Our Meeting at Shed 39 Somerville Road West Footscray to see the move of Donations in Kind from Shed 40 to Shed 39.

Donations in Kind or DIK colloquially, consists of many parts of which the most visible has been Shed 40 at Somerville Road; however to avoid an inevitable rent increase DIK is in the throes of moving into Shed 39 which attracts cheaper rent due to its restricted southerly access to large vehicles. The move has incurred many man hours to relocate the pallet racking, put down new floor lines, build new offices and amenities and then relocate the stock, whilst also continuing the picking up of donated goods and stuffing of containers.

The other parts of DIK are its dedicated management team, Rotary volunteers, donors of funds and donors of goods and services. Bob Glindemann, Laurie Fisher and David Dippie, together with a



team of regular volunteers keep the store goods sorted and ready for containerisation in support of Rotary Overseas Projects. 

<u>Geoff's Health Tip</u> Sesame Seeds are more Nutritionally Active than we thought





We have all purchased bread coated in sesame seeds only to find they fall off as soon as you start cutting the loaf into slices. I would rather the sesame seeds be included within the bread mix than be used for temporary decoration, but I suppose it is visually attractive giving the impression of being wholesome and natural. Apart from this, sesame seeds have special health benefits that I will refer to later.

Sesame is an erect, annual plant Sesamum indicum L., or Sesamum orientale, belonging to the family Pedaliaceae, cultivated since antiquity for its seeds.

Records show it was first cultivated in China 5,000 years ago and later in parts of India. From there it was brought to Africa and the Middle East, and its value both medicinally and for cooking gradually spread.

In the Middle Eastern countries, sesame seeds are crushed in a stone mill to produce a paste known as Tahini. Tahini has a nutty taste and blends well with honey to produce a spread. Halvah is another delightful confection made of partly crushed sesame seeds, sugar, vanilla, honey and a little salt. Disrupters: These days we hear a lot about 'disrupters', whether it be Uber, Amazon or Cryptocurrencies. It is also a word used when 'endocrine disrupters', such as phthalates, propylbenzoates, toxic weedicides, etc, affect our endocrine system. This includes the secretion of hormones and function of our glands as well as ovaries, pancreas and testes.

The Rescuer: Sesame seeds have now gained fame for their high lignan content and phytoestrogens that are biologically active elements with antioxidant and chemoprotective properties.

How it works: Structurally similar to estrogen, lignans are credited with reducing the risk of hormonerelated diseases such as cancers of the breast, ovary, and prostate. Lignans have the ability to bind to estrogen receptors in cells, an action that has an inhibitory effect on the metastasis process. Geoff

DAYS FOR GIRLS

There are limited educational and skill development opportunities for young women and girls in the Solomon Islands, and simple items like feminine hygiene products are often rare. A couple of years ago, the Rotary Club of North Balwyn began fabricating a range of such items for them. The program has since extended to Timor Leste and Papua New Guinea. The "Days for Girls" team make templates and samples in

Australia, then travel to teach the girls how to use sewing machines and, where possible, make the kits themselves, enabling them to go to school any day of the month. The team meets for sewing/ packing days once a month at the Uniting Church, Duggan St, Balwyn North and are always on the lookout for new members.
