The Club members dedicated themselves to "Service above Self" and willingly gave of themselves, their time and expertise and ensured that all our activities were carried out to the highest possible standard.

Within the pages of this Annual Report are the details about all our undertakings during the year. These demonstrate the breadth of activities undertaken ranging from a community service multicultural festival to sponsoring students to attend RYLA to international projects in the Solomon Islands along with the fundraising efforts to ensure the projects could happen. The fellowship activities throughout the year gave members the opportunity to get together and enjoy each other's company in a fun and relaxed way. Thank you to every Director who so ably lead their Committees and planned a very full program throughout the year.

The year has been a testament to Team Work with members banding together to work on activities including gardening, catering, selling raffle tickets and working at Camp Getaway just to name a few. Every time volunteers were called for members quickly volunteered which ensured activities were successfully accomplished.

One of the goals I had set, prior to taking over as President, was to involve the wider Rotary community more with projects that involved the partners of Club members. Many of our Club members hold District positions which meant they were very good at juggling their time to fit in both District and Club responsibilities. This was invaluable for gaining a broader perspective of Rotary as they freely offered their expertise and advice when asked.

They attended meetings, made some tough decisions, instituted changes, formed sub committees to tackle difficult issues and worked diligently to ensure the smooth running of the Club. A silent member attending Board meetings is the Minute Secretary and Rob Head carried out this role very ably with the minutes always sent out a few days after each meeting.

The Club Secretary is a pivotal position within the Club and Gavan Schwartz has carried out this role with incredible dedication. He is very well organised, clear thinking and ensured that all paperwork was always completed on time. Gavan has spent much time, behind the scenes, compiling a policy document for the Club. It is not a glamorous job but is a most important one and one that will help the Club to function smoothly. A huge vote of thanks to Gavan for all he does.

The Vice President is another pivotal position and Brian Hurnard has filled this role brilliantly. He has given me his unstinting support and was always there with advice and wisdom, which I have so much appreciated.

CLUB SERVICE

Committee Director: Brian Lacy

Club Service relates to the effective and efficient administration of club business, the health and vibrancy of our Club and the wellbeing, enlightenment and engagement of our Rotarians.

I have had the privilege of serving with President Jane and her team this past year as the Club Service Director for North Balwyn Rotary Club. It is my second year in that role and it is an honour to have been asked to serve with President Elect Rowan for yet a third term. At this point I want to thank President Jane for her inspirational leadership and support over the course of this year. I look forward to working with Rowan in the coming year.

Club Service Issues

Apart from the issue concerning the Club's meeting venue the year has been unexceptional from a Club Service perspective. The year began with some of the Club's members expressing dissatisfaction with the Kew Golf Club's meals and service. Surveys of the members about an alternative meeting venue resulted in majority support for RCNB remaining at Kew. Consequently the Board resolved to continue its arrangement with Kew Golf Club as the venue for our meetings.

Following discussions and negotiations with the management of Kew Golf Club about the quality of food and service there has been significant improvement in the meals and service. Periodic meetings with KGC management will continue to monitor the situation.

There remains some dissatisfaction about the bar closing before the end of the meeting. Some members would like the bar to remain open for drinks at the conclusion of our meetings. It is a question of cost and whether members would be willing to pay something of a levy on top of the amount they pay for the meal to keep the bar open.

It has been suggested that RCNB ought to conduct a tender process every two years to appoint a venue and provision of hospitality for the conduct of its meetings. I consider such a process would be beneficial to both RCNB and the selected service provider. It would specify the scope of the services and make for greater certainty about the nature and quality of service to be provided.

Club Service Team

I want to acknowledge and thank also the Club Service team of this past year for their excellent work.

Tony Wells has done an excellent job as our Sergeant at Arms. He has set the tone of our meetings always ensuring they are conducted efficiently and effectively. In doing so he has been a real presence and an entertaining toast master. Tony is taking a break this year and Maurie Walters has agreed to step up to take on the Sergeant role. He is to be supported by David de Garis who has agreed to take on the role of Assistant Sergeant.

Maurie has relinquished his role as Program Coordinator, a role he has performed effectively and with alacrity for some time now. He has maintained and provided us with a program of quality speakers throughout the year. I welcome Russell Turner who has agreed to take on the Program Coordinator role.

Hugo Goetze has agreed to continue in his role as Attendance Officer, a role he performs with due diligence and care year after year. Hugo's timely and accurate attendance reports and records are much appreciated.

Hugo has reported a net increase of three members for the year. Membership started the club year with 74. During the year the numbers slipped to 72 and increased to 77 by years end. Against this, the member attendance to all weekly meetings has varied between 36 and 56, whilst the total attendance at ordinary meetings has ranged between 40 and 63.

Attendance has been impacted upon by the significant number of members who are on District and Zone activities on Thursdays, or others who at times are on Catering (Fund raising) duties.

Special meetings such as Club Birthday, Grand Final, Christmas Dinner and Partner's nights had attendances in the 70's, 89 and 95. Not including Changeover, our largest meeting was the Melbourne Cup night when 15 members from RC Yea boosted our attendance to 100.

I am extremely grateful to Hugo for his timely and detailed reports on attendance.

Eileen Toohill has been a caring and compassionate Almoner for the past year and I am grateful for her work and support. I welcome Duncan as our new Almoner. Eileen will continue as part of the Club Service team in her new shared role as Greeter and I look forward to working with her in the coming year.

John Rennie has agreed to continue in his role as Protection Officer. John is doing an excellent job in monitoring the Working With Children requirements and compliance generally. He reports that a total of 60 of our members have current Working With Children certification. These are the only members who are legally (under Victorian law) able to take part in Club projects in which children, under the age of 18 years, are involved. John has on two occasions, emailed those who have not acquired certification encouraging them to submit applications. John is yet to approach some of the new members and he continues to monitor the project lists as circulated to ensure that the participants are qualified when required.

Fellowship is an important element of wellbeing, enlightenment and engagement of our Rotarians. David Cheney and his fellowship team have ensured that our Club has been well served with fellowship opportunities throughout the year. David's report on Fellowship events and activities is a separate report. I congratulate David and his team for the work they have done and what they have achieved. I am very pleased that David has volunteered to continue his role in Fellowship.

Barry Cummings will continue as Property Officer and Audio Visual manager for the coming year. Barry is in the process of consolidating the Club's property and assets and developing a register for that purpose. This is an important process and one which will require some assistance from other members of our club. I am pleased that Barry has agreed to continue in his position as Property Officer this year.

I thank David de Garis for his excellent photography in the past and welcome him as the official photographer. I thank Marcel Muntwyler, who has agreed to continue his banking role, for his work in that regard in the past.

Peter Sutherland will continue with the Grapevine but under the Communications portfolio. Peter has done a wonderful job as editor of the Grapevine. Peter of course does so much more for Club Service and I thank him for it. Thanks must also go to Peter Wilson who edited "The Grapevine" for the first months of the year while Peter Sutherland was on holidays. This was a steep learning curve for Peter W but one he tackled and succeeded brilliantly (and now he is very proficient using Publisher!).

The Club Website was revamped and now links in with the District and RI websites. This makes updating much easier and the 'look and feel' link with all the other Clubs in the District.

I welcome Findley Cornell to the team for Foundation. Peter Cleary, who has done an excellent job as an advocate for Foundation, will provide assistance to Findley. I thank Peter for his past performance and look forward to working with him again this year. They will look after EREY (Every Rotarian Every Year) and Paul Harris Society.

Rowan has assembled an enthusiastic Club Service team to ensure that our members are fully engaged in the life and management of the Club in the year ahead:

COMMUNITY SERVICE

The Community Service Committee successfully fulfilled its goal to reach out into the community and involve members in activities aimed and located within Boroondara and slightly further afield.

Gardening

A very successful Community Service program during 2015/16 and the Club is indebted to Greg Cribbes for coordinating this project. It takes a great deal of time and effort to do this and Greg's input has been continuous and vital to the success of the project.

With the generous time and support given by the RCNB Gardening admin team, the Club continued to coordinate Gardening visits at 'needy' properties with the enthusiastic involvement of students from Camberwell Grammar, Xavier College, MLC, Sienna College and Burke & Beyond – all very much appreciated and as we heard from the delightful teachers at one of our Thursday Meetings during the year, considered a most worthwhile experience.

During this year the project has accomplished:

- ⇒ 107 individual visits usually on 3 timings during the week, except during school vacation.
- ⇒ 54 separate properties visited with Gardening tasks ranging from minor tidy-up and pruning through to very, very significant makeovers (where prickles generally come at no-charge).
- ⇒ 539 Council waste bins filled with the results of our gardening.
- ⇒ Community service hours by the students per week were generally over 35/week, contributing some 1,200 vital hours to the Project and the wider community needs.
- ⇒ 38 Rotarians making a total of 261 attendances at visits throughout the year.

Servants

Many Club members supported Servants. A team of 3 adults and 3 interactors were part of the Servants Team in Run Melbourne, a major fundraising effort for Servants. Everyone walked or ran the course and enjoyed the experience. Other Club members went to Romana to cook a bbq and have it ready by the time the runners/walkers arrived there.

Club members cooked sausages and provided drinks at Carrical House for the annual carol singing event. This was a very happy occasion with more than 100 local people attending and joining in the carols.

Club members attended a performance at Scotch College which told the story of Carrical House and some of the resident's stories.

Club members went for dinner with the residents at Carrical with the aim of each group getting to know each other just a little better.

Club members attended the East Hawthorn Church where Matt spoke and told his recent story, which was very moving.

Club members attended the 30th Birthday for Servants and brought along the bbq trailer and cooked the bbq for the celebration.

Mens Shed

Planning for the Men's Shed continued with slow progress and some frustrating delays. A timeline was established with a projected completion during the coming Rotary year. A huge thank you to the Club members who are on the Board of the Men's Shed for their persistence and perseverance as planning with the Council took much longer than expected, however it would appear that the outcome will be well worth the wait.

Camp Getaway

The Club undertook a Working Bee in October which saw members and partners spend the weekend at Camp Getaway and much was achieved both outside and inside. This included concreting, cleaning the kitchen, washing cupboards and sorting out equipment all while enjoying each other's company.

Variety Club Christmas Party

Members attended the Variety Club Christmas Party to assist with the running of the event for a huge number of children who come and enjoy the experience.

Uniting Church Kew Christmas lunch

Club members went on 24 December to the Uniting Church in Kew to set up for Christmas lunch. This included setting the tables, finding chairs and putting up decorations and decorating the Christmas tree. Then on Christmas Day members went to assist with serving lunch.

Multicultural Festival

The Multicultural Festival, held in the North Balwyn Village in February, brought together more than half the Club members to assist throughout the day. This was an outstanding success with a huge number of people attending. Activities included cultural groups singing and dancing, school children singing, a magician's show, a petting zoo and clowns along with food and drinks to sample.

Camcare

As in previous years Club members donated toys at Christmas time which were given to Camcare for distribution within Boroondara.

The Club was asked to assist with providing shelving for Camcare and two members willingly purchased and put together shelving so that Camcare could house the many donations of food it received. Many thanks to Greg Matthews and Peter Elliott for carrying out this project.

Halloween

Club members donned costumes and assisted the Greythorn Traders to hand out sweets to children to celebrate Halloween. This was also an opportunity to give out Rotary information to parents and meet local residents.

Carols in the Park

Club members assisted with the organisation of Carols in the Park. Greg Ross took the role of MC and did a brilliant job. Other members organised and ran the Glo Stix stall, the profit which goes to fund the event, assisted with setting up and pulling down tents and gave out programs. A wonderful community event for more than 5,000 people.

Special Children's Christmas Party

The Special Children's Christmas Party was held at the Moonee Valley Racecourse and Club members were on hand to cook an endless supply of sausages and supply them in bread to feed 1,000s of hungry children and adults. A very worthwhile, but exhausting day.

YOUTH COMMITTEE

The Youth Committee has enjoyed a very productive year, maintaining ongoing projects and implementing new ones.

The year commenced with the Committee reviewing the roles and responsibilities document. Each member of the Committee contributed to investigating and assessing the worthiness of the programs listed in the document. Those programs considered no longer relevant to Rotary Club of North Balwyn (RCNB) have been deleted from the document. Traditional Rotary programs such as RYLA and RYPEN have been reassessed. At the same time programs provided by other agencies have been investigated and considered, for example, the Lord Somers Camps for Girls and Boys and Leadership Victoria programs. Science programs represented by the National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) and Conocophillips Science Experience have also been reviewed.

Youth Exchange Outbound

We have not sought to select and send a student as an outbound exchange student this year.

Youth Exchange Inbound

The Committee has accepted the offer to host an incoming student Moritz Ellermann from Germany for the 2016- 2017 Rotary year. For the first time we have agreed to share the responsibility and costs with another Rotary Club. In this instance the Rotary Club of Balwyn. A memorandum of Understanding has been drawn up between the two Clubs. The student counsellor will be Bronwen Dimond from the Rotary Club of North Balwyn. Moritz Ellermann has been given a place at Trinity Grammar. He will attend school with his first host family's son who is a student at there with the family provided by Rotary Club of Balwyn. The Rotary Club of North Balwyn also has a host family in place and is seeking one more host family.

Short Term Youth Exchange Inbound/Outbound - Mongolia

This pilot program has been planned and is being implemented by a sub committee comprising Ian Adams, Bill Oakley and Estelle Kelly. The first step of gaining Expressions of Interest from 14-16 year olds has been posted on Facebook. Potential interest is also being sought through local Secondary Schools and community groups e.g. Scouts. It is planned for an exploratory trip to Mongolia to be undertaken by some RCNB members later in 2016 with the potential to take Secondary students to Mongolia in June/July 2017. It is planned Mongolian students will visit Australia in January 2018.

North Balwyn Interact Club

The Interact Club has recommenced the 2016 school year with four Office Bearers and four Directors who make a strong leadership team. A teacher, Mr Brett Hobbs, has been delegated to Interact. Lachlan Pham is the President with Jenny Chong as the Vice President. Interact students are regularly invited to attend a Club dinner meeting.

The students have been able to select an area of interest to them and become involved in planning to continue to support established projects eg Servants and Minh Hac in Vietnam. New projects are being encouraged and students are busy planning to teach IT skills to residents at Eva Tilley Aged Care facility. The traditional fundraising events have been planned and implemented eg selling noodles at Athletics Day in Term 1. Plans are also underway for a Pizza Day, It Takes Two and selling cakes and sweets. The Interact Club continues to meet fortnightly on a Tuesday during lunchtime.

Three students attended the District 9800 Conference in Bendigo in March. They delivered an informative session including their video featuring the 2015 achievements. This video came equal second in a worldwide competition run by Rotary International.

The possibility of establishing a scholarship for a worthy student at Balwyn High School is being investigated. The Director of Music at Balwyn High School has put forward some suggestions.



In order to gain a higher profile in the school community the Youth Committee sponsored the badging of fifty caps for Interact Club members. It is hoped this will assist in spreading interest and support for Interact. Attendance at this year's meetings has improved with more than 10 or 12 students attending on a regular basis.



North Balwyn Earlyact Club



The EarlyAct Club at Balwyn North Primary School has been active in all areas of service. The Club has 45 enthusiastic members from Years 5 and 6. Jan Rowe has been the school representative for the past 2 years and Bronwen Dimond continues as the Rotary representative for the group.

As their School project, the members took on the "Lucky Pockets" stall at the school Fair. 300 plastic pockets were packet with donated lollies, toys and trinkets and were sold as a lucky dip item, for \$2.00 per pocket. The stall's \$600 profit was the highest amount raised by any student-run stall.

The Wesley Central Mission again benefitted from the efforts of the students focussing on our Community project. Boxes of food and toiletry items were packed from donations made by families from all areas of the school. These were then collected by the WCM and distributed to families in need of assistance, in time for Christmas.

Through the Overseas Kids' Foundation, the Club continues its sponsorship of Dung Quan, a twelve year old boy from Vietnam. An "It Takes Two" event is being planned for later in the year, with our students and teachers performing in our school Hall. The gold coin charge for this event will go towards Dung's sponsorship.

Our students made a short movie showing their involvement in a number of their EarlyAct projects. This was shown at the District Conference as an example of one of the groups endorsed by our Rotary Club.

This year saw a great fundraising result for the Club, providing the funds which drive all the other service activities and allowing us to make a substantial donation to our charity - The Rotary Foundation. The fundraising activities Committee will generate in excess of \$75,000 this Rotary year. It is difficult to be precise because fundraising continues throughout the year with the last scheduled fundraising activity just four days before the end of the year, and the first for next Rotary year just 10 days into the new year. I will mention the members of the Fundraising Committee in relation to the major fundraising activities they were involved with, but each fundraising activity relies upon, and gets wholehearted support from all Club members to be successful.

Christmas Raffle

For some, selling raffle tickets is not their favourite pastime. Nevertheless the Christmas raffle remains one of the most effective ways in which we as a Club show that Rotary is alive and well and working in our community. It is great to hear from ticket buyers, hundreds and hundreds of times, how well Rotary is regarded, and supported by our local community. Lindsay Pegg undertook the coordinating work for the second year running and was joined by Peter Elliott, to run what has become a finely honed machine, to marshall our members, partners and friends to be selling at the best returning sites at the best times. Besides making around \$9,000 for Club funds, the Golf Day extended our reach into our local community, with support from many local businesses. These connections have also resulted in several new members and Friends of our Club. Special thanks to Greg Matthews and Greg Cribbes who shared chairmanship of the Golf Committee which ran over a longer time than expected when the day needed to be postponed from October to February because of the condition of the course at Kew. The committee for the event included as well, Peter Elliott, John

Magor, Rowan McClean, and Geoff Steinecke. Congratulations to all on a great result, and plans are underway for a bigger and better day next year.

Grand Prix

We have been at the Grand Prix for as long as it has been here in Melbourne, and we have seen many changes in that time. Over recent years our involvement has steadily increased, to produce a remarkable result of nearly \$20,000 for the Club this year. The Saturday night dinner again wasn't a feature having been dropped by the Grand Prix Corporation last year, but it has been replaced with a thank you "brunch" for the many contractors involved in building and setting up the site. This takes place in the week of the Grand Prix proper. Additionally our involvement in the Historic Cars Paddock has risen from one lunch for the drivers to four all day sessions selling to the public. Income from this almost eclipsed our return from the traditional CAMS officials' breakfast. Geoff Steinicke headed up the team for the umpteenth time, and was assisted by Stephen Greatorex and Brian Lacy. Nino Sofra looked after all the food and cooking logistics, and dozens of our members and "petrol head" friends manned the various venues. Post mortem meetings with the Grand Prix Corporation indicate they are well pleased with our involvement and contribution, and next year we look forward to an even better return on our sales in the Historic Car Paddock and the possibility that we might provide a "sausage service" onsite for the contractors in the week or two leading up to the Grand Prix.

Catering

Led by Nino Sofra and a small team comprising Bill Oakley and Brian Lacy, we marshalled the Club members and friends to a multiplicity of catering events, the mainstay of which is regular appearances at Bunnings Box Hill to sell sausages and soft drinks. However we supplemented this with more sophisticated fare at the Miniatures Craft Fair, Rotary Craft Markets, and Boroondara Music in the Park Festivals with sandwiches, egg and bacon jaffles, muffins, soup, scones and biscuits. Introduction

The International Committee has made sound progress on projects in Minh Hac (Vietnam) and Tetere (Solomon Islands). Donations in Kind Inc., Footscray continues to be supported.

Vietnam

Minh Hac

Minh Hac, as for the entire Province of Phu Tho, has birth difficulties, high cancer rates, poor medical facilities and, from Government economic ratings, the poorest people nationally, with incomes averaging US\$20 per month.

The support needs of the community have been identified in collaboration with the People's Committee of Minh Hac and a range of opportunities for community development has been identified. Support provided over several years includes:

- Locally built infrastructure including a community center and library, and improvements to the health clinic.
- Assistance to pig farmers has generated for the first time, earnings from outside the community. Six farmers now have successful operations and have expanded into raising rabbits and ducks and well as capturing biogas and fertilizer through the process.
- The supply of dozens of pre-owned and new eyeglasses for people in both the Minh Hac and Yen Luat communities.
- Renovated laptops have been supplied to schools, the health clinics in both communities and to four students who have continued on to tertiary study.

2015 visit to Minh Hac

Rowan MacLean and John Burley led a visit to the local communities. Accompanying them were: Christine Burley, Scott Pepin, Director International Service Bacchus Marsh Rotary, Lita Foot, Director of Youth Services, Bacchus Marsh Rotary and Rachael (Trang) Nguyen, a Vietnamese-born Melbourne-based accountant who has assisted with project management and finance

Rotary Foundation District Grant

In February 2016, the RCNB received a grant of \$6,000 to support the projects at Minh Hac, providing that RCNB matches the grant on a \$2 for \$1 basis. Our contribution of \$12,000 forms the largest component of our 2016/17 Budget.

The project addresses key focus areas:

Water and sanitation

Basic education and literacy

Economic and community development.

Specific objectives rising from these key focus areas are the provision of safe drinking water for school children and extending the support currently being provided to local pig production. The village has recognised that pig production is a cost-effective way of improving the incomes of its poorest families. The project provides assistance in setting up pigsties, purchasing breeding sows and for the provision of ongoing training and technical support.

The local People's Committee is keen for this support to be given to suitable females, who wish to enter pig production - as small-scale loans, some initial grants for setup costs, and ongoing training. Establishing an efficient and reliable administrative mechanism for micro loans is under investigation.

Yen Luat

As a result of achievements at Minh Hac, in 2014 the Provincial Government asked Rotary to assist another poor community at Yen Luat. The Rotary Club of Bacchus Marsh agreed to assist this community for five years after representatives from Bacchus Marsh visited Yen Luat for the first time in September 2015.

Solomon Islands

Royce and Jean Abbey Scholarship

During the year, RCNB was the recipient of the Royce and Jean Abbey Scholarship, worth \$US10,000. It was used to fund a two-month intensive vocational program for Janny Saukeni, a teacher at the Don Bosco Rural Training College Tetere. The objective of the program was to enhance Janny's understanding of animal husbandry and vocational teaching through work experience in a range of animal production settings.

Brief synopsis of her program

Otway Pork, Winchelsea - 2 weeks - Breeding and raising free-range pigs Free Range Eggs, Traralgon - 2 weeks - Breeding and raising free-range chickens Department of Primary Industries, Benalla - 1 week - Cattle nutrition and management, bio-security issues.

Woodleigh College and Elizabeth Murdoch College, Mornington Peninsula - 9 days - Vocational education (Secondary): agriculture and animal husbandry to secondary school students.

Victorian Association of Agriculture and Horticulture - 1 day - Workshop

Rotary Donations in Kind (DIK)

RCNB continued to support DIK with an annual contribution of \$3,500 towards the rental and operational expenses of the store in West Footscray. During the year, RCNB volunteers assisted in collecting, transporting, sorting and packing school desks and furniture for shipment. Donated goods are shipped from DIK to developing countries, and include sending supplies to Rotary projects in East Timor and the Solomon Islands. RCNB Chairman of International Committee is a director of DIK Inc.

DAYS FOR GIRLS PROJECT

What is Days for Girls?

Every girl and woman in the world deserves education, safety, and dignity. Days for Girls gives women access to quality sustainable feminine hygiene and awareness, by direct distribution of sustainable feminine hygiene kits to enable them to manage menstruation. The kits, attractively presented in a fabric bag, contain all the items needed to enable women to carry on with their lives while they menstruate. These supplies are reusable and avoid the need to use expensive paper products which are unsustainable and cannot be disposed of easily. The kits are sometimes stitched and donated to the women or the women are taught to make the kits themselves.

It turns out this issue is a surprising but instrumental key to social change for women all over the world. Girls often stay home from school when they menstruate and so having adequate supplies enables them to stay at school and empowers them through the continuity of education which breaks the poverty cycle. (www.DaysforGirls.org)

The "Days for Girls" (DfG) project has proved a very successful initiative, undertaken by the ladies of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn. There have been two different components to this project, one taking place in Melbourne and one in the Solomon Islands

Bev Sofra and Diane Goetze took a lead role in establishing a sewing group to make kits initially for distribution by individuals and groups who were travelling to areas where the kits were needed.

Then grew the idea to take the DfG scheme to the Solomon Islands where RCNB has some established projects through the Don Bosco schools and especially through the Salesian Sisters with their Mary Mazzarello Development Centre (MMDC) in Henderson.

Sewing days commenced and have proved incredibly successful with up to 18 ladies attending each time and enjoying both the companionship and the satisfaction of completing more than 100 kits.

Some kits will be taken to Timor Leste with Sue McDonald and some went to the Solomon Islands.

A team comprising Jane Pennington, Bev Sofra, Sally Sharp and Sally Sutherland along with Nino Sofra and Bill Oakley travelled to the Solomon Islands for 8 days in April 2016. The ladies worked on the Days for Girls project while Bill and Nino researched further projects which could be undertaken at the Don Bosco School in Tetere.



The (ladies) team stayed at MMDC with the Salesian Sisters and introduced Days for Girls to three different groups of women. In total 68 women were taught to make kits and received a finished kit. Instructions were given as to how to make the kits and this will be incorporated into future Life Skills courses at MMDC. Some women were most interested to continue making kits and potentially using this as an income generation scheme to support their families. The relationship between the MMDC and RCNB was cemented and will be built on in the future. Additionally some women were introduced to sewing and this skill will be useful to them in the future.

This is the first step in an ongoing commitment to this project in the Solomon Islands. The next steps are being developed!!

A huge thank you to everyone who was involved and made this project happen. Special thanks to the Team members, the ladies of RCNB who gave their time and talents, the Sisters at MMDC and the women in the Solomon Islands who were so enthusiastic to learn.

VOCATIONAL COMMITTE

In 2015-16, the goal of the Vocational Service Committee was to develop and execute a dynamic, respected and positive plan that would:

a. Build an understanding of the importance of Vocational Service within the Club.

- b. Undertake programs that will improve the business skills of Club members and the local community.
- c. Undertake programs that will improve the skills of members to contribute to the well-being of community members.
- d. Contribute to the District Vocational Services Program.

Continuing Programs

The programs that were successfully conducted by the Club in FY14-15 continued in FY15-16:

- a. The Police Mentoring Program continued under the stewardship of Findley Cornell and the Club welcomed the involvement of Senior Sergeant Dan Hilton.
- b. The English-language tutoring program established last year and coordinated by John Gartlan continued with the assistance of Club members and their partners.
- **c.** Employment Interview Technique Training for senior students of local youth groups continued to be offered by Club members. In October 2015, eight Club members assisted the North Balwyn Venturers and plans are being finalised to again support Camberwell Grammar School.

New Programs for FY15-16

In addition to continuing programs, the following programs were undertaken;

- a. Vocation assisted the Board by reviewing the governance of the Club, recommending improvements and developing a Financial Procedures Manual. The recommendations and Manual were endorsed by the Board in March 2016 and Colin Sharp provided a presentation to Club members on its key points. I appreciate the valuable assistance of Geoff Haddy and Russell Cooper in this endeavour.
- b. Defibrillator training was given to a number of Club members to ensure that the Club's defibrillator could be deployed and used if necessary at selected Club service activities. Max Hardy also presented at a Club meeting on the use of the device.

- c. In October 2015, Paul Geyer, the State Manager of the Australian Institute of Company Directors spoke to the Club on Business Ethics and contemporary issues facing Board Members and company executives.
- d. Nino Sofra through the Director Fundraising, asked for a number of members to be trained as baristas to assist with catering events. Jurgen Kehne, owner of Cafe Romeo was approached and has agreed to train seven Club members.
- e. The Vocation Committee cooperated with the Fellowship Committee to arrange a visit the Shrine and the War Cabinet Room in Victoria Barracks. The Shrine visit was successfully completed but the visit to the Barracks visit was not possible due to heightened security.
- f. The Club undertook a successful visit by 28 members and partners to the Melbourne Wholesale Fruit Vegetable & Cut Flower Market on 17 Nov 15 to get a better understanding of wholesale market operations and logistics. I appreciate the support of Russell Cooper.
- g. Arrangements are being made for a Club visit to Fareshare in the current or next year.

Ongoing Activities

- a. The Club aims to program a presentation on recognising depression in Executives. This activity is continuing.
- b. The Vocational Committee aimed to explore ways of participating in the Life-after-Stroke mentoring program by training Club members to effectively assist in rehabilitating community stroke sufferers. Activities are yet to be scoped by District and the Club will continue to be involved.
- c. A member of the District Vocational Service Committee was invited to present the new Vocational Service Vision to the Club. Despite a positive response, a visit was not able to be conducted this year.
- d. The Club aimed to participate in the District Rotary Skills in Action recognition program to highlight where members and the Club are applying their skills for the benefit of the community. The Club registered interest in the District Program and is awaiting details.

TREASURER'S REPORT

This has been my final of three years as Treasurer of the Club.

First, I'd like to thank Past President Adrian for his support for bring the accounts for 2013-14 up to speed and for the 2014-15, ensuring any necessary adjustments for the 2014-15 were made to the satisfaction of the Club's Auditor, both year's accounts now having been formally approved by the Club. New Assistant Treasurer Greg Cribbes will, from 1 July, be taking over as Club Treasurer and I wish him every success in the job and trust that you will all support him to do the job effectively and efficiently, as I feel confident he will, given his professional financial background.

I would also like to thank Marcel for his dutiful regular banking of the weekly cash and cheques collected from Club meetings, then leaving the deposit and weekly meeting paperwork in my letterbox so that everything can be accounted for. Also a big thanks to Hugo, to Adam and his staff at Kew Golf Club for details of how many have eaten each week, a necessary part of each week's accounting. I would also like to thank the Board and Club members for their forbearance in what has been a year of transition for the Club's accounting of its spending and expenses. I know that some members found the experience trying and frustrating. As I reported last year, the Club's accounts were moved to a cloud-based accounting system, Xero, a widely-used accounting system among small business, that requires no specific software to be installed, only an internet browser and is much more intuitive, for some people. It also offered the advantage of giving Board members real time access to the Club's accounts, payments, and account balances. It was my hope that this would also allow a smooth transition to the next Treasurer through the end of the 2015-16 financial year.

For those who might have recently joined the Club and may not be familiar with the Club's finances, we operate financially through two Accounts, one the Administration Account and the other the Service Account in accordance with Rotary guidelines. Club subscriptions, operating day-to-day running costs, meal costs and payments, ongoing costs to District 9800 and Rotary International are processed through the Administration Account. The Service Account takes proceeds from the Club's various fundraising projects that are used to support our Community, International, Rotary Foundation, Youth, Vocation and other projects.

As is usual practice, the Administration Account was budgeted to end in near balance and judging from transactions that have taken place so far this financial year and impending accounts and receipts to the end of the financial year, this is likely to be the case this year. In effect, Members Subs are used to finance the ongoing non-meal costs of the Club, postage, website and so on in addition to the District 9800 and Rotary International dues payable by the Club.

The Service Account includes the proceeds of our major Fundraising events and use of those and accumulated funds for the Club's service activities, both locally and offshore. Based on the events that have taken place to the end of May, total Fundraising has been a stellar \$79,779, after netting off various fundraising expenses (eg food, gas, materials).

Major fundraising to the end of May have totalled:

Our financial support for our various Community Service projects have so far this year totalled \$9,728, including \$5,000 for the Boroondara Family Network, our continued support for Donations-In-Kind (DIK) membership (\$3,500), as well as support for the very successful North Balwyn Village Multicultural Festival, the Club's Gardens' Project, Carols in the Park, and shelving for Camcare to continue their excellent work.

The Club commitment to the Men's Shed we hope will become more of a larger financial reality as it moves closer to being constructed, a reality that the Club is financially provisioned for.

Among the International projects, President Jane's Days for Girls project has also been getting wide personal and financial support from the Club, its members and partners as we heard recently on a Thursday night. So far this financial year, \$6,601 has been directly expensed in financial support for the Day's for Girls project (materials, support for for training). The Club remains committed to Minh Hac and received a two District grants in support of the project, one for \$6,000 and another for \$2,500. The Balwyn High School Interact Club also made a \$533 donation in support of Minh Hac. The Club provided financial support for Syria's Refugee Crisis (\$1,000). Youth Service support included RYLA, MUNA and Youth Committee Student Sponsorship support.

The Club continues to actively support the Rotary Foundation and Foundation activities as well as Australian Rotary Health. This year, the Club received a grant of \$US 10,000 from the Rotary Foundation – Royce and Jean Abbey Foundation to sponsor the training of Janny Saukeni of which \$A7,143 has been spent so far this financial year.

Full details of the Club's accounts will be detailed after the end of the financial year. Your Club remains in a very solid financial position: at the end of May 2016, the Club had \$203,500 "in the bank" (in cheque accounts and term deposits), including its financial commitment to the Men's Shed, and two other special funds, the Disaster Relief Fund and President's Fund that can be drawn up as needed to support worthy projects as the needs arise.
