Bill's Banter

This week's Speaker - Gabe Hau from the Rotary D9800 E-Club - gave a sobering and challenging talk about family violence, and the response from the Rotary Club of Brighton in setting up Violence Free Families (VFF). The first task was to objectively evaluate the intervention/training courses which were routinely used to treat -mainly men- and hopefully to achieve some behaviour modification. With the help of Melbourne University some independent research was undertaken which found that the programs had some positive effect. Based on the outcome of this research Violence Free Families set about developing an online program which could also be used for country and remote residents who could not easily get to a city based, face to face program. Gabe reported on the steady progress being made despite the lack of political support, and sometimes in the face of active opposition.

Our Club has been a substantial contributor to VFF to help RC Brighton with its set up. Gabe described the complexity of reasons and causes of family violence and stressed the need for us as a community to adopt a nuanced and multi-faceted approach to dealing with the effects and causes of family violence. The approaches developed and adopted by VFF are independently evaluated and tested VFF is now an independent Company that raises and spends about \$500,000 a year and conducts programs and research to reduce family violence.

As part of Mental Health Week and to support the <u>ARH Lift the Lid on Mental Health</u> we all wore funny hats and tried our knowledge on a Hat Quiz. Thanks to Eileen Toohill for judging the best hat, and congratulations to Estelle Kelly for winning with a lovely Mongolian creation she brought back for her grand daughter, and then pinched back for the night! Thanks to Jane Pennington for organising all the hat frivolity and for doing her usual masterful job as Host for the night. The result was \$400 to \$500 for ARH.

On Friday our members were rattling tins for this cause at Bunnings Hawthorn. Thanks Jim Romanis for organising us also to the Club members who volunteered.

Its our final push with the Gardening Project over the coming few weeks before end of year exams. We need more help to supervise gardening sessions, please make contact with Brian Hurnard if you can volunteer.

Born and educated in England, the son of champion international jockey Ron. Came to Australia in 1983 and was apprenticed to Colin Hayes at Lindsay Park.

Leading apprentice first year riding 1984/85 in South Australia. Took over as number one rider for Lindsay Park from the injured Jim Courtney in 1989 and was the leading jockey in South Australia the following two years (1989/90, 90/91).

Moved to Melbourne in 1991 to ride as number two jockey for David Hayes and had great success at Group level the following few years, the most memorable being the 1993 Caulfield Cup on Fraar.

The winner of around 900 races (approx. 50 at Group and Listed level) and with wide international experience including winners in Britain, Europe, Hong Kong, Macau and Malaysia.

Retired from the saddle at the end of the 2001/02 season only to return in 2008.

Finally retired from riding after badly breaking a leg New Year's Eve, 2012.







Geoff's Health Tip

Gout, a simple disease waiting for a new strategy



When I was quite a small boy I can remember my uncle Fred suffering from pain in his big toe, he said it was gout. To me, it was a funny word that didn't have a meaning, except to my uncle it meant pain - sharp excruciating pain. Normally, he would love to have a kick of the football, but on 'gout days' he sat in a reclining chair with his foot up in the air to relieve the pain. Now, six decades later, the prevalence of gout has increased from 0.5% of the population to 1.7% with over 400,000 sufferers in Australia. The prevalence of gout in elderly male Australians is second only to New Zealand, which has the highest reported rate in the world.

The pain of gout is due to the build up of uric acid in the blood to the point that monosodium urate crystals form in joints - often the large joint of the big toe. The usual treatment is to take medication that reduces the amount of uric acid in the blood to below a certain level. Interestingly, some people with high uric acid, do not suffer from crystallisation in the joints as the excess urate is expelled in the urine.

Uric acid is formed when the body digests purines, compounds found in most foods in varying amounts, but especially in refined foods, processed red meat, anchovies, beer (from the yeast) and beans. The list of foods to avoid and foods to eat is extraordinarily long and has probably been compiled from anecdotal evidence over the past hundred years, but high intakes of coffee, low-fat dairy products and vitamin C are associated independently with low risk.

The arbitrariness of treatment is best summed up by Dr.Juergen Braun, Medical Director of Rheumatology, Ruhr University, Germany, who said, "I think the most important message is that gout is a simple disease in the way that it is easy to define targets such as constantly low uric acid levels. However, there are almost no studies checking whether strategies to reach those targets work and whether we should change our strategies."

Worldwide statistics show that gout is increasing in most countries with Australia having one of the highest occurrences, increasing 300% in the past 60 years. Like many diseases that are increasing worldwide, the causes are difficult to pinpoint, but introduced changes in food production and lifestyle are the primary suspects.
