

Guest Speaker: Stuart Wenn; And then there were two.



Stuart is a past AFL field Umpire who made his AFL umpiring debut in 1995 and went onto umpire 341 games, including 5 finals and an exhibition match in London; he retired from umpiring at the end of the 2014 season.

He is an AFL Life Member and the 11th in the all-time games tally for a field umpire. Stuart has worked with the National Bank for many years as Business Lead - Capability; he joked about how more unpopular could a man be being an umpire and a banker!

Stuart remains heavily involved in AFL and umpiring and is currently the National Talent Coach.

Stuart was bombarded with questions about the changes in the game and current interpretation of rules by umpires, however to avoid any misinterpretation of Stuart's opinions of current happenings on the field no comments will be made here.

However Stuart noted that the AFL is sponsored to the tune of nearly half a billion dollars a year by advertising and TV rights and many decisions about how and when the game is played is influenced by the AFL and its sponsors.

The coaches like a series of controlled plays, and keeping possession of the ball. The umpiring supports fast free flowing games with minimal stoppages.

New rules and changed interpretation of current rules will be an ongoing part of the game to ensure it remains

the popular spectacle it is today.

Stuart delivered a lively and reflective presentation and gave us all an insight into some of the skills and working of AFL umpiring.

Stuart says "The best result an umpire can have after the Grand Final is that after the game, no one remembers who the umpires were".

Geoff's Health Tip

Is there a positive relationship between alcohol and cancer?

Last week, <u>The Age newspaper</u> printed details of a report from the <u>Centre for Alcohol Policy Research (CAPR)</u> in which it was stated that alcohol was to blame for 6.5 percent of male and 4.1 percent of female head and neck cancer deaths.

CAPR deputy director Michael Livingston said "alcohol remained a major contributor to Australia's burden of disease, with overwhelming epidemiological evidence that alcohol contributes to the development of specific cancers." For instance, more than 100 epidemiologic studies have looked at the association between alcohol consumption and the risk of breast cancer in women. These studies have consistently found an increased risk of breast cancer associated with increasing alcohol intake. The Million Women Study in the United Kingdom (which included more than 28,000 women with breast cancer) provided a more recent estimate of breast cancer risk at low to moderate levels of alcohol consumption. The study found that every 10 grams of alcohol (one standard drink) consumed per day was associated with a 12 percent increase in the risk of breast cancer.

The increasing incidence of cancers positively associated with alcohol might come as a surprise to many people as there is a general lack of recognition among Australians that alcohol causes cancer. Furthermore, a recent report in the <u>Drug and Alcohol Review</u>, when examining websites and documents from 26 alcohol industry organizations found that most of the information extensively misrepresents evidence about the association between alcohol and cancer.

I think we have we been misled by the alcohol industry in much the same way as the 'big tobacco' industry denied an association with lung cancer. The cosy sight of wine makers sniffing and tasting a nice red is very appealing but nowhere is there a warning of a health risk. Sure, the associated public relationship organisations have promoted the 'responsible drinking' message, but what does this mean? Does it mean that there is a real risk to your health? No, it means keep your blood alcohol level below 0.05% to drive without the risk of losing your licence – hardly a warning that alcohol has been positively associated with a risk of cancer.
