President's Report 2013-2014

It's hard to believe, but yet another year has passed and we will soon be welcoming a new president of the North Balwyn Rotary Club. This year has flown by, and on reflection, our achievements have been immense. Preceded by the culmination of years of hard work by our members, this club is today a vibrant, forward thinking and community spirited organisation of which we should all be proud.

Violent Free Families has proven to be a worthy charity of choice for the 2013 -2014 year. There is no doubt that the issue of family violence has been highlighted strongly in the media in the past year and it is comforting to know that our club has taken steps in support of families across Victoria. The hard work of this club has helped the Rotary Club of Brighton, teamed with Life Education to take the initial steps in the establishment of programs which are set to be rolled out in primary schools in the coming months. We have set aside \$15,000 raised at the very successful Charity Golf Day to be donated to this worthy cause.

Another project very important to me is the establishment the Men's Shed at the North Balwyn Bowls Club. This project is well under way and the proceeds of the annual Christmas Raffle will be set aside for this wonderful local community initiative.

The annual Multi Cultural Festival held in the North Balwyn Village and the Gardening Program go from strength to strength, and with the participation at the annual Carols by Candle Light at MacLeay Park, our club is gaining an ever increasing profile within the local community.

Paul Harris Fellows were awarded to seven very worthy recipients. Their commitment to the club and more importantly the community has been outstanding. I am honoured to have the opportunity to present these awards.. A sum of \$15,000 has been donated to the Rotary Foundation.

Our Catering Committee has continued its hard work providing services at the Grand Prix as well as community functions throughout Victoria, one of which was the fellowship week of rebuilding fences after the devastating Gisborne fires. We helped reconstruct more than 2 km of fencing, much to the delight of the local farmers. The annual Golf weekend held at Wangaratta attracted more than 50 members and their partners. Fellowship was certainly enhanced during this fantastic weekend.

Proudly, we have supported projects in Vietnam, Indonesia and The Solomon Islands. Further to our hard work, support and commitment to the Rotary organisation 'Donations In Kind' we now hold a position on the D.I.K. board.

We have also continued with the Police Mentoring Program. I consider this program very important as it continues to bring the Police and Rotarians closer together for the betterment of the community. Importantly, refugees have also benefited from our mentoring program. This initiative has seen club members volunteer at schools throughout Greater Melbourne.

Guest Speakers at the dinner meetings have been another highlight of the year with many and varied topics covered from sporting icons to community leaders. Also, member profiles were popular and a great way to learn more about the past, present and future of our fellow Rotarians.

Clarisse Bachut has been a wonderful exchange student and has left a marked impression. A big thank you to all who hosted her and made her stay welcome. I am sure she will go home with many great memories and stories.

A big thank you must go to all members, partners and Friends of Rotary. I would also like to acknowledge the Board for their continued commitment, in particular Vice President, David Cheney and Secretary, Gavan Schwartz for their support and guidance to me throughout the year. Without their commitment and dedication the year would not have been so successful. Thanks too to Karen for her continued support.

Overall the year has been a very successful one for the Rotary Club of North Balwyn .and I wish Adrian all the best during his year as president.

Treasurer's Interim Report, 2013/14

The enclosed is a provisional summary based on finances through May and part of June. Not all payments for the year have been made.

First, as a newcomer to the role, I'd like to thank last year's Club Treasurer Gary O'Connor for his guidance, for filling in when I was away, to Hugo Goetze for the weekly Club meeting meal summaries and related weekly work and to Marcel Muntwyler for his diligent banking for the Club each week. Also, for members who kindly completed the requisite Payment Request Form to properly process the payments and those who kept me in the loop with the Club's fund-raising projects.

For those not familiar to the Club's finances, we conduct two sets of accounting records (no not a real one and one for the Tax Office!), one the Administration Account and the other the Service Account in accordance with Rotary guidelines. Club subscriptions, operating costs, meal costs and payments, on-going costs to District 9800 and Rotary International – the day to day running costs and activities – are processed through the Administration Account. The Service Account takes proceeds from the Club's various fundraising projects that are used to support our Community, International, Rotary Foundation and Youth projects.

The Administration Account was budgeted to end in modest deficit; it now seems it will end in surplus, though there are payments yet to be made that occur at the end of each financial year.

The Service Account includes the proceeds of our major events for the year: the Golf Day (\$14,636 was raised after expenses), the Christmas Raffle (\$17,614), various catering events (\$8,826), the Grand Prix (\$13,687), Trivia Night (\$6,388), Bill's jams (\$1,200), the ladies' Christmas fair (\$2,211). The Board budgeted to raise just under \$64,000 from these major events. Through the hard work of your club members, their spouses and other supporters, just under \$66,000 was raised, a fantastic outcome!

Our financial support included for our various Community Service projects, namely the DIK membership (\$3,500), the North Balwyn Village Multicultural Fair (\$1,500), the Boroondara Gardens' Project (\$2,061 spent), the Boroondara School Fair (\$500), Carols in the Park (\$1,000), Camp Getaway (2,087) with commitments remaining to Violence Free Families and the Men's Shed. International projects included completion of payments/ installation of the Tetere windmill (\$1,710), disaster support for the Solomons Islands (\$2,219) and the Vietnam Minh Hac project (\$8,599). For Youth Vocational Service included for Youth Exchange (\$7,549, that comprises meal costs of sponsor families of \$2904 and financial support for our Exchange student Clarisse Bachut of \$4,645), MUNA (\$600), and RYLA (\$2,420). The Club donated \$15,000 to the Rotary Foundation.

Club Service

Keeping our hosts, the Kew Golf Club, happy with attendee numbers is not an easy task and the consequence of getting it seriously wrong could cause members to miss out on a meal or payment for excess meals ordered. Thank you Hugo for a job well done and I'm sure no one wants to take this job from you for the coming year.

Club Service

Peter Cleary acted as Almoner for the year and provided the club with updates on various members with their ailments. Whilst it is not always a good news type of story, Peter delivered it in an efficient and accurate manner each week.

Naomi Uehara's contribution to enhancing the web site has been appreciated and her departure for a career move to Canberra has left some big shoes to be filled. We hope to see Naomi back at the Club when she returns to Melbourne sometime in the future.

Marcel Muntwyler kept the monies flowing and ensured any "funny money" was segregated out for a separate report.

During the year we had the opportunity to review the pricing structure for our Club meals at Kew Golf Club. It was pleasing to see an outcome whereby we were able to adjust some of our arrangements with the bar closing earlier, the projector screen moved away from the doorway and other things that allowed for greater productivity of the kitchen staff. This in turn flowed through to a continuity of current pricing for our weekly meals. Kew Golf Club have done a great job hosting our meetings throughout the year and Peter Lambourne and his staff need to be thanked for the way in which it has operated. We look forward to their continued high service levels in the year ahead

Projects undertaken included:

- Gardens Project: This has been our major ongoing activity during the past year. We now have twelve local schools/groups which have participated since inception and a large number of students have passed through the program. More than 100 properties have been cleaned up. This has been a very positive exercise for all concerned with excellent feedback received.

 Special thanks to Rowan McClean who has, and continues to, devote a great deal of time and effort to ensure the ongoing success of this project. Brian Hurnard has also provided valuable assistance this Rotary year.
- **Multi-Cultural Festival**: This was another major undertaking for the year. The MCF was arranged in association with the North Balwyn Village Traders Association and held on Saturday 22nd February. Despite a damp start the day proved to be a success with good attendance. A large team of Club members assisted on the day. Special thanks to Rowan McClean and his committee who put in many hours to ensure the success of the Festival.
- Camp Getaway: Our Club sponsored a group of disabled children from Glenallen Special School to attend the camp during September with further camps planned for later in the year .Club members assisted with the running of the camp. FOUNDATION

The Committee's objective has been to promote and support the Rotary Foundation (TRF), noting the TRF mission is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education and the alleviation of poverty.

Two young and impressive speakers at Club meetings during the year provided focus on the Rotary Foundation. The first was Lien Trinh, recipient of the inaugural D9800 Post Graduate Scholar. This scholarship replaces what were known as Ambassadorial Scholarships. The program focuses on overseas study for a Master's degree. Lien Trinh, who already has Bachelor and Master in Optometry degrees from the NSW and Melbourne Universities spoke about her work in the field and her mission to "Reach populations not just individuals". To mark Rotary Foundation Month (November) the Club invited Rotary World Peace Scholar, Jessica Butcher to speak at a Club meeting. Jessica attended the University of North Carolina in 2011-2013 and her area of expertise is multicultural interfaith dialogue especially between Muslim and Christian communities.

The Club's contribution to the Rotary Foundation this year has been \$15,000, in line with previous years. This approximates \$200 per member. The Club continued seek to lift the profile of the Foundation by presenting guest speakers with certificates of appreciation indicating a contribution to TRF, as part of the Club's total giving to the Foundation.

The Club also provided a Royce Abbey Award this year, as has been our practice for the past five years. The award requires the Club to provide \$US1,000 to the Royce and Jean Abbey Cultural Ambassadorial program to assist the training of young men and women in developing countries. The Club's nomination for the Royce Abbey Award this year is Estelle Kelly.

The Club has also awarded seven Paul Harris Fellow recognitions during the year, each of which reflects a contribution of \$US1,000 to the Foundation. The Club, in its history, has now awarded more than 120 PHF recognitions. In looking at our history it is interesting to note the total amount of funding received by the TRF over the years from RCNB is almost \$300,000. This tangible contribution to the Foundation underpins all that we do as an International service organisation.

In a major effort this year the Foundation Committee actively sought to increase the number of Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY) members. 31 members of the Club are recorded as active members of the program which asks for a yearly contribution of \$100 or more. EREY is a matter for individual choice. But the Club continues to encourage members to join or re-join this program to ensure Rotary keeps doing "good in the world".

The Club's commitment to the Rotary Foundation has been directed towards the Rotary theme for 2013/14 of Engage Rotary Change Lives.

Once again another year of fundraising draws to an end, second year for me as the Fundraising Director, difficult at times trying to do the job whilst attending to my duties as incoming President. My apologies to all members if I have not met with their expectations.

INTERNATIONAL

Introduction

The International Committee has continued to put into practice the Rotary ideals of service and the advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through involvement with and support for partner communities and organisations in countries less fortunate than ours. The committee has decided to continue its focus on projects with communities that we have built strong relationships and where we know that our support will build sustainable and much appreciated outcomes and support these ideals. Our ongoing partnerships are with communities in Ubud, Bali, Minh Hac in Vietnam, Tetere in the Solomon Islands and Sue McDonald's ongoing work in Timor Leste. Financially we have concentrated on projects in Tetere and Minh Hac this year.

Minh Hac progress

In August Rowan McClean and Nino and Bev Sofra travelled to Minh Hac to check on progress with club projects and with the many students sponsored by club members and others through the Overseas Kids Foundation. The visit enabled us to hand over the funds raised by our Interact Club for use in supporting the community centre and associated library. During the visit in 2013 a wishlist of items was identified by the community and the club Board agreed to allocate funds to purchase AVTV teaching systems for the Primary and Secondary Schools. Here is the equipment bring delivered by our Vietnamese partners to the schools. The staff have never had display equipment like this to aid their teaching and they are extremely grateful. This was received with much ceremony and appreciation. We have also agreed to provide further funding for classroom furniture in the secondary school and further seed funding for the pig project.

Rowan, Bev and Nino were able to report on the success of the pig project which has provided for the construction of stalls and the supply of sows for individual farmers. This has been an outstanding success, with some farmers now having several sows and producing much needed income for their families. It is the first successful 'cash crop'in the village!

RCNB has agreed to continue support for Minh Hac village. A return visit to Minh Hac is planned for August 2014.





Bali

The installations of PC equipment and printers funded by the club in 2012/2013 were followed up during a visit to Bali by Rowan McClean in the first quarter of the year. The installations are in three locations around Ubud serving four Primary Schools and an Early Learning Centre, with teaching and maintenance being managed by the Ubud Rotaract Club. Students asked for more access and school timetables and curricula have been adjusted to meet the new needs, which reflects the success of these installations. We have insisted on the use of porn filters and equal access for female students.

INTERNATIONAL

Work in Solomon Islands

This year the Don Bosco Rural Training College at Tetere celebrates its tenth anniversary, and so this year marks ten years in which the Rotary Club of North Balwyn has been active in the Solomon Islands. In that time we have seen Tetere go from a few uncultivated fields to a vibrant and growing farm and teaching institution recognised by all as one of the leading teaching institutions in the Solomon Islands. It now has over 300 students enrolled in its two year course, and is expecting to increase that number towards 400 in the next year or two. In addition



to feeding the school community the farm at Tetere also provides food for the Salesian Sisters, the Technical Training College at Henderson and the adjacent Hospital at Tetere - almost a 1000 mouths to feed. Don Bosco Tetere welcomes students from all provinces and from all religions providing them with a broad, ethically based education with particular emphasis on agriculture and husbandry.

Over the years, we have helped with irrigation projects culminating with the erection of the first windmill in the Solomons last year. This is now providing water to irrigate several fields for rice production, adding to food security and enabling the boys to develop new farming skills that they can take back to their villages. We have also provided lumber to enable the students to build bunks for the new boys accommodation block, and are now working to assist with providing the concrete and materials for foundations of the new classroom block which will be built by the students themselves with the help of the Japanese Government's Grassroots Foundation.

With the help of the Aisin company, through the good offices of our late member Robert Ebihara, we have also been able to help the Salesian Sisters who run a hostel and women's refuge near the airport to help and support girls and young women, many of whom are coming to Honiara to study. We have now provided some 12 sewing machines and threads and materials for the ladies there so that they can develop skills and potential for earning an income.

Work on constructing new facilities in the Solomons has been disrupted by the devastating floods that affected the islands earlier in the year, leaving many people homeless. Our partners were active in providing releief for those affected. At a recent visit by Sr Saleia to our Club, President Larry was able to present her with a cheque for \$2100 to help with the recovery and re-establishment work following the devastating floods and earthquake which hit Guadalcanal earlier this year.

Global Grants Vocational Training Team in Timor Leste

Since November 2011 the VTT (Prof Jeremy Oats, Rotary Club of Melbourne, Prof Sue McDonald, Rotary Club of North Balwyn, Prof Caroline Homer, Dr Fiona Cullinane, Dr Ingrid Bucens and Dr Jim Lie) have participated in providing 12 training courses over 6 visits to over 100 midwifery and medical health professional across Timor Leste. This is one more trip than the originally anticipated 5 and due to careful financial management we are hopeful that we will be able to make 1 final visit in August 2014. The majority of the participants are working in poorly equipped health centres and posts with minimal resources.

The refresher course concentrates on skilling the participants to be more aware of and able to provide better care or more expedient referral and transfer in situations most likely to cause death or severe injury or ill health in women and infants – haemorrhage, infection, high blood pressure, obstructed labour, premature labour, shock, breech presentation and neonatal resuscitation.

The workshops include lectures, case studies, a great deal of interactive simulation exercises with obstetric models and discussion , all of which is facilitated through the use of both local interpreters and our VTT colleagues Dr Ingrid Bucens who also speaks Tetum and Dr Jim Lie who also speaks Indonesian.

Further funding has been sought to continue the work which anecdotally and through pre and post course evaluations indicate the refresher training is of value in increasing the clinicians' knowledge and their direct clinical practice. We all feel very privileged to be part of this team, greatly value the opportunity to work on the project and are extremely indebted to Rotary International and the RI Global Grants Committee for their faith and support.

Police Mentoring Scheme

This scheme was once again an outstanding success. Inspector Campbell Mill was assigned to our club. Gavan Schwartz very capably handled liaison between Campbell and our club, to mutual benefit. Apart from his periodic club visits, Campbell also addressed the club, as guest speaker, on his own important strategic police role.

The club hopes to participate again in 2014-15 but, at the time of writing, is uncertain as to the outcome of our application. The number of applicant clubs exceeds the number, about 21, of available police mentorees.

Student Careers' Days and Mock Interviews

Counselling at Careers' Days and Mock Interviews was successfully carried out at Balwyn High and Camberwell Grammar, with every indication that these visits will be repeated in 2014-15. Moreover, some experienced club members from outside the committee were called on to provide special expertise in these projects, for which we particularly thank Garth Symington, Rowan McClean, Naomi Uehara and David De Garis for their contributions.

Help for The Disabled

The committee sought to facilitate a project whereby disabled students at Belmore Special School would be helped by Year 12 Balwyn High students who, during Schoolies' Week, were more interested in being of service to others than in pursuing self-indulgence. Although the project was not able to be brought to fruition, the experiment was beneficial. Both schools were enthusiastic and we are hopeful that the project, with modifications, will be implemented in the forthcoming Rotary year.

Vocational Month Speaker

The committee arranged for Sister Mary Lewis of Mercy Connect and Asunta Deng, a former refugee from South Sudan now working as a teaching aide at St. Albans, to address the club as Vocational Month speakers.

Tuition For Asylum Seekers and Refugees

Whilst it has not so far been possible to establish a club project assisting asylum seekers and refugees, a number of club personnel now assist Jesuit Social Services and the City of Brimbank in providing English tutoring at Sunshine, and also assist Mercy Connect in providing educational assistance to refugee children at a Dandenong school. Any member or partner wishing to help with this work, which is not onerous but does require sensitivity and a fairly regular weekly commitment, is invited to speak to John Gartlan.

Projects in Progress

At the time of going to press, planning work is being done for our next site visit and for the sourcing of a suitable applicant who can be put forward for Rotary's excellent Shine On Awards scheme.

With an ambitious target for new members in 2014/2015 set by incoming President Adrian, it remains to be seen how successful the new brochure will be - but this can be reported upon next year.







Rotary Club of North Balwyn – Builds new fences in Gisborne – March 2014
