with the proceeds earmarked for kitchen equipment. The tangible contributions to Servants and FareShare reflect our commitment to organisations providing much needed community services.

Another highlight for the year was a highly successful Multicultural Festival held in the North Balwyn village with support of the Trader's Association. The event was coordinated by Rowan McClean and established a profile for the Club in our own Community and a direct link with the shops and services in the village.

North Balwyn was the lead Club for Rotarians at Work Day in the Eastside Cluster and under Garth Symington's guidance 50 Rotarians worked at eight locations clearing up gardens for those who needed a helping hand. This was an extension of our regular gardening clean- up program supported by several schools in the municipality.

The Club sent two candidates to the Hiroshima Peace Forum, an initiative of the World Rotary President, Sakuji Tanaka. This event focussed on youth and our representatives were Naomi Uehara and an Interactor from Balwyn High, Lauren McLennan.

The Club also launched an Earlyact Club at the North Balwyn Primary School in May. This is the second Earlyact Club in D9800 and it will encourage the primary students to reflect the values of Rotary. Bronwen Dimond has enthusiastically coordinated the development of the Club and I appreciate her contribution.

The Club hosted members of the Group Study Exchange team from D1080 in the UK during the year. We have an inbound Rotary Youth Exchange Student joining us for 2013/14 - Clarisse Bachut from France. The Club has also nominated an outward bound Youth Exchange Student. The Club participated in District 9800 Police Leadership Mentoring program. Geoff Haddy was mentor for Superintendent David Watt who presented as guest speaker at a Club meeting and visited on several occasions. Superintendent Watt valued his association with the Club. The final point I would like to make is about our future. The Club is now 33 years old and it is timely to review our future directions. The Board agreed to participate in Rotary's Future Vision program and I expect this will proceed in the new Rotary year. Future Vision will provide a template for how we might operate in the years ahead. In my view it is important to think strategically how we will continue to provide service in a changing world. The Rotary Vision program is designed to help in this respect.

All that the Club has achieved in 2012/2013 would not have occurred without the tremendous support of many people for our activities, including service programs, fundraising and fellowship.

I very sincerely thank all who have contributed through the year – including a very supportive Board, as well as other members of the Club, but our wives, husbands, partners and friends, and in my case particularly through the support of Jo.

Terry Gretton's death was a devastating occurrence to deal with, but working together we continued to do what we do well and to seek to achieve *Peace Through Service*. The result has been another wonderful year for the Rotary Club of North Balwyn.

CLUB FINANCES

The following accounts relate to the first eleven months of the year. Our full year accounts, including prior year comparisons, will be published on the Club website as soon as practicable after 30th June, replacing the 2011/12 accounts currently on the website.

The Club maintains two sets of accounting records:

ADMINISTRATION accounts for transactions relating to the day-to-day operations of the Club including our financial obligations to Rotary International and to District 9800.

SERVICE accounts for transactions relating to our fundraising, community projects, service activities and donations for the benefit of our local and international communities. This includes our contributions to the Rotary Foundation.

It is anticipated our ADMINISTRATION account will end the year with a small deficit due in part to a modest shortfall in our anticipated income and in part to increased expenditure, particularly, on the (overdue) updating of our website. The anticipated deficit will be covered by the reserve funds we have in the account.

Looking forward we must expect continuing pressure on the ADMINISTRATION account. Members will be aware that the major items of expense in the account are the payments to District and Rotary International .The District levy is to increase by \$15 per member next year and the cost of the semi-annual payments to RI will increase if the recent fall in the value of our currency against that of the USA proves to be a permanent change.

Our SERVICE fund raising exceeded all expectations, a tribute to the dedication of the Fundraising Coordinators and to the generous support of members for all our varied fundraising activities. Given our history of successful fund raising and the accumulated reserves in the SERVICE account, the Club can confidently look forward to supporting both existing and new service projects in the coming year.

The following were among our SERVICE activities in the year to date:

- 1. Total payments of \$20,000 to the Rotary Foundation (\$15,000 allocated to this year and \$5,000 to the 2011/12 year) together with a further \$1,195 to the Royce & Jean Abbey Endowment Fund.
- 2. The acquisition of "Gretto's" bus for Servants Community Housing ,funded mainly by the Christmas Raffle , supplemented by donations from members and others.
- 3. A donation of \$18,000 to FareShare from the proceeds of the Golf Day.
- 4. A payment of \$ 4,032 towards the running costs of the inaugural Multicultural Fair in the North Balwyn Village. The \$1,035 proceeds of the day's sausage sizzle were donated to the Royal Children's Hospital.
- 5. \$6,604 to Don Bosco Tetere to buy timber for student bunks , funded as to \$2000 by the Rotary Club of Central Melbourne Sunrise.
- 6. The payment of \$4736 from the Timor Leste Medical Aid Fund , leaving a balance of \$ 863 for future aid.
- 7. An initial payment of \$3600 for our ongoing Bali Schools project. We received a donation of \$2500 from the Manningham Rotary Club for this project.
- 8. The establishment of the Tetere (Expansion Project) Fund. The expansion project budget is \$24,000. The Board has agreed to contribute \$ 8000 upon the project proceeding. \$ 6500 has been donated to date by other Rotary clubs

A donation of \$ 2700 to Guide Dogs Victoria from the Christmas Fare takings

This is my last year as Club treasurer .The Club's ongoing financial affairs will be in the very capable hands of David de Garis . I wish to express my thanks to my fellow board members and to all others who helped me , especially Marcel Muntwyler for attending to the weekly banking throughout.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Introduction

This has been a busy year for the Community portfolio, and we have continued with those activities that have proven to be successful year-to-year and set out to find other ways to raise our profile in the community.

Objectives

We planned to be visible in the community, to develop some new partnerships, to seek new members from the community and to strengthen our image as a group that is active and making valuable contributions to the residents of Boroondara.

Structure

There were no formal committees in 2012-2013, but the Board approved the appointment of a support person for each portfolio when it became apparent that help was needed. Garth Symington agreed to support the Director, and has been very active with FareShare, weekly gardening sessions, managing the gardening program for several months, organising the Rotarians at Work Day and helping other community projects.

For our new activity, the North Balwyn Multicultural Festival, there was excellent support from a great many club members for the months leading up to the event and on the day. Without singling anyone out, it was a great club effort of which we can be proud.

Activities and Achievements

The Rotary Gardens Project has grown from strength to strength. We currently have eight schools, 40 Rotarians and 34 active properties. We continue to get glowing feedback from residents.

The North Balwyn Multicultural Festival was a resounding success and we have built a strong relationship with the North Balwyn Village Traders Association who want to run a similar Festival next year.

Thanks to good preparatory work by Bernie Smith and some other members, RCNB is in a strong position to be the lead partner in a Men's Shed project for the north east of Boroondara. A potential site at North Balwyn Village appears to be unsuitable for the activity because of the cost of establishing it and tenancy uncertainty. The Balwyn Community Centre on Whitehorse Road is being redeveloped and Council is planning to locate the Men's Shed there. We have had a good presence in the Council-run Community Partnerships Forums, at Boroondara Cares, at the Variety Christmas function, and at Camp Getaway. We helped with the Uniting Church Christmas lunch and have had good local media coverage for the Rotary Gardens Project, the North Balwyn Multicultural Festival, and our support for Servants and FareShare. The Christmas raffle, Grand Prix and other catering events, blood pressure monitoring during National Stroke Week the Christmas cake stall and Carols in the Park have been highly visible public activities for the Club. Our 'brand' on the new Servants bus will be another message to convey the Club's contributions to our community

Tak Yukawa's personal alarms initiative, ably supported by Bob Bromley and others, is gaining momentum and is a useful tool for vulnerable members of the community.

A proposal is being developed to hold a monthly RCNB stall at North Balwyn, which would highlight further our role in the community and enable us to sell alarms, Bill Oakley's jams, sausages and handcrafts from Rotary projects overseas.

Conclusion

It has been a satisfying year and we have certainly developed new relationships and been seen as active by the public. The stronger ties established in our own North Balwyn area is a particularly gratifying outcome from the year. Attracting members is difficult, but I hope that an active public face will help.

Community activities rely on the ongoing support and involvement of our club members, and I would like to record my thanks to all members who have contributed to our efforts this year.

Club members opened their hearts and homes again to provide accommodation for her visit. Bronwen Dimond is to be her counsellor and we look forward to Clarisse's arrival.

The new Rotary year will also see the nomination of an outbound student, Eloise, yet to be considered in late May by District and we wish her well.

North Balwyn Interact Club

This year our Interact Club boasts a much bigger membership than in past years. About 20 members attend each weekly lunchtime meeting. President Kithmin Ranamukhaarachchi and Vice President Harrison Kehne jointly chair meetings. This year, two students have attended the Rypen weekend at Lancefield and one student has attended the Hiroshima Peace Conference with our Naomi Uehara. The students concerned have been enthusiastic about the ongoing benefits they expect to derive from these programs.

In 2013 the fund-raising activities have included a lunchtime pizza sale, a fairy floss sale and hair spraying at the school's athletics day, and a free dress day for all students.

The very popular 'It Takes 2' and 'Strictly Balwyn' concerts will again be held in the second half of 2013. It is also intended to hold another pizza sale in October or November. At least six of our Rotary members will assist on this day.

This year the Interact Club will be supporting the Club's Minh Hac project.

RYPEN (Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment

This year two students from the Interact Club at Balwyn High school were chosen by our club to be part of the RYPEN camp at Camp Weekaway in Lancefield from March 22nd to the 24th March. The two students were Sion Hau and Eva Wu, both returned greatly enriched and felt the camp was most enjoyable and informative.

RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards)

This year we were not able to source two students ourselves but were able to sponsor Johnson Ja and Dylan Mavros who were in the running with the Rotary Club of Melbourne. The camp at Camp Oasis was held from 2-8 December 8 2012. Johnson is a second year Medical student at Monash University and he is very active in his local community having been on the Stonnington Youth Council. He is a volunteer with St John Ambulance, and has been selected as part of a group involved in fundraising vaccinations for overseas communities. Dylan is currently studying Social Science / Psychology through VTAC after realising the course in advertising at RMIT was not the career he wished to follow. Dylan coaches under 16 basketball and works casually as an usher for a local council theatre.

Dylan and Johnson spoke to our Club about the various challenges that the group faced and resolutions achieved when working with a group of like-minded individuals. Both reiterated the strong bonds of friendship forged whilst at the camp, and thanked our Club for the opportunity to gain insight into so many new concepts and the way to problem solve the outcomes.

ROTARACT

As with last year The Rotaract Club of North Balwyn was not able to sustain itself and ideas were floated about joining forces with a Guide, Scout / Rovers group to dual badge. While this has not come about, there is still the possibility it might as Jane Pennington and Bill Oakley work behind the scenes. We also have a new Rotarian in Greg Dimopoulos who was the president of the Rotaract Club a year before its folding.

EARLYACT

Our Club has recently chartered the second Earlyact Club in our District. In partnership with Balwyn North Primary School, this new group was launched on 20 May at a ceremony attended by District Governor Dennis Shore and

Lynda, President Tony Wells and Jo and several members and wives from our Club. Earlyact is designed to promote goodwill, understanding and peace through the active participation of its student members, so that with committed citizenship and effective leadership, they may improve the quality of life of their school, local and global communities.

Earlyact is a Service Club with membership open to all students in Years 5 and 6. Our Club has started with 49 members, 14 of whom are office bearers. DG Dennis Shore presented badges to all members, who were then invited to join the visiting Rotarians for a celebratory afternoon tea. President, Vanessa Han and Vice President, Rishov Doloi will work together to promote the activities of the Club to the wider school community, with assistance from School Advisor Jan Rowe and Rotary Advisor Bronwen Dimond. Several projects have already been identified and work on these will begin immediately. The Earlyact Community team will collect food for the Wesley Central Mission's Winter Meals Appeal. The School team will start working on the stall which they will run at the school's Fun Fair, in November, and the International team will form friendships with, and provide assistance to, schools in Vietnam and Rali

CAMP GETAWAY

The Club continues to support Camp Getaway near Bendigo under the leadership of Ken Maxfield. PARTNERSHIP WITH 1ST NORTH BALWYN SCOUT TROOP

During 2012, in conjunction with a number of other clubs in District 9800 (in particular, Rotary Club of Canterbury) we began to explore whether there would be value in our developing partnerships with other like-minded community organisations, and, in particular, Scouts and Guides. Guides are exploring a partnership between District 9800 and the Guides Victoria.

We have chosen to try the model of a partnership between our Club and an individual Scout Group, and have commenced to develop a partnership with the 1st North Balwyn Scout Group. The Group meets at the Scout Hall located in McCleay Park, just behind Balwyn High School. Many of the youth members of 1st North Balwyn are students at North Balwyn Primary School and Balwyn High School, so this is a good fit with our other youth activities of Interact and Earlyact.

1st North Balwyn Group operates all Scout sections from Joeys (age 6/7) to Rovers (age 18/26), and offers us another source of youth and energy to participate in our projects, and to whom we can provide assistance and support.

The Group Leader of 1st North Balwyn Group is Richard DeVere. Richard has become a Friend of RCNB and has visited our Club. His wife Bernadette, who is also the Venturer Leader (15/18 year olds) has been a guest speaker. Late President Terry Gretton attended 1st North Balwyn's annual meeting in 2012, and Richard and Terry met at sponsorship forums organised by Bendigo Bank.

We believe that the best way to build a partnership is simply to start working together when we have the opportunity. 1st North Balwyn participated with us in the North Balwyn Multicultural festival and has explored becoming involved both with the Grand Prix and with the Garden Project. We have provided help to the Venturers by acting as employers in some role playing interview activities for the venturers. We are exploring the possibility of using some youthful energy and muscle in some of our overseas projects.

We hope to strengthen and grow the partnership as we each explore and find ways in which we can participate and support the program and activities of the other. Richard will talk to a future meeting of our Club to explain a little of how his Group operates, and it is hoped that members of RCNB can visit various meetings of the Scout Group.

FOUNDATION

The Rotary Foundation is our charity and it is up to us to support it financially as well as its programs. When, and not if, polio is eradicated from the world we will be able to feel justifiably proud of our small part in it. However this is only one part (albeit a large part) of the many humanitarian programs of the Foundation.

This is how I finished my report last year and I thought it appropriate to begin this year's report.

The Club's "All-Time Giving" stands at \$280,849.97.

Funds may be donated to the Foundation in the form of Paul Harris Fellow (PHF) recognitions where the Club donates \$1000 on an individual's behalf or an individual may do the same. Members may become "Every Rotarian Every Year" (EREY) members (previously known as Centurions) by donating \$100 per year. Currently we have 36 "paid up members". By an annual contribution of \$1000 one can become a member of the Paul Harris Society. Currently we have three members.

We slowly add to these numbers each year but unfortunately we have some members who lapse due to non-payment of their annual contribution. I posed the challenge in my report last year for future Foundation directors to substantially increase the percentage of our members who are EREYs or PHS members. That challenge still stands.


This, year, as in previous years, the Club made a donation of \$15,000 to the Foundation which allows us to make those PHF awards previously mentioned.

The Foundation's funds are available to clubs and districts for eligible projects. This year we have in motion an application to fund a windmill in the Solomons adding to our ongoing involvement in this part of the world. Whilst this application is proceeding in this Rotary year we are hopeful it will come to fruition early in the next.

Other Foundation activities include the Club being well represented at the annual Paul Harris breakfast where again we filled a table.

We hosted another GSE team, this time from D1080 in the UK. It is unusual to host in consecutive years, however due to favourable comments by last year's team we were invited to host when another club pulled out. The visit was co-ordinated by Russell Cooper who upheld the North Balwyn tradition of hosting. Thanks to Russell and to the host families. A varied program was arranged and the team addressed the Club at our weekly meeting. A number of us also attended their welcome held at a venue in Brighton.

Grand Prix This event just continues to be run better every year with the organising group now well experienced and up to the challenge. Always a popular fundraiser, and this year was no exception with an abundance of volunteers offering to help.

Catering New members get to know early just how big a part catering plays in our activities when they find a RCNB apron included in the goodies bag they receive upon joining. Indeed catering contributes significantly to our fundraising efforts through direct and indirect projects. Catering has again this year provided significant funds from its various activities, including among others the Grand Prix, Golf Day, Reclink, craft, miniature and exquisite eggs exhibitions.





Christmas stall Held in the North Balwyn Village, was again an outstanding success with a great variety and quantity of goodies being donated. All were sold either on the day or raffled at the following Club meeting. Funds raised were donated to Guide Dogs Victoria.









Miscellaneous Once again activities initiated by various members of the Club made valuable contributions to the funds raised for the year. These included Bill's Jams, five-cent pieces collection, Spiral wishing well, personal safety alarms and member donations.





INTERNATIONAL

Introduction

There have been three International projects this year, and another possible project has been identified. In 2010 Imre Lele accompanied Rowan McClean on a visit to Minh Hac and, in 2011,Russell Cooper joined him. Because of difficulties encountered with the Vietnamese authorities by virtue of Rotary International not yet having a presence in the country, there was no visit in 2012. The next visit is planned just after the end of this financial year under the banner of a newly registered non-government organisation. A visit to Balinese schools was made in July/August 2012 to coincide with Rowan McClean's annual leave.

Bob Bott and Bill Oakley visited Tetere to continue the Club's long-running relationship with the Solomon Islands.

Objectives and Strategy

Minh Hac

Overseas Kids Foundation began supporting the education of the most needy children in the community as identified by the People's Committee. The Club has joined OKF as the project has expanded. More than a dozen of our members now support a needy student to enable them to attend school. The second phase of the Minh Hac project was to help with infrastructure and community projects. This is a Club project, and members have provided continuing support for the Kindergarten, the Primary School, and the Health Clinic. The first commercial venture, a pig-raising project, commenced this year and is intended to help the people break out of their subsistence cycle.



There are serious public health problems, and analysis has been commissioned to assess river and well-water quality and ascertain if that might be a contributing factor.

Bali

We have sourced external funding to supply furniture to a primary school and are currently conducting a computer hub trial in another primary school. Depending on the results of the trial, we have already arranged funding for trials in two other schools.

Tetere

We have arranged for the supply of sewing machines to the women of the community and the Board has approved a grant to contribute to a windmill installation to provide cost-efficient water for the rejuvenated rice-growing project.

Structure

President Terry Gretton decide not to have committees in 2012-2013, the approach being that the Director responsible would seek help from members as and when required. This was reviewed at the end of the first quarter and it was decided to approach an individual to support the Director and, in the case of International Imre Lele, who has visited the Solomons and Minh Hac and is one of the Club's sponsors of the Vietnamese project, agreed to assist. Bob Bott, Bill Oakley, Geoff Steineke and Robert Ebihara came together as a separate work group to continue support to the Solomon Islands.

For all three projects, a key success factor is that we have groups of committed, trustworthy and reliable people on the ground. In Vietnam, DTT are our counterpart group and there are some people from Minh Hac now living in Hanoi and community leaders in Minh Hac that constitute this group. In Bali we have established relationships with the RC of Bali Ubud Sunset and the Rotaract Club of Ubud to oversee our projects. In Tetere, the Don Bosco Mission is our partner on the ground.

Conclusion

We have achieved excellent results in all three communities. Our first two secondary school graduates from Minh Hac, both of whom had insufficient food each day when we met them, have won places in university and should go on to become valuable members of their society. Two dozen poor students (many of them orphans) are attending school every day. The Community Centre we funded with the help of Interact at Balwyn High School is an active Centre catering for the social needs of people of various ages. Our provision of refrigeration at the Health Clinic enables staff to go to remote locations and inoculate babies against disease. We are supplementing kindergarten meals for 100 young children with nourishing food. Six classrooms and the staff room at Keliki III Primary School now have good quality cupboards for their books and supplies. Children are being introduced to computers at Puhu IV Primary School, and students from neighbouring schools are also attending instruction. Rice growing has been reintroduced to the Solomon Islands, and women have equipment to help them make and repair clothing and other cloth items. The Club can be proud of its international achievements, and is really making a difference to people's lives.

THE GLOBAL PEACE FORUM—HIROSHIMA, MAY 2013

The project to send a Rotarian and Interactor to the Global Peace Forum in Hiroshima was an initiative of our late President Terry Gretton. It was proposed as a way of investing in New Generations who are already involved in Rotary. I was honoured to be selected to attend the Forum together with Lauren McLennan, a member of Interact from Balwyn High School





The Rotary Global Peace Forums were a special project of the 2012/2013 Rotary International President Sakuji Tanaka. There were

three forums held throughout the world; the first took place in Berlin and had the theme "Peace without borders". The second had the theme "The green path to peace" and was held in Honolulu. The theme for the final forum in Hiroshima was "Peace begins with you" and was focused on how young people could work towards peace through their everyday lives.

There were many amazing experiences during our time in Japan, however here are some of the highlights:

- Visiting Osaka: We went to several museums including Osaka Castle and the Museum of Housing and Living where we were able to dress in traditional clothing and explore a traditional Japanese village complete with houses and shops giving an historical account of life in Japan.
- Attending a meeting with the Rotary Club of Osaka Next: Although the meeting was conducted in Japanese, it was interesting to see a club specifically for younger members and the difference in the way the meeting was structured. The members were very welcoming and spending time with them was a great insight into modern Japanese culture.
 - Enjoying local cuisine: including ramen, takoyaki, tempura, gyoza and okonomiyaki.
 - The Friendship Party: This took place in the evening of the first day of the forum and was an opportunity to get to know Interactors, Rotaractors, Peace Scholars and Rotarians from around the world.
 - The Forum: This was held within Peace Park and next to the Peace Memorial Museum. It was a constant and sobering reminder of the damage caused by war but also provided a vivid message of hope and the opportunities that come with peace.
- The World Friendship Centre: One of the Rotaractors who we met during the forum, invited us to meet the people he was staying with in Hiroshima. They run an information centre/bed and breakfast dedicated to the hibakusha (the survivors of the atomic bomb). This was an amazing chance to hear more about the aftermath of the bombing of Hiroshima and to hear about the continuing impact on the residents of the city and it's surrounds.
- Visiting Miyajima (Itsukushima): This is considered to be one of the "3 views of Japan". It was a wonderful cultural experience with many shrines and temples to visit as well as the famous torii gate.

Overall, the trip was an amazing success, surpassing our expectations and giving us many opportunities for learning and development. In addition to learning more about peace and how we are able to build peace into our own lives through the forum, we gained valuable insights into a very different culture and made many new friends that mirror not only our dedication to Rotary but our commitment to building a better world. Thank you for giving us this incredible opportunity.

TOM WING YOUNG

Passed away 7 February 2013

Tom joined the Club in 1980 as a Charter member and remained an enthusiastic, popular and very involved member until his retirement in 1999.

He was President in 1989-1990, a Paul Harris recipient and was granted Honorary membership on his retirement.

Tom faced massive health problems for many years and the way he coped with, and regularly overcame, his many bouts of serious ill health became legendary.

He was an ABC (Australian born Chinese), born in very humble circumstances. His father, who had received no formal education, struggled to ensure that "Number One Son" received a good education, resulting in Tom attending Scotch College.

He spent his life in the Chinese food catering and restaurant industries, and was, with his father, responsible for the invention of the dim sim.

Tom's Rotary history is notable for arranging our first golf/fellowship weekend in October 1985 at Rich River which set the pattern for many such weekends ever since. He was in charge of our Club's first foray into food catering to the public when he was responsible for the catering at the Aero modellers Display in March 1984. He was also in charge, from 1987 onwards, of the "Tom's Café d' Wheels" food caravan at the "Hole in One" golf competition.

On the personal side, Tom had four loves:

- Norma to whom he was married for 62 years and their five children;
- Food (as president, business would be suspended the moment his meal arrived);
- Golf (he was a member of Metropolitan Golf Club, but was unfairly accused of believing that women should never have been allowed on a golf course);
- and the Collingwood Football Club (with a life-time supply of the oft-played videos of the 1953, 1958 and 1990 Grand Finals).

Tom will long be remembered by his large number of friends as a thoroughly loveable person, and a committed, hard -working member of Rotary.

One example of this generosity is the support extended by the Rotary Club of North Balwyn, which recently assisted ten rural properties within the Moira Shire to clear fence lines of debris, re-stand existing fences and in many cases, complete fence renewal. While the task is enormous for one farmer, a large group can achieve results swiftly.
